



The City Engineer of Cincinnati recently stated to a deputation from Cleveland, visiting Cincinnati for the purpose of making enquiries in regard to the asphalt pavements in that city, after speaking of the tendency of the asphalt pavement wherever laid to attract the traffic, "that in his opinion, for resident streets, there was nothing superior, and it the bill now pending in the Legislature, for the appropriation of \$2,000,000, for the improvement of leity streets, is passed, asphalt will be used on all the resident streets of the city." The deputation were also told that although rents were largely increased on the streets where asphalt pavements were laid, yet their increased rates were willingly paid.

It has been urged that while these pavements may be suitable for quiet residential streets, they are not suited for streets on which there is heavy traffic. The best answer to this objection his that at a meeting held within the past two weeks of the board of aldermen of the city of New York, a petition was presented protesting against the repaving of Wall-street with granite block pavement and petitioning for asphalt, in order that they might have a hoiseless and clean pavement, which, it was stated in the petition, "would add not only to the general comfort, but also to the business interests of the street and city," the result of which was a resolution rescinding the order to repave the street with granite block pavement, and ordering the asphalt pavement to be laid on Wall-street, which is probably the most heavily trafficked street in the city of New York.

That the asphalt pavement is, considering the cost of construction, maintenance and durability, the cheapest pavement in the world, there is not the slightest doubt, On sanitary grounds there can be no question as to its immense superiority, and in the saving of wear and tear on vehicles, and in all other important respects, in my opinion the asphalt pavement is infinitely superior to any other known pavement, and it is beyond doubt the pavement of the future. Like all other great improvements, however, it has to encounter the proposition, and Toronto it seems is no exception to the rule in this respect, but I am very confident that after a few of our principal streets are laid with asphalt, opposition to its general adoption will be hopeless.

Meantime all that we have to do is to see that these pavements are properly laid by

that these pavements are properly laid by people of undoubted reputation and responsibility who have made these pavements a specialty, and who are able to give a satisfactory guarantee for the work done.

Prices for 1000 side lots of sole leather: No. 3, 15c a pound; No. 2, 18c; No. 1, 23c; No. 1 selected, 24c; block leather, 18c to 25c; upper leather, 25c to 30c.

Dry Goods. The dry goods trade during the past ten days has been very bad. The effect of the frost and the dread of its being worse than is now appar-ant has made the retail trade avoid purchasing sat has made the retail trade avoid purchasing for either present or future delivery. Travelers are having a hard time of it on the road just now in consequenc. The firm prices, however, in some lines creates a degree of confidence. Manufacturers of dyed cotton goods are now refusing orders at prices which ruled a month ago. In woolens the situation is not so satisfactory. Manufacturers complain that orders are coming in slowly and prices are weak and owing to the recont advance in wool prices of manufactured goods cannot be lowered much below present figures. The situation is one of "wait." Retail men are waiting to see how the crop prospects look before buying largely, wholesale man are waiting for five same reason, and the mills are waiting for orders. Payments have been remarkably good. With the exception of some districts in Quebec where last year's crop was a complete failure, and in some places in the Northwest, payments from all over the country are satisfactory. In the Privince of Ontario there is nothing to complain of as far as payments are concerned.




