LOSS OF BRITISH DESTROYER AVENGED AFTER HOT PURSUIT FOE'S SUBMARINES ARE BUSY

Two German Torpedo Boats Sunk in North Sea After Running Fight—American Tank Steamer Attacked and Three Lives Lost—Several More Vessels Torpedoed.

LONDON, May 2.—(11.20 p.m.)—A German submarine on Saturday sank the old British destroyer Recruit, off the Galloper Lightship, in the North Sea, but the score was more than equalized by other British destroyers, which, after a stern chase, overtook and sank the two German torpedo boats that had accompanied the submarine on her cruise.

GERMANS MEET WITH BAD CHECK IN SOUTH AFRICA

General McKenzie, With Mounted Force, Cuts Off Enemy at Gibeon.

WHOLE TRAIN IS TAKEN

Remnant of Force Escapes From Pursuers in Rough Ground.

Special Cable to The Toronto World. CAPE TOWN, South Africa, May 2.—German forces retreating from Keetmanshoop, German Southwest Africa, were intercepted and seriously defeated near Gibeon by a mounted force under Gen. McKenzie, it was announced here yesterday.

Enemy Cut Off From Retreat

When the Germans were forced to evacuate Keetmanshoop without striking a blow Gen. Botha sent Gen. McKenzie forward with a mounted force to cut them off. He came up with the enemy near Gibeon, where they were caught and badly cut up, and a few of the survivors were only able to get away by escaping to rough ground, where cavalry could not operate.

London Church Honors Canada's Gallant Dead

Commemorative Services Held Thruout Day in St. Stephen's by Canadian Rector, With Appropriate Music and Sermons.

Canadian Associated Press Cable. LONDON, May 2.—Services at St. Stephen's Church, one of the most beautiful churches in this city, the rector, Rev. E. J. Houghton, himself being a Canadian, were held today in commemoration of the gallant dead of the Dominion.

Losses Among Canadians Will Reach Six Thousand

FRENCH ARE AT DARDANELLES TO OPEN NEW PLAN OF ATTACK

Troops Have Withdrawn From Asiatic Side and Have Left for Unknown Destination -- Losses to British Fleet Were Light.

LONDON, May 2.—A despatch from Athens to The Exchange Telegraph Co. says it is learned from Mytilene that the landing of 4000 French troops on the Asiatic side of the Dardanelles last Sunday was executed for the exclusive purpose of facilitating the occupation by British troops of Seddul Bahr, a town on the European side of the straits and at the southern extremity of the Gallipoli peninsula.

SIR CHARLES TUPPER'S ELDEST SON IS DEAD

Canadian Associated Press Cable. LONDON, May 2.—James Stewart Tupper, eldest son of Sir Charles Tupper, has died in a hospital at Oxford, after several weeks' illness. He was in his 64th year.

PTE. G. L. BENNETT REPORTED WOUNDED

Pte. Henry G. Leigh Bennett, reported to be wounded, is 19 years old and joined the 8th Mississauga Horse at the outbreak of the war, going to the front with the Second Battalion of the Canadian contingent. He attended King Beach School and afterwards Riverdale High School. Bennett was a clerk with the Bank of Commerce. His father, G. L. Bennett, lives at 21 Wineva avenue.

Assailed by an Immense Force of Germans Numbering Five to One, the Canadians Held Their Position in a Most Gallant and Courageous Way.

World Office, 1 a.m. At 1 o'clock this morning The World got further information as to the engagement at Langemarck, and, while we cannot give our authority at the moment, it would indicate that the Canadians suffered very severely, and that the total casualties will run into thousands and the killed into hundreds.

The Canadian troops were assailed by an immense force of Germans, probably five to one, and fought them for one afternoon and thru the night, holding their position in a most gallant and courageous way, but as to how many were killed and how many were wounded, no definite information is as yet to hand.

Apparently, in face of overwhelming odds in the number of Germans who attacked the Canadians, it seems that no support of any kind came to our troops, and that the general in command had failed in the duty of protecting them.

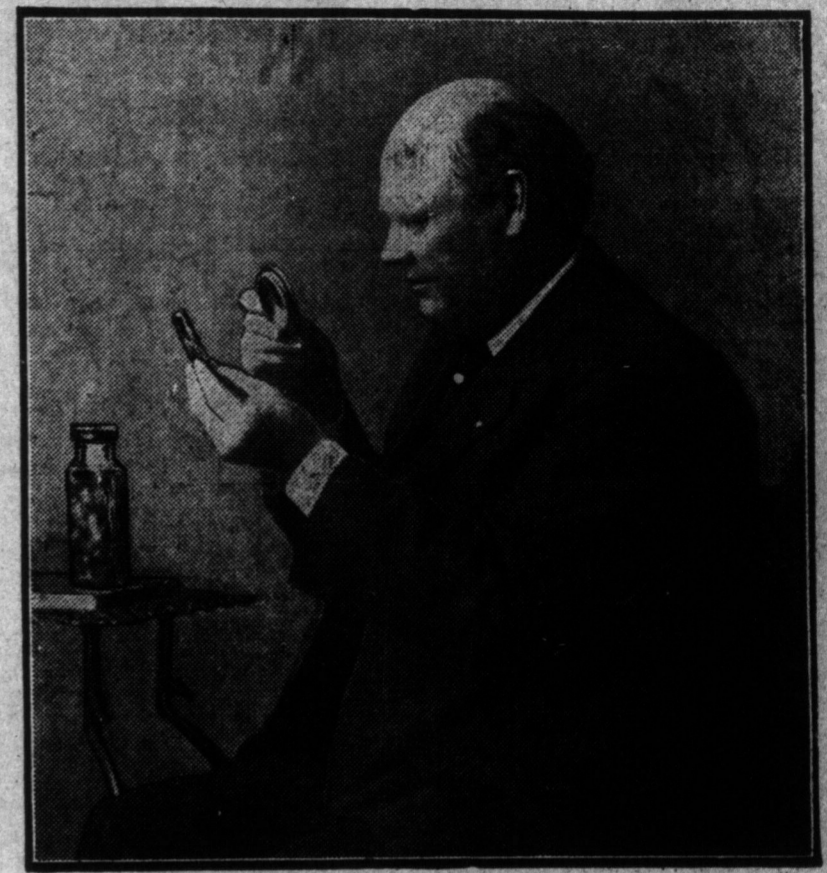

Some who have given consideration to the question of admitting the dominions into the arena of foreign affairs appear to imagine that this can only be done through a formal change in the constitution of the empire...

think that a representative council of some kind is necessary, with whom, it is to be presumed, the foreign secretary will consult and thru whom the dominions will be kept in touch with the course of negotiations...

The objects of diplomatic action are of greater importance than the steps taken to gain them so long as these steps accord with the public conscience. It does not seem at all impossible for the imperial and dominion governments to come to an agreement regarding the general direction to be followed by the conduct of the imperial foreign policy...

More serious difficulties, we believe, confront the advocates of parliamentary control of foreign policy, and of the course of diplomatic negotiation. Were all nations on an equally democratic basis, open diplomacy would be feasible even if, on occasion, it might prove dangerous...

What the Navy Has Done

In replying to a letter from a correspondent, The New York Tribune accepts as obviously sound his declaration that "the German fleet is protecting Germany." He adds: "That is more than the British fleet has been able to do for England during the whole of this war..."

Very different and much more formidable is the task laid upon the British navy. The main fleet must be kept in continuous readiness to deliver battle at any moment the enemy fleet may emerge from its well-protected lair...

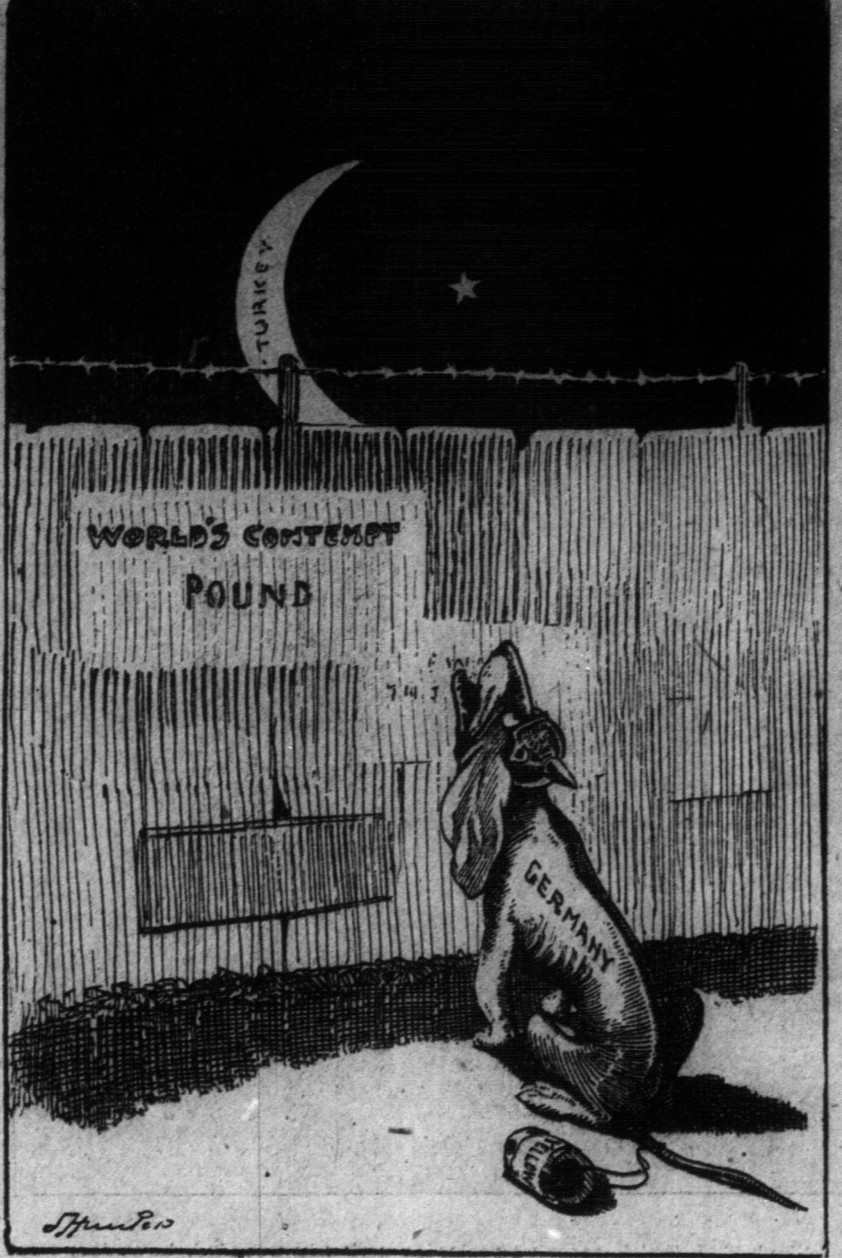

God is infinite. Pastor Russell also denounces Christian Science, with several harsh adjectives. He says: "The God in our midst. 'Nothing in the Bible so declares.' 'An omnipresent God is not a person.' These quotations are from the Bible, and are not his own words."

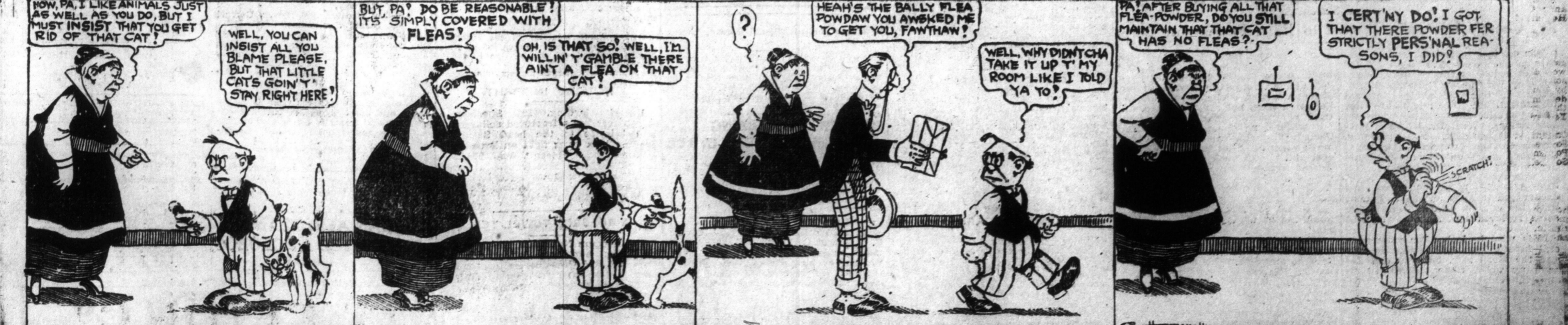
