TWO ACRES. The meeting of the Germantown (near Philadelphia) Farmers' Club was holden at

the house of Philip R. Freas, on the 23rd November. He is the editor of the Germantown Telegraph, a warm and active friend of agriculture, horticulture, &c., and the originator of the Club. Though his whole plot of ground comprises less than two acres and a half, yet he manages, to produce upon it is preferious a little of to produce upon it in perfection a little of everything. Those who are sighing for more land will do well to read his statement carefully, and inquire whether it would not be wiser to cultivate their present acres better than to add to their number.
