It is interesting to set out the accident statistics for last year. On British railways there were 290 collisions, 408 derailments, 331 levelcrossing mishaps, ninety-eight fires, and twenty-four miscellaneous accidents. Though 462 persons were killed on the railway, only 112 were actual passengers.

There were 25,641 persons injured but of these 21,098 were raliway servants, and the great majority of the injuries were not serious. In addition, 141 trespassers on the line were killed, and 213 persons committed suicide on the railways.

The collisions between passenger trains numbered only thirteen-one on the Great Western, three on the London and North-Eastern, seven on the London, Midland, and Scottish, and two on the Southern. It is a thousand times more risky to walk the treets of London than it is to travel

How it Began.

The McGill investigations in this field had their beginnings when two years ago, Dr. H. S. Birkett, Professor of Otolaryngology at McGill, made arrangements for the younger members of his clinical staff to obtain instruction in the scientific aspects of their particular subject. During the instruction in physiology given as part of that course by Dr. John Tait it became evident that certain aspects of the mechanism of the inner ear

ood in urgent need of further instigation. Last year Dr. W. J. Mc-Nally was appointed a Cooper Research Scholar in Experimental Medicine for the purpose of conducting inestigations on the subject. The work direction proved to be of particular interest in its bearing on ear disease and on the subject of deaf, mutism. This work is at present in course of publication in two joint papers in the merican Journal of Physiology.

The inner ear, on which the researches have been conducted, contains, in addition to the organ of hearing, an elaborate apparatus, which is analogous to the compass of an aeroplane and which gives information in relation to the field of gravity and to various accelerations and displacements of the head and body. When this "compass" is in good working order through the perfect condition of the inner ear mechanism as in persons of normal hearing, there is full control of the limbs. In the case of a deaf mute or patient with ear disease, this "compass" may not be in good working order and giddiness, unsteadiness of the limbs and interference with equilibrium is the result. In the dark, when the assistance rendered by the eyes is interfered with, or when swimming with eyes shut under water and contact with the ground is lost, deaf mutes tend to lose their sense of direction and become disoriented. They require a lot of aid in developing. Especially is this true of international relations, where vaster interests and perils are all the time impinging upon each other. If we clearly see that the new Europe is a factor in the worldproblem with which we had not thought it necessary to deal before, our immediate business is to ask how we ought to deal with it, what should be our altered attitude in the presence of this great alteration in Europe, and what is the duty for America which in consequence lies next at hand.

It is not a question of working out a subtle or intricate policy. The thing can be stated in very simple terms. If we have to live with a new Europe we should at once set about making the unescapable relation pleasing and useful for both sides. Ever since the war, the leading European Governments have shown themselves most anxious to consult the United States and to do what they thought would be ropean deference there has come to be a certain pause. Perhaps we shall not be so much courted and flattered as we have been. Europe may now wait for us to make the advances. She may feel that she has something to give as well as to receive. However that may be, the work of adjustment to the new conditions in Europe rests

It is not merely a case of making friendly gestures. We must work out forms of practical co-operation. The first one that offers itself is cordial union with the European nations in supporting the international tribunal of justice. Certainly the Locarno settlement, with the new atmosphere in which it has bathed Europe, constitutes one more powerful argument for step, strongly urgeed by our Government, advocated by an immense preponderance of weighty public opinion, should be taken without delay. It would be a gratifying proof that America will not be open to the reproach of wandering about in a new Europe

Garnet Wheat

REGINA, Sack., Dec. 1. (C.P.) —Gar-t wheat, the new discovery an-nunced by L. H. Newman, dominion realist at Ottawa, which promise o revolutionize the wheat growing adustry of Western Canada, has been to Mr. Newman, and from these, the new cercalist has announced that he has evolved a wheat which ripes from seven to twelve days earlier than Marquis. Dr. Saunders was the discoverer of the latter variety.

Mr. Newman is also experimenting with another new wheat called "Reward," but it is not yet ready for dision. If final tests prove successful a limited quantity of Garnet will be distributed to Western farm-

a high quality taken from the Riga district in Russia and Preston wheat, one of the Saunders wheats. Preston was at one time grown rather extensively in Western Canada as it is a very early wheat of high milling quality, but it is hearded and shatters easily, and while still grown in a few districts, the yield is generally light. In the new wheat the good qualities have come from the Rigs district, se that Carnet comes from a select fam-

The only blemish on Garaci's record so far as has been revealed is the colour of its flour, which is slightly yellowish, and the wheat consuming countries have constantly demanded flour that will make the whitest bread possible. It is probable, however, that some strain of Garnet may be discovered which does not have the objectionable shade of color. Mr. Newman in an official report

"Like its Preston parent, Garnet relatively dry conditions, better than do most other varieties of common wheat. It matures from a week to eleven or twelve days ahead of Marquis, depending on the locality and the nature of the season. In production Garnet ranks among the good yielders. Where early-maturing sorts are an advantage or where a certain type of drought prevails, this variety may excel even Marquis in yield. It is not expected, however, that Garnet will take the place of the latter variety. where this is well suited to prevailing conditions.
