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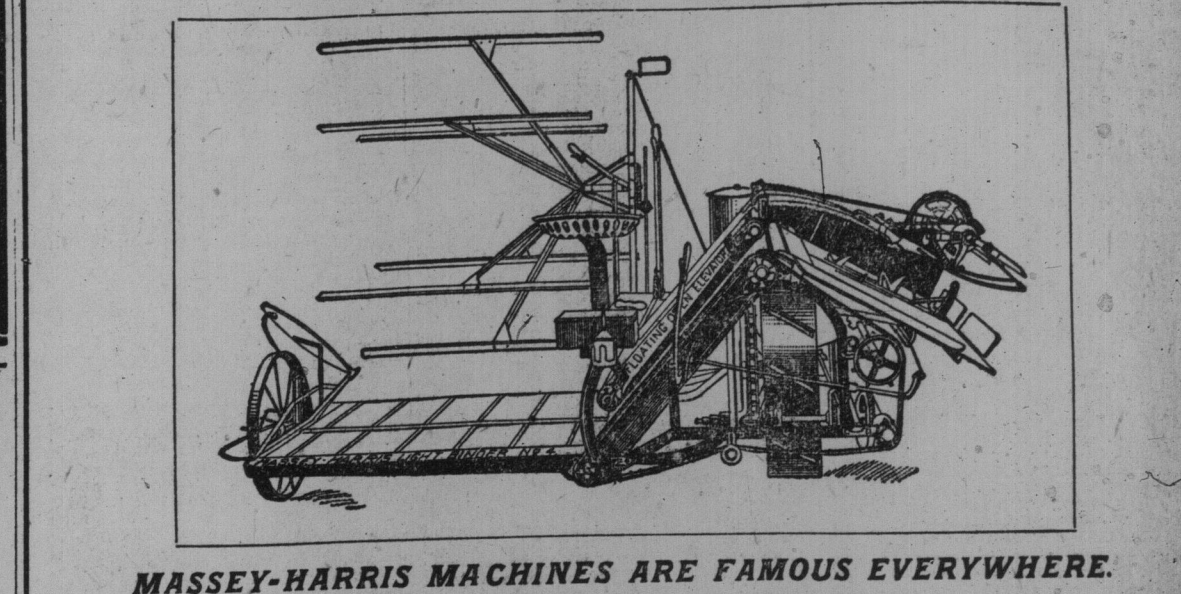

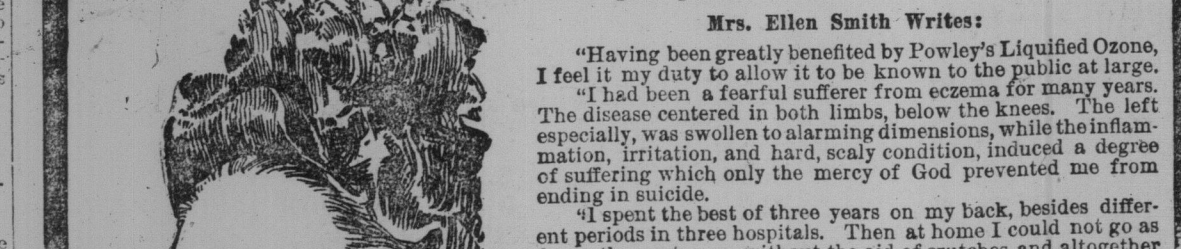

RAILROAD MEN'S DEMANDS.

Employers on Western Roads Planning a Big Move.

Oakland, Cal., Oct. 24.—A demand will be made upon the Southern Pacific in thirty days for increased wages which will affect more than 50,000 employees, and a concerted demand will be made upon the Southern Pacific and twenty-two other roads west of Chicago for increased wages.

The chief cause of the request is the increased cost of living. The men demand also that the railroads are doing more business than formerly and making greater profits. Another reason cited is that owing to the year equipment in use by the railroads the employees are compelled to work harder.

St. John's, Nfld., Oct. 24.—Another marine disaster has been reported here. The men were drowned by the foundering of a craft of Foggo during a recent gale.

The total of the casualties among the fisher folk during the past few weeks is extremely large, and the total of lost fishing vessels for the year promises to reach an abnormal figure.

SMALLER GLASSES OF BEER

Threatened Owing to Shortage of the Barley Crop.

There is some talk among Toronto brewers about having to increase the price of beer and other malt drinks. This is due to the increased price of barley, due to the shortage of that crop. It is said that forty per cent. of the new crop is valueless as far as manufacturing malt from it is concerned. It refuses to sprout.

While the price may be increased to the retailer it is quite impossible to secure from the consumer over the bar, more than five cents for a glass of beer. At the same time the price of the glasses can be decreased. This is the usual course.

A more serious menace is the activity of the brewers of the States. The duty on beer is but sixteen cents per gallon. With the increased barley yield in the States, and the difference of the duty can easily be made up. The Brewers' Association will discuss this subject within a few days and notify the trade of the decision.
