ELECTRICITY ON TEMISKAMING ROAD

Matheson Asks Power Be Given for Its Generation.

WANTS BRANCHES TO THE G.T.P.

Measure to Amend Succession Duties -Mr. Foy Proposes Changes in the Mines Act.

Toronto, May 16. - The features of today's session of the Legislature were the bringing down of two Government measures by Hon. Mr. Matheson, one to provide for increased powers for the Temiskaming Railway commission, and the other to amend the succession

Mr. Matheson explained that his bill to amend the act respecting the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway had several objects. It provided for the payment of \$1,000 additional to one of the commissioners for professional services. It gave the necessary authority for extending the line to connect with the Grand Trunk Pacific, and for the construction of short branches not exceeding a certain number of miles to be fixed later. 



A bill to abolish the Conmee act at one stroke, introduced by Dr. Beattie Nesbitt, will not even be considered. Mr. Downey's bill provides that municipalities desiring to install their own electric lighting or gas plants or waterworks for municipal purposes only, may do so without purchasing the plants of private If they desire to go into the business of supplying electric light, or power, or gas, or water, to private consumers, they shall have power to expropriate private companies, but they shall be obliged to expropriate only one company, in case there are two or more in the field. The municipality may appoint a valpremises, the books and records of the company, to enable him to estimate the value of the plant. If the company will not sell out at his valuation, it shall be compelled to submit to arbitration, and if it fails to accept the terms of the arbitrators the municipal council may take over its property. The arbitrators may not allow anything for prospective profits or franchise, but shall have regard only to the value of the plant to the municipality, and the cost of providing more valuable and modern improvements. In the case of a gas or water company, 10 per cent may be added to this valuation, but nothing in the case of an electric company.

One clause of the bill relates to the possibilities of Niagara power. Under this clause municipalities would not be obliged to acquire the plant of a private company if they desired to establish works to distribute electricity transmitted to them from public works established by the Provincial Government. The prospect that the Government will establish such works is very remote, but there is a probability that the municipalities may wish to unite to build transmisison lines to receive electricity generated by private companies at the Falls. Will they be obliged, under such cincumstances, to purchase local electric light and power plants, owned by private companies? This is a new condition not contemplated when the Conmee sections of the municipal act were adopted.

Miss Priddis Accounts for All But Fifteen-Some Interesting Information.

A comprehensive and very interesting paper on the origin of the names of London's streets was delivered beevening by Miss Harriett Priddis. The paper was the result of many years of inquiry and research, and the names of all the city's streets were accounted eleven. Miss Priddis and the society would be pleased if anyone can give any clue to the origin of any of the names of the following streets: Ann Ann (now Empress avenue), Paul, Francis, Albion, Westmoreland avenue, Chesley avenue, Park, Van, Layard, Philip, Smith, Chester, Bridport and Sherwood. Of course, explanations can be easily suggested for some of these names, but the aim is to get an authenticated explanation. The reading of Miss Priddis' paper occupied two hours.
The origin of some of the street names should be known by every patriotic citizen. Almost everyone knows that Wolfe street is named after the hero of the Heights of Abraham, but few are aware that Picton street derives its name from that of Sir Thomas Picton, a favorite general of One of the city's newest streets is

killed at Waterloo. Hyman street, which was cut through to nnery stands nearby. Colborne street was called after Governor Sir John

Clark's Bridge got its name from Rev. William Clark, a pioneer minister, benging to the Congregational Church. He erected a home on the south bank of the river, and collected money for a bridge, whose successor still bears his name. Miss Priddis expressed herself as
