

3. Sacraments.

Baptism is dispensed on the first Sabbath of each month. The Lord's Supper is dispensed on the first Sabbath of February, June, August, and December, in the morning, and on the first Sabbaths of April and October, in the evening. Communicants are requested to bring their communion cards, as this is the only way of recording

4. Support.

Pews and sittings are free, although as far as possible allotted to the families and persons who attend the church. Any who have not secured sittings are requested to make application for them on any Wednesday evening before or after prayer-meeting service, when the seat-letting committee will endeavor to meet their requirements.

The congregational expenses are met by voluntary contributions, given for the most part weekly, by envelope. All who have not adopted this system are earnestly requested to do so, applying to the Envelope Secretary for envelopes. It is suggested that each contributor shall take his or her supply of envelopes home, keep them in a safe place, use them regularly with due regard to the dates printed thereon, seal them securely, and write the amount enclosed in every case on the face. Each contributor who follows these suggestions can ascertain by a simple examination of the envelopes remaining on hand, precisely how his or her account with the church stands at any time, and they are asked to make such an examination periodically, and supply any omissions which may have occurred by reason of absence

SYNOPSIS OF MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION.

The annual meeting of the congregation was held on the evening of Monday, January 13th.

After devotional exercises had been conducted by the pastor, Mr. R. Donald was requested to act as chairman, and Mr. A. D. Crooks, as secretary to the meeting.

The report of the Session for the past year was presented

by Dr. McTavish, who moved its adoption, seconded by Mr.

The adoption of the annual report of the Managers was moved by Mr. Donald, seconded by Mr. Petry, and carried.

Reports of the results of the work carried on during the year by the various organizations connected with the church, were presented and adopted, and it was decided that these, in addition to the reports of the Session and Managers, should be printed in pamphlet form and distributed among the mem-

Mr. Donald Bain resigned from the Board of Managers, thereby leaving eight Managers to be elected for two years, and

The following gentlemen were elected to act on the Board of Managers for two years, Messrs. A. R. Creelman, R. Donald, C. J. Peter, A. D. Crooks, R. W. Spence, W. York, A. I. Forster and H. Meldrum, and for one year Jas. M. Hamilton.

Votes of thanks to the members of the choir and to the auditors for valuable services rendered during the year, were

Messrs. John Ferguson and Peter McCulloch were reappointed auditors for the ensuing year.

REPORT OF SESSION.

It is with gratitude and praise to God we present another Annual Report of the spiritual condition and progress of the congregation. We have to record many evidences of the Divine favor notwithstanding our unworthiness of His mercies.

The regular services of the church have on the whole been fairly well attended, though there are still many of our members absent on Sabbath evening whom we would like to see present. We have had the largest attendance at Communion this year of any in the history of the congregation.

The different departments of the church's work have been conducted with diligence and success, as the separate reports will no doubt show.

The Session and congregation owe a debt of gratitude to Mr. F. W. Anderson, and those devoted workers associated with him, for the admirable way in which they have conducted the services in the Elizabeth Street Mission, without the usual expense to the congregation So far as we can judge the work has never been more efficiently done, and the experience gained has been of inestimable value to the workers themselves.

The Sabbath School has continued its work with evident tokens of blessing. At the beginning of the year the bible class was moved into the church, and this has proved helpful. The primary class was moved at the same time into the ladies' parlor, but this change has not been found very convenient. We trust that ere long a suitable place may be arranged for this most important and successful branch of the work.

The interest in the Christian Endeavor Society has of late been very marked. The last prayer and consecration meeting for the year was perhaps the best in the history of the Society.

Special services held in November, and conducted by Mr. H. E. Govan, of Glasgow, and others, were blessed to the conversion of not a few and to the spiritual quickening of very many.

The Session regret very much the necessity of parting with Miss Dallas, as organist and leader of praise. She has filled this position for sixteen years with great satisfaction. By her exemplary Christian character, her untiring faithfulness in the discharge of duty and her uniform kindness and courtesy she has won the esteem and respect of all who know her. The Session trust she may enjoy a well earned rest and may long continue with us in the membership of this congregation.

The Missionary interest has been well sustained during the year. We are gratified to learn that the contributions for Missionary and benevolent objects are several hundred dollars in excess of last year. This in the face of the business depression is a matter for thanksgiving to God. Miss Maggie McIntosh, whom we were glad to have with us, has reached China again in safety. Miss Bella Robson, another of our members has also gone to China during the year, in connection with the China Inland Mission.

We have not been free from the visitations of death, and we have to mourn the loss of several of our devoted members. During the year, 95 new members have been added to the roll. Of these, 70 were by certificate and 25 on profession of their faith. The removals are, by death 6. by certificate 34, and by retirement from the roll 26, making the net gain 29, and the present membership, 641.

The attendance at the various communions is as follows: February, 331; April, 274; June, 322; Aug., 232; Oct, 315; Dec., 326. Sixteen infants and two adults have received the sacrament of baptism.

We close our report thanking our Heavenly Father for all the blessings of the past, and looking forward with faith and hope for the future.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MANAGERS FOR THE YEAR 1895.

The Managers have much pleasure in submitting to the congregation the usual report and statements of account for the past year. From the figures submitted, it will be seen that the receipts have proved sufficient to meet the ordinary congregational expenses of the year, and reduce the deficiency "with which it opened by the sum of \$315.32. This result was in part secured through the liberality of the congregation in responding to an appeal for a special collection during the month of December, which realised the sum of \$178.55, leaving an adverse balance of \$139.90 at the opening of the year 1896.

Compared with the receipts for 1894 it will be seen that the ordinary open and envelope collections for the past year realised almost the same amount within a few dollars. A comparison of the expenditures, however, shows that all requirements have been met in 1895, with a smaller sum by \$540; the saving was effected as the result of the decision arrived at towards the end of 1894, to do without a choir master for the musical service, and without a paid missionary for the district work at the Elizabeth Street Mission. Gratifying progress has been made in connection with the Floating Debt, or Church Improvement Account, the outstanding liability with which the year began-\$4,556.95-having been reduced to \$2,686.50, the contributions from the congregation amounting to \$870.45, and the remaining \$1,000 representing a bequest from the estate of the late Neil Currie, to which an extended reference was made in the report of 1894.

There are now on the contribution list the names of 221 members and adherents, giving weekly the sum of \$93.74

that the revenue is sufficient to meet all requirements, if ordinary prudence in making engagements be exercised. The method adopted to liquidate the floating debt by special envelope contributions has yielded in the past year a result which gives hope that in the not very distant future that liability will be extinguished. Although there is plenty of room for growth in the congregation, there are only a few vacant sittings, and the general attendance at both morning and evening service seems to be increasing. The Managers rejoice in the belief that not only in its financial, but in all other respects the church is in a sound, healthy and growing condition.

The following Managers retire by rotation, and are eligible for re-election :—Messrs. Creelman, Crooks, Donald, Forster, Paton, Peter, Spence and Stephens.

Mrs. Jeffrey's class takes second place, 3 boys out of 5 securing prizes.

Mr. Mark's class takes third with 3 out of 6, and Miss Gordon's class fourth with 3 out of 7 securing prizes.

14 girls and 15 boys are entitled to prizes for regular attendance, having been present 48 Sundays or more.

During the year, 11 scholars have become communicants of the church.

REPORT OF MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION.

The Missionary Association have pleasure in submitting their report for the past year.

As a Congregation we have abundant cause for thankfulness, that our monthly Missionary meetings have been so well attended, and that the contributions have not decreased notwithstanding the great depression in commercial affairs. We pray and trust that greater zeal and liberality may be shown by both members and adherents during the coming year.

Communications have been regularly received from our Missionary, Mr. Russell, in India, giving encouraging tidings of his work, and keeping us in close touch with his field of labor. At our annual public meeting we were addressed by that prince of modern missions, Dr. Mackay, on his wonderful work in Formosa. We trust his earnest words will not soon be forgotten. Interesting addresses have been given by Rev. Mr. Farquharson, of Pilot Mound, by J. Fraser Campbell, on India, Rev. C. A. Amaron, on his French Work, Rev. J. C. Hamilton, on his work in Jamaica, and Messrs. Chrichton and Linton, who are on their way to South America.

Excellent papers were read by Mrs. Builder, on India, Mr. Thompson, on his work among the Jews in Toronto, and Mr. J. A. G. Macgeoch, on the Jews.

We were glad to have a visit from Miss Margaret McIntosh, on furlough from Honan, who addressed us before leaving to return to her field of labor, which she has reached in safety.

An excellent address was given by Mr. Fred Anderson, in charge of the Elizabeth Street Mission, which showed encouraging results from the faithful and earnest labors of the workers. Much self-sacrificing effort has been freely given to this good work.

Word has been received from time to time, from Mr. Eshoo, giving an account of his good work in Persia, Mr Muirhead, of Whitewood, N.W.T., whom we are now helping to support is expected shortly to visit Toronto. We feel there has been no lack of interest by the Congregation, if we can judge by the contributions.

The separate reports no doubt will show that the Missionary interests in the Christian Endeavor, Sabbath School, Women's Foreign Missionary Society, and Mission Band have been well sustained during the year.

REPORT OF NORMAN H. RUSSELL.

MHOW, CENTRAL INDIA, FOR THE YEAR 1895.

I again take the opportunity of the close of another year to address you a letter on the work of your missionary in India.

Permit me first to thank you for your support both material and spiritual, and for your sympathy and interest in our work in India.

This has been a year of few changes with our congregation, and its surrounding Christian community at Mhow. We have had but one marriage and two deaths. Baptisms from the non-christian community have also not been numerous. Largely on account of the continual persecution the christians have been subjected to in and about Barwai. The wells have been closed to them, they have been wrongfully imprisoned and even torture has been resorted to, to persuade them to give up Christ. The building which I started in the town of Barwai, has been stopped by order of Maharaja Holkar, and we are thus without a place of any kind to hold our meetings. Even the land which I had bought and paid for they refuse to allow me to hold, though I have a stamped receipt for the deed which I registered in their Native Court. These things have acted as a great restraint to those who are enquirers, several of whom were about to come forward for baptism. They naturally feel strongly tempted to remain quiet a while till the trouble blows over.

For those Christians who are in the district we have arranged that they should be visited once or twice a month by the catechists, and taught in the Word. You will be pleased to hear that one of their own people, a young man baptized over two years ago has been under training for some time, and having passed a very creditable examination at the theological classes, is to be set to work among them. He has shown a marked spiritual development since becoming a student, and has given up even tobacco for the Master's sake, though its use is almost universal in India.

For those of our Christian community who are in Mhow, we have a daily class in the morning. At present we are tak-

ing up the "Shorter Catechism" which is now translated into Hindi. On Wednesday evening, we take up the parables of our Lord, the whole congregation being turned into a Bible Class. Communion is held every two months, and is well attended, as in fact are all the services.

For three months of the past year I was associated with Mr. Wilson, in conducting theological classes at Rutlam, for the Bible Workers of the Mission. This was to me most enjoyable and helpful work. Five also of our Mhow workers were able to attend the classes, and I am glad to report that in the higher class Mhow took first and second prizes, and in the lower class, first prize. The subjects taught were Biblical and Systematic Theology, Exegesis of Romans, the Gospels and Introduction, besides Hinduism and Jewism, and how to refute them, and in the lower class, Astronomy.

Three months were spent last cold season in the district at preaching work. We held most enthusiastic meetings in our "Gospel Tent," preaching to crowds of from two to seven hundred people, and numbering in all over 25,000 souls.

We found a ready hearing wherever we went, and many were led to become enquirers. The month spent at Dhar has ripened, as you know, into the opening of the place as a full mission station. My brother, Rev. F. H. Russell, and his wife, together with Miss Dr. O'Hara and Miss Dougan form the staff there, and they report most interesting meetings, a large attendance at the Dispensary, and not a few enquirers The gracious gift of the Maharaja to the mission of 13 bigahs of land for bungalows, and another piece for a hospital was a most propitious opening for the work.

Some time was spent by us among the Bheels. This work also has successfully appealed to the Church, and Dr. Buchanan has been set aside by Presbytery to labor among these people. He and myself being appointed by Council a committee to visit the whole Bheel district, and report as to the most desirable location for head-quarters Spent two weeks in October among the hills, travelling over 160 miles among the Bheels ; and had some most interesting experiences. We have chosen Jhabua as head-quarters, and Dr. Buchanan begins work at once.

Though Mhow field has, by the opening of these new stations, become much contracted, there is still left a very large district sufficient to keep two men continually employed On account of the difficulty encountered in Holkar territory, I have been led to open a new station on British soil in a small tract quite contiguous to the Barwai cluster of villages. As it is quite new, I cannot report as to its success, but we will not experience the troubles we have on native territory. It is, however, a considerable distance from the railway, and will be difficult to supervise at certain seasons, as I found when visiting it last hot season.

We have held and are now holding some very interesting Evangelistic meetings in Mhow, in which our school teachers and others take part. Most of our Christians went to the Mela in Ujjain last October, where they were much blessed. Our Christian children also have been developing. Most of them are in Indore, at the boarding schools. Two of the boys joined the church in full standing last summer; one of the girls has just married a Christian teacher; another boy has been baptized. We have also a number of orphan boys under training with us in Mhow.

The Sunday school work has been carried on vigorously. In our large school we have over 300 of a weekly attendance, besides the many smaller schools in the mohullas and villages. During the hot season we held a large gathering of all our Sunday school children, when prizes were distributed to those who were proficient in the Bible examination. At the close of the meeting a S. S. Convention among the workers was held, and much interest created.

Concerning our schools much of interest could be reported. Especially our High School has had a most successful year. We have prepared four students for the entrance or matriculation examination, and four others are going up for The Government the Government Middle examination. Inspector writes of our schools : "The results of my examination are, on the whole, decidedly satisfactory, and are a very great improvement on those of last year." And again, "Altogether I am much pleased with the general progress effected in the educational work of the mission during the year, especially with the attention devoted to the extension of vernacular education on a sound basis." Of our branch schools, which are the foundation of our Sunday school and preaching work, the same report might be given. We are very anxious to start a library of good English books among

our school boys, but have not the money for it. Perhaps some of you could help by giving us a donation of some good healthful story books.

My brother being appointed to Dhar, I was left alone with the Chaplaincy of the European Presbyterian troops again thrown to my lot. This work I also had for the three months my brother was at the hill. It is a work I most thoroughly enjoy. Our Sunday evening services have been very well attended, as also the weekly prayer-meeting. I have also been able to help the men in their prayer-room meetings, and in March last we had here a most helpful and blessed conference for the deepening of spiritual life, where many My constant mission work, having a daily Bible class and classes in the school, and my very frequent and often long absences from the station, prevent my doing much visiting among the English soldiers. I have a worthy helper, however, in Mr. Drew, who looks after my work when I am absent, shares the Hindi services, and does a great deal of work that would otherwise fall to me, superintending build-

ing work, etc. I am three months in the District, three months at the theological classes, and out on other committee work, being associated with Mr. Campbell in the charge of the Bheel work when Dr. Buchanan goes home on furlough. So I have asked the Presbytery for help, and Dr. Thompson has been placed with me, for his first year to give what assistance he can while learning the language, and in him I know I will find a ready and useful co-adjutor.

For all the Lord's goodness to us, for continued good health, for health to my family, for much assistance from friends both material and spiritual, and for fruit and blessing in the work, I ask you to join with me in thanksgiving. For a continuance of blessing for help to those who are being persecuted, and strength to the weak, that they may become bold, and for all who labor in the Word that they may be blessed with Divine wisdom, and filled with the Holy Ghost, I

ask you to join with me in prayer. May the priests of India's Zion be clothed with salvation,

and may her saints shout aloud for joy. Yours faithfully,

REPORT OF THE LADIES' AID SOCIETY.

We have much pleasure in presenting this our fifteenth annual report. During 1895 sixteen meetings were held, with an average attendance of ten. Much to our regret this shows no advance upon the numbers of 1894.

No advance upon the humbers of rogation we have distributed fuel, food, and clothing to those we have distributed fuel, food, and clothing to those requiring them, and have occasionally given medicine and money. As has been the case for some years back, one aged member of the congregation is maintained at the Aged Women's Home and another at the Old Folk's Home. Large quantities of clothing and quilts have been made and sent to the Elizabeth St. Mission, where they are sold for a small sum, as is also the cast-off clothing. This plan was adopted a few years ago, with a view to encourage a spirit of independence, and to prevent pauperization, and has proved most satisfication.

factory. We regret exceedingly that we have this year to record the fact that our beloved President (who has so ably filled that office for fifteen years) has declared her intention of retiring finally, and will not allow her name to be mentioned for nomination to the position again.

We feel this loss keenly, for apart from Mrs. Meldrum's efficient service, she has endeared herself to the hearts of all who have been brought into contact with her. In addition to this we grieve to say that Mrs. Mitchell, our first Vice-President, has been obliged, owing to ill health, to retire from active work. Mrs. Mitchell, to whom we are all much attached, has been most faithful in performing the most arduous duties of the Society, viz., purchasing all necessary material and cutting out of all garments made by us.

We feel very much depressed at this state of our affairs, and would again appeal to the ladies to come forward and join us in our work, helping us to carry it on without these good workers who have been a host in themselves. "Union is strength." At the close of last year's report, we expressed our confidence that the members of the congregation would

REPORT OF THE AUXILIARY OF THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSION SOCIETY.

In presenting the fifteenth annual report of this Auxiliary, we do so with the feeling of an ever deepening interest in the work, and the desire to do all that lies in our power to advance the spread of the Gospel through all the world.

During the last year we have had the pleasure of hearing addresses by several ladies, who have been actively employed among the dark places. They were Mrs. Goforth, from China; Mrs. Builder, India; Mrs. Walker, Indians at Cape Mudge; Miss Hockin, from the colored people of Virginia; and Miss Watson, President of the Society for the conversion of the Jews in our own city.

A new feature was introduced to further the personal interest of each member, namely, the allotting of a missionary to each one, to write to occasionally, and more than that, to remember specially in prayer. Also, the President and Vice-Presidents took their turn in conducting the monthly meetings. Both of these have proved very satisfactory introductions. We regret to record the calling home of one of our sincere, quiet Life-members, Miss Cobban.

Last year we held 11 meetings, with an average attendance of 27. In October the usual thankoffering meeting was held, when we gathered in \$89.25, an advance on the previous year. In August a good donation of money and clothing was sent to the North-West. We also note a deepening interest among us, in the labors of missionaries to the long neglected Indians.

We have 101 members who take the *Leaflet* and enjoy it; also 9 scattered helpers, who have contributed \$23.40 in their quiet way. There are at present on the roll 80 members; 51 of whom belong to the General Society; 6 to the Auxiliary; and 23 are Life-members. We have contributed \$212.87during the year.

A few of our scholars thinking themselves too big for Sunday School have left off coming, others by change of residence are too far away, and others have been enticed away through other influences; we have also had some changes among the workers, and are very sorry to part with them, more particularly with Mr. Wm. Doran and Miss Mabel Burns (now Mrs. Doran). Mr. and Mrs. Doran have been our co workers for about eight years, Mr. Doran as Librarian and last year Secretary-Treasurer, and Mrs. Doran as teacher. We learned to esteem them both for their faithful and earnest work, and our prayer is that God's richest blessing may rest upon them in their new relationship.

With regard to our work we cannot speak about definite results with any degree of confidence. On the part of some scholars we do feel that the lessons we have studied together last year have proved a blessing to the younger girls and boys. The result has been the formation of a class for instruction in the Word of God and for prayer, meeting on Thursday night from 7 to 8 o'clock. This class is under the care of Messrs. Gordon and Waters and Misses Fisher and Parsons.

We have again to say, that as workers we are conscious of much imperfection, and can only say we have tried to do our duty. Our earnest desire in entering upon the work of this year is that we may have much more of the Spirit of our Lord and Master, Jesus, who went about continually doing good.

On the 21st June we had our usual picnic to Lorne Park, and on the 30th December, our Christmas entertainment, both of which were greatly enjoyed by all. Our thanks are due to our friend Mr. Park for entertaining us at our Christmas meeting with selections from his phonograph. We are very thankful to the many friends in the Central Church, who have aided us with money and provisions on both occasions, also for books for prizes.

The number on the Sabbath School roll at the beginning of the year was 140, the average attendance for the year 82; average attendance of teachers and officers, 20. Total average attendance of all, 102. Contributed by the Sunday School, \$48.84.

The Cottage Meetings which are held every Tuesday evening at the house of Mrs. Harris, 7 Foster Place, and Mrs. Barton's, 168 Centre Avenue, are being greatly blessed. Sometimes there are as many as twenty present and never less than twelve at one meeting.

MOTHERS' MEETING.

In presenting our fifteenth annual report of the work in connection with this interesting branch of church work, it is with a feeling of good work having been done, and a greater interest having been awakened among the members of the class sought more especially to be reached by means of the meetings of mothers. The work has been advanced considerably, and the outlook is very hopeful for even greater success in the future. Looking over the work as a whole for the past year, we feel there is much cause for thankfulness on our part to our Heavenly Father for having permitted us to meet week after week to study His own Word, and apply its lessons to the every day work of life, as rule and guide. We take up the Sunday School lesson, and study it carefully and prayerfully, sending its influence into many homes to brighten and cheer. We would again thank the Ladies' Aid for the help so kindly given to us through the past year, for our weekly teas, the well made garments and warm quilts, the cast-off clothing and also the coal for the aged and infirm. Their work is truly a labor of love. We have forty regular members, and there have been thirty meetings during the year, the attendance at the meetings being very encouraging indeed. The times have been very hard and the cry "no work" makes the heart of the workers sad; but the Master says "The poor ye have with you always," and we know that with His blessing all will be well. We know by past experience that the influence for good of the Mother's Meetings has been greatly blessed, and we enter upon the work of the year now opening with an earnest desire to follow in the footsteps of the Great Shepherd, and to profit by His example, in helping the poor, the needy, and the distressed.
