BALFOUR HOLDS LONG TALK WITH THE PRESIDENT

British Commissioner Cheered As He Goes To White House.

GERMANS TRYING TO CUT OFF PETROGRAD

London, April 3 .- German transports have left Libau, on the Baltic, south of the Gulf of Riga, for an unknown destination, according to a Central News dispatch from Petrograd today.

A dispatch from Petrograd on Thursday said there were wellfounded reports that the Germans were preparing to attack the northern front, massing troops along the Dvinsk-Riga line and concentrating transports and warships in the Bal tic Sea ports. A portion of the Ger-man fleet was reported to have been sent from Kiel to Libau. The Petro grad dispatch sald it was regarded as probable that the plan was to make a descent in the rear of the Russian northern flank, somewhere on the Gulf of Finland, and to cut off Petrograd.

AFTER WEEK'S INTERLUDE

Gen. Sir Douglas Haig reports that the forces under his command attacked on a wide front on both sides of the River Scarpe, where a portion of the Hindenburg line forms a barrier defending Cambrai, and that they are making satisfactory progress.

DEFENDS SOLDIERS Dual Deserter Sent to Reformatory for BY STATISTICS ON TORONTO BIRTHS

Controller McCarthy Says Those Out of Khaki Worst.

Controller Jesse McCarthy of Toronto at Askin Street Church, yesterday presented the claims of the social and evangelistic department of the Methodist Church in Canada. In his evening address he replied with emphasis to those who are in the habit of making statements reflecting on the character of Canadian soldiers.







BALFOUR STIRRED WITH EMOTION ON REACHING CANADA

Ypres and Vimy Have Endeared Sons to Empire.

IMPERIAL RECOGHITION

Sir George Foster and Sir Thomas White To Attend Conference.

OTTAWA, April 22.-Right Hon, A J. Balfour, British foreign secretary, in a message to the governor-general while at Halifax en route to Washington, voiced the highest appreciation of the spiendid heroism of Canada's sons and the part the Dominion is playing in the war. His message says:

"I am glad that owing to the chances of war a diplomatic mission from Great Britain to the United States should first set foot upon American soil in Canada and that it should fall to me, a Scot by birth, as so many thousands of your fellow-citizens, to bear witness to the heroism and the patient sacrifice of your sons and daughters. The roll of honor of the British Empire has many names upon it which kindle our imagination and in the mention have power to knit us all together.

Ypres and Vimy Great Names.

"Upon that roll the names of Ypres and Vimy Ridge will bear witness to the world that, when the cause was just and the peril great, Canada would spare nothing of what in peace time men hold dear. I know well that heroism and sacrifice are not confined within the limits of the battlefield. Sir Robert Borden has had a story to tell in Great Britain of effort prodigally offered to the imperial cause in every township from ocean to ocean, of the prudent counsels of your provinces and their statesmen in matters of administration and finance; of the contrivance of your men of business; of the munitions work that your men and women have performed. Finally, but not least. I would not have forgotten in the Empire the service of Canada to the work of the Red Cross.

Most Important Event.

"No more striking or picturesque event has happened within the range of history than this voyage of representatives of two of the oldest and most powerful civilizations of Europe worn by the strain of almost three years of warfare, across an ocean strewn with deadly peril, to take counsel with the most powerful of the young democracies of the world for concerted action against a common foe in defence of liberty and human rights. "One purpose of the conference is to collaborate plans and co-ordinate resources both of man power and material and which shall best affect the speedy and successful conclusion of the war. The British mission numbers among its members two representatives of the Canadian Government, the Right Hon. Sir George Foster, and Hon. Sir Thomas White who have been appointed by His Majesty's Government.

Imperial Recognition.

"In this respect the precedent sometime since set by the British Government of recognizing the overseas dominions as integral parts of the Empire has been followed. The economic conference in Paris last June the British delegation comprised Mr. Bonar Law, Sir George Foster and Premier Hughes. In the war conference now proceeding in London the overseas dominions and India are represented and have equal voice in council and conclusion, So in this unique and important conference which convenes in Washington next week, two members of the British mission are chosen from the Dominion of Canada. Sir George Foster will proceed at once to Washington to meet the other members of the mission; Sir Thomas White will follow later when the budget is well under way. It is not probable that both of these gentlemen will be absent at the same time as both departmental and paritamentary duties render this inadvisable, in-so-far as it can be avoided. colunteer enlistment with conscription volunteer enlistment with conscription only as a last resort, and the fight for this measure was led by Chalrman Dent of the military committee, whose supporters felt sure that they would make a good showing. A strong element in the House, however, backed the selective conscription plan advocated by the army general staff and recommended by the military committee minority, led by Representative Kahn, of California, a Republican.

In the Senate the bill under consideration was to be followed by five minute talks.

Mr. Kellaway quotes that "a prominent engineer has expressed his firm conviction that, given two more years of war, he would undertake to build a battleship from keel to aerial in all its complex detail entirely by women labor." Those who see the work at the present exhibition and realize that it is only a minute fraction of what could be brought together by the technical section of the ministry, had they the space requisite, will perhaps appreciate that the idea is neither fantastic nor a vision of Jules Verne or H. G. Wells. The woman who has trained for the trapeze can find her vocation at the girl who is proficient at dancing is well equipped for undertaking work involving movement of position. The ministry has found cases where these specialized abilities have been successfully applied to industry. Only a small modification of the gear of the heavy forging press or of the appliances in the molding shop would be necessary to decrease the muscular effort required by one-half and to increase the distance of the operator from the hot metal or furnace by the equivalent. There are, in fact, some operations in the smiths and press shops in which the aptitude of women for correct appreciation of time intervals shows to great advantage. The motion study has been a favor te subject with American factory organization experts for several years, and the sequence of movements made by the operator is a theme which would bear careful investigation. This sense and its influence on industrial processes was alluded to by Jules Verne some thirty years ago in "The Begum's Fortune"; today, by the aid of the cinematograph, it can be investigated on a scientific basis. It is to be hoped that any further exhibition held under the auspices of the ministry may be undertaken on a larger scale and supplemented by a series of films liustrating good examples of motion study; films which the photographic section of the ministry should know best where and how to obtain.
