That a window looking into said yard from the Court House be converted into a door, and means of communication be started down to said kitchen yard be made, thus obtaining the necessity of going through the Gaol to the Court House, and rendering the approach much more easy—also that three large ventilators be made in the ceiling (one over the bench) with corresponding ventilators in the sides of the dome with a view to carry off the foul atmosphere. Should this recommendation be adopted by the Council, we would further recommend that the Clerk be instructed to write to the sheriff and state that as soon as the Court House official intimation that the Judges (who object to the proposed improvements)—such improvements shall be carried into effect.
