NOW IS THE TIME TO ADVERISE

Baron Hayashi Says They Will Not Moderate Terms.

Heaps of Money In the Treasury and War Program Is Being Carried Out Army Is Now Prepared to Encom-

London, July 19.—Baron Hayashi, the Japanese Minister here, said to the representative of the Associated Press yesterday that Russia had appointed good men as peace plenipotentiaries. Nevertheless M. Witte and Baron Rosen had not inspired Japan with confidence in a favorable outcome of the negotiations.

"We do not know," the Minister added, "what powers have been delegated to them, and after the events of the past eighteen months Japan puts faith only in accomplished facts. The terms will be communicated only at the conference. Then we will discover what powers the Russian plenipotentiaries possess."

The Associated Press correspondent suggested that the general opinion prevailed that the Japanese terms will be

"I cannot see where people get such an idea," replied the Minister, "the public evidently mistake the Japanese for

Minister Hayashi intimated that Japan was ready to continue the war unless she secures suitable terms. He called attention to the fact that practically the entire sum realized by the last two leans was unexpected, and said the capture of the Island of Sakhalin was not precipitated by the approach of the conference, but was a natural sequence of the Japanese campaign, the plans for which had not been altered since Russia acceded to a conference.

St. Petersburg, July 19.—Evidence of the Government's consternation over internal conditions is found yesterday in its abrupt recession from the position it assumed in respect of the All-Russian zenstvo congress. It practically was decided yesterday morning to let the zemstvoists meet in Moscow without serious molestation.

Attempts were made Monday to trammel M. Witte, chief peace plenipotentiary, with limitations devised by the grand ducal party, which would prevent the statesman from obtaining a cessation of hostilities in the Far East save on terms impossibly advantageous to Russia.

M. Witte lent himself to the project—apparently. That is, he chimed in with the position that no peace proposal injurieus to Russian national pride would be considered for a moment by the representatives of Emperor Nicholes.

Witte, it is reported on credible authority, criticized bitterly in privale the heads of the factions who had sought to place him in a false position. He saw they hoped to make it impossible for him to concede a peace treaty. ## JAPS ARE NOT ANGELS INCREASES PASS HOUSE REEVE RESIGNS

No Objections Were Offered Thereto by Anybody.

The Business of the Session Ends In the Commons - Waiting For the Senate to Finish Passing on Impertant Bills-Sydney Route Satisfactory-Maritime Provinces Pleased-Statement to Be Prepared.

Ottawa, July 19.-The new North Sydney mail route was discussed in the House yesterday morning. D. A the House yesterday morning. D. A. McKenzie, of North Cape Breten and Victoria, asserting that the recent test with the Virginian's mails was a satisfactory one. On Mr. McKenzie's showing the Maritime Provinces got their mails two days ahead of the usual time.

Hon. W. S. Fielding suggested that as there was a benefit at least to the lower Provinces, the mails might be landed at North Sydney when the steamers took the route south of

steamers took the route south of Cape Race. During the time when the route was through Belle Isle the mails could hardly be carried back to North Sydney. The cost, however, would have to be taken into considera-

tion.

The Minister of Railways told the House that a final statement was being prepared of the result of the test.

Mr. Emmerson also announced that the Transcontinental Railway Commission expected to let contracts before the end of this year.

Salary Bills Passed.

DRAGS ON UNTIL AUGUST.

Premier Balfour Says Early Dissolu-tion is Undesirable.

London, July 19.—Premier Balfour has dissipated the hopes of his oppon-ents of an early dissolution of Parlia-ment.

At a meeting of Unionists yesterday, the Premier urged his supporters to be regular in their attendance at the House of Commons, so as to prevent the defeat of the Government as the result of a snap division. He pointed out that a dissolution in August would be inconvenient to the House and to the country. Mr. McCormick Desires to Withdraw-A Capable and Energetic Executive

Barrister John M. Pike, solicitor for the Township of Harwich, received a telephone message from George M. Baird, of Blenheim, clerk of township, yesterday, to the effect hat Reeve James McCormick has tendered his resignation to the Counil. Mr. Baird asked advice as to what he should do.

Mr. Pike replied with a letter adising the clerk that the resignation does not come into effect until asented to by a majority of the Counsented to by a majority of the Council, and as soon as that is done it will be necessary for the clerk to instruct the Deputy Returning Officers to have a new election which election shall be held within 15 days after the clerk notifies the Deputy Returning Officers.

It is understood that Mr. McCormick's action is the result of a difference with one of the council are

ference with one of the councillors and he is said to have remarked that

and he is said to have remarked that if that councillor did not resign he (Mr. McCormick) would.

It is to be hoped that Mr. McCormick will reconsider his resignation. During the time he has held the office of Reeve he has proven himself a capable and worthy man. If he adheres to his intention in resigning it will cause a vacancy in the Harawich Township Council which will be hard to fill.

It will come as a surprise to many of the ratepayers of Harwich to know that James D. McCormick, their popular Reeve, has handed in his resignation to the Clerk, James M. Baird, with the request that it be dealt with at once, and a meeting has been called to determine what action should be taken under the circumstances. The trouble are what action should be taken under the circumstances. The trouble ap-pears to have arisen, or culminat-ed, over the expenditure of certain charity funds, and iit appears at the last meeting of the council the Reeve demanded the resignation of one of his colleagues, but failing to get the support of the other members of the council he felt that there was no other course course one but to head in other course open but to hand in his own resignation at the meeting called for Saturday next at Blen-heim, when the whole trouble will be ventilated.

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TWO KINDS OF POLITICS

A distinction is commonly drawn between party politics and states manship, to the disadvantage of the former. But party politics in its most intelligent form is identi-cal with statesmanship. It does not mean the winning of paltry or casual advantages, but the maintenance of a party on such lines as will serve the country, win public support, and make each member of the party proud of its name and traditions. It involves the selection of a sound position, such as will stand the test of criticism and time, the adoption of right methods of administration and the selection of honest and capable officials and of Parliamentary candidates who will do honor to the party. "Such a generous contention for power ,on such manly and honorable maxims, will easily be distinguished from the mean and interest ed struggle for place and emolument." A political party is injured, not by

strong partisanship, but by narrow and shortsighted partisanship, mere prejudice and hatred of political opponents, or desire to take unfair advantage. For illustration, we may take the case of the Yukon, and the case of the new Provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan. The Dominion Government seems to have at its elbow any number of small-bore politicians who are full of fears as to what will happen if "the Tories" get into power in the new Provinces, and full of plans for destroying Mir Haultain's influence as a leader. The constituencies for the first Provincial elections seem to have been arranged by some of these peddlers of petty schemes. The larger interests of the Liberal party, as well as of the country, would have been served by "a wise and salutary "neglect" of Provincial politics. The Government and the dominant party at Ottawa should have said to the Provincial politicians: "Here is your new constitution; work it as you please." Sir John Macdonald, astute as he was, made a mistake when he allowed himself to be drawn into conflict with the Mowat Government; and toward the close of his career he perceived this, and his at titude toward the local Government might almost be described as one of the benevolent neutrality.

Instead of meddling with local politics in Alberta and Saskatchewan, the Government should consult some wise, broad-minded and honest friends as to the condition of affairs in the Yukon. The small fry among the politicians are terribly afraid that Conservative Legislatures and Governments in the new Provinces will hurt the Government at Ottawa. It is not the avowed opponents, but the false friends and the parasites of a party who eventually bring it into ruin and disgrace. These men seem to have got the upper hand in the Yukon. The Government is careless of local public opinion, or is, perhaps, persuaded that everyone who protests is a "Tory," anxious only to make political capital. Yet it seems likely that in that quarter some gigantic scandal will develop that will bring in its train not only loss of office, but lasting discredit and dishonor, from which it will take many years for the Liberal party to recover. Such are the consequences of allowing the views of small politicians to prevail .- Toronto News.

SPIRIT OF BROTHERHOOD.

Great Teacher Gives Answer, With Ir finite Charm and Directness to Young Man's Question.

And who is my neighbor?—St. Luke,

This was the question proposed by the lawyer who had asked Christ what he should do to inherit eternal life. The learned Jew was evidently con-founded by the first answer of the Galilean rabbi referring him to the Galilean rabbi referring him to the Mosaic law; and his perplexity was increased by the Lord's quiet repartee when He rehearsed the great duties, to his God and to his neighbor. It would seem as though the clever unfriendly critic forgot the hostile purpose with which he stood up to question and, really conscience stricken and willing to justify himself, in good faith asked the question of the text.

And the great Teacher, with infinite

And the great Teacher, with infinite charm and directness, gave an answer so clear and unmistakable that only wanton stupidity could fail to understand and appreciate it. The record is silent as to the ultimate effect upon the lawyer; but if he were at all serious with his inquiry he must have gone away a wiser and better man. The old away a wiser and better man. The old law became invested with a character and application he had not before rea-lized. He was possessed with a firm purpose to exemplify this new because to him fuller revelation of the will of

If there be one lesson that the Mas-If there be one lesson that the Master reiterated more frequently than another, and sought in so many ways and on so many occasions to impress, it is the great truth of universal brotherhood suggested by the question, "Who is my neighbor?" He did so, doubtless, not because it is so difficult doubtless, not because it is so difficult of apprehension but because it is so hard of application. The life of service would indeed be easy if it consisted only in doing the things that pertain specifically to God; to worship, to pray, to give for the maintenance of religion, to hold implicity the great verties as they apply only to Deity. All these would call for comparatively little effort and are, after all, not very severe tests of character. This lawyer and those he represented were very scrupulous in the discharge of these duties; and yet, while being so, could count all the rest of the world as outside the pale of their sympathy. They had gotten hold of only one side of religion and had utterly neglected the other.

There is no question of the relative importance of the two great duties of life. They are equally important and mutually dependent; the one is the complement of the other. The Master emphasized the second commandment which was like unto the first in great-ness and importance, because it had been disregarded and it most needed emphasis. While it may seem possible for a man to despise God and love his brother, it is absolutely impossible to love God and despise his brother. In other words, the test of loving God is loving one's brother. At the bottom there is very real infidelity about the being of God and the honor due. His Son, but there is a great deal of quesson, but there is a great dain of dues-tion regarding the spirit of brother-hood on the part of those who profess to believe in Him and to follow Him. Men are applying the same test that the Master used, "By their fruits ye shall know them," and by far too many and too frequently are they found

wanting.
Who, then, is our neighbor? Who are those we are bound to love and help! Surely net only our kindred and those who are bound to us by ties of com-panionship and interest. Going thus panionship and interest. Going thus far, we go no further than pagans have gone before. We are to transcend this if we are to be worthy of the Christian name. We must find out neighbor everywhere and in every one, but more especially in the man who needs us. needs us.

There are three barriers that retard

There are three partiers that retard the spread of this gospel of universal brotherhood—pride of race, pride of place and pride of character. There is a pride of race that is entirely worthy. however, its assertion other races to be despised and avoided; when it breeds enmity, engenders strife and manifests itself in injustice and prejudice it is contrary to the Christ spirit and unworthy of those who possess a genuine basis for such distinction. There is a pride of position which is commendable, for we are all members of the same body. but all have not the same office. But when those of high station laud it over those of low estate; when social, civil, financial or intellectual elevation puts men out of sympathy with those who live upon a lower plane, or when consideration is shown in a spirit of condescension it is distinctive of the

spirit of brotherhood. Finally there is a pride of character deserving of praise and emulation. It never assumes the "holier than thou" attitude; it "vaunteth not itself" and "is not puffed up." If that lawyer had answered his own question it is quite certain he would have excluded the ungodly and immoral. But in Christ's view the neighbor we should commis-erate and rescue is not only the poor traveler who may fall among thieves, but every one who has lost his way or fallen into the mire of guilt and

shame.
Our neighbor, then, is not the man who is up and who can assist us on our way, but he that is down and our way, but he that is down and whom we can help to rise; he is the man who is most in need of our sympathy and succor; he is the man who has a bruised and bleeding heart that only patient love can heal. If we go to him and help and bless him and make ourselves neighbor unto him we shall thus fulfill the law of Christ and not only be keeping His commandments, but living His life.—Rev. Hutchens C. Bishop, Rector St. Philip's Church, New York, in The Herald.

#### WHAT TOTEMISM IS.

Light on an Interesting and Little Understood Subject.

It is interesting to note that totemism is found not only in Alaska, but among the North American Indians, the aborigines of Australia, the Hottentots of Africa and even the hill tribes of In-dia. Totems are also common among the Samoans.

clan or tribe, but it signifies a great deal more than mere political or social alliance. It is not only a tribal emblem, but also a family sign; not merely a symbol of nationality, but also an expression of religion; not simply a bond of union among primitive peo-ples, but also a regulator of the marriage laws and of other social institu tions. A totem has been defined as "a class of material objects which a say. age regards with superstitious respect, believing that there exists between him and every member of the class an inti mate and special relation."

Among the Ojibway Indians there

are no fewer than twenty-three differ-ent totems. Nine of these are quadrupeds, marking out the wolf, the bear, the beaver and other clans, eight are birds, five are fishes and one is the snake.

Some extraordinary superstitions regarding totems prevail in Samoa. Thus it is believed that if a turtle man eats it is believed that if a turtle man eats of a turtle he will grow very ill, and the voice of the turtle will be heard in his inside saying: "He ate me. I am killing him." If a banana man uses a banana leaf for a cap he becomes bald. If a butterfly man catches a butterfly the trible him. it strikes him dead. If a fowl man eats a fowl delirium and death results, and so on, all going to show that the totem has something of the quality of a fetich as well as the significance of a fearify emblem.

Regarding totemism, it is to be noted

that the relation of mutual help and protection includes also the totem it-self—that is to say, if a man takes care of his totem he expects the to-tem to return the compliment. If the totem is a dangerous animal it must not hurt his clansmen. The scorpion men of Senegambia declare that the most deadly scorpions will run over their bodies without hurting them. There is a snake clan in Australia which holds to a similar belief. Among the crocodile clan of the Bechuanas if a man is bitten by a crocodile or even has water splashed on him by one he is expelled from the clan as one esteemed unworthy by the totem.-Housekeeper.

THE TREADMILL.

A Punishment Still In Vogue In Many English Prisons.

The treadwheel is still in vogue at many English prisons. Within the walls is a little building, built of blue gray stone, standing somewhat apart from the main structure in a corner of the exercise ground and prison garden. On the chocolate colored door are painted in white letters the two words, "Wheel House." As the door opens the dull, grinding sound that we heard outside grows a little louder and clearer. The door closes behind us with the inevitable clash and click of the returning bolt. The house is an apartment some thirty feet long and fifteen feet wide. On the left hand side are the wheels four of them, in two tiers, divided by a gallery running the whole length of the house and communicating with the floor by a staircase at the opposite end On the right hand side there is another lower and shorter gallery, on which stands the warder in charge. The wheels are separated by a section of

Each wheel is divided into compartments, cutting off each prisoner from the others. The object of this is to prevent the prisoners from seeing and hearing one another, although conversation in a low voice pitched in a dif-ferent key from that of "the music of the wheel" is perfectly easy and intelligible.

Hot All Over Ontario — Some Former Hot Spells Recalled.

Toronto, July 19.—Yesterday "Old Probs," Mr. Stupart, of the Observa-tory, reported 92 degrees in the shade as the highest temperature here of the day.

The temperature has never been 100 degrees in Canada yet, but it came mighty near it fifty one years ago. On August 24, 1864, the mergury soared to 99.82, but there is nobody handy who recollects it. The present is, however, exceptionally warm weather, even at a registration of 92 degrees. It doesn't happen severy year. Looding back through the weatherman's cook book, however, it is discovered fiftit July 12 last year was warmer than yesterday, for it was 93 degrees then. In 1903 and 1802 there was a temperature of 81 on July 8. In 1901 we had a sizzlef on June 27, with 97, and it was the same on September 12, 1898. For six years before that the mercury kept out of the 90's, but in 1902, on July 28, it registered 93. Other high temperatures show are July 16, 1887, 97 degrees; July 1, 1872, 96 degrees; July 13, 1858, 33 degrees. August 8, 1864, 94 degrees; July 6, 1862, 95 degrees; July 17, 1856, 96 degrees. The temperature has never been 100

Hot All Over Ontario We are not the only people getting a little thinner. Windsor singed a bit a little thinner. Windsor singed a bit at 94 yesterday and was the warmest place in Canada. All over Ontario it was hot. They had it at 90 in Ottawa. In the Eastern States and all along the Atlantic coast the warm weather was very busy. It was 98 in Philadelphia, and Washington had 96, New York 96, Boston 94, Chicago 94 and these are some of the places, Toronto people went to spend their holidays. As usual, Northwest Canada has something to distinguish itself. In Winnipeg the people were comfortably awaiting another tornado with the temperature at 78. In Calgary it was only 74. It appears that pressure has been brought to bear on the American Government by certain interests in he United States against "rossed" or barked wood. They want the barking to be performed in the United States, and consequently have induced the Government to impose the 20 per cent. duty.



Some Everyday Incidents That Go

to Prove This Fact About a thousand yards from the window where I sit is a factory which blows its whistle every noon. The steam always comes from the whistle some little time before the sound is heard. Yesterday I counted three seconds between the time when the first steam was seen and when the sound of the whistle was heard. The whistle is heard when the weather is foggy or clear, hot or cold, windy or calm. It is sometimes louder than at other times, but it always takes three sec-onds to travel the 3,000 feet from the factory to my house. We often hear also an echo of the

whistle, which comes two seconds later than the first sound. This is the same sound coming by a roundabout journey 5,000 feet away. It travels first 1,000 feet to a him beyond and then is sent back 4,000 feet to our house.

A few days ago I heard a band of musicians playing upon the street, and, although they were far distant from me, the high tones of the piccolo and the low tones of the bass horn reached me exactly together, showing that high and low tones travel at the same speed. During a thunderstorm I noticed a flash of lightning and counted ten seconds before the sound of the thunder was heard. This showed me that the storm was about 10,000 feet (or about two miles) away. A little later, however, the time between the light-ning and the thunder began to grow leas, and the noise of the thunder be-came louder, which showed that the storm was getting nearer. Finally a storm was getting hearer. Finally a dazzling flash of lightning was fol-lowed immediately by a deafening crash of thunder, and at the same time the shingles flew from a patch of roof on a barn near by. It had been struck by lightning and was soon in flames.—

## **WOMAN SHOOTS TO KILL**

Obroxious Toronto Man Persisted in Coming to Her Home.

Mrs. Kyle of Ingersoll Uses Revolver With Deadly Effect on David Mo-Gee - First Shot Missed But Two Others Took Effect - McGee Ran Ten Yards and Died on the Side

Ingersoll. July 19.—Because he per sisted in coming to her home and at tempting to interrupt the happiness of her life, Mrs. Emiline Kyle, wife of Robert Kyle, an employe of the Inger-'soll Condensing factory, shot and kille David McGee just outside her house at 7.30 this morning. Three shots werfired from her revolver. The first miss ed, the others took effect. McGee drop ped on the sidewalk after running ter yards and died a moment later.

"I've Shot a Man." Mrs. Kyle immediately walked to po-ice headquarters, half a mile from her nome, and gave herself up. "I've shot a man," was her exclamation, as she rushed into Chief Wright's office. "He is now lying dead on the road near my house. I'm sorry, but I had to do it. He would not stay away from my home and to protect myself I was forced to do it."

The chief promptly placed her un-der arrest, and, accompanied by Dr. Neff, coroner, set out for the scene of he tragedy. Arriving there they view d the remains of McGee lying on the ng rooms and prepared for burial. ary later viewed them and adjourned meet last evening.

#### Victim a Toronto Man.

The murdered man is a son of Mr. and Mrs. John McGee, of Toronto, who lived in Ingersoll up to ten years ago. His family are highly respected but his ife was largely a failure. Eight years ago he was sent to Woodstock Jail for ago he was sent to woodstock Jan for assaulting Policeman McConnell here. Later he was sent to the Central Prison, Toronto, and a couple of years ago was arrested for abducting a Miss McIntyre in Toronto. He was captured with her at Detroit, and sentenced to a term in prison. One mouth ago he term in prison. One month ago he turned to Ingersoll and has been here ver since. He was not working, and vas frequently to be seen around the

Three weeks ago McGee came to my ome. I didn't want him around, but home. I didn't want film around, but, seeing he was out of work, I gave him food for two weeks. Then he began drinking and I ordered him away. He used to return while I was at work in the factory. My wife was afraid of him, as he would threaten to smash our windows if she did not let him in the house.

#### Kept Doors Locked.

Kept Doors Locked.

"For the last three days she had kept the doors locked, to keep him out. This morning she opened the doors to wash, and in less than 15 minutes after I left for work McGee appeared. My wife tells me she told him to leave. He didn't go. She got a revoiver off the dresser and fired at him as he entered the door. The hullet missed him the dresser and fired at him as he en-tered the door. The builet missed him and he ran out on the walk. My wife went to the door and told him to go on. He began to return. She fired 'wice again and he dropped. I bor-rowed the revolver last Wednesday 'from Superintendent Knight, of our 'actory, that' my wife might defend herself. I feared the fellow, as he had been drinking."

Both Kyle and his wife are well-thought of here. They have no family. The scene of the tragedy is a neatly tept frame house on the western out. whits of the town. At noon Mrs. Kyle was remanded on the charge of murder. Both the accused and the murdered man were about 35 years of age
