THE LATEST STRIKE. THE LATEST STRIKE. Visiting the hotel on the following (Wednesday) morning, I found the place alive with oil men. They were excitedly discussing a new strike that had been made the previous evening. This was on the Shebo farm, three miles to the south of the town. Some This was on the Shebo farm, three miles to the south of the town. Some six weeks ago two Americans from Findlay, Ohio (the celebrated natural gas country), came to Bothwell to pro-spect for oil. They engaged Mr. W. McKenzie of Petrolia to drill a well for them on the Shebo farm, which they had leased along with various other properties. On Tuesday, Dec. 2, Mr. McKenzie got through with his job, and when a pump was put in and set to work it was found that the well was producing oil at the rate of 150 barrels per day. As there was only a single tank ready to receive the oil it was soon filled and the engine was shut down at 7 p.m. Tuesday. On the fol-lowing afternoon another test was made of the capacity of the well. The farm is situated on the south side of the river. I drove to the well by way ANOTHER GOOD PROPERTY. Mr. Alex Elliott is preparing to operate on an extensive scale. He has lease the Sussex, Lutz and Gessner properties. He is the first in the district to erect a power house. This was only started going the other day. Six wells are operated from it by means of the "jerking" gear which is such a conspicuous feature on an oil farm. Five of these wells average six made of the capacity of the well. Inc farm is situated on the south side of the river. I drove to the well by way of the iron bridge. On my arrival there I found a group of oil men (there were probably thirty of them) standing about the well and taking a lively in-terest in its output. The discharge from the pipe was about one-half water and one-half oil. It was pumping at the rate of 150 barrels of oil in the twenty-four hours. The spectators were all well pleaged with the test, but es-pecially delighted with the result were the proprietors, Messrs. G. W. Whit-man and C. E. Brinton. They have been in the oil business many years, and a new strike is no novelty to them. Nevertheless, they expressed them-selves as well pleased with their first strike in Bothwell. 



The average output of a well there is one-third barrel per day. The Bothwell wells have started out with a much larger output than those in either Petrolea or Oil Springs. If they maintain their present capacity, or even 50 per cent. of it, they will turn out quite profitable. That the wells will be permanent is the general opin-ion of all the practical oil men of the district. In Petrolea a well can be pumped at a cost of about 25c a day. The same thing is not yet possible in number and scattered. The cost of operating the wells will decrease ac cording to the increase in the num-ber of wells.
