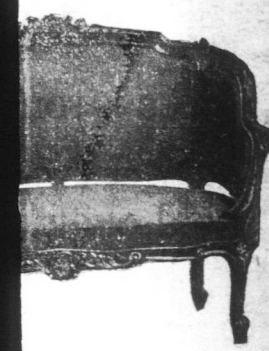

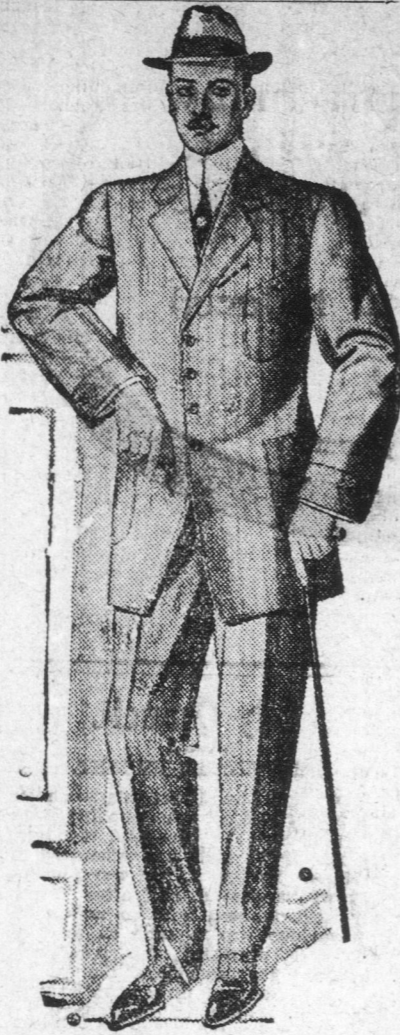

The Evening Chit-Chat

I'm going to make you acquainted with two women whom I know, and tell you a little poem that I love, to-day.

The connection and the comment I leave to you. The first woman is an old acquaintance of mine. She lives in a beautiful home not far from mine. She has been married about twenty years but has no children. They say she is glad because she dislikes children. Sometimes they say more than that. The empty home is the disappointment of her husband's life. He has a more than ample income and he always urging her to adopt some "lonely baby" but she absolutely refuses.

She belongs to two bridge clubs and one civic improvement club, and is on the committee for "the suppression of unnecessary noise."

She keeps her house immaculate. She keeps but two maids at a time, but has had nine different ones altogether in the last year.

She is the kind of woman who lodges complaints against shop girls, street car conductors, etc. Last year just before Christmas a girl fagged out with the Christmas rush, went out into the street discharged at Madame's complaint that she had answered her sharply. From another girl at that counter came the story that Madame had been shown about fifteen heavy boxes, and then on not finding what she wanted had insisted the girl was not trying to find it. The story also ran that the girl—who was extremely pretty by the way—went out into the streets the day before Christmas saying that she was not going to try any more—it wasn't any use.

The other woman, whom I met in the course of my newspaper work two years ago, is a woman about whom

the tongue of rumor is continually saying cruel things. How much is true, I don't know. I don't want to know. What I do know is this: She supports her father and mother and not only supports them with money but with love.

I don't think she ever said an unkind word about anybody or passed a beggar by without giving. There is a girl in the city who tells this story about her. She, the young girl, came to the city looking for work, spent her savings without getting it and on Thanksgiving Day was wandering the streets penniless. She met this woman, whom she knew slightly. The woman on finding out her trouble insisted on lending her five dollars and later found her work. Subsequently the girl discovered, through very roundabout channels, that the five dollars was not only the woman's last cent, but a very treasured pocketpiece which, even in her own worst extremity, she had never parted with.

There is a fine young man in our community with a splendid wife and baby and an ideal home, who owes everything to this woman. She found him a desperate young fool ready for any vice. She saw the worth in him and helped him find himself. And then when he would have married her in gratitude, she refused because she loved him too well.

I don't believe that anyone ever suffered any more than she did at this time, and yet through it all, she kept her fine cheerfulness and her marvelous interest in other people's needs which makes her unique in a world filled with people saddening the earth with their troubles.

1891, and with the outward time to five days sixteen hours thirty-one minutes, and the homeward to five days twenty-one hours three minutes.

The Cunard Line won the championship back in 1893 with the Campania and Lucania, twin boats of 12,950 tons, 398ft. in length and 65ft. in beam, and costing about £650,000 each. The Lucania in 1894 brought the time down to five days seven hours twenty-three minutes homeward.

Then came the German challenge. In 1900 the Hamburg-American steamer Deutschland steamed from Sandy Hook to Plymouth in five days seven hours thirty-three minutes. In 1906 the Norddeutscher Lloyd Kaiser Wilhelm II. came over in five days eight hours sixteen minutes and in 1908 she made an average speed of 23.72 knots. Since 1907, however, as already mentioned, the Lusitania and Mauretania have held the championship.

"Roseberry Smith."

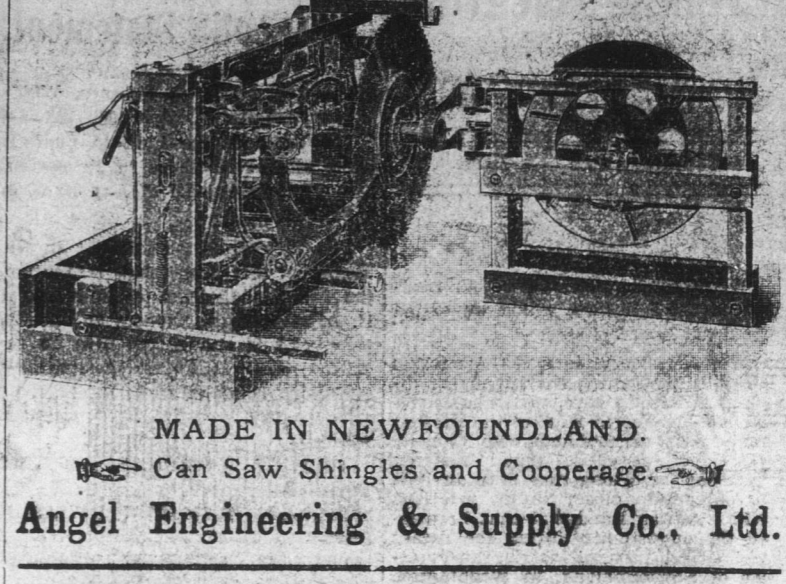
The Close of a Romantic Career on the Turf.
By the death of Mr. James Smith at Upper Tooting a romantic career in sport and business is recalled. He was familiarly known as "Roseberry Smith." It was in 1876 that he accomplished the feat that has been associated with his name ever since, for in that year he won the Cesarewitch and the Cambridgeshire with his horse Rosebery—a feat that no horse had previously achieved. In connection with his nickname "Rosebery," one episode, worthy of place in the more thoughtful melodrama, may be recounted. During the autumn prior to the horse's great victories, a prominent London sportsman, getting wind of Rosebery's carefully concealed merits, sent his brother down to the stable to spy out the land. The advent in the neighborhood of a mysterious stranger quickly became known, and to rid the stable of this unwelcome visitor the trainer hit on an ingenious plan. It was customary to send a boy on a back to the village for letters every day, so the trainer, knowing that the "tout" would find it out, mounted the lad on Rosebery. Immediately the "tout" found out the nature of Rosebery's employment he returned to London convinced that his brother had got on the wrong scent.

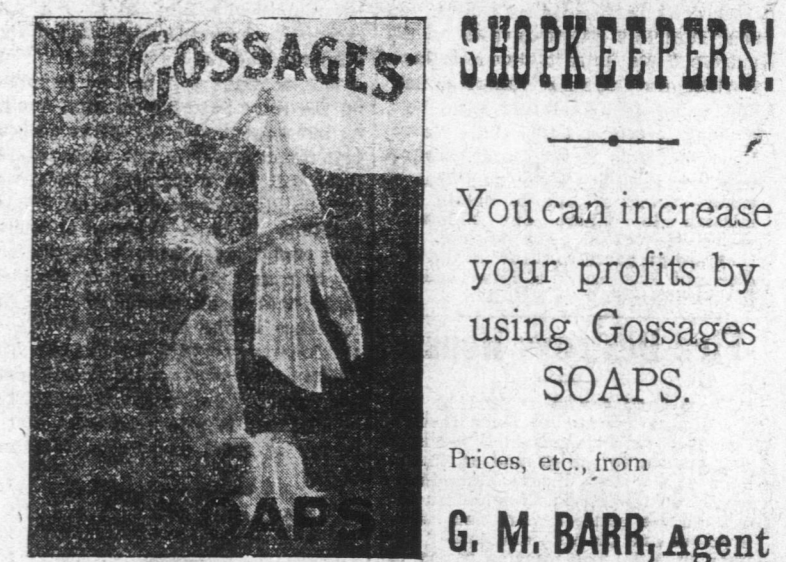

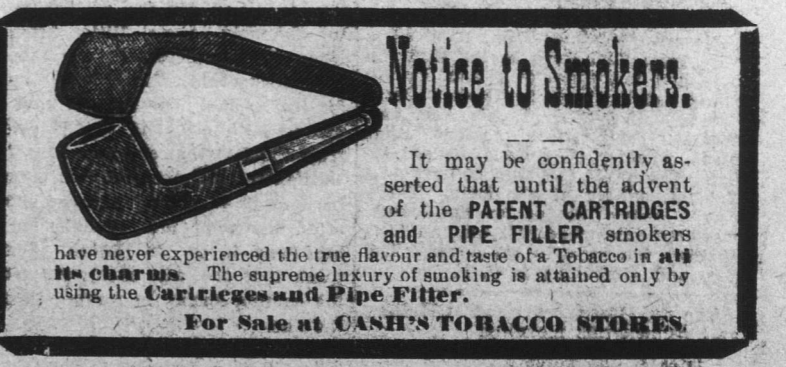

Fighting for the Ocean Championship

Just over sixty years ago the British Government, recognizing the value and possibilities of a quick and regular service of mail vessels between this country and America, invited tenders for the regular carrying of mails. The contract was secured by Mr. Samuel Cunard, a Nova Scotian merchant. Mr. George Burns, of Glasgow, and Mr. David MacIver, of Liverpool, who guaranteed a fortnightly service in summer and a monthly service in winter, between Liverpool, Halifax, and Boston, for \$3,000 a year. They built the first Cunard liner, the Britannia, a wooden ship of 1,150 tons, measuring 207 ft. by 34ft. and fitted with engines of 740 h.p., which left Liverpool on July 4th, 1840, reaching Boston fourteen days eight hours later.

What a contrast to the Cunards of to-day—the Mauretania, for instance, which at the moment of writing is attempting to steam to and from New York within twelve days, including a stoppage on the other side of forty-eight hours. Instead of 740 h.p. engines, the Mauretania has engines of 68,000 h.p., and nearly four Britannias, placed end to end, could be accommodated in the length of the great liner, whose exact measurements are 790 ft. by 88ft. by 80ft. The sister vessel, the Lusitania, is the same size and these liners, which are the largest and fastest in the world, and fitted with turbine engines, have held the

championship in ocean racing since 1907.
HOW SPEED HAS INCREASED.
The Britannia, however, was not the first steamer to cross the Atlantic. The first ship to steam all the way was the Royal William, which, in 1837, took twenty-two days to travel from Quebec to Gravesend, while the Struth, the first steamer to cross the Atlantic from this side, did the Journey in 1858 in sixteen and a half days, keeping up an average speed of eight and a half knots. If the Mauretania is to beat all records she must maintain a speed of twenty-six knots an hour.

The blue ribbon of ocean racing has changed hands many times in the last half-century. The Imoon Line, for instance, won the honour in 1869, when the City of Paris made the trip in six days and twenty-one hours from Queenstown to Halifax, and the City of Brussels achieved another record with a passage of seven days twenty-two hours three minutes home from New York to Queenstown. Another and later City of Paris established an outward record—five days fourteen hours twenty-four minutes from Queenstown to New York—in 1892, but this was lowered by the Cunard Lusitania to five days thirteen hours forty-five minutes a year afterwards.

STRUGGLE FOR SUPREMACY.
Thus the struggle went on. The White Star Line, which is about to produce the largest ship ever launched, the Olympic, of 45,000 tons—the tonnage of the Mauretania is 32,000—came into the field of competition in

A "Star" Story.

We direct the attention of our readers to the following which we culled from the Montreal star:

Washington, January 17.—A curious story is now going the rounds of diplomatic circles here, which has special significance in view of the present reciprocity negotiations with Canada.

It is to the effect that President Taft has for a long time been anxious to enter into closer trade relations with Newfoundland and that he seized the opportunity during the recent visit of Sir Edward Morris, the Premier of Newfoundland, to Washington, to make strong representations to him with a view to entering into a reciprocity agreement with the ancient colony.

It is even stated that President Taft and Secretary Knox drafted the broad outlines of such an agreement, and that one of the points of it was that they were willing to make considerable concessions to Newfoundland in the matter of permitting the free entry of Newfoundland products to this country in return for certain privileges, one of which would be permission for American fishermen to purchase bait in Newfoundland waters.

Sir Edward Morris refused overtures. It is recognized here that Newfoundland has a great future, and it was hoped that by the agreement proposed, not only would a considerable advantage be obtained for Gloucester fishermen—an advantage that would greatly enhance the reputation of President Taft—but that the United States would be able to get in on the ground floor in exploiting Newfoundland as a market for American products.

It is further stated that Sir Edward Morris refused to consider such a proposal, as in his opinion it would jeopardize the best interests of his country.

We do not credit that either President Taft or Secretary Knox made formal and official overtures to Premier Morris for Reciprocity with Newfoundland. But we would not be surprised to learn that the United States informally and unofficially gave Sir Edward Morris to understand that they were willing to negotiate a Reciprocity Convention with Newfoundland on the basis of the free export of pulpwood from Newfoundland and Labrador.

It will be remembered that Mr. C. Pepper, Commercial Adviser to the Government of the United States, was sent here last fall to investigate the pulpwood resources of Newfoundland. Further, for years now American pulp and paper manufacturers have been striving to compass this end. We believe that this is the true "inwardness" of the Star story, and that so eager are Americans to obtain permission to export our pulpwood, which is forbidden by statute, that they are prepared to make any concession of Free Entry of Newfoundland fish for Free Bait as a "bribe."

Fire Destroys House.

From parties who arrived by Saturday night's train we learn that the residence of a man named Seymour was burned to the ground at Shearstown at 9 o'clock Friday night in the height of the storm. Neighbours discovered the house on fire and roused Seymour and his wife and family who were in bed. The inmates escaped unscathed with their lives and in their night apparel and the house and its contents were destroyed the loss to the owner being a terrible one. The fire, which was caused by a gas stove, ignited the woodwork and caused the disaster.

Held by Police.

Just before the Florizel sailed Saturday night, Supt. Grimes with Officers Furlong and Lawlor, boarded the ship and took two of the Spanish seamen who were bound to New York ashore, bringing them to their boarding house. It appears that these young men are sailors that they came out here on the barque Guadalupe, and that if not returned to Spain by the same conveyance, the captain is liable to a heavy fine. Constable Morley invited the aid of the police in the matter. The men are loath to go back in the ship.

Death of Denis Shea.

President Conception Bay B. L. S. Hon. J. D. Ryan, President of the B. L. S., received a telegram this morning acquainting him of the death of Denis Shea, Esq., the venerable President of the Conception Bay Benevolent Irish Society. The funeral will take place on Wednesday morning at Harbor Grace.

Prospero at Griguel.

Messrs. Bowring Bros. received a wire from Seal Cove saying that the ship had left there at 6 a.m. Friday going north direct to Harbor Deep, having called at Jackson's Arm and Western Cove before reaching that place. To-day they were advised by Capt. Keen that the ship had reached Griguel, calling at all ports. There was a heavy jam of ice but strong westerly gales forced it off and thus enabled the ship to go down. The ship and everything is O. K.

The s.s. Durango arrived at Halifax at 1 o'clock this morning.

The faces and hands, and few who were present will forget the experience they had.

By mistaking hair oil for cough mixture, a lady residing in the East End had a serious mishap with her children on Friday night last. She was aroused by the cries of her youngest son, who was suffering from a severe cough, and taking what she thought was the cough cure, brought it to the lad and administered a large spoonful. She soon discovered the mistake, as the liquid acted immediately, but emetics were applied, and a doctor being called the fluid was removed from the stomach. The boy is now none the worse for the misadventure.

B. I. S. L. & A. Meeting.

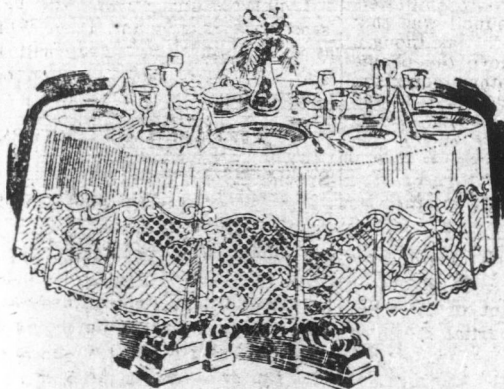

House Blown Down.

The storm of Friday afternoon and night was one of the worst ever experienced in Conception Bay, and was particularly heavy on the north shore. At Western Bay a house owned by John Fitzgerald was completely demolished by the force of the hurricane which raged. It was detached and built on a hill, and about 4 p.m. a gust of wind more violent than any which preceded it hit the structure and blew it over, completely wrecking it. The material of which it was composed was smashed in pieces, and not much of it will be available for use if it is to be re-erected. The uprights, cross beams, clapboards and rough boards were nearly all broken in several places, the chimney, windows and doors were destroyed, and the loss to the owner is a heavy one. The house was worth at least \$1,000, had just been completed, and Mr. Fitzgerald and his family had intended to occupy it this week. Had they been living in it, some of the family would have been killed. Before the structure tumbled, fell, beams and part of the roof were ripped off and blown out in Salt Pond Cove Pond, some distance away.

Boys Perish in Storm.

Hon. R. Watson, Colonial Secretary, had the following message from Mr. Aaron Steno, Pogo, Saturday night: "Two boys, aged 14 and 17, sons of Joseph Cull, Shoal Bay, left their homes yesterday (Friday) morning, and were overtaken by the storm and smothered. Search parties found their bodies about a half mile from their house. Both were dead."

Speculating in Cattle.

A number of young men in the city are speculating in cattle and at least two groups of these have shipments on the way, the kite being purchased in Toronto. Mr. John Rice recently selected 40 head of fine animals in Toronto, and Mr. Joseph Judge is also coming forward with a lot of specially selected stock. The price for beef on the hoof is now very high and the speculators hope to make handsome profits on these shipments.

Rit With Sledge.

Saturday evening while one of the laborers employed at the s.s. Adventure was at work under the ship on the dry dock, a heavy sledge fell from the hands of a man working above him on the scaffolding, and falling on his head felled him to the dock floor, where he remained unconscious for several minutes with blood flowing freely from an ugly cut in the skull. On reviving the man was assisted up off the dock by fellow workmen and brought to a doctor, who had to insert several stitches in the wound.

Special Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, Jan. 23. President Taft began in earnest a campaign for the fortification of the Panama Canal, Saturday night. His speech at a banquet given by the Pennsylvania Society at New York was devoted to this subject. In the Senate the President had been told that sentiment in favour of fortification was almost 2 to 1; while the House seems evenly divided, but not on partisan lines. The President declared there was absolutely no treaty obligation in the way to prevent fortifying the Canal. The United States had every reason to protect what was purely an American waterway. He yielded to no man his love for peace; and he hoped to submit to the Senate arbitration treaties of a broader nature than had ever come before that body or any other legislative body of the world. But universal peace was yet a long way off, and he could not conceive any patriotic American being willing to allow an attacking force free and equal use of a waterway which was built by America largely as an instrument in defence of their country.

The Chinese Attack Foreigners.

The Chinese suspected the police of killing the coolie, and rioting began in several sections of the city. Detachments were landed from British and also from German gunboats were landed. Heavy fighting followed, and ten Chinese were killed. The Viceroy sent native troops to restore order, after the landing of the British and the German marines, and the Volunteers were called out to defend the foreign community. Several foreigners were injured.

The Grace at Barbados

Sails Blown Away and Hull Damaged—Captain and Crew Well. The friends of the crew of A. Goodridge & Sons brig, Grace, Capt. John Jackson, were beginning to feel some anxiety over the long passage which the vessel was making from Oporto, she being out 70 days on her voyage to this port Saturday, when at 4 p.m. that day a telegram was received by the firm announcing her safety, though the ship did not come through without damage. The telegram received by Messrs. Goodridge & Sons from their agent at Barbados, Messrs. S. P. Musson, Son & Co., and it apprised them that the Grace had arrived with her sails badly damaged and several stanchions gone, and that most of the damage to the vessel was above the water line. The message also stated that the captain and crew were well. Messrs. Goodridge immediately telegraphed their agents asking for particulars of the extent of the damage to the ship, and expect an answer to-day. Capt. Jackson is a master mariner of ability and intrepidity, and his vessel is a good sailer, but the past few years in the making of voyages luck has been against him. About this time last year the vessel in running from here to Halifax was 32 days on the voyage, had a desperate time of it and for a time it was feared she had gone to bottom. She struck a shoal going into Halifax, came off, however, but had to undergo considerable repairs. Two years ago she was on the "missing" list in coming from Bristol to this port with general cargo, but turned up O.K. after a voyage every day of which gales of wind and mountainous seas were encountered, and she made the run across in 83 days. Several years ago on a voyage from Europe to this port she was blown south, and on that occasion also fetched Barbados after sustaining considerable damage. It is thought that on this voyage she was off this coast in fairly good time but was driven south to the West Indies and brought up at Barbados. The vessel will likely be given repairs at Barbados, and the damage to her will not seriously inconvenience the owners as no freight awaits her here; but her arrival at Barbados will mean that by the time she is repaired she will be enabled to secure one of the first cargoes of molasses from that island.

Narrowly Escaped Drowning.

Mr. Alonzo Pollett, of Western Bay, narrowly escaped drowning on Wednesday afternoon. He had been in the country all day and was returning home with his horse and slide drawing a heavy load of wood, when he started to cross Rocky Pond to take a short cut home, when about the centre of the pond had been reached a bad sheet of ice was met and horse and driver went through. Pollett clung to the wood which floated the slide, and his cries for help brought some men to his assistance. Knowing that the ice was treacherous in places the men brought trawlers and ropes with them, and throwing one of the latter to Pollett he managed to slip a noose over the horse's head when those on the firm ice stepped the end and held the animals head up, thereby keeping it from drowning. Pollett also put a rope around his own waist and was drawn in over the ice to safety. Then after much exertion and no little risk to the men the horse was cut clear of the traces and also hauled up on the ice. The load of wood and the slide

(Special to the Montreal Star.) Winnipeg, January 17.—Thirteen travel-beaten men, most of them bearing the marks of the rigors of an eight hundred mile "mush" over the ice and snow in weather that often went more than forty degrees below zero, arrived in Winnipeg this morning by train from Gimli, on Lake Winnipeg.

The party comprised Prof. J. Macoun, F.I.S., F.R.C.S., director and naturalist of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa; A. G. Bachand, of the Hydrographic Survey, Ottawa; Sergeant Nicholls, Royal North West Mounted Police, and the nine men of the party which accompanied Mr. Bachand on the work of surveying the harbor of Port Churchill.

Mr. Harry Ford, an interpreter who had been connected with the Mounted Police at Fort Churchill for the past seven years, was also a member of the party, all of whom, with the exception of Sergt. Nicholls, will leave for their respective homes in the east to-morrow morning.

Captain Harold Bartlett, of the ill-fated schooner Jeanie, which was wrecked at Wagner Inlet on Hudson Bay, on September 9, with Prof. Macoun on board, is still at Gimli, with the members of his crew, and will not come to Winnipeg until to-morrow. The members of the crew include Mate Eade, Engineer Fred Gerrard, Assistant Engineer, Jimmy James, Steward, Jimmy Way, Boatswain Tucker, Coxswain Doolan, and two A. B.'s, named Morrissey and Kenny.




