If this is done, we are confident that all the accommodation the town wants for twenty years to come can be secured at a reasonable cost without destroying the architectural proportions of the building. A grocer carrying on business at Birkenhead, who had been convicted of adulteration, his green tea having been faced with Prussian blue and gypsum, appealed to the Court of Queen's Bench in London. On his part it was shown that the tea as sold by him was in the same state as when it came from abroad; and it was stated that the "green" tea imported from China was invariably painted and faced in this manner. Mr. Justice Blackburn said a tradesman could only be protected by putting up in his shop, "I sell tea from China adulterated with Prussian blie and gypsum," or he should tell the purchaser that he was selling such. 
