Full Holiday Will Be Proclaimed by Mayor—If, As Unlikely, Unit Gets Here Before 3 p.m. Wednesday, Half-Holiday Will Be Observed.

Mayor C. R. Somerville reported just before press time today that he had no official word as to the probable time of the arrival here of the 1st Battalion. The latest information he had, he said, was that the Olympic was to dock at noon today.

His worship stated that if the unit arrived late on Wednesday afternoon, as seems likely, it would probably be held outside the city until the following morning, and that a full day's holiday would be proclaimed for Thursday. If, however, the battalion reached here at any time before 3 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon, a half-holiday would be proclaimed and the reception would be tendered the same afternoon.

Mayor Somerville announced that addresses of welcome would be given by himself and probably by Sir Adam Beck.

Many Causes for Dispute.

Behind and underneath all materia progress is that supplied by the league of nations. It is practically the guarantor of many material facts, while by rejection of all French amendments i has deprived itself of all but mora force. Whatever may be the point of view at the present time, it is at least useful to present the European view of the league of nations in its present form. In both Great Britain and France it has been in all discussions of recent days subordinated to practical questions, and there is a universal tendency to regard the understanding between Great Britain, France and Italy, which more and more takes on the character of an alliance, an alliance which has at least the benevolent assent of the United States, as the real practical force. In other words, in Europe the prevailing impression is that after much preliminary negotiation we have had recourse once more to the old system of alliance and balance of power.

When peace with Germany is signed, on or about May 10, assuming the Germans do sign, there will remain all the great questions of the east and of the south, ranging from Russia to the Persian Gulf, few of which have been more than opened so far. Only the Italian boundaries and claims are sure to be settled by the time German difficulties are out of the way, but at least and at last there seems a real possibility that we shall be at peace with Germany again within a month, and that the main business of the peace conference will thus be liquidated, although the map of Eastern Europe and Western Asia will be still unmarked.

All along the great battle line now the Allies were advancing, and at the time the armistice was signed on November 11 the Germans had been decisively and very badly beaten in the field. They were in what amounted to a rout at the time that the fighting ceased, although it was true that they afterwards reformed and marched back across the Rhine in good order. It was true also that the people of Germany received them with acclaim, as a victorious army, but it also was undoubtedly true that the demobilized German soldiers had since told the people the truth, and that they now knew that their wonderful military machine had been smashed in actual battle.

In 1917, said Gen. Maurice, the great Allied drive, which sent the Germans reeling back to the Hindenburg line, took three months, and it netted 20,000 prisoners and 220 guns captured. In the drive of 1918 the Germans were driven back from the line of their greatest advance to the Hindenburg line in one month, and the captures were 77,000 prisoners and 760 guns.
