

## ANNUAL REPORT, &c.

REPORT of the flate of the MADRAS SCHOOL, Incorporated by the name of the "Governor and Truftees of the Madras School in New-Brunfwick," made agreeably to the direction in that behalf in the Charter, at the first Annual Court or Meeting of the faid Corporation, on the first Tuesday in July, one thousand eight hundred and twenty.

This School was orginally formed at the City of Saint John, in the Province of New-Brunfwick, under the Patronage and liberal encouragement of HIS EXCELLENCY GEORGE STRACEY SMYTH, Lieutenant-Governor and Commander in Chief of the faid Province, in the month of July, 1818, by the voluntary contributions of Trinity Church, and of the Corporation and Inhabitants of the City, for the infiruction of Children and Youth of both fexes, and particularly the indigent in the principles of true Religion and useful Learning according to the fystem invented and first practifed by Dr. BELL, at Madras, and in use and practice in the British National Education Society, incorporated and established in England. The School was placed under the direction of Mr. GEORGE BRACG, who was licenfed for that purpole by HIS Ex-CELLENCY, and by whofe abilities and perfevering zeal and diligence, the School became fo eminently ufeful that a Grant was made by the Legislature of the Province

vince at the Seffion of the General Affembly in the year 1819, of the fum of L. 250 towards erecting a fuitable building, in the faid City, for the accommodation of the School. Aid having allo been given towards the fupport of the School by the National Society in England, the Committee chofen and appointed by the Subferibers to the Inftitution, Inhabitants of the faid City, for managing and conducting the affairs of the School, were encouraged to undertake the purchase of a Lot, and the erection of a Brick Building thereon, for the accommodation of the School, one story in height, which has been fince completed of the following dimensions in the infide, viz. 78 feet in length, by 33 feet in breadth, and the height of the School Room from the floor to the centre of the arched ceiling 17 feet.

As it was found that many difficulties might arife in managing the affairs of the School from the want of corporate powers for the purpole, the Committee above mentioned prefented a Petition to His Excellency in the month of July, 1819, praying that a Royal Charter might be granted for the more perfect establishment of the School, and for erecting a Corporation for receiving, managing, and disposing of the property and funds for the use of the School, and extending the benefits of the Inflitution.

HIS EXCELLENCY being defirous to promote and encourage an Infiitution fo uleful and important, and to extend the benefit thereof to other parts of the Province, was pleafed to direct that a Royal Charter fhould be prepared without delay for the purpofes mentioned in this Petition, and the Charter was accordingly prepared and granted by Letters Patent, under the Great Seal of the Province, bearing date the 23d day of Auguss, 1819, by which it is among other things required that the Central School be always held and kept in the faid City of Saint John, and that that the ber other part o as the fund them fo to

At the Seffion of the General Affembly of the Province the prefent year, the fum of L. 750 was granted "To the "Governor and Truftees of the Madras School in New-"Brunfwick towards the fupport of that Infiitution "throughout the Province."

It being required by the Charter that the Corporation caufe to be kept by their Treafurer regular and fair accounts of all fums *received* and *paid* for the ufe of the Corporation, and to render the account thereof each and every year at the Annual Court or Meeting of the Corporation, on the first Tuesday in July, in writing, on oath of the faid Treasurer.

Mr. BRAGG, the Preceptor of the School, alfo exhibited his account of fums received and paid by him, by which there appears to be a balance due to him of the fum of L.12:10:10, exclusive of a fum allowed to him at the prefent meeting of the Corporation of L.35, to make his falary up to the fum of L.200 per annum, commencing the 1ft day of January laft, these fums amounting in the whole to the fum of 47:10:10, due to Mr. BRAGG; the fums flated in his account as received by him, are for tuition money, and the Books belonging to the Corporation fold by him to the Scholars.

Upon a Reprefentation made by the Reverend Mr. ARNOLD, of the State of the Madras Schools, two at Suffex Vale and one in Norton, in King's County, the fum of L.40 has been allowed at the prefent Meeting of the Corporation to Mr. and Mrs. LEGGETT, as Inftructors in one of the Schools at Suffex Vale, of the fum of L15 to Mifs MAR-TIN, the Preceptrefs in the School at Norton, and of the further fum of L.15 to Mr. TRURO, late Preceptor in the other School at Suffex Vale, amounting in the whole to the fum of L.70, payable out of the Provincial Grant made as before mentioned at the laft Schion of the General Affembly.

It is fatisfactory in this place to flate the encouragement that has been given to the Inftitution by the Grants that have been ordered to be made by HIS EXCELLENCY THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR, by and with the advice of HIS MAJESTY'S COUNCIL, from time to time, viz.

For the benefit and fupport of the Central School, a lot efcheated to the Crown for failure of heirs, adjoining to the lot purchafed for the erection of the School Houfe thereon, four lots in Duke-firect, efcheated for a like caufe, with the buildings thereon, and regranted to Mr. HENRY GARDNER, who had an equitable claim thereon, upon his offer to pay to the Corporation the fum of Two Hundred Guineas, mentioned in the Treafurer's account as received from him.

The Shag Rocks, fo called, lying near the mouth of the harbour of St. John: This Grant has not been hitherto productive on account of a refirictive claufe in an Act of Affembly, which, from its inefficiency will probably be repealed.

For the Benefit and fupport of the Madras School at St. Andrews, in the County of Charlotte, a part of the Town plot there, on the South West fide of Waterftreet.

It has however been found, that notwithftanding every practicable exertion to collect the fums above fpecified, there has been a deficiency and confequent loss of at least one third part; fo that even in the prefent profperous state of the School, the tuition money cannot be depended upon, as a fource of income, for more than  $L_{200}$ .

There appears to be a competent fupply for the prefent, of the neceffary books and School apparatus, in the Treafurer's hands.

During the last winter the Floor of the Central School has been divided into two parts for the accommodation of the Children of different fexes, but the number of boys in daily attendance has fo greatly increased, that it is found that the whole Floor will hereaster be required for their accommodation; it has therefore

therefore been thought expedient to appoint a Committee to make the requifite inquiries and report a proper place for the erection of a fuitable building for the accommodation of the female Scholars, together with a plan and an effimate of the expense of a building for that purpofe.

It having been thought highly expedient that fome means of inftraction fhould be provided for the Children of People of Colour, whofe education appears to have been hitherto altogether neglected, a Committee has been appointed to confer with His Excellency THE LIEU-TENANT GOVERNOB, at his requeft, upon the measures proper to be adopted for the effecting of fo defirable an object.

The Governor and Truftees are aware that the execution of thefe purpofes muft be attended with confiderable expense but they feel it to be their duty, without delay, to refort to all the means in their power to accomplift them, in full confidence that the aid of the Provincial Legislature will be hereafter extended in reimbursing to them fuch expenses as may be anavoidably incurred in the profecution of undertakings which appear to them for useful and important.

It has been thought advifable that arrangements fhould be made for a public meeting annually of the Children belonging to the Central School, which the Children belonging to other Schools fhould be invited to join at Trinity Church, in this City, on fome convenient week-day, to be appointed for that purpofe, at a fuitable feafon of the year, on which day, a Sermon fhould be preached and a collection made for the benefit of the Central School, and to this end the Church Wardens of this Church have been requefted to make fuch arrangements for the prefent year on the first Tuefday in August next, on which day the the Rector I ratory to fu

The following Rules and Regulations proposed by His EXCELLENCY THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR for the Government of the Madras School in the other parts of the Province, were approved and adopted by the Court, at the prefent Meeting,

The Schools with their local funds to be under the immediate management of the Minister and Church Wardens of each Parish, who are to make an annual report to the Secretary of the Board by the first of June, on the following points, Ift. The date of the eftablishment of each School.

2d. The names of Teachers and whether properly qualified in this fystem, and where and by whom instructed.

sd. The number of Children of both fexes entered fince the formation of the School.

4th The number of Children of each Sex in daily attendance.

5th. That the elementary books of the National Society be ALONE used in the instruction of the Children.

6th. From what funds the School is fupported, and whether any and what affiftance is required for the current year.

N. B. The Secretary of the Central School will furnish the National School books on application.
