That gallant martinet responded by a bow as profound as that of an old lady in a minuet, and kissed his hand to her as she disappeared.

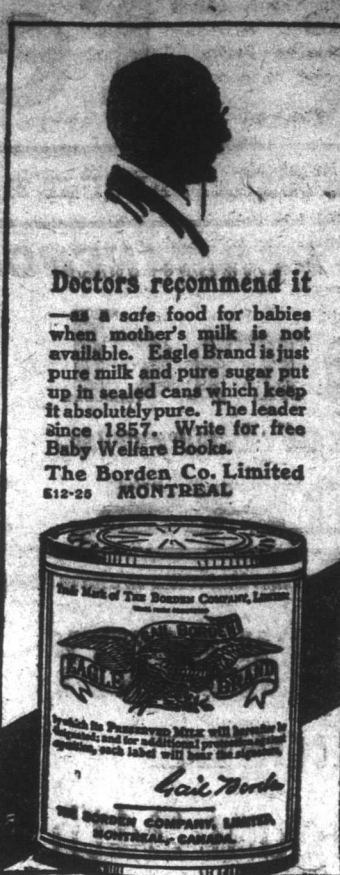

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Results of Conference Approved by French, Belgian and German Cabinets

Viscount Grey Retires From Public Life—Martial Law Proclaimed at Port Sudan—U.S. Fliers Leave Iceland To-Day.

FRENCH CABINET GIVES APPROVAL.

PARIS, Aug. 19. The French Cabinet to-day unanimously approved the work of the French delegates and the delegates' attitude during the London Conference and thanked it for the important results it had attained in the interests of France.

GERMAN CABINET ALSO SATISFIED.

BERLIN, Aug. 19. It is generally expected the Reichstag will meet Friday and its decision on results of London Reparations Conference will be taken at that time. Yesterday a meeting of the Cabinet, under the chairmanship of President Ebert, unanimously approved the German delegates' attitude during the London negotiations and the Government is determined to dissolve the Reichstag in the event of the latter failing to sanction the London pact.

BELGIANS SATISFIED ALSO.

BRUSSELS, Aug. 20. After listening to-day to a detailed account of the recent reparations conference in London, the Belgian cabinet unanimously endorsed the conduct of affairs by Premier Theunis and Foreign Minister Rymans and congratulated them on the agreements reached. The cabinet to-day

appointed Louis De Broqueurs as Belgium's third delegate to the League of Nations. He will take the place of Baron Boyens, who requested that he be permitted to relinquish his post.

FLIERS HOP OFF THIS MORNING.

REYKJAVIK, Iceland, Aug. 20. The United States round the world fliers and Lieut. Lecotelli, Italian aviator, who will accompany them on their flight to North American continent, will take off on the long lap to Fredericksdal, near Cape Farewell, East Greenland, at three o'clock to-morrow morning. It was decided to-day.

MARTIAL LAW IN PORT SUDAN.

KHARTUM, EGYPT, Aug. 20. Several British warships have arrived at Port Sudan to aid troops there in maintaining order. Martial law is in effect following further disturbances in Port Sudan.

MANITOBA CROPS DAMAGED BY STORM.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 20. Meagre reports up to an early hour this morning indicated that the severe electrical storms which have been passing over Manitoba the past two days have played havoc with crops in a number of sections of the Province. Especially is this true of Foxwarren District, where it is reported,

the storm which broke over Northwest Manitoba on Monday night brought hail which ruined crops on six thousand acres, fifty farmers suffering losses estimated at averaging eighty per cent. The electrical storm was also accompanied by violent wind and torrential rain.

PRINCE RETURNS HOME.

LONDON, Aug. 20. The Prince of Wales returned to London last night after having spent a few days at Beauville where he was chiefly occupied in playing polo. An amusing incident occurred in connection with the Prince's sojourn at Beauville. One evening the doorkeeper at the Casino refused His Royal Highness admission, the doorkeeper not recognizing the heir apparent to the British throne at the time. The mistake was quickly rectified, however, and the Prince seemed to enjoy the joke.

PRINCE WILL GO DIRECT TO BANJO.

LONDON, Aug. 20. The Prince of Wales is anxious to reach his ranch at the earliest possible moment and his stop on Long Island, where he will witness the international polo matches, will positively be his only stop on his way to Alberta. What he may do on the return journey is as yet undecided.

SQUADRON AT QUEBEC.

QUEBEC, Aug. 19. The British special squadron arrived at Quebec at 1.30 p.m. to-day.

ADMIRAL BELIEVES IN DOMINION NAVIES.

QUEBEC, Aug. 20. "When you ask me as to the Naval Defence Policy to be adopted by the Overseas Dominions of the Empire, I would say that it is a very delicate question to consider, but if you would like me to express my opinion on the subject I am willing to state that providing the Dominion of Canada or any other Overseas Dominion within the British Empire is desirous of maintaining their own navy, it would be to my mind the finest thing that could possibly happen the dominion thus affected, while at the same time it would be a magnificent help to Great Britain. This was the statement made in an interview this morning by Vice Admiral Sir Frederick Field commanding the British special service squadron now here.

GREY RETIRES.

LONDON, Aug. 19. Viscount Grey of Fallodon has retired from the Liberal leadership in the House of Lords for personal reasons.

DUE TO ILL HEALTH.

LONDON, Aug. 20. Viscount Grey of Fallodon, whose retirement from the leadership of the Liberal Party in the House of Lords was announced to-day, has slipped out of British public life as modestly as he entered it. His friends and political associates, knowing his state of health, were not surprised at the news from Fallodon where the former Secretary of Foreign Affairs is spending a holiday at his country seat which only last year was restored from the effects of a disastrous fire in 1918.

MACDONALD'S LETTER CREATES STORM.

PARIS, Aug. 20. The storm raised by the British Prime Minister's letter to France and Belgium, urging expenditure in evacuation of the Ruhr, continues to rage. Official circles, however, maintain Mr. MacDonald acted quite naturally in the matter, using the only procedure available to him to make known officially, apart from the London Conference, the traditional viewpoint of his Government.

DALHOUSIE REUNION.

HALIFAX, N.S., Aug. 20. From Sydney, N.S., from New Westminster, B.C., from St. John's, Nfld., from Bermuda, and from many intermediate points, sons and daughters of old Dalhousie have assembled in Halifax for a three days' reunion, marking the 106th anniversary of the founding of the University by Lord Dalhousie. Nearly four hundred former students registered this morning.

ENGLAND'S DEATH AND BIRTH RATE.

LONDON, Aug. 20. England's death rate for 1923 is given as 11.6 per thousand, the lowest in recorded history. In a report by the Ministry of Health, just issued, the total deaths were 444,768, which figure is 42,000 less than in 1922. The infant mortality rate is also the lowest recorded, dropping 15 per cent from 1922 to 1923 and representing a saving to the nation of 45,000 babies. The birth rate, however, does not give the same satisfaction. The number of births was 768,131, or about 22,000 fewer than in 1922.

RAILWAY ACCIDENT IN PORTUGAL.

LISBON, Portugal, Aug. 20. Six persons were killed and forty injured yesterday when a passenger train, proceeding from Lisbon to Estoril, a fashionable summer resort, collided with a freight train. The passenger train was crowded with business men.

DAMAGE FROM RAIN AND FLOOD.

DESMOINES, Iowa, Aug. 20. Two men lost their lives, many head of cattle were destroyed and property damage to the extent of hundreds of thousands was done in a terrific rain storm in Eastern Iowa, last night. Practically all the cities and towns in the storm's path here were flooded and the Wapsipinicon, Cedar and Big Creek Rivers overflowed.

SUCCESSFULLY TERMINATED.

MADRID, Aug. 20. The Spanish operations against the rebels at Afrau, in the eastern zone of Morocco, have been successfully terminated, says an official communique. The rebels are known to have suffered a loss of 90 killed and 340 wounded, although native reports and air observers put enemy casualties as high as 550. Among the Spaniards wounded were two Lieutenants.

AN ARAB-RUSSIAN TREATY.

JERUSALEM, Aug. 20. King Hussein, of Hedjaz, has conducted a peace treaty establishing diplomatic and commercial relations between Hedjaz and Soviet Russia, according to information received here to-day from Mecca.

MATTEOTTI'S BODY TAKEN HOME.

ROME, Aug. 20. The body of Giacomo Matteotti which was found five miles outside of Rome last Saturday, was taken to his late home in Eretta Golese to-day and

It is said some of them refused offers of employment because the work was not to their liking and that this attitude has left a bad impression in the minds of local officials.

NICE TACTICS TO SQUARE ACCOUNTS.

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 19. Argentine coastwise steamer Asturlano, on a voyage to the South Argentine ports with 320 passengers and crew has reported by wireless that a time bomb exploded in a trunk in the hold of the vessel Sunday night, causing a fire which took four and a half hours to extinguish. The Asturlano, one of several steamers boycotted recently by the Argentine Maritime Federation, sailed Friday with a minimum crew.

TWO KILLED AND SEVERAL INJURED IN COLLISION.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 19. John Katerynuk, a section foreman at Jacobs and his father-in-law, George Steetruk, a section laborer, were killed, and S. Holstrom and L. Darcy sustained broken collar bones and other injuries as a result of a collision late Saturday, between two gasoline speedsters on the National Lines between Sioux Lookout and Armstrong, Ont.

CHINESE CASUALTIES.

PEKING, Aug. 19. Four hundred mud houses collapsed in floods in the area near Kaifeng, the capital of Honan Province, and many casualties were reported from Chiaoao among the cave dwellers who are drowned by flood waters, advices received here say.

TRAVELLING ARRANGEMENTS FOR LORD RENFREW.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 19. The Prince of Wales who is travelling incognito as Lord Renfrew, will visit his ranch at High River, Alberta, next month, will leave New London, Conn., on Sept. 14th, en route to Canada, according to a statement made here last night by officials accompanying Sir Henry Thornton, President of the Canadian National Railways, on his arrival from the West. The Prince has accepted the invitation of Sir Henry Thornton to make use of the facilities of the National system on his journey across the Dominion. He will arrive in Winnipeg by special train on Sept. 16.

A RIVER OF MUD.

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Aug. 19. A veritable river of mud boulders and ashes, extending in width for a few hundred yards to half a mile in some places and 15 to 25 feet deep, is flowing from the mouth of Mud Creek Canyon, eight miles above McCloud, Siskiyou County, on the slope of Mt. Shash, into the McCloud River, says a despatch to the Sacramento Bee.

FAMILY FUED ENDS IN THREE DEATHS.

TEXARKANA, Ark., Aug. 19. Walter Armstrong, 50, Charles Dixon, 26, and Jim Dixon, 29, were shot to death in a five cornered gun battle in the main street of Fouke, near here, yesterday, according to a despatch to the Texarkanan. Wm. and Stuart Armstrong, sons of the dead man, are alleged to have shot the Dixon brothers.

STRIKE STATISTICS.

OTTAWA, Aug. 19. The time loss caused by industrial disputes in July was less in the previous month or in July of last year, according to this week's Labor Gazette. Fourteen disputes began or were in progress during the month affecting 9,224 employees and causing a loss of 229,204 working days. The previous month there were 23 disputes, affecting 13,872 employees and 244,673 working days were lost.

COST OF LIVING.

OTTAWA, Aug. 19. The average cost a weekly budget for a family of five using twenty-nine staple foods, was \$9.91, at the beginning of July, according to the current issue of the Labor Gazette. At the beginning of June it was \$9.86 and \$10.17 for July of last year. Slight advances occurred in the prices of flour, potatoes, butter, eggs, and fresh pork. Prices of sugar, mutton, bacon, cheese, and beans were lower. Fuel and rent showed little change.

ZANNI'S PLANE DAMAGED.

HANOI, French Indo China, Aug. 19. Major Zanni, the Argentine round the world flier, met with an accident while taking off for Canton to-day, when his machine overturned. The flier escaped, but his plane was put out of commission.

U.S. FLIERS' PLANES' DEMOLISHED.

ED. REYKJAVIK, Iceland, Aug. 19. The American Army world fliers will be unable to leave Iceland for Greenland for at least three days more, owing to damage suffered by both planes in an attempted start.

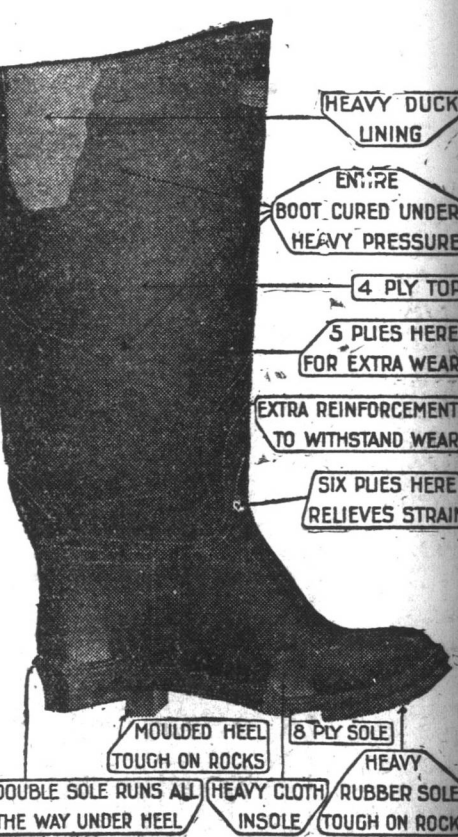



TO-NIGHT'S 5 MILE RUN.

Thrilling Race Anticipated. The 5 mile race for a splendid cup, donated by Lt.-Col. Nangle, besides a gold medal of most excellent design for second place, will be contested for on St. Bon's College Campus this evening, at 7.30. Whales and Shore Fishery

Dear Sir—Please give me space in your valuable paper in reply to "Observer" Bonavista of the 18th inst. re fisheries problem. The deminishment from year to year, he thinks is a mystery hard to solve. Now, sir, to my mind it is one of the easiest things imaginable to one with experience, and mark you it is only a fisherman with experience will see it. I will give my opinion and experience from 1885 until the first time the fishery was installed on the east coast of Newfoundland. That was the first step to the ruination of the shore fisheries. I spent twenty-eight years of my life on a light-house on the east coast, about a quarter of a mile from the nearest land. In my young days it was no hard thing to get up at dawn, to see what the fisherman term the caplin scull and see thousands of tons of caplin and lots of cod fish with them close to the shore in from one to three fathoms of water. Then traps, trawls and nets would be full, and everyone in the highest excitement, and as the day came on the whales would be seen in hundreds—I might say in thousands—some close to the shore, and hundreds in the offing driving the codfish and caplin close to shore. They would remain like this during the caplin scull. If you went on what the fisherman term the outside ground, say in twenty-five or thirty fathom of water, you would not get any fish until after the caplin was over. Now for the past twenty or twenty-five years it has been a rare thing to see a whale in the caplin scull. The consequence is, the trap fishery is almost a thing of the past. There is a small portion of caplin come to land, but to get cod, one has to go out in twenty-five or thirty fathoms of water. The head lands are different. Take St. John's for instance, and other head lands, where the cod is passing, some years it is good trapping, but I am speaking of the bays chiefly. Even St. John's is not what it used to be. Now Observer admits old shore fishery is fast becoming obsolete. Mr. James J. Hagen

A VETERAN TELEGRAPHER VISITS HIS NATIVE CITY.
(H. F. SHORTIS)

By the last trip of the Sable I, there arrived in St. John's, Mr. James J. Hagen, one of the few remaining operators of the old New York, Newfoundland and London Telegraph Company, the pioneer company in this country. Mr. Hagen joined up in 1869, when the telegraph office was in the old Court House, which was destroyed during the great fire of 1872. After mastering his profession he was for a short time stationed at Black River, relieving Mr. Blackadar, and in 1873, he was ordered on to St. Pierre, where he did duty for about forty-nine years. He was retired about two years ago, and proceeded to Cambridge, Mass., where his daughters reside. Two of his sons hold leading positions in connection with the Telegraph Company of the United States, and Canada. Mr. Hagen is the son of the late Capt. Hagen, one of the best known master mariners of his day, and was for a number of years master of the S. S. Ariel, running on the West and North Coast alternately with mails and passengers. Capt. Hagen was master of the brig "Triumph," owned by the famous sealer, Capt. Pierce Feehan, and was instrumental in saving the lives of all on board the American barque "Slam," in mid ocean, in the sixties of the past century, for three days, during a terrific storm. Capt. Hagen and his crew remained near the doomed ship, and at last, with heroic bravery and able seamanship, succeeded in rescuing the shipwrecked mariners of the Slam. The heroism of the Newfoundland captain and crew was highly thought of, and the newspapers of the United States and elsewhere gave a glowing and extended account of the bravery displayed by our countrymen upon that occasion. In recognition of his services, Captain Hagen was presented with a pair of beautiful silver mounted binoculars, and the chief officers and crew were also recognized for their services. The binoculars are still in the possession of the veteran telegrapher in his home in Cambridge, Mass. It is needless to say that after forty-eight years residence in St. Pierre, Mr. Hagen speaks the French language as fluently as he does his mother tongue. He returned by the Sable I on Tuesday, and it is not improbable that he may yet spend the evening of his days in St. John's, where he was born, bred and spent his early days. I may mention that of all the operators stationed at St. Pierre, when Mr. Hagen went there in 1873, not one now remains. He has enjoyed his very brief visit to his native city, and it is not probable that he will ever return to St. John's, and, as for past events, he is indeed a walking encyclopedia. We trust it will not be long before Mr. Hagen will once more return to his native city—and remain amongst us.

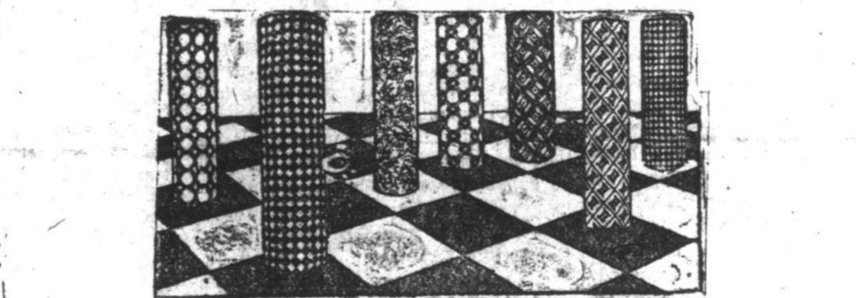

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Legislative Council

OFFICIAL SYNOPSIS.

TUESDAY, Aug. 19.
House met at 10 a.m. pursuant to adjournment.
On motion of Hon. Mr. Morine and by unanimous consent, Bill to amend Revenue Act of 1905 and amendments thereto, was put through all stages and passed without amendment.
Bill respecting the United Towns Electric Company Limited, was read a first time, by consent, a second time.

Hon. Mr. Morine explained the object of the Bill was to allow this Company to extend in various parts of Placentia District and St. John's East. It did not give any exclusive rights, but allowed the usual privilege of free entry of material for original construction.
Hon. Mr. Ellis recalled that last year on a similar Bill, the matter of the charge for electricity was brought up. Everyone knows we are charged far in excess of what is paid elsewhere. We are granting privileges session after session, and apparently no effort is made to reduce the price of electricity.

Patrick McGrath said when this Company was first projected the idea was they would come in to St. John's and supply power in competition with the Reid Company, then in existence. Now they have made an arrangement whereby they supply the City Company with a certain amount of power, there is to be no competition and citizens are still paying tremendous rates, at least twice as much as in Halifax and Sydney, and three times as much as Montreal and Toronto. He believed water power rights on the Southern Shore had been given, but we did not seem to be deriving any advantage.

Hon. Mr. Morine said that in any case the Company had not made matters any worse, but had conferred a great blessing on the people in many of the Outports. It was his opinion that a Public Utilities Tribunal should be appointed to deal with such matters as this. The whole question of the rates to be charged in St. John's should have been provided for when the Bill went through. This Bill did not have any bearing on that position, but it is a matter that will have to be dealt with in the near future.

Hon. Mr. Ellis said he thought the Public Utilities Tribunal idea a good one. Some years ago the City Council had made an endeavour to acquire some water powers within and area of 60 miles of the city. It was their intention to try and reduce the cost of electricity but their application was turned down as some one had made a previous application, although the Council had expended some five or six hundred dollars in surveying the ground.
The Committee reported the Bill without Amendment, and by consent it was read a third time and passed.

Hon. Mr. Morine moved the first reading of the Loan Bill and by consent the second reading. He stated that it was proposed to spend an amount not exceeding \$4,000,000 on repairs to the Dry Dock, the improvement of the Railway, etc. He had heard the criticisms in the main of two items only, first the construction of a plant for fuel and coal in St. John's. It seemed fairly general, he said, among people who ought to know that the coal plant for the bunkering of steamers would not be necessary. It appeared attractive at first but if on examination it would not be essential it would not be embarked upon and care would be taken to get expert advice on the matter. The money could be directed towards the other purposes stated in the Bill. Then the rails between Brigus Junction and Clarendville have been getting worse and worse and it is proposed to lay new rails. The sum stated for repairs was said to be too low. If that proved to be the case Mr. Morine thought that if the money were not needed for the coal plant it could be spent in re-railing a longer distance. Mr. Morgan had stated that the whole line needed to be re-railed. The condition of the railroad was a very important factor in the success or otherwise of an undertaking such as the Humber. The rails very often have to bear loads which are too heavy for them. The rolling stock also is insufficient. Quantities of wood cut some months ago, he continued, had not yet reached the mills. The only matter he had heard much discussion about is the most important in connection with tourist traffic. He said he was an enthusiast on this matter and that anyone who had doubt about it

was behind the times. There was, he added, need of a highway on the West Coast between Port aux Basques and Bay of Islands. The numerous fishing rivers this connected and the agricultural district opened up would be a beautiful country for tourists. Then again he thought all around St. John's there were many attractions of scenery and fishing inducements so different from those offered elsewhere, which had only to be thrown open to invite a crowd. He explained what had happened in Canada and the United States during recent years. At one time the rich man and those of leisure only, could afford to travel across the border and visit the new and strange places. Today because so many possess "silver" the middle and labouring classes are doing the same thing. The rich man who wants a degree of seclusion is being driven away and is seeking new fields. If Newfoundland could be made attractive and proper steamers and railroads provided those seeking new sights would visit it. This proved the case in Nova Scotia. In Yarmouth and through the Valley of Evangeline, a large amount of money was spent on the roads with the result that they are now much frequented by tourists. He felt satisfied that if the plans to attract the tourist in this way were carried out we should soon not be able to entertain all who would come. Nova Scotia with all its beauty has nothing like Newfoundland to offer the tourist, and if we have a good steamer across the Gulf and can provide a motor road of 150 miles on the West Coast, we shall have that steamer's decks loaded with motor cars of people who want to see our scenery and visit our fishing rivers and pools. And many of these visitors will invest their money here as they have done in Nova Scotia, and leave vast sums in one way and another with our people. With regard to the road building Mr. Morine stated that it was the intention to have the whole scheme in control of a commission and department with probably the Government Engineer in control. The advice of the Motor Association would be asked and an endeavour made to make the movement a popular one. There was no idea of having the work divided up into districts and the money dribbled away. Nor was the money only to be spent in building new roads. The object was, he continued, to connect up old roads and repair them, so that motorists could go over the whole length of the country. A number of people, he said, talked of the motor roads as if they were to be constructed for pleasure only while in reality they were to develop the country and afford to people the opportunity of getting in touch with one another, and of raising them above the level of local affairs. He remembered a time, he said, when the farmer was the bitter enemy of the motor, because of the inconvenience of drawing in their horses when one passed. Today, he added, the motorists in Canada are the farmers. Their whole method of living has been changed. The farmer's wife is happy. She is no longer isolated but can, by means of good roads, keep in touch with the outer world. This same state could be reached here in a fishing country. He mentioned the case of a son of a fisherman who had a "river" in which he and his wife had made a tour through Trinity Bay. Not only did he enjoy the scenery but was surprised to see the various industries carried on in that part of the country. In all places motor roads respond to the call of progress. Fine fishing ponds, he said, were to be found near Fortunate Cove and a few thousands would make a beautiful open road to the ponds. If we are to have a big hotel in St. John's and keep people here a few days we must have something to attract them. The hotels and sporting places must be linked together. With the co-operation of the Motor Association and the Rotary Club a Tourist Association could be formed and the attractions of our country widely advertised. A large office might be opened on Water Street and an agent appointed to visit steamers, etc. He also stated that if there were an agent in the United States, competent to meet the motored men and explain what we had to offer, we could sell our country in another sense, to the tourist. Mr. Morine thought that this was the first piece of constructive policy attempted for many years and would largely benefit the fishermen. They would get work on the roads, the traffic would increase, there would be greater importation, for the way to import luxuries is to import the persons who demand them. Increased importation means decreased taxation. Fishermen may not wish to remain such all their lives, he added, and if we could give them something more profitable and improve the place where they live, it would benefit him. A large sum of money had been spent in the past to build roads in the wilderness to no end, but spent in the proposed way it could not fail to be for the advancement of the Colony. The work, while not given as such for the unemployed, will afford employment to many but will be done under tender or contract under the Government Engineer, and men must render good service or be discharged. These were the principles and he hoped that they would elicit public sympathy and enthusiastic support.

Mr. P. T. McGrath stated that he

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considered the amount of money appropriated to re-railing inadequate. The cost of the 16 tons of rails would absorb the whole amount as the cost of steel rails in England was about \$40.00 per ton. If for a reasonable figure the rails could be obtained in Sydney, he thought it would be commensurable. Freight, he added, may go to \$10.00 per ton, depending on whether the steamer got a return cargo. If 80 lb rails be used instead of the 50 lb. used at present, the sleepers would have to be put nearer together he said, and if the road bed were to be improved an additional amount of money would have to be expended. In reference to the Gulf steamer Sir Patrick asked whether it were worth while to carry on this means of communication during the winter season? In his opinion it had not proved a success. He suggested doing away with the idea of an ice-breaking steamer and for the four months of the year when ice conditions made the Gulf difficult to cross the steamer could ply between St. John's and Halifax, a route, which, he considered, would be a much more satisfactory one. For this purpose he thought a second-hand steamer could be procured in England for half the amount proposed to be spent on an ice-breaker. He thought that with regard to the bank scheme the criticisms had much to commend them but he considered if the Government did not intend to carry out the scheme it would be debatable whether the amount of money should be voted at all, for if it were, there would probably be an irresistible temptation to spend it. Four years ago provisions had been made in the Act for the construction of a new Long Bridge and Freight Sheds but nothing had been done and the money was spent in some other direction. As far as the Government's tourist policy was concerned there was a diversity of opinion. Every one realized the great possibilities which the country affords and we can only hope that it brings the good results looked forward to. The Farmers' Government in Ontario embarked on a road building policy and no doubt it has been tremendously successful in bringing people into the country but some people have doubted whether the return is sufficient to warrant the cost.

Hon. Mr. Morine stated it was the intention of the Government to offer a portion of the Loan locally, so that any person who might wish to take it up might do so. It was intended also to float it by tender and contract and take the very strictest care in considering and awarding the contract. The Bill was reported without amendment and by consent was read a third time and passed.
Hon. Mr. Morine in moving the adjournment said he wished to make some comments upon remarks made by Mr. Warren, M.E.A., for Fortune Bay, in the Assembly yesterday, relative to his speech on the second reading of the Alcoholic Liquor Bill. He started by saying that it had been quite unnecessary for me to refer to alleged misconduct on the part of previous governments as a reason for supporting the Alcoholic Liquor Bill. I consider, sir, that the fact that previous governments had not enforced the Prohibition Act was one of the strongest reasons for its repeal; those governments had either tried to enforce the Act and failed, or had been remiss in their duties for a number of years. After a law has been

upon the Statute Book for ten years, without strong enforcement at any time, and at last becomes a mockery, a reason is presented for the repeal of the Bill and the enactment of some other law. It seems to me that the conduct of the Squires Government particularly was a powerful reason for the repeal of the Prohibition Act. In the second place, Mr. Warren defended the conduct of the government of which he was Premier, in 1923, in placing a duty of seventy-five cents per gallon upon liquor brought into this country for trans-shipment. He said that the trans-shipment itself had been lawful, and that the imposition of a duty was simply a method of increasing the revenue without increasing the traffic. That was not half the truth. At first enacted the Prohibition Act did not permit the importation of alcoholic liquors for trans-shipment, but in 1917, under the coalition government of Sir Edward Morris, Sir William Coaker and his colleagues proceeded to the enactment of an amendment providing that goods brought into this country for trans-shipment should not be held to be "importations." That was to enable trans-shipment to such places as St. Pierre, and to facilitate St. Pierre's illicit trade with the United States. Then for a number of years St. Pierre was making profits on a business in this Colony as a part of the port, but in 1923, envious, apparently of the prosperity of St. Pierre, and desiring part of that illegitimate trade, Mr. Warren's Government imposed a tax of seventy-five cents per gallon upon liquor. Mr. Warren's defence for doing this is the duty of seventy-five cents per gallon simply gave this Colony a part of the profit that would otherwise go to St. Pierre, and did not increase the consumption of liquor. He forgot also to say at the same time his government secured the enactment of a measure making it possible for the rum traffic to be done from this port as a base instead of from St. Pierre. In other words, he facilitated the operations in any particular case, it should have been considered in connection with mitigation of their sentences. The majesty of the law ought to have been upheld. But Mr. Warren conveniently forgot to make any reference to another fact in this connection, his removal of Magistrate Miffen from Greenspond to Twillingate, at the demand of his colleagues, the members for Bonaville Bay, the now Sir William Coaker and others. Mr. Miffen had done his duty. He was a valued and valuable Magistrate. He had aroused the apathy of lawbreakers by his courage. Finally, Mr. Warren referred to the appointment of Mr. Meaney as Controller, just before the general election of 1923, and said that it was no more secret than my appointment to the Government of this Colony and to this House. Now, the offence of secrecy about Mr. Meaney's appointment is this, that after Mr. Warren and his colleagues had made a minute appointing him, they resolved that the minute should be suppressed in order that the people should know nothing about it. There was no secrecy about my appointment to this House or to the Government. Who will be appointed to Governments or to the Legislative Council is not usually announced beforehand.
The Council took recess at 11.30 a.m. until 3 p.m. when it resumed and his Excellency the Governor having arrived commanded the presence of the Members of the Honourable House of Assembly, who attended at the Bar of the House. His Excellency was pleased to assent to the Bills passed and delivered a speech of

The Tang O' the North

NEWFOUNDLAND A TOURIST RESORT.

In the sweltering days of July and August when the mercury is flirting around the nineties, the call of the North is very insistent to those who have to spend three-fourths or more of their lives in the city.

Some there are who dread a sea voyage, but to the majority of New Englanders at least, the ocean trip is a most appealing one.

To prove this one has only to go to any of the docks on Atlantic Avenue from which passenger steamers sail and note the vast crowds of excursionists bound for Nantasket, Revere and other nearby beach resorts.

Many, however, prefer a longer voyage, and through the columns of the "Weekly" we propose to tell them of an ideal ocean trip—one which has peculiar attractions of its own and one which is becoming more and more popular.

We refer to the trip to St. John's, Newfoundland, via Halifax. For many years a weekly passenger line (the Red Cross) has been running from New York to St. John's via Halifax, and the increasing number of passengers shows how popular this delightful trip has become. As a result, the Boston shipping firms are getting wise to the possibilities of establishing a first class passenger service between Boston and St. John's, and this season a real effort has been made to accommodate the holiday travellers.

Already one steamer (the Sable I.) has been making regular fortnightly trips which have been greatly enjoyed by those who have participated in them, and there is a possibility of other lines getting busy. So that before long we may hope to see a regular weekly service established with modern ocean-going steamers.

One advantage of this health-giving trip is that the traveller has an opportunity of a break in the journey at Halifax, Nova Scotia, where there is a stop-over of ten or twelve hours, according to the amount of freight to be discharged and loaded.

In a future article we may have something to say about Halifax and its many attractions; to-day we must confine our remarks to the Newfoundland end of the voyage.

Soon after leaving Halifax on the last stage of the journey the traveller experiences the cool, invigorating air with the 'tang of the north' and as the good ship steams on the exhilarating effect on the passengers is very noticeable.

Five hundred miles is not a great distance for a thirteen knot steamer to cover, and when the early mists come on deck on the second morning out, they are confronted with the beautiful cliffs guarding the entrance to the harbor or St. John's. This entrance is known as the "Narrows," a channel about 700 feet wide, with Signal Hill on the northern side and Fort Amherst on the southern.

When the warm rays of the summer sun, tempered by the cool ocean draught, are shining on the waking city, and the calm blue waters of the harbor are reflecting in their mystic depths the overhanging cliffs, the scene from the deck of a steamer as she enters this, the finest harbor in the world, is entrancing and unforgettable.—Newfoundland Weekly.

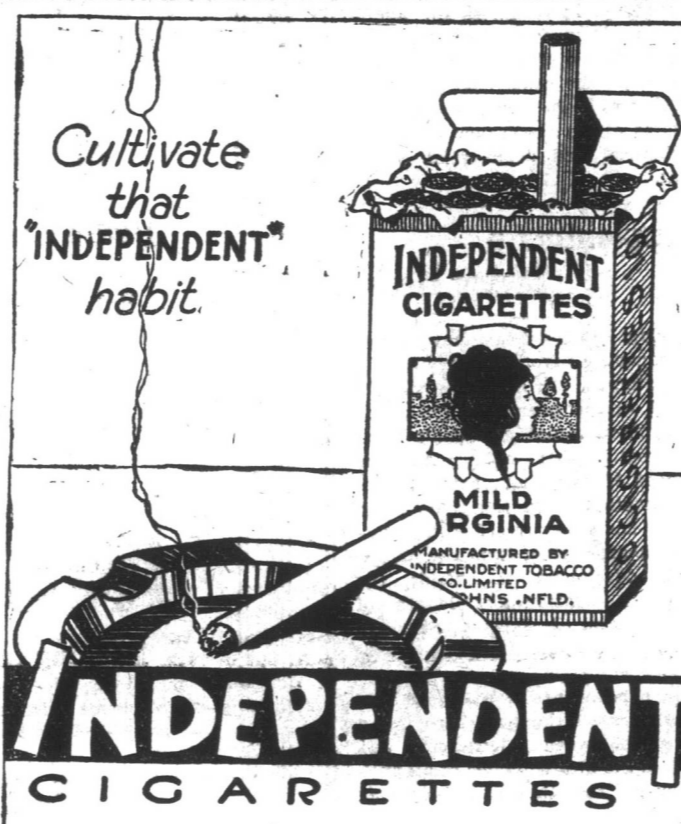

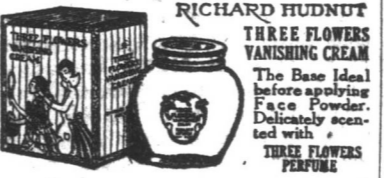
Lloyd's Bashfulness Cause of Riotous Fun

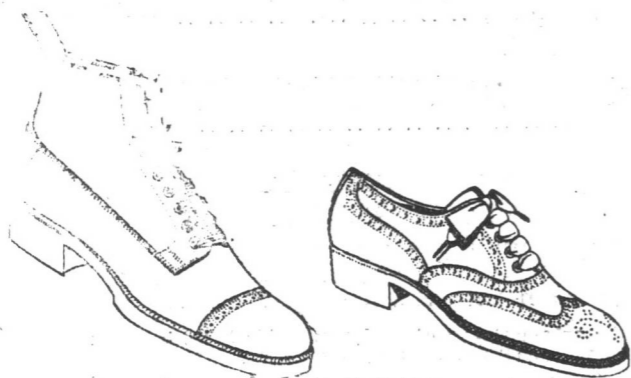

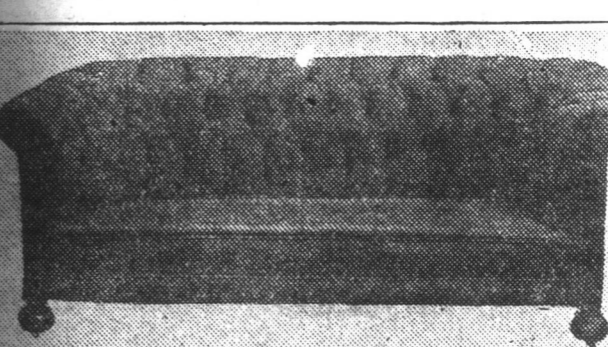
