St. Thomas, June 3. — (From Our Own Man.) — The following notice on the doors of The Atlas Loan Company occasioned a good deal of excitement:

"Owing to the financial difficulties of A. E. Ames & Co., the directors of the Atlas Loan Co. have decided in the interest of the shareholders and depositors to close their doors for the present."

The Atlas Loan Co., of which A. E. Wallace is president, and John W. Eddy, managing director, has been looked upon as a safe institution, and carried about half a million dollars worth, or more, of first mortgages, principally on Elgin County real estate.
