

Peace and War Har Brown Recieve Strike in Montreal

THE FINAL REPLY.

LONDON, June 16. The peace terms to be presented to Germany to-day are the final reply of the Allies, said Mr. Bonar Law, Govt. spokesman in the House of Commons, in opening the victory loan campaign at the Guild Hall to-day. The Speaker said he hoped earnestly the Germans would sign the terms. "It is for them to choose within five days," Mr. Bonar Law added; "they must sign or the armistice is at an end. There must be a just peace, but a just peace must be a stern peace." The speaker said that the chief of the British Staff had declared that twenty-three different wars were now going on, and added: "It is not all over. It is quite possible by want of wisdom, by absence of restraint, by disunion among the Allies, and by want of unity at home, to lose not the victory but the full force of the victory which has been bought so dearly."

THE LIMIT FIVE DAYS.

VERSAILLES, June 16. The delivery of the Allied reply to the German counter proposals which was set for four o'clock this afternoon, was postponed at that hour until six o'clock this evening. The revised Treaty will be delivered with the reply. The provision for civil control of the territory on the left bank of the Rhine which had been tentatively agreed upon, was eliminated from the final draft of the terms. The German plenipotentiaries will sign a reply for the Treaty, writing upon it the exact time from which the five days' limit which they must sign or reject the document will date.

WILL ASK FURTHER EXTENSION.

PARIS, June 16. It is anticipated generally that the Germans will ask for an extension of time in which to reply to the final peace conditions. The request, it is believed, will be based on the fact that the Germans were given only one revised copy of the Treaty. The copy to be received by the Germans will be in French and English and must be translated and printed before it is placed before the German National Assembly at Weimar. It is expected that the translation and printing will take at least 24 hours.

TIME EXTENDED.

PARIS, June 16. The Germans have been granted an additional forty-eight hours in which to make their reply regarding the signing of the Peace Treaty.

NO TIME FOR PRINTING.

PARIS, June 16. The delivery of the Allied reply will not be in printed form. There is no time to print the revised documents. Count Von Brodorff Rantzau will be handed a copy of the original Treaty with the changes in red ink. Ninety-nine other copies will be handed to other German plenipotentiaries. They will make the changes themselves from the first.

WANTED TO GET JOB DONE.

GALWAY, Ireland, June 16. Speaking of the flight Alcock said it was difficult to sum up his impressions. He had no sense of remoteness, as any sense of loneliness had been worn off by previous night flying. He had no thought of what he was flying over but was only intent in getting across. "We wanted to get the job done, and we were jolly well pleased when we saw the coast." He believes the secret of long distance flying under similar conditions is to nurse the engines. He never opened the throttle once. Following the wind the machine averaged 130 miles an hour. Alcock said that he wore electrically heated clothes, but that the machine was so snug it was unnecessary to switch on the current. The aviators leave Galway for London this afternoon at 2.25.

Germany Given Five Days.

Peace and War Hangs in the Balance --- Alcock and Brown Recieve Universal Congratulations --- Big Strike in Montreal---Labor Unrest in France & Italy.

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WANTS TO HONOR FLIERS.

WASHINGTON, June 16. A resolution authorizing the Pres-

ident to confer the Congressional Medal of Honor upon Capt. Alcock and Lieut. Brown, expressing the admiration of Congress at their feat in making a non-stop flight across the Atlantic, was introduced by Representative Laguardia, Republican, of New York.

PREPARING TO EVACUATE PETROGRAD.

LONDON, June 16. A wireless from Moscow says active preparation are being made for the evacuation of Petrograd.

FRENCH MINERS ON STRIKE.

PARIS, June 16. A general strike, called by the Federation of Miners, went into effect this morning.

AMERICAN PRAISE.

NEW YORK, June 16. The New York morning newspapers are unstinted in their praise of the great accomplishment of Captain Alcock and Lieut. Brown. The Times calls it a great feat and says it ranks among the greatest of human achievements and not merely as another highest mark of British sportsmanship. The Sun says when flying to Europe has become a routine incident of every day life, as it soon will be, the names of Alcock and Brown will gleam bright in the records of man's progress in mastering the elements. The World says, "The flight of Alcock and Brown across the Atlantic was a splendid feat. In scientific skill and pure sportsmanship, in physical endurance and indifference to danger, it has never been surpassed in the records of aviation. For all times they have won the honor of being the pioneers to bridge the ocean from Newfoundland to Ireland." Captain Sexton, Chief of the United States naval staff in London, commenting on Captain Alcock's flight to-day, said: "It was a very fine performance. The United States navy will be only too pleased to extend congratulations."

CONGRATULATIONS ON ALL SIDES.

LONDON, June 16. The Aero Club is making plans for a

reception and banquet for Captain Alcock on his arrival in London. Hawker is credited by the Central News as saying with regard to Alcock's achievement, "It was a magnificent and very fine feat. Am very glad Capt. Alcock was able to make the flight in real fashion without warships and all that sort of thing. It is very gratifying from that point indeed." Viscount Northcliffe has sent the following message to Capt. Alcock: "A very hearty welcome to the pioneer of direct Atlantic flight. Your journey with your brave companion Whitten Brown, is a typical exhibition of British courage and organized efficiency. Just as in 1913, when I offered the prize I felt it would soon be won, so do I believe that your wonder journey is a warning to cable monopolists and others to realize that within the next few years we shall be less dependent upon them, unless they increase their wires and speed. Your voyage was made more quickly than the average Press messages of 1913. Moreover, I look forward with certainty to the time when a London morning newspaper will be selling in New York in the evening, allowing for the difference between British and American time and vice versa in regard to New York evening journals reaching London next day. Then we shall no longer suffer from the danger of garbled translations due to telegraphic communication. Then American and British people will understand each other better as they are brought into closer daily touch. Illness prevents me from shaking you by the hand and personally presenting the prize; but I can assure you that your welcome will be equal to that of Hawker, and his gallant American compeer Read, whose great accomplishments have given us much valuable data for future Atlantic flight. I rejoice at the good augury that you depart from and arrive at those two portions of the British Commonwealth, happy and prosperous Dominion of Newfoundland, and future equally happy and prosperous Dominion of Ireland. Yours sincerely, Northcliffe."

CONVERSED ACROSS ATLANTIC.

Wireless Telephoning Expert, whose Voice Crossed the Ocean, Now in Newfoundland. Handley-Page-On-The-Sea, To-day. More and more is Newfoundland becoming the Mecca of aviation, and several of world-wide fame have been here within the last few months. Not the least of them is Lieut. Robb, R.N.V.R., one of the Marconi Wireless Co.'s expert engineers. Lieut. Robb, who is now at Handley-Page-On-The-Sea, Hr. Grace, supervising the installation of the "Atlantic" wireless, transmitting, receiving and directional instruments, spent some considerable time in the company's laboratories, in charge of the perfecting of the invention, with the result that, in March of this year, wireless telephone conversations were carried on by him and Lieut. Pickett, R.N.V.R., at Louisburg, N.S., with other experts on the west coast of Ireland, the conversations being carried on over a period of several days. Lieut. Robb, with whom I have conversed, tells that the experiments were carried out without a hitch, the human voice carrying across the broad Atlantic Ocean just as plainly as it does on the ordinary telephone. With such success, indeed, were the tests conducted, that a commercial service is anticipated very shortly, and in time will undoubtedly be linked up with the regular telephone systems, so that people in St. John's, for example, would be able to talk with friends in London. In the meantime, Handley-Page-On-The-Sea is proud to have been for some weeks the living-place of one who, like Lieut. Robb, has been so prominently connected with the project and so responsible for its success.

PLENTY OF FUEL LEFT.

LONDON, June 16. Major Mayo, of the Aero Club, inspected the Vimy plane and found the seals on the marked parts intact, according to a wireless from Clifden, Ireland. In landing the pylons of the center section and the main spar of the lower plane were broken. The steel construction of the fuselage saved the machine from further damage. The two engines ran smoothly. When the plane landed there were two hundred and ninety gallons of petroleum in the tank, sufficient for a flight of ten hours longer.

BIG STRIKE IN MONTREAL.

MONTREAL, June 16. Four thousand employees of the Dominion Textile Company struck this morning for higher wages and shorter hours. Four hundred electrical workers also struck. This strike may extend to the entire building trades.

STRIKE OVER IN ITALY.

LONDON, June 16. A wireless despatch received from Rome says the general strike has been ended throughout Italy.

MURDER AND SUICIDE.

SOREL, Que., June 16. An attempt to murder the girl he loved, Aurelian Rondeau, shot and killed her father, Philip Menard, who protected her. Rondeau tried to commit suicide by jumping in the river. When pulled out he killed himself by shooting himself twice in the abdomen.

THERE WAS ANOTHER CAUSE.

PARIS, June 16. It was the refusal of the German generals, especially General Von Faly-enbayan, to accept the Austrian plan for offensive operations that was the underlying cause of the catastrophe to the Central Empire, according to declarations made by Field Marshal Conrad Von Hostendorff, the former

Austrian-Hungarian chief of staff, to the press, says a Zurich despatch to the Petit Parisien. The Austrian plan consisted of pushing the war to the limit against Italy, which the German generals declined to follow.

KRONSTADT TO FALL.

HELSINGFORS, Finland, June 16. The fall of Kronstadt, the naval base of Petrograd, is imminent, according to reports received by naval circles here from Reval, the capital of Esthonia. The reports say that a white flag has been hoisted over the fortress several times by its Bolshevik defenders.

A MONTH'S NOTICE.

PARIS, June 16. The Allies have promised to deliver within one month a list of persons who they intend to try for the responsibility for the war and the violation of the laws of war.

CANADA'S MILITIA FORCE.

OTTAWA, June 16. Major General Newburn, in the House of Commons this afternoon, introduced the bill so to amend the Militia Act to provide for a permanent force in Canada of not exceeding 10,000, instead of 5,000 as at present. The bill was read a first time.

The Kaiser and His Army.

The Kaiser Wilhelm II. of Germany began his reign on June 15, 1888, by a startling address to his soldiers, in which he asserted that the Kaiser and the Army were born for one another, and belonged to one another; which brought to mind his speech to his Hussar regiment the year before, when he said: "We are standing before an uncertain future, and it behoves us to think of the old device on our helmets. "With God for King and Fatherland." But in the present war it has been "I am God!" In fact his hostility to England was shown at his accession, and twenty-six years later was shown to the full when the great war of 1914 commenced. The manifesto to the army was followed by another couched in the language of Divine Right, to the effect that he would be "a just and merciful Prince, fostering piety and the fear of God, a helper to the poor and distressed, and a guardian of the right." When we read this, we wonder if, at the present time he remembers his promises, bearing in mind the oppression and miseries he has caused to Belgium and France by the excesses of his troops. In his speech to the German Parliament he made allusion to his father, but professed



To Stop Rent Profiteering.

"The legislature of New York is considering a bill to put an end to rent profiteering by establishing committees in every municipality to which tenants may carry legitimate complaints. The committee would have the power to fix a fair rental, and if the landlord refused to agree, the assessment of the property would be reviewed and raised on an amount based on the rental value. The effect would be to make the property owner pay the city in taxes, part of what he took from the ratepayer," says the Toronto Globe. "Instances of rent profiteering have been reported in Toronto, but are of course exceptional. The lower value of money, increased taxation, and the greater cost of repairs have justified higher rents, but the housing shortage is not a legitimate factor. There should be some method of preventing extortion, and the assessment department will fall in its duty if it does not take note of such cases when it is making up its rolls."

Aerial Fire Patrol.

Canadian newspapers are opening a discussion on the possibilities of the aeroplane in forest patrolling, to make a demonstration of which, Lieut. Stuart Graham flew from Halifax to Montreal, using in his flight, however, a hydroplane. The Government of the United States may be said to be the originators of this movement, having had under consideration for some time the adoption and use of the aeroplane for the better protection of the great forests of the Union. Supplementary to the use of planes will be the installation of wireless telephones, some of which have already undergone experimental trials, in order to test their practicability. Thus modern science is being used to aid the foresters, fire wardens and rangers of the American Republic in detecting and reporting the outbreak of forest fires, which are, at times, most numerous in sylvan places.

Both Canada and the United States recognize the value of an efficient and up-to-date Forestry Service, and are spending much time and money in working out the problem of fire detection and the protection of valuable timber-lands from the ravages of the destructive element. With the adoption of the aeroplane and wireless, there is brought into service and operation two ideal methods of detection and constant communication with the surface patrols and fire companies, and the few experiments so far conducted by the United States service, resulted in the detection of fires in heavy timber at altitudes ranging from six thousand to ten thousand feet.

Canada's forest resources are so huge that the loss by fire has been in proportion, hence the possibilities of the aeroplane for patrolling must develop. Another use to which aircraft could be put is the cruising of timber properties, the prospecting of minerals and for the speedy transportation of supplies into districts, inaccessible, excepting by the slow and laborious process of packing by means of carriers. The frequent and annually recurring forest fires which Newfoundland experiences, have taken severe toll of valuable timber, and though our forest patrols do their best to cope with these fiery enemies, they are greatly handicapped by the slow methods of progress which of necessity, must prevail in wooded country, where all travel has to

be done on foot. The use of a small cruising aeroplane would greatly facilitate the work of our Forestry Service and permit the members to give their attention to a greater radius of treeland in an hour than could be covered afoot in a week. The advantages thus offered in detecting an outbreak of fire would be incalculable, and speedy measures for extinguishing it taken.

There should not be any difficulty in acquiring a couple of planes for this necessary work, especially when the British Government are selling by auction, many planes and parts, some of them being but very little used, at prices far below the market value, and which range from \$400 up to \$1,800. The initial outlay and the operating cost, would easily be saved to the revenue by the protection they would afford from damage done to timber areas by forest fires.

Aeronautical.

In company with Capt. V. S. Bennett, R.A.F., Major Fiske, representing Boulton and Paul, which firm has entered two machines for the trans-Atlantic flight, has visited St. John's, and inspected various places in the city, for likely places from which take-offs may be made. The planes will arrive by the Digby on her next trip, while the hangars have already arrived. On arrival here the machines will be very quickly assembled and will essay the flight within a week of each other. The Martinsyde biplane's new engine has been installed and she will be transferred to Pleasantville within a few days. The planes will then be attached, when the trans-Atlantic flight will be attempted.

Lieut. Williams, representing the Alliance Aeroplane, is expecting his machine by the Schem. He has hired Lester's Field, from which the Vickers-Vimy big bomber made her successful flight.

"Atlantic" May Fly To-Morrow.

TRIAL FLIGHT TO-DAY.
Handley-Page-On-The-Sea. HARBOR GRACE, Today. The new radiators, of the very latest design, have been attached to the engine and the short trial flight, for the purpose of testing their working, will in all probability take place to-day. If everything works well, and the weather is favorable, the "Atlantic" will get away to-morrow on her trans-Atlantic flight. Local interest is still centered on the Handley-Page machine, and Handley-Page-On-The-Sea is always the scene of a large crowd of interested spectators.

Getting Boats Ready.

The C.C.C. Boat Club members were engaged last night getting their wharf erected, and it is likely that the practice boats Myrtle and Mary will be put on the lake to-night. Enthusiasm is growing daily in the coming regatta, and this week will probably see a goodly number of the crews at practice. At next Friday night's meeting of the committee, most of the preliminary work in connection with Regatta Day will be finalized, and reports from several sub-committees appointed at the last meeting will be received. A crew of soldiers have already made application for the "Cadet" for the military naval race, which promises to be the feature of the day's contests.

Ready for Shipment.

With a week's fine weather, it is not unlikely that some of the codfish caught during the spring by the Belleoram fleet, will be ready for shipment, which will be much earlier than in previous years. Last night there was brought to a successful conclusion the first short term Campaign ever conducted in Newfoundland, namely, the Newfoundland Methodist Educational Campaign which originally set as its goal the sum of \$150,000, and later increased the goal to \$200,000. Last evening's report brought the grand total of subscriptions to the magnificent sum of \$248,466.50. After the report was made, other subscriptions were handed in, and Team 16 pledged itself to secure enough money to finally go beyond the quarter million goal.

Last night's meeting was in the form of a high tea, and was called for 7 o'clock. Practically every worker was there, and a large number of guests occupied seats at the Executive Committee Table. Among the guests were: Rev. Gordon Dickie, M.A., Pastor of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church; Dr. V. P. Burke, B.Sc., and Dr. Stensford of Heart's Content. Talks were made by Hon. R. K. Bishop, General Chairman; Mr. E. J. Hockenbury, Campaign Manager; Mark G. Holtzman, Associate Manager; Rev. T. B. Darby, Guardian of the Home; Rev. J. R. Saint, of His. Content; Arthur Mews, C.M.G.; Capt. A. R. F. Horwood, Mr. J. Peters, Capt. A. Kean, J. Leamon, Rev. Dr. Curtis.

Special recognition was rendered in connection with the Campaign, was given both by the General Chairman, Hon. R. K. Bishop, and Mr. E. J. Hockenbury. A special vote of thanks was tendered to the Publicity Committee, of which Mr. W. H. White was chairman, and through him to the press, to Messrs. Soper and Blotch, who so ably conducted the Report Luncheons, and through them to the Ladies and Boy Scouts, who, through the different evenings made the report meetings so helpful. This vote of thanks was moved by Rev. Dr. J. R. Saint, who spoke as a representative of the Outports, and assured the Campaign Workers that if the same enthusiasm could be aroused outside of St. John's, as was evident at the meeting, the Outports would far exceed their goal. This vote of thanks was seconded by Mr. J. Leamon.

The Rev. T. B. Darby thrilled the workers last evening, when he referred to the Boys, who had many times attended chapel service in the very room in which the dinner was held, and who had gone in and out of the class-rooms of the College, where they received their training, and who had made the supreme sacrifice during the great War. He said that in their honour and for their sakes, many persons had made their contributions to this Educational Fund. He said in part: "We have taken the torch of Life from their falling hands, and have planted it a little farther up the shining heights of the City of God, and every man and woman, and child who have given time and money to this cause, have caught in part at least the spirit of our heroic dead, and not for their sakes do we make this offering, but for His sake, whose spirit of self-sacrifice and self-denial had entered into theirs."

A feature of last night's programme was the bringing upon the platform of approximately 100 Junior Boys of the College, who sang the Nfld. Ode, and the National Anthem, and were accompanied on the piano by Mr. Gordon Christian. The Chairman, when the boys were assembled on the platform, told the workers that it was for these boys, and others like them, that the Campaigners had been working the past week. Mr. Hockenbury and Mr. Holtzman in their remarks, congratulated the workers upon their splendid accomplishment and upon their loyalty to the organization, and predicted as the result of this Campaign, other achievements that would even out-rank this one. During the evening a resolution, moved by Mr. Arthur Mews, and seconded by Mr. R. F. Horwood, was put before the workers and passed, looking towards a closer union of the school systems of Newfoundland. The following is the resolution in full:

THE KING'S APPEAL.
LONDON, June 16. (Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—The King has issued the following appeal in connection with the Victory Loan: "Whereas throughout the war I appealed to my people to unite for victory, I now urge upon them another common effort in order to set peace upon a basis sure and sound. I ask them to co-operate in making the Victory Loan a national success. After years of conflict, peace is now, by the blessing of God, in prospect. The time of transition bears with it problems calling for a like spirit of endeavor as before, and a like spirit of sacrifice. The security of my realm and the prosperity of my people can only be maintained if the fabric of both rests on solid financial foundations. To establish these foundations, the great Victory Loan is now being launched, and once again I call upon my people for their unstinted support. It is thus that we who live may fitly meet the debt due those who gave their lives in the cause of freedom, and it is thus too that we may render ourselves faithful trustees of that future of peace and safety, for which I earnestly pray."

PRESENTED YESTERDAY.
PARIS, June 16. The reply of the Allies to Germany's counter proposals will be delivered to the head of the enemy peace delegation at Versailles at four o'clock this afternoon. A special train is held in readiness at Versailles, and it is presumed the Germans will depart for Weimar immediately upon receipt of the Allied reply.

A LONG LIST.
PARIS, June 16. The Allies have promised Germany to deliver within one month, a list of persons, whom they intend to try for the responsibility for the war and of violation of the laws of war.

TUMULTUOUS WELCOME.
DUBLIN, June 16. A tumultuous welcome was given Alopek and Brown on their arrival to-night, and when the train entered the station the flyers were fairly mobbed by cheering crowds. On the train Alopek looked remarkably well and was in buoyant spirits, but on the other hand Brown seemed greatly fatigued and frankly admitted it. He said, "There's no little amount of luck in the success of N.C. 4 or our flight, but so far as we were concerned it could not have been worse. In our case, after the first hour, we were muddled in fog until we landed in Ireland. Nevertheless, with only a sextant and compasses and a special device for determining the machine's speed and drift, we came through, and I am sure we could do it again."

GENEVA, June 16. Czech forces under the command of General Hennoque of the French Army have begun a counter offensive against Hungarian Soviet troops, and have captured several villages after 10 hours of fighting, according to a Prague despatch received here.

L. G. Mackay Witnesses Historic Events in Nfld.

L. G. Mackay, of this city, has just returned from a week's visit in Newfoundland during which time he visited the city of St. John's and the larger towns there as well as the points of interest. "My trip was crowded with excitement," said Mr. Mackay in a conversation with The Record, in which he made many interesting observations on events which transpired during his visit to the colony. A stormy session of the Newfoundland House of Assembly, the arrival in St. John's of the Newfoundland Regiment, visits to the aerodromes used by the American and British aviators in connection with the trans-Atlantic flights and the arrival of the American balloon which made the 2000 mile flight from New York to Harbor Grace, were a few of the events which transpired in the colony during his eventful week there. While in St. John's Mr. Mackay witnessed the arrival home of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment. The gallant men of the regiment landed in St. John's on June 2nd, and were given a warm welcome by the people of the city who turned out en masse for the occasion. The Premier, Sir M. P. Cashin, Col. Secretary J. R. Bennett, Minister of Militia Hickman and other Government officials were at the wharf when the boys disembarked. The city was gaily bedecked with bunting while thousands lined the main thoroughfares to welcome the gallant heroes home. Many of whom have seen service from beginning to end of the war. The reception given by St. John's to her returning veterans was no mean one. Visitors in the city could not help but remark on the enthusiasm of the people of the city and the warmth of the welcome extended the battle-scarred heroes.

Assembling Planes.
While in Harbor Grace, Mr. Mackay visited the aerodrome where the Vimy Bomber and Handley-Page biplanes are being assembled for the trans-Atlantic flight. "Equal progress in the work of assembling their machines is being made by both commanders," he said. The Handley-Page machine being more ponderous and complicated, is regarded as likely to require a materially greater amount of time for finishing touches of wiring and adjustment which are necessary before any airplane may be taken aloft. Added to this advantage which now seems to be with the Vimy, there is the prospect of the machine being lighter not only in actual weight but also in lifting capacity. The Handley-Page men have little hope of being able to rise with a trans-Atlantic load except in one direction and then only in a very strong wind.

"In conversation with Captain Raynham, whose Martinsyde plane met with an accident in attempting to rise, I was told," said Mr. Mackay that the unsuitability of his Martinsyde for the cause of the flight. The aerodrome of his Martinsyde is surrounded by high hills and only in a strong wind can a plane reach sufficient altitude for a flight over them.

Colony Prosperous.
"There is no doubt that Nova Scotians as well as all Canadians have a tendency to think of the Ancient Colony as suffering from backwardness," Mr. Mackay stated, but the financial reports this year of the Newfoundland government tell a different tale. During the fiscal year ending June, 1918, the colony enjoyed a revenue of nearly seven million dollars or more than twice that of Nova Scotia with nearly double the population—Sydney Record.

Nfld. Scotch Cured Herring.

Although there continues to be a depression in the market for Newfoundland Scotch style herring, importers in New York have no misgivings as to the future. In view of the condition of affairs in Scotland and the recent sale of heavy lots of Norway herring to Germany, many hold the belief that there will be a better demand for Newfoundland Scotch herring during the summer and fall. Importers are not backward in their condemnation of the methods employed by retailers of Newfoundland herring here. They claim that the prices being asked are so high that consumers cannot afford to buy them. The market here has declined since the arrival of stocks of the fall catch to a point where Newfoundland Scotch cured herring is selling this season at about the same levels as last year, "despite the fact that the fish cost considerably more at packing points. The trade looks for an improvement in the near future, and there are predictions that the supply held here will be entirely cleaned up before new stocks of the fall catch of 1919 arrive.—N. Y. Fishing Gazette, June 7.





The "Gallant Arethusa."

The first "Arethusa" did doughty deeds for France before she was ordered to change her flag and allegiance in 1759, the year of Minden, of

Quebec, and Wolfe's great triumph at Quebec. Seen off the French coast by a British frigate squadron, under Commander Lockhart, the "Arethusa," as then called was hotly chased for four hours; but only lowered her colours when a second opponent, the "Venus," loosed her broadsides on her. For nearly a score of years the captured "Arethusa" had no opportunity of winning laurels, but in the year 1778, when France and England were on the verge of war, early on the morning of June 17, while Admiral Keppel's fleet was cruising off the Lizard two French frigates and a cutter were suddenly in sight. The signal, "Chase strangers in sight" went up on the British flagship, the "Victory," and at once the "Arethusa," with some of the swiftest of our ships, headed for the enemy. One of the French frigates was quickly overhauled, and after a threat of broadsides the French captain went on board the "Victory" to explain to the British Admiral what they were doing in British waters. The other, "La Belle Poule," refused the summons, and with every inch of

canvas stretched, showed a swift 'pair of heels' to the Englishmen. All her pursuers were quickly left behind—all save the "Arethusa," whose captain, Samuel Marshall, for two hours hung doggedly on her heels before he at last was able to range alongside and hail her. To her captain he made the formal request to put about and return with him to the British fleet. He received an insolent reply, and

almost before the last word was spoken the frigates side burst into flame, and a smashing broadside struck the "Arethusa," sweeping her decks and shattering her bulwarks to splinters. The next moment the starboard guns of the "Arethusa" broke into responsive thunder, and strewed the enemy's decks with dead. For four long hours, fast as the guns could be loaded and run out the deadly duel was fought. French and English alike resolute to fight to the last man. When at last after four hours of such fighting as even British sailors had never known, the magazines in each ship was empty, and the last shot fired the wind fell, and the "Arethusa" was left a shattered, motionless wreck on the sea, while "La Belle Poule," although her sails were hanging in ribbons, yet had enough canvas to drift away and struggle into the shelter of a neighboring cove. There she was quickly towed by shore boats to a berth among dangerous reefs, unapproachable without a pilot. The "Arethusa," gallant as she was, could do no more. She could only cut away her wreckage and rig up jury-masts with sufficient sail to drag her back to the British Fleet. But though she took back no prize with her, the story of her heroic fight sent a thrill of exultation and pride through Great Britain, which is still felt a century and a half after she fired the last shot at "La Belle Poule." In four hours she had won immortality, and made the name "Arethusa" the proudest borne by any British man-of-war. That the tradition has been maintained has been proved in latter days.
