Mr. Mackay asked if the continuation schools would be inspected. Dr. Pyne replied that a special inspector had been appointed for that

Dr. Pyne explained that the purpose of his bill respecting separate school fifth classes and continuation classes was to give separate school boards the same privileges and advantages as public schools in regard to such classes. The bill received its second reading.

Passing of the Model Schools. The amendments to the department of education act, as explained by Dr.

Pyne, provide for certain necessary changes. When the new normal schools are in operation some of the model schools will be abolished. Those remaining will be under the direct control of the department, which will select those to be retained. UNCLE SAM'S NAVAL PRO-GRAMME.

Old world countries continue strengthening themselves at sea as if they were preparing for an inevitable This is doubtless one reason why Secretary Metcalf, of the United States navy department, is found urging on Congress an appropriation of upwards of \$73,000,000 for naval construction and repair. The fact is a few years brings about great changes in a fleet. Of the United States ships that took part in the war with Spain, one battleship is out of commission on the Pacific coast and three other battleships, two armored cruisers, one second-class battleship, and one second-class armored cruiser are out of commission or held in reserve in the Atlantic coast naval yards, of Old London, where agitators can all being rated as obsolete, as, indeed, are all the heavy vessels left on the Atlantic side. In addition a number of oldtime commerce destroyers and protected cruisers and smaller craft are lying in disuse on the Atlantic stations. The major force of the navy




