WHO STOLE MATTE?

The famous matte stealing case in which the state of Washington and the Northport Smelting & Refining Company appear as complainants and A. L. Peel, formerly shift-boss at the smelting works as defendant is now in full swing at Colville, the county seat of Stevens county.

Bartlett was the opening witness of note for the prosecution, and he has been on the stand for a couple of days. He claimed that matte stealing was a common practice at the smelter. He had written to many refiners with a view to arranging for the sale of stolen material, and had decided to dispose of the swag that was in his possession when captured by a San Francisco plant. Peel, he declared, had suggested the name of one of the refiners that he wrote. To avoid suspicion, his letters to refiners were posted outside of Northport by Gasper and Peck, two traveling men. In explaining his reasons for having fled to Seattle, Bartlett stated that he was suspicious that Postman that he was doing business with the smelters, and as matte stealing was generally suspected by Northport people a clue might thereby be obtained.

Bartlett said that the arrest at Rossland of some of the men charged with matte stealing and the conviction of them there rather startled him, but his confederates told him to take courage then while eyes were upon the Rossland fellows, and agreeable to this advice, he made the attempt to get away with the 250 pounds of matte. He said it was the plan to go to Seattle, and after removing his baggage to a hotel to repack the stuff and ship it to San Francisco. He said the reason he was shipping to San Francisco was because the smelter there promised the best pay for the values, offering 85 cents, but he could not say what any of the other refiners had quoted.
