





Meteor Lost for a Century Has Been Discovered Again.

Buenos Aires.—The whereabouts of an aerolite of great size, which was revealed to the Spanish conquerors by Indians about the middle of the seventeenth century, and of which traces have been lost since the year 1812, have again been ascertained, according to a communication received by Professor Clemente Onelli, an Argentine naturalist, from a Senor Leberthou, who claims the rediscovery. The aerolite is located in the Province of Santiage del Estero, in the uninhabited Otumpa pampa, which is also known as "Sky Pampa" after the celestial origin of the stone. Up to the year 1812 the situation of the aerolite was well known, and from the minerals which constitut ts mass several flint-lock muskets were made. It was about the middle of the seventeenth century, that the Spaniards, guided by the Vilelas Indians, discovered the great meteori mass, half buried in the sands. Re-

After the war of independence and the long period of formation of the Argentine nation had passed, several expeditions were sent out to search for the aerolite. Other attempts were made in more recent times, and ft was only this year an attempt made by the authorities of Santiago del Estero province ended in failure.

According to certain analysis allers. According to certain analysis alleged to have been made in 1812, the meteorite was constituted of pure moteoric iron, nickel and cobalt.




