Government Telegraphy.

Mr. F. B. Thurber read an interesting and valuable paper before the board of rade of New York city last week on postal telegraphy. He traces out the advantages derived in England from the absorption of the telegraph system by the postoffice department; shows how largely the service has increased since the change; notes the fact, not generally known, that the first telegraph line from Baltimore to Washington was constructed by the United States government, and protests with effect, because with justice, against a policy which has allowed this magnificent franchise, which belonged to the people, and in its birth was fastered by the people, to pass into the hands of monopolists. He estimates the actual expense of constructing the present Western Union lines at sixteen million dollars; the rest of the nominal stock value, on which dividends are declared, he declares to be fictitious; the sum total of the present stock is eighty millions. the telegraph system by the postoffice detotal of the present stock is eighty million

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

A Costly Well.

Gen. Phineas Banning is building a very large well at a cost of about \$10,000, in Wilmington, Cal., his purpose being to supply that town with pure water.
