THE CHILD WHO SKIPS.

Barbara has just skipped a grade. I think it is the "A." And her mother is so proud! Of course she feels that it stamps Barbara as a superior child and the step ahead as a highly to be desired attainment. Most mothers in her place would feel the same, and yet just what is to be gained by having a child skip a grade?

In the first place the skipping is often brought about by some such condition as existed in Barbara's case. The school room was crowded and there were too many children for the teacher to handle comfortably. In the grade ahead there was plenty of room and so the ten brightest children in Barbara's grade were put into the next grade. Sometimes a child has been taught at home by an interested and ambitious mother and so is in advance of the others.

Often Something Is Missed. But why, in any case, is the average parent so proud of having his child "ahead of his grade?" What is there to be gained in having John or Mary know decimals at the age of ten instead of 12, or to have had a year of Latin at the age of 14 instead of having just started it? These things will come along in due course of time and what about the part of the school course that they lose in skipping? Either a child loses it altogether or has to make it up by tutoring outside of school and neither alternative is desirable.

There is another consideration to be taken into account when a child is very far ahead of others of his age, and that is companionship. I know an extremely bright lad who graduated from high school just after his fifteenth birthday. He was small for his age and his youth was really a drawback in his senior year of which he complained bitterly to his mother.

Really Out of His Class. The fellows consider me just a kid," he said. "I'm too small to play on any of the athletic teams, and when it comes to dances, all the girls want to dance with the big fellows."

In a chapter of her delightful essays on children, Alice Meynell has an interesting chapter on "the hurrying of children" in which she tells of John Evelyn's "hopeful child" who died at the age of five after having gotten by heart almost the entire vocabulary of French and Latin primitives and having developed a strong passion for Greek.

Nature's Unhasting Processes. In commenting on his father's pride in the boy she says: "All being favorable, the child of Evelyn's studious home would have done all these things in a few years in the course of nature. It was the fact that he did them out of the course of nature that was to Evelyn no excuse. The course of nature had not any beauty in his eyes. It might be borne with for the sake of

the end but it was not admired for the majesty of its unhasting process."

In another part of the book Miss Meynell employs a felicitous phrase in speaking of the fashion of hurrying childhood saying that "it abolishes little girls."

That's what the pushing and skipping process does when it is carried to extremes—abolishes childhood. Is the doubtful and fleeting prestige of being ahead of other children worth the price?

Communists Will Declare a Strike When Hindenberg Enters the Capital

Flotilla Sails to Clean Up Rum Row-- Serbian Prince Involved in Communist Outrages--United States Start Vigorous Offensive Against Rum Row.

COMMUNISTS CALL STRIKE.
BERLIN, May 6. The delegates to the Communist Workers' Council to-day endorsed the proposal of the Communist Party for a 24-hour strike on Monday, the day Hindenberg is expected to enter Berlin. The delegates agreed to try to persuade the workers to join the strike.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE IN KOREA.
TOKIO, May 5. According to advices received from Seoul, a devastating forest fire started near Kaakio, Hokudo Province, to-day, sweeping through numerous villages and leaving thousands of persons homeless.

OFFENSIVE AGAINST RUM RUNNERS.
NEW YORK, May 5. Twenty-one boats of the United States coastguard steamed out of Gibraltar Bay, Staten Island base, this morning, bound for rum row, to open an offensive which will seek to sweep the liquor armada off the Atlantic seaboard by June. They included some of the dry navy's speediest cutters, and behind them were similar vessels, converted submarine chasers with patrol boats, all liberally sprinkled with guns and most of them capable of high speed. Secrecy marked the departure. It was not known what steps were to be taken in the event of extermination, but it was understood that one of the plans would be to post one or more boats of the coastguard fleet towards every ship in rum row every hour, thus making it impossible for the shore boats to take on cargoes or bring out provisions and water.

DRUG HABIT SPREADING.
TORONTO, May 5. Addressing the annual conference of the Ontario Medical Health Officers' Association to-day, Dr. J. A. Mayot, Minister of the Federal Dept. of Health, said the drug habit is spreading alarmingly in Canada. "I haven't any definite figures," he said, speaking on statistics, but we know there are new addicts developing all the time. We think there are about 10,000 addicts in Canada.

IN FINANCIAL TROUBLES.
LONDON, May 5. A receiver was appointed to-day to the Guild Steamships and Industrial, Ltd., shipbuilders, ship owners and iron workers, with a capital of £2,000,000 sterling.

APPEAL ALLOWED.
OTTAWA, May 5. The Supreme Court to-day gave unanimous judgment allowing the appeal of Cecil Smith, of Windsor, Ontario, against the judgment of the Exchequer Court, which ruled that his profits from bootlegging were subject to income tax.

WANT SHAD SEASON ADVANCED.
ST. JOHN, N.B., May 5. Acting on behalf of local fishermen, J. Fred Bolyea, West St. John, telegraphed to-day to Hon. P. J. Cardin, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, requesting that the season for shad be open on May 9, and not on May 18, as it stands at present. The reason is that shad are now making their appearance in the harbor and fishermen are desirous of losing no time in their catches.

KEEPING IT DARK.
MONTREAL, May 5. The Gazette to-day says "Montreal's red light district is to be wiped out. Pierre Belanger, Chief of Police, had received orders to close and keep closed the vice area. Publicity attending the smashing of the district is one thing official Montreal wishes to avoid. The executive committee and Chief of Police himself even, flatly deny that special instructions to seal up disorderly houses have been issued, but positive information as to the true state of affairs was available last night from an unimpeachable source."

PRINCE INVOLVED IN COMMUNIST OUTRAGE.
BELGRADE, May 5. The discovery that Communists were taking advantage of the condition of Prince George, brother of King Alexander, to use him as a tool in their campaign against the King and the Jugo Slavian Government, now it declared to have led to his internment the decree for which was signed late last week.

SLAYER STILL AT LARGE.
OTTAWA, May 5. Charles Umett, alleged slayer of Charles Edward Underwood, during a fight in a local rooming house last Thursday night, was still being hunted by the police in Gatineau Hills this morning. He is believed to be hiding far up the Gatineau Valley. Quebec Provincial Police are now assisting the Ottawa and Hull Police in the search, and hundreds of private citizens who know every county in old Quebec are also lending aid.

CHILDREN BURN THEIR SCHOOL.
AYLMER, May 5. Edmond Lambert and William Lebel, two youths attending Aylmer Academy, were, this afternoon, arrested and lodged in jail on charges of arson, arising out of the fire which destroyed the Academy last night causing \$30,000 damage. The boys are alleged to have confessed they burned the school because they were tired of school life and thought if the school was burned they would not have to attend.

WILL USE RADIO.
WASHINGTON, May 5. Two different radio sets, designed to cover all possible contingencies, will be used by the seaplanes of the MacMillan Arctic Expedition this summer.

CONFESSION DENIED.
CAIRO, May 5. Official denial was made to-day of the reports that Dr. Chafik Hansour, member of the Chamber of Deputies, had confessed he had received money in connection with the assassination last November of Sir Oliver Lloyd, Sirdar of the British Command of Egyptian troops.

THE LEAGUE'S COSTLY HEADQUARTERS.
GENEVA, May 5. The Geneva Supervisory Commission which directs the League of Nations' finances voted to-day to proceed with the construction of a new League Assembly all at a cost of \$2,000,000 gold francs instead of 4,000,000 francs allotted by the last Assembly.

THE GASOLINE TAX.
OTTAWA, May 5. A gasoline tax was collected in five Canadian Provinces during the year, in British Columbia, at the rate of three cents a gallon, in Quebec, Prince Edward Island and Alberta at two cents per gallon, and in Manitoba one cent, per gallon. New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Saskatchewan are without gasoline tax. Ontario has imposed a two-cent tax per gallon in 1925.

PASSED WITHOUT DIVISION.
LONDON, May 5. The bill providing for the return to gold standard by Britain passed the third reading in the House of Commons to-day without division.

SEVERE EARTHQUAKE RECORDED.
OTTAWA, May 5. A severe earthquake was registered at the Dominion Observatory this morning. The first preliminary tremors were recorded 5.26 a.m. eastern standard time and the distance from the epicentre was 3860 kilometers or 2,500 miles. The time of origin of disturbance was 5.14 a.m., and the record lasted for over four hours.

BODY OF MISSING PHYSICIAN FOUND.
OTTAWA, May 5. The body of a man found floating in the Ottawa River opposite Gatineau Point, late yesterday, has been identified as that of Dr. F. H. Powell, a prominent physician, who had been missing since January 6th last, when he was seen boarding a train in Toronto bound for Ottawa. Dr. Powell saw service in the Northwest Rebellion.

Can You Make Meringues?

Meringues are not difficult to make, but they require care in the baking. The cases can be kept for some time in a tin with a well-fitting lid. Ingredients—5 whites of eggs, 6oz. of caster sugar.

Method—First prepare a board on which to cook the meringues by oiling it with salad oil. Do not put on too much oil or it will give an unpleasant flavor to the meringues. If a new board be used, bake it in a cool oven for two hours before using it.

Beat the whites of the eggs very stiffly until they are perfectly solid, then stir the sugar gently to them. Dip a dessertspoon into a basin of cold water and take up a spoonful of the meringue in it. Smooth it over with a knife dipped in the cold water, shaping it with the knife. Dip another dessertspoon in the water and scoop out the meringue from the first spoon and place it on the prepared board. Continue this until the egg mixture is used up, wetting the spoon and knife again for each meringue. Sift caster sugar over each and place them in a cool oven. As soon as the meringues begin to colour slightly leave the oven door open a little and continue to dry the meringues for two hours, then lift them very carefully from the board and scoop out some of the sugar from the inside. Scrape the board quite clean, and place the meringue upside down on it and leave them in the oven for another hour to crisp. Put them on a sieve to cool and cool and then store them in a tin. The oven must be just hot enough when the meringues are put in to set

them or they will spread and lose their shape, but it does not matter how slowly they are finished.

To Use—Fill the meringues with whipped cream sweetened and flavoured to taste with vanilla, coffee, or chocolate, put two together, and serve.

Wembley the Most Wonderful

To-day, the fifteenth anniversary of the accession of His Majesty the King, has been fittingly chosen as the opening date for Wembley, and the presence of the King in person among his subjects from all over the Empire to officiate at the opening ceremony is but another happy instance of the close intimacy which exists between the Sovereign and his people.

This remarkable Exhibition was planned and carried out in 1924 in a manner which reflected the greatest credit upon those responsible for it, but the short time allowed to make preparations, and the fact that it was impossible to avoid in a few cases the omission of certain interesting features. With the experience gained, the promoters and the various working committees have been able to elaborate on their plans, and Wembley the Wonderful of 1924 will be surpassed in details and in its general splendour by the marvelous exhibition of 1925.

First among the exhibitors to agree to the idea of re-opening Wembley this summer, the Newfoundland Committees both here and overseas promptly set to work to make the Newfoundland Pavilion foremost as well in adding to last year's attractions. For example, fish and furs, which could not for unavailing reasons figure as prominently as desired in the exhibit, will present two of the most striking and artistic features this year. Every type of fish in the waters which surround Newfoundland has been mounted in glass cases as if in the act of swimming, models of dried salt fish will be on view, miniature model bankers, drums, casks, butts, boxes and the other paraphernalia of the trade, all made to scale, have been obtained through the generosity of private contributors, and fishing scenes will be displayed by a new process on large illuminated photographs. A relief map will also indicate Newfoundland's trade connections with the seaports of the Atlantic.

Furs of every description both in their natural state and made up into ladies' coats, rugs, etc., will give to visitors a comprehensive idea of the wonderful variety and value of this industry. A well known London firm which deals in Newfoundland and Labrador furs has also agreed to stock a case, and replenish it every three weeks. By no means the least striking among the fur exhibits will be the immense polar bear, which it will be remembered, was secured down north last spring, and this skin has been beautifully mounted and loaned for the occasion.

In order to make the exhibit more conspicuous, minerals found in the country will be shown in bulk, and it is certain that Mr. Davies will not fail to induce those visitors who are interested in such matters to give them their closest attention.

A counter has been provided for the sale of Newfoundland souvenirs such as post cards,

Labradorite, and articles made of seal skin, and samples of cod liver oil will be available for distribution.

The pulp and paper industry will be well represented, and the exhibit of the Humber operations has been considerably improved and enlarged.

The appearance of the Pavilion itself has been greatly improved. A new lighting system has been installed, and nothing has been left undone to make the whole arrangement as artistic and as striking as possible.

The main purpose of such an exhibition is of course to attract attention, and it will be agreed that the success of the Newfoundland Pavilion in this respect was most gratifying. A careful check was kept on the number of visitors in 1924, and those who came and went away with an enlightened idea of the Oldest Colony exceeded two million.

No words of appreciation of the work of the Committees both here and in London can adequately express the great obligation which the whole country is under to these gentlemen. Starting at a late hour last year with but a small amount of money at their disposal, they were ready for the opening, and when accounts were made up after the exhibition was over, they had five thousand dollars still in hand. Filled with the same loyal enthusiasm, they have worked mightily this year, and with an additional fifteen thousand dollars granted by the Government, they have carried out a programme which promises to show Newfoundland to the very best advantage among her Sister Dominions. To-day Newfoundlanders in London will be accommodated with tickets for the opening ceremony, and if they walk with their heads a little higher in the air as they view their homeland in miniature, and point her out to strangers with ill-concealed pride, all honour to them, and may many others of us do likewise before the final curtain drops on the most wonderful and most spectacular display that the world has ever witnessed.

Radiology

The Chicago Daily News announced on April 22nd that its Radio station WMAQ had been heard nine thousand miles away in Australia. The report says that hundreds of people had good reception of the station. The time taken for Radio Waves to travel this distance is one twentieth of a second.

And now we have not only the movements of the performer on the motion picture screen, but also the voice. A specially prepared phone film made at the White House recently, and shown to an assembly of newspaper men in New York, broadcasted the voice of President Coolidge from the motion picture screen. This invention, which is an offspring of Radio, will eventually revolutionize the moving picture industry.

The serious drawback to Radio reception is the storage battery. There is always the risk of spilling the electrolyte, or the cell may become leaky, besides the inconvenience of getting it recharged. Dry cell tubes do not give the volume that storage battery tubes give, and up to now the only alternative has been to use the 201A. Experiments are being made endeavoring to use the lighting mains for filament heating, but getting rid of the hum is the trouble. However, in course of time this will be effected, then away goes the clumsy storage battery, and the expensive B batteries as well.

With the Summer season approaching, atmospheric roaring, and the "great outdoors" calling, interest in Radio will naturally lag for the next few months. This will be my last effort for a while, to pass on to others by way of the Telegram what has been my pleasure to glean from the study and reading of Radio problems and news. It is of course my wish to continue to have our local broadcast, of which, as the Czarka man says, "we feel very proud."

When Autumn comes, let us hope we will have tubes which operate from the lighting mains, B. battery eliminators, static eliminators, and so on. But, my earnest prayer is, that owners of regenerative receivers will have learnt how to operate their outfits so as not to cause annoyance to other listeners.

PRINCESS ROYAL'S CONDITION SERIOUS. LONDON, May 6.

A medical bulletin issued by her doctors this morning says the condition of the Princess Royal, Louise, sister of King George, gave rise to rather more anxiety during the latter part of yesterday.

HINDENBURG'S ELECTION RATIFIED. BERLIN, May 6.

The election of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg as President of the German Republic was officially ratified yesterday by the Federation Election Commission, which is composed of six representatives of the major Reichstag parties and Prof. Dr. Wagemann, Commissioner for the elections.

AMUNDSEN'S POLAR FLIGHT TO START TO-DAY. CALO, May 6.

The dash for the North Pole of the Amundsen airplanes may possibly start this afternoon at 4 o'clock from Danes Island, on the northwestern coast of Spitzbergen. Four o'clock is considered the better part of the day to commence the flight owing to the meteorological conditions prevailing at that hour.

THREE KILLED BY EXPLOSION. PITTSBURG, May 6.

Three persons are believed to have been killed and seven more are missing following a terrific explosion in a fruit store at Swissville suburb shortly after midnight this morning. Two bodies are reported to have been taken out of the ruins which were in flames.

COMMUNISTS OUTRAGE IN POLAND. WARSAW, May 6.

Terrorist activity alleged to be organized and directed by Communists is being renewed in Poland. From Bialowieska Puszcza, a former Russian Crown Forest comes a story of Murder and pillage by a band of armed men who left "receipts" in pillaged houses, signed "The White Russian Communist Party." The gang killed a policeman, the head forester and the forest keeper, and wounded four other persons. Only the vigilance of the railway workers and the ministry have averted serious railway accidents.

ANTI-BALFOUR RIOTS. LONDON, May 6.

An official statement regarding the recent anti-Balfour riots in Damascus was made yesterday in Parliament by Col. Amery, Colonial Secretary: "The demonstrations against Lord Balfour were expected beforehand," the Colonial Secretary declared, "but they were not in Damascus, the French Government took the necessary precautions to prevent outbreaks in Beirut, but the riots in Damascus were a complete surprise both to the French Administration in Syria and to the British Administration in Palestine."

SERIOUS CONFLICTS EXPELLED IN N. AFRICA. MELILLA, Spanish Morocco, May 6.

The fighting between Rifians and French is reported to be increasing in severity, but the present engagements are believed to be but a prelude to greater conflicts, which will develop as Abdel-Krim throws more men across the neutral zone separating the Spanish and French Protectorates. The French are said to have been successful in the fighting thus far. Being aided by Native contingents in the French area, and advices received here say the Rifians have been driven back into their own country in some places. The French airmen have done effective work in bombarding the tribesmen from entrenched positions and inflicting severe punishment by means of machine gun fire from low altitudes.

RIFFIAN OFFENSIVE EXPECTED. MOROCCO, May 6.

The latest information received here from the troubled areas is that 20,000 RIFFIAN tribesmen have been assembled for an attack on the French zone of the Moroccan Protectorate.

BESCO COLLIERIES PICKETED. GLACE BAY, May 6.

Picketing of the collieries of the British Empire Steel Corporation was commenced to-night by representatives of the United Mine Workers of America, in an endeavour, it was stated, to ascertain the number of bona fide officials engaged in mine main-

HOLLAND CERTAIN TO HOLD OLYMPICS.

Are Already Making Plans To Stage World Games In 1928, Says Big Official.

PARIS, April 30.—Charles Van Rossum, General Secretary of the Dutch Olympic Committee, has informed Baron Pierre de Coubertin, President of the International Olympic Committee, that Holland is certain to organize the 1928 Olympic games. Van Rossum has been in conference with Baron de Coubertin for the past three days.

"Even should the Dutch Government fail to make an appropriation for the games," Van Rossum said, "you may be sure Holland will not request any change in the Olympic schedule. Funds will be found elsewhere."

Thus the possibility of Holland passing up the 1928 games has been temporarily removed from the agenda of the Prague Olympic Congress which opens its sessions May 25.

It developed during the conversations between Van Rossum and Baron de Coubertin that Los Angeles, Cal., had been unofficially sounded as to whether that city would assume the task of staging the 1928 games in the event of Holland's inability to hold them. A negative reply was received from the California city, which expressed a desire to maintain its 1932 date for holding the games.

HOSPITAL DENIES BABE IS VERY ILL.

"Steady Improvement" Is Official Announcement From Physicians In Charge Of Sluggish.

NEW YORK, April 30.—The report from New Haven that a Prof. Atlas of that city and owner of the Turkish baths there had stated that Babe Ruth was through with baseball and would be fortunate to get out of the St. Vincent Hospital of this city alive stirred up the sport fraternity last night. However, an official statement from the hospital to-night stated that the Babe "is showing steady improvement." It adds that Mrs. Ruth, who suffered a recent nervous collapse, is also gaining daily in the same hospital.

Under a New Haven date line, Prof. Atlas is quoted in the day's press, in part, as follows:

"Babe Ruth, if he survives his present illness, will leave the hospital an invalid, and will never play ball again. I have my doubts that the Babe will come out of the hospital alive, let alone return to the line-up of the New York Yankees. The big fellow is in bad shape, although one would never know it from newspaper reports.

"The home run king is suffering from ulcers of the stomach, brought on by overeating. This has ruined his entire digestive system.

"A man of abnormal physique, of sturdy athletic build, exercising in the open air, he should, by taking proper care of himself, be thumping home runs at the age of 50.

"However, he has rotted his stomach with food which was not good for him. Moreover, he has overeaten. This condition has been carrying on for years, and the wonder of it is that he was not bedridden years ago."

DEMPESEY STILL AT OUTFITS WITH BOXING MOGLULS.

NEW YORK.—Jack Dempsey closed the book of his heavyweight championship experience in New York exactly as it was reopened when he arrived in the metropolis with his wife, the former Estelle Taylor, to complete the closing scenes of a moving picture.

After having been informed by Promoter Tex Rickard that it would be impossible to sign him for a title fight until after the Gibbons-Tunney and Wills-Welner bouts here in June, Dempsey made no progress in his peace overtures to the New York State Athletic Commission, which some time ago placed him on the ineligible list for failure to satisfactorily answer the challenge of the negro, Harry Wills.

The champion is scheduled to sail for Europe next week on a belated honeymoon.

Wills is to box Charlie Welner for the Italian Hospital Fund at the Polo Grounds, on June 19. Should Wills fail to dispose of Welner expeditiously (and there are many who give the Newark Adonis a good chance to defeat the Senegambian) the long talked-of Dempsey-Wills match would be an impossibility. And if Gene Tunney and Tom Gibbons, who are to box on June 2, should put up an unimpressive exhibition, they would go into the discard as possibilities.

Two points that have been raised against any further boxing by Dempsey—the possible objections of his wife and the fact that his new nose would be knocked askew—are branded as inconsequential by the champion. Dempsey maintains that his wife would not object to his meeting Wills or any one else. As for the new nose, of which so much has been made, Dempsey claims that it is no more liable to be busted than the old one.

The nose he now sports is not a trick nose at all, says Jack. There

was no injection of paraffin or other substances sometimes used by those who make a business of remodelling faces. The necessary rebuilding material, according to Dempsey, was cut from the back of the ear.

HOPPE-SCHAEFFER TOUR ABANDONED.

Famous Billiard Players Demanded Too Much Money From French Promoters.

The French billiard promoters have rejected the financial demands of Young Jake Schaefer and Willie Hoppe, America's premier billiardists, and as a result all negotiations for the proposed visit of the champion and former champion to Europe this summer have been dropped for the present, according to an announcement made in New York by an official of the Brunswick-Balke-Collender Company. The French offered Schaefer and Hoppe 40,000 francs and the players replied that each wanted \$2,500 and expenses for a month's work in France.

The French, however, have not given up hope, for the cable concludes with the message that "in case we see a possibility to come to some satisfactory agreement, we will not hesitate to re-open negotiations." It was explained that the demands of Schaefer were equivalent to 150,000 francs, to which should be added a reasonable compensation to the French players, in short, an amount which could not be made in large receipts in twenty days in the most favorable conditions and in the best time of the billiard season.

PAAVO NURMI MADE THREE NEW MARKS.

Phantom Finn Races To Records At Mile and Quarter, Mile and Half, and 2,000 Yards.

LOS ANGELES, April 30.—Paavo Nurmi, the phantom Finn, thrilled 35,000 fans at a track meet in the Coliseum here last night by topping from its thirty year old pedestal, T. H. Conner's world record of six minutes 46 2-5 seconds for the one and one-half mile. He ran the distance in 6:42.5.

Besides breaking the mile and one-

half record, Nurmi smashed in the same race the world's records for the 1 1-4 mile and 2,000 yards distances. His time at the 1 1-4 mile mark was 5:35 and at the 2,000 yard mark, 5:3 8-10.

A new world's record for the 2,500 metre walk was established by Willie Plant. The time was 10 minutes, 39 seconds. The former record, 10 min. 47.1 seconds, was made by Ugo Frigerio in Italy.

NAVY TEST RECEIVER REDESIGNED FOR BROADCAST WORK

CONSTRUCTION OF THE LOW-LOSS COILS.

EDITED BY JOHN M. CLAYTON.

A short-wave receiver is as good as our diagram above will show the method. There are any number of good low-loss condensers on the market, and as it is a rather hopeless task trying to construct a condenser we usually buy them. But the coils can be constructed very easily. To be low-loss the coils must have a minimum amount of solid material in and around them. They must be wound with comparatively large wire, and they must not be coated with any dope or any insulating material.

While not being quite as efficient as a plain cylindrical wound single layer coil the Lorenz, or basket weave, coils are very efficient, are self-supporting and are in general use in short-wave receivers.

Drive 11 large nails in a piece of 1-inch board on a circle 3½ inches in diameter. These nails are used to wind the wire on. Start the winding around one nail, skip the next, go around the next, skip the next, and so on. A short inspection of our diagram above will show the method. The number of turns is taken as the number of times a wire passes the starting point, whether each turn is wrapped around the particular peg or not. For the wavelengths between 64 and 118 meters (which includes all the stations now broadcasting below 300 meters) 19 turns of wire should be in the coil. The wire, as mentioned previously, is No. 18 annunciator wire. When the required number of turns have been wound on the form tie the wires together by means of a piece of heavy thread tied around the coil from top to bottom in four places. The string should be tied tightly so that the coil will be solid. For the stikler coil to go with the 19 turn secondary for these waves you will need a similar coil having only 4 turns. Make the leads of the coil about 2 inches long so that these leads may be used as supports for the coil, as was explained yesterday.

In the modification of this outfit for broadcast wavelengths which are in general use to-day (300 to around 600 meters) you should make up two similar coils using No. 22 D. C. C. magnet wire. One coil will require 40 turns of wire and the other 75 turns. Two coils will be needed to cover the 200 to 600 meter band on account of the very small condenser used in shunt to the secondaries. In the modified circuit we eliminate the antenna coupling condenser and substitute a 15-turn coil. The method of coupling and connecting this will be shown to-morrow. This should be wound with No. 22 D. C. C. magnet wire and should be similar to the above-described coils.

In your illustration, seen above, show the method of mounting two brass angles which contain the condenser "C" used as a coupling condenser for the short-wave portion of the receiver.

Our Boston Letter

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir—In every country and every clime where the wandering sons and daughters of dear Old Terra Nova are privileged to domicile, there is always found a cheer, a hurrah, and a warm welcome for the old Evening Telegram of Newfoundland.

Permit me, sir, to assert without flattery, very properly and justly, so it was the watchdog on the lonely tower of boyhood associations of days now past, the acknowledged terror of evil doers and the irresistible power of right against might, in our island home. Ever and anon it bore its messages of goodwill, of condolence and encouragement to the afflicted, the victimized, or overburdened, and without malice or favour fearlessly published its democracy irrespective of commercial intrigue, of sectional influence, or party political purposes, and kept the people alert and informed along the extensive coastline of the seagirt isle. No wonder then wherever or whenever it makes its appearance at a gathering of our countrymen in the great republic of the west that the audience in gleeful enthusiasm and emotion gladly extend the good hand of fellowship and welcome in ecstasy the well remembered Telegram to the home of their adoption. I am sure their early recollections, their sentimental nature and eternal gratitude will never permit them to act otherwise. Such indeed, pressed and implied in the prolonged applause as Mr. Hogan appeared in Telegram in hand to read your Boston letter before the Newfoundland Mutual Benefit Association at St. Rose's Hall on April 7.

The inconsistency of human nature is an evil we must ever and always deeply deplore, and more particularly so when it strikes home or affects the land where we first saw the light. The poet says and, well

"Lives there a man with soul so dead,
Who never to himself hath said
This is my own, my native land."

Of course when we accept the citizenship of the U.S.A. it comes without saying we revoke our allegiance to the land of our birth, and our first and foremost duties must then, and there stand in defence of our constitution and the land of our adoption. In the execution of these principles and in the fulfilment of such mandates I rejoice to say I have never heard of a Newfoundlander playing the traitor's part. How faithfully and well the naturalized citizens of this nation adhered to their declaration has been amply attested during the great World War or at least after America entered the portals of the conflict. The German-Americans be it said to their credit did not hesitate to show their patriotism for their adopted land both by martial force and financial assistance. The Kaiser boasted at the beginning of the war he had nothing to fear from American intervention while five hundred thousand of his trained soldiers backed by twenty millions of Germans and German descent stood on Ameri-

banks of association with their own countrymen, but when the necessity arises they are seldom or never found wanting in their love, their devotion, and their sympathy for the old homeland.

Considering the present condition of industrial affairs I would not encourage or advise emigration from Newfoundland. Let us hope that the boon of prosperity as recently reported from there will cling like ivy tablets with a contented and happy people. But to-day emigration and immigration seems to be the prevailing privilege of the universal world, and I suppose Newfoundlanders in many cases are desirous to keep abreast in the spirit of the times with other peoples. I must, therefore, respectfully suggest and impress upon you the great necessity of advising anyone leaving our shores the importance of registering at the office of the Newfoundland Weekly for the preservation of their identity and their immediate entrance into a Newfoundland society where national friendship, mutual protection, and industrial information can be afforded.

The hustle and bustle of the ray throng on the busy streets and boulevards, the bright-lights and other allurements of theatrical performance are all very well, but yet in some cases they produce a fascination which robs the remembrance, destroys the recollection and severs the ties of nature which bind us to the homeland and does not make us desirous citizens of America either. The Newfoundland Weekly though still in its swaddling clothes is undoubtedly doing a great work in the way of organization amongst our people, and its publishers deserve gratitude and congratulation. Boston Newfoundlanders are proud of their baby and hope at no distant day to see Miss Weekly matured and full grown taking her stand in newspaper row, wielding her influence for Newfoundland as well as for the home and the land of her adoption.

I should think that the pride and the privilege of countrymen in America would be to subscribe to the Weekly, and I may add that our people at home should not be behind the times either because we both want to know what the other fellow is doing. There is a strong tie of friendship, age, even blood relationship between good old Boston, the hub of New England industry, and the chief city of the country we delight and love to call the homeland, dear old Terra Nova.

Proceedings at the Legislative Council

OFFICIAL SYNOPSIS.

TUESDAY, May 5, 1925.

The Council met at 3.15 p.m. pursuant to adjournment. Pursuant to notice, and on motion it was ordered that the Rules of the House be suspended in relation to all Bill now before the House or to come before the House for the remainder of the session.

HON. MR. MORINE in moving the second reading of the Industrial and Provident Society's Act, stated that its purpose was to change a qualification of the Act passed in 1919 by substituting \$1000 for the \$300 therein mentioned.

The House resolved into Committee of the Whole on the Bill, Hon. Mr. Murphy in the chair. The Committee rose and reported the Bill without amendment, and the Bill was then read a third time and passed, and it was ordered that a message to that effect be sent to the House of Assembly.

HON. PRESIDENT read a message from the House of Assembly that they had passed the accompanying Bills and requested the concurrence therein, namely, (1) Bill entitled an Act relating to the Guarantee of Debentures of the Western Marine Railway, Ltd.

(2) An Act entitled 'Of the Inspection of Ships.'

(3) An Act to amend Chapter 174 Consolidated Statutes entitled of Passenger Accommodation on board Steamers and sailing vessels. The Western Marine Railway Bill was read a first time and in moving the second reading HON. MR. MORINE explained the company mentioned is doing business in Burin, and is chiefly of advantage to the western shipping trade. The company had contracted a debt. Security was given by mortgage and notes of those interested. The amount had been arranged for by the bank and had been reduced by \$35,000. It was proposed to raise the remainder by debentures. The Government felt that it was right to help those who were trying to help themselves and give the colony's endorsement. It was not anticipated that the Government would be called upon, for there was every sign that the Company would soon be able to look out for itself.

"The Bill was read a second time and committed, Hon. Mr. Alderice in the chair. The Committee reported the Bill

without amendment and it was thereupon read a third time and passed, and ordered to be sent to the House of Assembly with a message to that effect.

Bills re Inspection of Ships and Passenger Accommodation on Ships were respectively read a first and second time and committed and were severally reported without amendment. They were then read a third time and passed and it was ordered that a message be sent the House of Assembly informing them accordingly.

HON. JOHN ANDERSON tabled Report and Financial Statement of the Dominion Co-Operative Building Association, Ltd.

The Council then adjourned until to-morrow at 4 o'clock p.m.

Clear Out the Bolsheviks

MORE ENVOYS COME TO ENGLAND.

(Daily Mail.) I gather that the Government is seriously exercised concerning the rapid spread of Communist activities in this country.

The task of the Home Office in guarding against the spread of revolutionary propaganda has been rendered far more difficult by the increased freedom of action bestowed on the emissaries of Moscow by the full diplomatic recognition of the Soviet Government by the late Socialist Government.

An increased number of Soviet officials were allowed diplomatic immunity from search, and may come and go as they please between London and Moscow. The staff of the Soviet Embassy in London, as in other capitals, is greatly in excess of the numbers required by other foreign Governments. The proportion is probably about 3 to 1. Every one is a member of the Communist Party and has taken an oath of allegiance to abide by the orders of the Communist executive in Moscow.

Under the agreement entered into by the Soviet Government is entitled to increase from time to time the number of its Consulates in Great Britain "as trade may demand." That is being done with all possible speed, and in every case a tried and sworn Communist is sent. This is in contradistinction to the practice of other countries who usually employ a native trader to represent their interests.



Hindenberg's Hopes

TORONTO, April 27.—(By Canadian Press)—In September, 1919, Field Marshal Paul Von Hindenburg, now President of the German Republic, wrote the story of his life. In the last chapter, "My Farewell," he says:—"Comrades of the German Army, once the proud and mighty German Army! How can you talk of despondency? Think of the men who gave us a new Fatherland more than a hundred years ago. Their religion was their faith in themselves and in the sacredness of their cause. They built up a new Fatherland, not on the foundation of doctrines strange to them, but on those of the free development of the individual within the framework of the whole body politic, and on his sense of responsibility to the state. Germany will tread that path once more as soon as she is permitted to do so.

"Germany, the goal and starting point of so much that is inexhaustible in human civilization and culture, will count as nought only so long as she ceases to believe in her great historical mission. My faith is unshakable that the best among us, with their deep, strong thoughts, will succeed in fusing the ideas of to-day with the precious relics of ancient times and on them set the stamp of eternal qualities which will bring salvation to our Fatherland.

"Such is the firm conviction with which I have left the bloody battlefields of this War of Nations. I have witnessed the heroic struggle of my Fatherland, and I shall never believe that it was its death struggle.

"I have often been asked the question on what I based my hopes of our ultimate victory even in the darkest hours of the war. I could only point to my faith in the justice of our cause and my confidence in our Fatherland and the Army.

"For the time being a flood of wild political passions and scolding speeches has overwhelmed the ancient structure of our state, and apparently destroyed all our sacred traditions. Yet this flood will subside again. Then from the tempestuous seas of our national life will once more emerge that rock—the German Imperial House—to which the hopes of our Fathers clung in days of yore, and of which the future of our Fatherland was confidently set, nearly half a century ago, by our own efforts.

"When our national ideals and our national conscience have resumed their sway among us, we shall see how moral values have been struggling to birth in our present grievous trials and the Great War on which no nation is entitled to look back with more pride than the German people, so long as it remained true to itself. Then, and then only, will the blood of all those who fell believing in the greatness of Germany have been poured out not in vain.

"In that hope I lay down my pen and firmly build on you—Young Germany!"

Some Freak Foundations

One Thomas Nash left 50 pounds sterling a year to the bell-ringers of the Abbey Church in his native city, Bath, England, on condition that each year, on the anniversary of his wedding, they ring the whole peal of bells with clappers muffled, and that on the anniversary of his death, they ring them with clappers unmuffled. (Whether his wife was alive to appreciate the kindly intent of this bequest, we do not know.)

About 1850, a foundation was created in England to perpetuate the sacred writings of one Joanna Southcott, who founded a religious sect based on the belief that she was to give birth to the Messiah. She attracted a considerable following, which, however, faded away when she died childless.

One Bryan Mullaphy, of St. Louis, who presumably had undergone the dangers and sufferings of the overland trip to California, left a substantial part of his fortune, in 1851, to aid his compatriots in journeying across the "Great American Desert."

Stephen Girard's magnificent bequest in Philadelphia provided that no minister of any religious sect whatsoever should ever be admitted to the premises of the college which he founded.

There was, many years ago, a "perpetual" endowment for the ransom of prisoners of North African pirates.

Frank Barnjum's Warning on Forest Waste

LAND OF POVERTY, SIMILAR TO CHINA, SURE TO FOLLOW PRESENT WASTEFUL TIMBER POLICY.

Frank J. D. Barnjum, the protagonist of forest conservation, who arrived recently in Montreal after an extended visit to the Orient, is more convinced than ever by what he has seen in China and other countries that Canada's future welfare is bound up with the way in which the forest problem is met and handled.

"Realizing for some time," he said, "that Canada is rapidly approaching the state of a treeless country, I determined to visit China and see for myself just what it means for a country to be denuded of forests. I had an opportunity of studying the entire coast line of that once great empire, and of making numerous journeys into the interior to a distance of 300 miles or more, and what I have seen has awakened in me a determination to use every endeavor to save Canada from being overtaken by a similar fate."

"China was once, as is well known, one of the world's greatest countries. It is still numerically a great nation, but beyond that it presents a picture of poverty, disease and famine hard to describe. Its degradation began with the destruction of its forests, and has reached depths that are almost beyond belief unless one sees with his own eyes."

Where Poverty Is Worst.

"Millions of Chinese are to-day living on three or four cents per day. Women and children may be seen everywhere picking up animal refuse which is dried and used for fuel. Every particle of stubble or straw is raked up clean and used for the same purpose. Even the roots of bushes are dug up and used for fuel, while human waste is used to fertilize the ground to produce rice and vegetables which the people eat. This process has been going on for so long that the soil has become impregnated with the bacteria of every known disease."

"Whole families live on the 'sampans,' a primitive type of boat which infests the rivers of China. Children are born, brought up and die on the water, and gain a living as scavengers. While the passenger steamers are in port these small boats swarm around the ship, the occupants using handbats or baskets to gather up such waste as may be dumped overboard which they use as food. All through the country there are signs of poverty and decadence. Human life is the cheapest thing extant. Men and women work as beasts of burden. There is no formal Government, military control being everywhere the rule. A tourist isn't allowed to travel anywhere in the interior except under military escort, and even then his life and person are not wholly safe. Banditry is still the casual occupation of many of the natives."

Downfall Due to Waste.

"China, as I have said, once ranked highly among the civilized nations of the world. Its downfall followed the destruction of its forests. Its lands are no longer fertile. Its people are reduced to the borderland of starvation. China is proof of the statement that a treeless nation is a decadent nation and it offers a lesson that other countries, Canada in particular, would do well to heed."

"As a result of the loss of her forests China has become a blighted country, the victim of alternate storms and droughts. Her land is still suffering erosion at a rate almost beyond belief. For more than 100 miles at sea from the mouth of the great rivers the yellow mud is plainly visible in the ocean, bearing mute testimony to what follows when the land is stripped of its forest cover."

Canada Bound Same Way.

"Canada to-day has millions of acres that are just as bare of tree growth and of soil as are the barren lands in China while millions of acres here are undergoing the same process. Many of our large rivers are just as yellow from soil content after any heavy rain as the yellow sea. Even the water in the Fraser river, when I crossed it on my trip across the continent, was as muddy and was carrying as much soil to the sea as the rivers of China."

"The water-table on this continent is becoming lower and lower each year as the forest is being removed or destroyed, so that the volume of our rivers is lessening from season to season, while our forest fire hazard is continually becoming greater. We are rapidly approaching a condition that is paving the way for a forest fire that will sweep our whole north country, and which may be accompanied by a loss of life hitherto unrecorded."

"Yet strange to say, Canada is doing little or nothing to avert such a fate. Our authorities are still indifferent or asleep. It is true that they talk a lot. They have recently given Canada a Save-the-Forest Week but beyond talk what does it amount to. What one practical thing have they done or are they doing to ensure Canada against becoming a treeless waste? I note that the Prime Minister in his 'Save the Forest' message said, 'Protection from fire, reforestation

and the application of cutting operations of the true principles of forestry would guarantee to Canada an annual but even greater than that of the present time,' but he omits to say that even if re-forestation were undertaken on an enormous scale immediately, it would still take forty years for these trees to obtain even pulpwood size. He ignores the fact that our present available supply, if present conditions are allowed to continue, will be exhausted long before that period."

"The authorities place great stress on the desirability of educating school children on forest fire prevention, but the appalling fact is that before the present generation of school children reaches maturity the greater part of our forests will be wiped out. The children that need education are the school boys that are playing at governing Canada at the present time."

"This is not a problem for the next generation; it is a problem for to-day and one that must be faced manfully and vigorously with every ounce of energy and brains that the Canadian people possess. If any one has any doubt on this point let him first visit China and see what a forestless country really means, and then let him take one of the Canadian Pacific Railway's luxurious trains, leaving Vancouver in the morning and travel wholly by daylight across the continent, stopping off at one of the many excellent hotels every night, and cover the ground from the Pacific to the Atlantic, noting the ravages of fire, insects and exploitation. Then let him make the same trip over any of the Canadian National lines, and if what he sees is not sufficiently convincing let him ascend any of our great rivers to their headwaters, and the farther he goes the more appalling the forest situation will become."

Enormous Inroads.

"The amount of pulpwood cut in Canada in 1923, according to the Natural Resources Intelligence Service, constituted a pile of wood four feet high and four feet wide, and more than seven thousand miles long. But this is entirely aside from the amount cut for lumber, fuel and other purposes. To this must be added the appalling amount destroyed by insects, fungi and fire. Altogether these would constitute a pile of wood four feet high and four feet wide, more than 100,000 miles long; a pile that would reach across the continent thirty times. I would like to ask any sane man whether he thinks this appalling destruction can continue for another ten years without jeopardizing our entire remaining forest resource. "The forest situation to-day does not require the opinion of an expert as conditions are perfectly apparent to any ordinary layman. The only possible hope I can see for Canada is in an immediate and drastic reduction in the amount of the annual cut and a complete and enlarged organization of fire prevention methods."—Montreal Star.

Is it the muscle? No, because then a Missouri mule would be worth more than your General Manager.

Is it the earning power? Then Jack Dempsey would be worth ten times as much as President Coolidge.


