HALIFAX LETTER

Halifax, Dec. 5.—The chief item of interest in military matter during the past week has been the proclamation issued by His Excellency, the Governor-General, Canadians are not a war like people and have not been trained in the game of war. It is not astonishing then that so many young men should take liberties which in civilian life would be attended by little or no serious consequences, but in military life are considered serious crimes. During the past summer some young men, without realizing the nature of the offence, left their military units and went to their homes or other places. In war times and at the front such conduct is punishable by death. Recognizing that so many well-intentioned but ill-advised young men have taken liberties, the Governor-General has issued an Order in Council granting royal clemency to such persons who before December 15th report to the O. C. of Military District or to the Officer Commanding the Unit to which they belonged. Such a proclamation will be followed by the return of a number of young men who have realized the seriousness of their offence but have not known just how to return. Already a number have reported.

Although the women have taken a large part in recruiting in England, not until recently have there been any lady speakers upon the recruiting platforms of this Province. Mrs. Grace D. McLeod Rogers, the authoress, whose books are so well known in her native Province, spent one week delivering recruiting addresses in Cumberland Co. and has recently delivered a very interesting and stirring address to a crowded audience in the Academy of Music, Halifax. Requests are coming from different parts of the Province for her services at meetings to be held in future days.

The 246th Battalion have received a number of recruits recently and is gaining in strength. In their recent route marches they have been complimented upon their appearance, and it looks as though this Reserve Battalion would be of the same splendid character as the other Battalions of the Highland Brigade. Others are coming in and uniting with the Siege Batteries, Army Service Corps Units, Railroad Construction Corps and similar organizations. Not only is there a place for every fit young man but a strong call that all capable of taking and definite part may do so immediately.

OF INTEREST TO POTATO SHIPPERS

To clear the embargo placed by the United States Government on potato shipments from Canada to that country, the Boston and Yarmouth S.S. Co. has taken out a special permit by which their Boston agent as consignee and their Yarmouth agent as nominal shipper of all shipments, undertake that no diseased potatoes shall be shipped to the United States. If diseased potatoes should be shipped, they would be either confiscated at Boston or returned to Yarmouth and if the practice should continue, the shipping privilege will be withdrawn; Thus by the carelessness of a few individuals an injury may be caused to a large number of persons, and all intending potato shippers are urged to use the utmost care when packing for shipment.

MRS. ARCHIBALD'S GIFT TO WOUNDED SOLDIERS IN FRENCH HOSPITALS

On November 6th, through the courtesy of the Red Cross Society of Halifax, there were shipped to Miss Annie Strong, Matron No. 2 Canadian Stationary Hospital, Boulogne, France, daughter of Mr. Everett Strong of Canning, twenty-two boxes containing in all 420 jars of preserved fruits, put up by Mrs. Rachel de Wolfe Archibald of Wolfville, N.S.

Since August 21st, when her shipment of 312 jars went overseas to the same hospital, Mrs. Archibald has been receiving small gifts of fruit and money to defray the expense of equipment for shipping etc., from friends interested in her work.

She has also received from the Wolfville Red Cross Society, 100 pounds of sugar and one gross of jars; from the Red Cross Society of Acadia Seminary, one barrel of sugar; and from the Provincial Branch in Halifax, two barrels of sugar, four gross of jars and funds to defray incidental expenses.

Many of the mothers of the boys who have gratefully acknowledged receipt of preserves—the first that we have tasted—to quote from their letters—have sent in encouraging letters and small contributions.

Mrs. Archibald acknowledges with gratitude the help and encouragement she has received in the work she is doing. She is now putting up grape juice which was last year so welcome in the Pneumonia wards, and quince and apple jelly. She expects to send another shipment and to continue the work during the winter months. Contributions, therefore, towards this work will be gladly received and put to the best possible use.

Mrs. Archibald now has ready for shipment 360 bottles of grape juice, 200 quart jars of apples and quince jelly, pear preserves and marmalades, pickles, etc., which will be forwarded this week. This somewhat exceeds the total of 1000 jars which she had hoped to send.

It was due to Lieut. Leon Archibald's request to his mother for this fruit to be used in above mentioned Canadian Stationary Hospital where he was a patient from July to October last that Mrs. Archibald took up this work which to her has been such a labor of love as well as to the others who have donated to and assisted in the work.

Lieut. Leon Archibald, R. E., son of Mrs. Archibald has been in active service at the front since the beginning of the war. He has been wounded and in the hospital twice and is now slowly recovering from the dire effects of shell shock to which he succumbed in the Big Push on the Somme in July 12, 1916. Lt. Archibald left a splendid position with Regina's oldest firm

of engineers and land surveyors to give his energy to his country's cause at the first call to arms. Although slated Permanent Base from injuries received in the first engagement of Ypres April, 1915, Lt. Archibald refused to remain away from the scene of action voluntarily went back to "do his bit." Kentville Board of Trade

Public interest in the Kentville Board of Trade is rapidly increasing, that is if attendance may be taken as a criterion along that line.

The Board had its regular monthly meeting in the Court House on Monday evening when there was an attendance approaching the centry mark—a number about treble of the attendance prior to a few months ago. There can be little doubt that the Board is rapidly acquiring its proper status in the life of the town.

Matters of general importance were discussed, including sheep, mail order houses, telephone service, the erection of a new agricultural building, the making of Kentville the headquarters of the Fruit Growers Association, and other matter of importance, sixteen new members were added to the board and a number of old members renewed their membership.

The President, Prof. Blair occupied the chair. After the reading of the minutes of the last meeting, a communication was read from the secretary of the Western Counties Board of Trade asking that the Kentville Board nominate delegates for the annual meeting which will be held at Bridgetown on January 22nd. Messrs Barclay Webster, T. P. Calkin and H. L. Cole were appointed as Kentville's representatives. A request for subjects for consideration at the annual meeting was unattended to.

Sheep Raising

The President presented the final report of the Sheep Committee. This report although brief bore testimony to the real work as done by the committee. A brief discussion followed the report, during which words of appreciation were spoken for the work accomplished. The report which the Board was desirous of having published was as follows:

Your committee beg to submit final report on Sheep Improvement work undertaken through this Kentville Board of Trade. As intimated in our last report a meeting of Farmers and Aylesford for the purpose of organizing a Live Stock Association was a success and the East Kings Live Stock Association was formed with the following officers:

President—J. E. Kinsman, Centreville.
Vice President—F. B. Westcott, Gaspereau.
Secy. - Treasurer—Geo. F. Watkins, Port Williams.
Directors—Charles O'Leary, White Rock; Avery T. Ward, Coldbrook; W. E. Jordan, South Alton; A. B. Harris, Canning.

Through this Organization 8 pure bred Shropshire and 6 pure bred Leicester Rams were loaned by the Sheep Division of the Live Stock Branch, Ottawa, and distributed throughout the eastern part of the country. The Association as follows: One at South Alton; 2 at White Rock; 1 at Coldbrook; 1 at Prospect; 2 at Woodville; 1 at Port Williams; 2 at Canning; 1 at Centreville and 1 at Berwick.

The Aylesford meeting was not a success there not being sufficient farmers present to form an Association.

Your Committee would suggest that a letter from the Board of Trade be sent to Mr. George O'Brien, Maritime Representative of the Sheep Division, and also to the Live Stock Branch, Ottawa, expressing the appreciation of this Board for the assistance given in making this distribution possible.

eighty dollars owing on membership fees and that a vigorous campaign was about to be started on behalf of securing new members. When asked as to the line of the "vigorous campaign" the matter was referred to Mr. Yould who while not revealing any drastic intentions intimated that efforts were to be made to add members to the Board. It was suggested that two young men be added to this committee to aid with prosecution of the work. On motion of the meeting it was decided to add Messrs. Laurie Ellis and Captain McBride.

When the proposal of new members was called for, the following names were presented and passed upon: W. J. Johnson, Fred Carroll, R. W. Phinney, Guy Mosher, W. Sidney Abbott, A. H. Morash, R. H. Phinney, F. L. Corey, Fred Wade, A. E. Jess, Dr. P. C. Woodworth, Wm. DeAubin, James Sealy, Fred Bishop, C. B. Sillars, C. P. McCoy.

Returned Soldiers

Frank Outhit reported that the Returned Soldiers Committee had several meetings and had looked after men who were returning to Berwick and Canning.

A resolution was brought forward by the President to the effect that efforts be made to have the town of Kentville the home of the Nova Scotia Fruit Growers meetings. In speaking to the resolution the president stated that this town had special facilities for exhibition purposes, naming the Arena Rink, which should be utilized. He thought that a grant could be secured which would make possible the erection of a small building wherein could be administered the workings of the society and which could be used for demonstration purposes.

Mr. R. S. Eaton spoke for some length on the subject expressing a desire that efforts be put forth along the lines as suggested by the President.

Mail Order Houses

Before adjournment it was announced that at the next meeting of the Board the subject of mail order houses would be discussed. The president of the merchant's association, Mr. A. E. Calkin was asked to prepare a paper on the subject so that the matter might be well opened up.

Mr. R. U. Parker addressed the Board briefly stating that efforts should be made to have the snow promptly removed from the concrete sidewalks and also exhorting the Board to take some measures that would lead to better telephone service that which is being accorded today. Both matters also the briefly considered met with approval by the Board as being well worthy of consideration.

Mayor Pelton said that before the winter was over a bye-law would be passed which would compel citizens to clear their sidewalks. As regards telephone service it was stated that Mr. Winfield, the General Manager of the Company had promised sometime ago an improved service. Those present thought it was time that the promise was fulfilled.

A notice sent out last week by the Dominion Coal Co's agent in Amherst announces an immediate increase of 65 cents per ton in the price of coal, according to the Amherst News.

Apple shipments for the west, via Digby and St. John, continue to be heavy. The C. P. R. steamship Empress took over six carloads of Nova Scotia apples from Digby on Saturday the 24th. for western points, also a carload of fish in addition to other cargo.— Yarmouth Times.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family, or an male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (not sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live with a nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

Applicant who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months out of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The acre of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

CANADIAN WOMEN CROWD TO BRITAIN

Six Thousand Have Landed There During Last Half Year

Ottawa, Dec. 4—Emigration from Canada to Great Britain is, and has been for some time past very heavy. The Department of Internal Affairs now issues over 1,000 passports per month which is more than ten times the number issued before the war. This means in effect, that 1,000 Canadians are leaving the Dominion for England every month. Of these about 500 are women, wives, mothers and sweethearts, most of them of Canadian soldiers. Some time ago the Government endeavored to discourage the exodus of Canadian women bound for the British shores, but the warning that their presence was not desired by Imperial authorities does not seem to have heeded. It is stated that during the last half year some 6,000 Canadian women have landed in Great Britain.

On account of the large number of passports being issued the Department of Internal Affairs, of which Sir Jos. Pope is deputy head, has requested that portion of the traveling public bound for British shores to give due notice of applications for passports if it wishes to avoid delay.

ROOM FOR US ALL ON EARTH

There are on this globe about 1,500,000,000 inhabitants. Most of us, who lack the sense of proportion, at the mention of this big number are apt to speak of the "overpopulation" of the world. Yet, if we spare a few moments of thought we shall better know what this represents.

There is in my study room a geographic globe about fifteen inches in diameter. Or that sphere there is marked a little spot about the size of the point of a pencil—at any rate, so small as to make it impossible to write the initials of its name. Lake Champlain, upon it. Yet, whenever Lake Champlain freezes over, there is good standing room for every one of all the inhabitants of the earth and then this lake would be considerably less crowded than some of the busy streets of New York.

Indeed, strange as it may sound, every one, young and old, would find about one square yard to stand upon. Nay, more, if the very young and the very old would please to stand aside on the shores of the lake, the remainder of the total inhabitants of the world could arrange a skating party where there would be less crowding than is seen on a busy winter day on that skating pond in New York's Central Park.—S. H. Blackland in Scribners.

GERMANS NOW ORDER DAMAGED BELGIAN BUILDINGS DESTROYED

Paris, Dec. 5—A Havre despatch from Havre says the Germans have issued a circular ordering the Belgians to demolish all buildings injured in the war which cannot be used for purposes for which they were constructed.

A MACCAN HERO

Capt. H. W. Burnett Chapman of the 25th Brigade has written to Mrs. R. St. Peter, Maccan, N. S., telling her the heroic death in battle of her son Lance Corporal St. Peter. Lance Corporal St. Peter was one of four brothers to put on the khaki. He was the first of the boys to go overseas. Another is now with the 40th Battalion in England and the two others are with the 193rd Highland Battalion at Witley Camp.

Work on the steamer which is being built by Captain H. T. LeBlanc, Wedgeport, is progressing rapidly and it is expected she will be ready for launching in the spring. She is being built for freighting purposes only and will be of good carrying capacity. The steamer is built from the model of the Great Lake freighters, with her engines and boilers aft and clear cargo space amidships.

The cutter Androscoggin, now in Boston in being prepared for her third winter season as a floating hospital for deep sea fishermen in Northern waters. She will leave in a few days for Nova Scotia waters, and will cruise for several weeks to render aid to sick or injured fishermen.

A very pleasing event took place in Wesley Sunday school on Sunday afternoon when Rev. C. B. Sinden on behalf of the school presented Mrs. Robert M. Allen with a purse and address, Mrs. Allen has been a teacher in the school for the past 35 years.—Yarmouth Times.

J. A. Marven, Ltd., biscuit manufacturers, Moncton, has done a wonderful business in his line. He had a trade of \$23,894 in 1906 in 1915 it was \$203,607 and for 1916 it will be nearly \$300,000. About 160 hands are employed.

Rev. H. F. Waring, once pastor of Immanuel Baptist Church in Truro, one of the deepest thinkers and most scholarly preachers we ever had in Truro, lately in charge of a Baptist Church in Vancouver, has accepted a call to a large, wealthy and influential church in Chicago.—Truro News.

EMBARGO ON CANADIAN SPUDS IS LIFTED TODAY

Washington, Dec. 5—The first step of the Department of Agriculture toward a policy expected to reduce prices on food staples was taken today when the embargo on Canadian potatoes was ordered lifted.

Shipments of potatoes, it was explained, must be certified to be as sound as is commercially practicable and to contain no more than 10 per cent of tubers showing traces of disease. Heretofore Canadian potatoes were admitted only at designated ports of entry. Under the amended rule importers must apply to the Federal horticultural board for permits.

FIVE SUBS A WEEK HUNS' OUTPUT NOW SAYS COPENHAGEN

COPENHAGEN, Dec. 5—Regardless of reports concerning the decline of man-power of Germany, there is no lack of men or materials in German shipbuilding yards, according to advices received here, which indicate that the tonnage now on the ways exceeds that of peace times.

It is definitely stated here that the more important yards have been devoting almost their entire resources for some time past to the construction of submarines, which, it is alleged, are now being turned out at the rate of five a week.

A number of submarines, it is stated have been designed solely with a view to their operation in ice bound waters, and are of unusual size and exceedingly strong.

It is understood they will be used in the Baltic Seas. They are said to have a cruising radius of 2500 miles on a single filling of fuel and besides torpedo tubes armed with light calibre guns on deck.

Middleton ratepayers at a public meeting last week voted 24 to 2 to buy the Nictaux water power.

"Where would Great Britain be without her navy?" is a question often asked. Now, another question is: "Where would Britain be without her air fleet?" All of which goes to show that every branch of the service is doing its share in the defence of the Empire. While the navy guards the trade routes, the land forces are winning new victories in the firing line, and the airmen, at home and on the continent, are risking their lives to assist both navy and army and to drive off attacking Zeppelins. The chief thing for the young men of this country to remember is that each branch of the service needs recruits. Canada has many thousands of young men who have not yet done their duty.

In reply to the American government's note of protest regarding the blacklist which contains the names of certain business houses in the United States with whom British subjects are directed not to deal. Viscount Grey seems to have presented a case that cannot be answered.

London, Dec. 7—Lloyd's report the sinking of submarines of the Danish steamer Gexos, 1,013 tons gross, and of the Spanish steamship Julia Benit, the crews of both vessels of both vessels were landed.

Death of B. H. Eaton, K.C.

(Dartmouth Patriot) A venerable and highly respected citizen, Brenton Halliburton Eaton, K.C., passed away Thursday evening, at his home on Prince Albert Road, after two weeks illness, although the deceased gentleman had been ailing for a year or more. Mr. Eaton was 79 years of age. He leaves a wife, two sons and two daughters. The sons are Lewellyn W., of Detroit, and Brenton H. Jr., at home. The daughters are Isobel, wife of E. O. Patterson, Chilliwick, B.C., and Blanche at home.

Mr. Eaton formed a partnership for the practice of law with his nephew, Horace L. Peckwith. Mr. Eaton practised law in Halifax, but resided in Dartmouth. For the past year he had his office at his home.
