In the Garden.

If strawberry plants for seedling are obtained from a distance, they should be ordered to arrive just as soon as the land can be worked, and they should be planted just as soon as possible after arrival.

The time necessarily spent in garden work can be greatly reduced if seeds are planted in long straight rows, thus permitting of cultivation with a horse.

It is not convenient to make a farm garden, why not plant tomatoes, cabbage, cauliflower, beets, carrots, etc., in line with mangels, or turnips. In this way work of cultivation will not interfere with the regular farm operations, and the plants are even more likely to do well than if set in a regular garden.

Kings County Temperance Alliance.

The annual meeting of the Kings County Temperance Alliance was held at Berwick on Friday last. There was a large and enthusiastic attendance. All the old officers were re-elected for the ensuing year.

Rev. Mr. Miller, ex president of the Shelburne Alliance, now pastor of the Wolfville Presbyterian church, was present and was elected to membership.

President Newcomb's report for the past year was unanimously adopted.

Much exception was taken to the action of the County Council in refusing to appoint Ira Cox, who was recommended by the Alliance for School inspector, and great regret was expressed in regard to the do-nothing policy which now prevails. In fact, it is rumored that the man who was appointed refused to act. The fact that there are large consignments of liquor coming to the various sections of the county was lamented. Strong addresses were delivered by C. A. Campbell, M. L. A., and N. W. Eaton, both of whom received a hearty and enthusiastic reception. The following resolution was unanimously passed:

1. The purpose of the Alliance so far as political action is concerned is to have the affairs of the county carried on by good men, especially such as are known to be favorable to the prohibition of the liquor traffic.

2. In making our influence felt, we have no desire to interfere with political parties only when and insofar as they stand in the way of the purpose of the Alliance.

3. Subsequently to the ensuing contest the policy of the Alliance will be to refrain from putting candidates in the field, unless forced to do so by the neglect or refusal of the regular parties to nominate men agreeable to our purpose.

Inasmuch as C. A. Campbell and N. W. Eaton have been in the field for some time as nominees of the Alliance, the endorsement of one or both of these men by the Liberal and Conservative parties on their respective tickets for the ensuing provincial election will be approved.

Mrs. Stephen W. deBlois.

April 13th witnessed the passing away of a notable woman, Mrs. S. W. deBlois. She was a daughter of the late Simon Fitch, Esq., an honored deacon of the Horton Baptist church and one of the prominent founders of the Collegiate schools in this place. Mary, the subject of this sketch, gave her heart to God early in life. She is remembered as an active worker in the great revival of 1848, when many from the village and from the hill experienced a saving change. She was an attractive girl of 21 years. To her natural charms were added the graces that are the fruits of the Spirit—love, peace, gentleness, goodness. All these were present in beautiful combination. So it seemed to us boys of the Acadia who were her enthusiastic admirers.

We loved to hear her speak in the religious services that were being conducted at that time. She had a fluent expression and a voice finely modulated and full of passion. The added years have amply justified the estimate then formed of her character. Miss Fitch became the wife of Stephen W. deBlois, who had two pastorate, one at Chester, the other at Wolfville, which began in 1856 and ended with his life in 1885.

Mrs. deBlois held a high place in the esteem, not only of the members of her own church, but of many others. She was known as a Godly woman. That of itself is a passport to the hearts of many. Her religion was not that of mere opinion or sentiment. It was not of a kind to be moved or moulded by popular current conceptions. She was never satisfied with low ideals respecting the Christian life.

She had a deeply sympathetic nature. She could rejoice in the joy of others, and weep with them in their sorrows. She had more than a passing interest in the life about her. She loved the young people, when they were happy she was glad. Hers was not a long, sad-faced religion. Her countenance bespoke the serenity and joy of her soul. Her smiles were pearls scattered along life's highway, and her lines of others richer and happier. She had a generous spirit, and loved to give according to the measure of her ability.

It is not putting it too strongly to say that a great soul has gone out of our midst; that a woman of superior parts has during all these years filled an important place in this community, and that though quiet and unobtrusive, her life has nevertheless been a blessing to many.

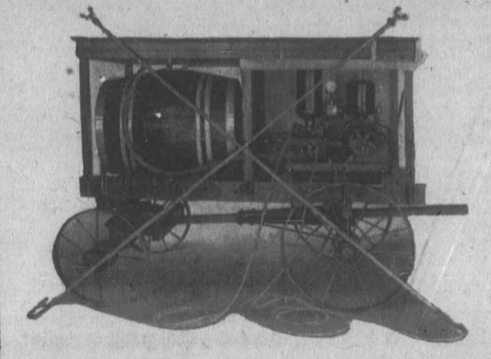

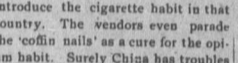
