## ECLIPSES.

There will be two Eclipses of the Sun this year, and two of the Moon; those of the Moon only being visible.

I.—April 5th, the Sun will be totally eclipsed, but entirely invisible on this continent.

II.—April 20th, in the morning there will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon, magnitude 8,544 digits, or over two-thirds on the Northern Limb. At Montreal it begins at 2h. 40m., middles 4h. 10m., and ends 5h. 43m.

III.—September 28th, an Annual Eclipse of the Sun occurs, but it will not be visible in this country.

IV.—Octr. 13th, in the evening, a partial Eclipse of the Moon will take place visibly. Magnitude, 11,976 digits on the Southern Limb. This Eclipse begins before the Moon rises here, and therefore will rise (5.15) with the Eclipse upon it. At Montreal this Eclipse middles at 6h. and ends 7h. 34m.

Venus will be the Morning Star until July 19th then Evening Star until May 10th, 1857.

Mars will be Morning Star until April 1st, then Evening Star until July 7th 1857.

## HERSCHEL'S WEATHER TABLE.

The following Table (ascribed to DR. ADAM CLARKE,) constructed upon philosophical considerations of the attraction of the Sun and Moon in their several positions respecting the Earth, and confirmed by experience of many years actual observation, furnishes the observer, without farther trouble, with the knowledge of what kind of weather there is the greatest probability of succeeding, and that so near the truth, that in very few instances will it be found to fail.

### Explanation of Weather Table.

It will be seen from the table, 1st. That the nearer the time of the Moon's change, First Quarter, Full and Last Quarter, is to *Midnight*, the fairer will the weather be during the seven days following; the space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

2.—That the nearer to *Mid-day*, or *Noon*, these phases of the Moon happen, the more foul or wet the weather may be expected during the next seven days; the space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to summer, though they effect spring and autumn to a considerable extent.

3.—That the Moon's Change, First Quarter, Full, and Last Quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, i. e. from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the *wind*, as it is noted in the table.

Though the weather is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring; yet in the main, the above observations will apply to these periods also.

### Explanation of Calendar Pages.

At the head of the respective pages for each month are given the ordinary tables of the changes and quadratures of the Moon. The 1st and 2nd columns show the mean times of the rising and setting of the Sun. The quantities are only set down to the nearest minute, the uncertainty of the observed times of the rising or setting of heavenly bodies on land, caused by the varying amount of horizontal refraction and the general liability to the intervention of terestial objects in such observations, renders a closer approximation unnecessary for ordinary practical purposes. The 3rd column contains the mean times of the rising or setting of the Moon. The quantities are only set down to the nearest minute, for the reasons mentioned above in respect to the Sun.

All Letters transmitted by the Post in Canada, with the exception of Packet Letters to and from the United Kingdom, are liable to a uniform rate of *Three Pence*, currency, per half-ounce, for whatever distance conveyed—*pre-payment* is optional—the charge increasing according to the weight of the Letter, one single rate for every additional half-ounce, counting the weight of a half-ounce as a full rate, thus:

Not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce....	3d Postage
More than $\frac{1}{2}$ oz and not exceeding 1 oz 6d	do
Ditto 1 oz ditto	1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz 9d do

The single Packet rate for Letters by the Atlantic Steam Packet Mails to and from England, via the United States, is 8d sterling, if *unpaid*, and 10d currency, if *pre-paid*, by British Boston Packets, and 1s 2d sterling, equal to 1s 4d currency, when sent by United States Government Packets *via* New York,—the rate on Letters by those Mails, *via* Halifax, or *via* Canadian Mail Steamers, is 6d sterling if *unpaid*, and 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ d currency, if *pre-paid*—and the rating on such Letters must be according to the British scale which is given hereafter.

Letters addressed to New Brunswick, Nova Scotia or Prince Edward's Island, are rated with the uniform rate of 3d per half-ounce,

Letters for Newfoundland, Bermuda and the West Indies, addressed over land *via* Halifax, are rated 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ d currency, per half-ounce.

Letters for Halifax, specially addressed by *British Mail Steamers*, from Boston, are rated 7½d currency.

Letters for Newfoundland, addressed by *British Mail Steamers*, as above, 1s currency.

Pre-payment of the above Letters is optional. Letters for *East Indies, Cape of Good Hope, Mauritius, Hongkong, New Zeland*, rate per half-ounce, 2s currency which must be pre-paid. Letters for *New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia, Van Dieman's Land*, rate half-ounce, 1s 5d Currency, which must be pre-paid.

Letters for France, 1s 8d currency per  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz. and 3s. 2d. currency per  $\frac{1}{4}$  ounce, when forwarded by British Steamers from Boston—when forwarded by American Steamers from New York, the charge will be 1s. stg. per oz. in addition to rates for transmission to Boston British Packets.

to Quebec and Halifax on payment of one penny at  
the time of posting—provided that the letter does not  
exceed the weight of half an ounce, for if above that  
weight letters so addressed are liable to the ordinary  
Postage rates as laid down in the foregoing tables.

Letters posted at any office in Canada, addressed to  
any place in the United States, except California and  
Oregon, are to be rated with an uniform rate of six  
pence currency, per half-ounce.

Letters posted in any part of the United States, ex-  
cept California and Oregon, addressed to Canada, will  
be rated there with a uniform rate of ten cents, equal to  
one-pence currency, per half-ounce.

The Postage Rate on letters passing between Canada  
and California and Oregon, is a uniform charge of  
one-pence currency, equal to fifteen cents per half  
ounce.

It is to be understood that the above rates include  
the whole charge for the transmission of a Letter be-  
tween any place in Canada and any place within the  
United States, between California and Oregon.

The scale for computing the charge upon Letters  
weighing more than a half-ounce will be the same as  
that for Letters passing within the Province.

Prepayment of Letters passing between Canada and any place within the United States, including California and Oregon, is in all cases, optional.

No additional charge on re-directed Letters.

Persons posting Letters containing valuable enclosures of whatever description are requested to observe that no record will be taken by the Post Office of any letter, unless specially handed in for registration at the time of posting, with payment of one penny as the registration charge. A certificate of such registration will be granted if required.

The Canada Postage Stamps, when used, will be taken in the United States as evidence of pre-payment of Postage on Letters going from Canada to the United States, and in like manner the United States Postage Stamps on Letters coming into Canada are to be taken by Post Masters in this Province as evidence of pre-payment having been made in the United States.

Stamps for the pre-payment of Postage can be purchased from Post Masters at chief offices.

### Newspapers.

All Newspapers published within the Province of Canada, pass by mail free of postage within the Province, whether posted from the office of publication or otherwise.

Newspapers posted in Canada for either of the other British North American Provinces, or coming from thence into Canada, pass free of charge.

Newspapers from Canada to the United Kingdom are, if conveyed by the ordinary weekly English Mail by way of the States, liable to a charge of one penny each on delivery, being the transit rate levied by the United States, and Newspapers from the United Kingdom to Canada, conveyed by the same route, must be pre-paid two-pence each in Great Britain.

Newspapers posted in Canada for the United States, pass free to the Frontier. United States Newspapers coming into this Province are liable to charge at the

rate of one penny for every four numbers to regular Subscribers, and to  $\frac{1}{2}$ d. each on transient papers, to be collected by the delivering Postmaster.

Newspapers for Foreign Countries, and parts abroad pass under the Regulations and rates of charge prescribed by the Imperial Post Office.

Newspapers re-posted in Canada pass free within the Province.

Publishers of Newspapers and Periodicals may send to their subscribers inclosed in their Publications, Accounts for Subscription and Receipts for the same, free of charge.

Newspapers when posted, must be so put up as to shew clearly that the packet or envelope covers Newspaper matter only—no marks or signs to serve the purpose of written communication will be permitted, either on the paper itself or on the cover, nor any writing other than the address to which the paper is to be sent, and the name of the sender—and if these conditions are not complied with, the Newspaper will be liable to charge as a letter, by weight.

As much irregularity and disappointment in forwarding Newspapers by Post is frequently occasioned, when the parcels are insecurely made up or carelessly addressed for the Post, at the Offices of publication, Post Masters are enjoined, whenever such want of due consideration for the nature of the service to be performed by the Post Office is frequently manifested, to call the attention of the Publisher to the circumstance, and request that greater care may be exercised.

### Magazines, Periodicals, and other printed matter.

On each Magazine or other Periodical Publication passing between any Post Office in Canada and any place in British North America, the United States or British West Indies, the ordinary postage rate is:—

If not exceeding 3 oz in weight.....  $\frac{1}{2}$ d.  
If over 3 oz in weight..... 2d.

If the postage on Periodicals published in Canada be paid quarterly in advance, either at the Office where posted or at the Office of delivery, one half the above rates are charged.

Periodicals when sent in packets to one address within the limit of 4 lbs. to each packet, pass at the rate of 3d. per lb. or fraction of a lb.

Printed Circulars, Prices Current or Hand Bills, and other printed matter of a like description, and Books, bound or unbound, passing as above, are charged a rate of one half-penny per ounce or fraction of an ounce, whether sent singly or in packets in one address, under the weight limit of 4 lbs. per packet.

Prepayment of the foregoing rates on Periodicals and Circulars and all other printed matter is optional, except when addressed to the United States or British West Indies, and in such cases the charge must invariably be pre-paid; further, on all such printed matter received from the United States and British West Indies, the Canada rate always remains to be collected by the delivering Postmaster in this Province.

Circulars and other Printed Papers must be sent unsealed to pass as such, and Pamphlets, Periodicals, Magazines, Books, &c., must be put up in covers open at the ends or sides, so that the character of the matter may be seen, and are subject to the same restrictions as to the presence of writing and penalty of letter postage for infringement of regulations, which are hereinbefore detailed as applying to newspapers.

The regulations under which Prices Current and Commercial Lists, Books, &c. are transmitted to and from the United Kingdom remain unchanged.

#### Book Post with England.

A Book packet may contain any number of separate books, publications, works of literature or art, almanacs, maps or prints, and any quantity of paper, vellum or parchment (to the exclusion of letters whether sealed or open) and the books, maps, paper, &c. may

either be written, printed or plain, or any mixture of the three, and may be either British, Colonial or Foreign.

The name and address of the sender, or anything else not in the nature of a letter, may also be written or printed upon the envelope or cover of the packet in addition to the name and address of the person to whom it may be forwarded.

All legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of the same, or a portion thereof, will be allowed as part of the packet, whether such binding &c., be loose or attached, as also rollers, in the case of prints and maps, and whatever may be necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or usually appertains thereto, and the postage is to be rated upon the gross weight of the packet.

The rates of postage on Book Packets remain as at present, viz;—

And so on, adding 1s. 3d. for each additional lb. weight.

The following conditions must be carefully observed, as prescribed by the Imperial Post Office;—

Every book packet must be either without a cover, or in a cover open at the ends or sides.

It must not contain any letter, open or sealed, or any sealed enclosure whatever.

No packet must exceed two feet in length, breadth or width.

The postage of book packets *must be paid in advance*. Printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament and Colonial Legislatures are subject to the above charges and regulations when sent by Book Post between Canada and the United Kingdom.

All Book Post matter intended to be sent to the

United Kingdom from Canada must, as heretofore, be forwarded upon Quebec, for transmission either via Halifax; or in summer, by Canadian Steamer.

Books cannot be forwarded except at letter postage rates by the mails sent to England through the United States.

Lumber Merchants, Dealers in Wood, Merchant Tailors, Boot and Shoe Makers, Stone Cutters, Tinsmiths, Carpenters & Joiners, Painters, Blacksmiths, Gun Makers or Gunsmiths, Confectioners, Coffee-House Keepers, Cabinet Makers, Upholsterers, Undertakers, Dyers, Founders, Ginger Beer, Root Beer, or Spruce Beer Brewers, Soda Water Makers, Hair Dressers or Barbers, Ink or Blacking Manufacturers, Goldsmiths, Silversmiths, Gold and Foil Beaters, Oil Cloth-Manufacturers, Bookbinders, Cutlers Gilders, and Frame Makers, Pump and Block Makers, Wire Makers, Brush Makers, Chair Makers, Tobacconists, Coach and Carriage Makers, Comb Makers, Furriers, Hatters, Musical Instrument Makers, Nail Manufacturers, Millers, Organ Builders, Saddlers and Harness Makers, Tanners, and generally on all persons carrying on trade or Manufacturers within the City, at the rate of £7 10s per £100 on the Rental.

*To be collected by Clerk of Bonsecours Market.*

Each Carter, Cabman, &c., shall pay an annual duty to the Clerk of the Bonsecours Market for en-regstration and number as follows:—For every Cart 10s.; ditto Caleche, 10s.; ditto Cab, whether two or four-wheeled, 15s.; ditto Coach Drawn by two horses, 30s.; ditto Omnibus, 40s.; certificate to every Master Carter, 1s.; ditto Driver, 6d.

The Clerk of Bonsecours Market also collects all assessments leviable on all horses and vehicles for which certificates of Registry are applied for, viz:—on each working Horse, for Assessment, annually,

12s 6d ; ditto two-wheeled vehicle, for hire, 15s. ; do four-wheeled Vehicle, ditto 20s. ; each Stage Coach, Omnibus or Waggon, drawn by one or two horses, 40s. ; ditto do do drawn by four or more horses, 60s. ; each Cart or Sleigh drawn by one horse, conveying any kind of Building Materials into the City from the Banlieu, shall pay an annual duty of 5s. to the Clerk of Bonsecours Market, for registration and number, for each Vehicle, under similar circumstances, drawn by two horses, 10s. ; for each Waggon or other four-wheeled Vehicle, or corresponding Winter Vehicle drawn by two horses 20s.

In Virtue of the authority of the third Section of an Act of the Provincial Parliament, passed the sixteenth year of Her Majesty's Reign, and chaptered eighty five, entitled, "An Act further to amend the Laws relating to Duties of Customs," it is ordered that the following packages be *chargeable with Duty*, viz: all Packages containing Spirits, Wines, Cordials, or Liquids of any kind in Wood, Bottles, Flasks, and all Packages of Glassware or Earthenware, Sugar, Molasses, Syrups, Treacle, Coffee, Rice, Tobacco, Flour, Provisions, and no deduction to be allowed for the weight or value of the paper or string covering Sugar, &c. All Packages containing Soap, Candles, Pipes, Nails, Chains, Paints, Spices, Nuts, Vermicelli, Macaronia, Glass, Tin, Canada Plates, Tins, Trunks and Jars containing merchandize, and all other Packages in which the goods are usually exposed for sale, or which necessarily or generally accompany the goods when sold. And that the following Packages are to be *exempt from the payment of Duty*, viz: Boxes, Trusses, Cases covering Casks of Wines or Brandy in Wood. Cases and Casks containing Dry Goods, Hardware or Cutlery; Crates and Casks containing Glassware or Earthenware, Cases containing Bottled Wines or Bottled Spirits, and all other Packages in which the Goods are *not* usually exposed for sale, or which do not necessarily or generally accompany the goods when sold.
