The Steamer Victoria Capsizes, and about 200 Men, Women and Children meet their Doom.

- Perhaps the most fearful calamity that ever befel a community in Canada, happened at London, on Tuesday last, in the capsizing of the pleasure steamer Victoria, (caused by overloading) and the loss of about 200 lives of the human freight. From the Advertiser we glean the following particulars:--
