In the coming year we enter on the work of liquidating the long standing debt of the Church.

As the congregation are aware, arrangements were made for this purpose three years ago. Contemporaneously with the adjustment of the ground-rent income from the Parliament-street property your Churchwardens of that year effected a rearrangement of the old standing debenture debt of \$75,000; it had formerly borne six per cent. interest, it now bears four and a-half per cent. At the same time it was arranged that the principal of the debt should be payable by instalments spread over twelve years. The landed income as it comes in half-yearly is appropriated to meet the instalments of principal and interest, which are also made payable half-yearly. The ground-rents produce within \$500 of the annual sum required to meet these payments. \$500 will require to be provided by this Vestry from year to year to carry out this scheme; by which, at the end of twelve years, the Cathedral Church of St. James, for the first time since its erection in 1849, will stand entirely free from debt. We ask the help of the congregation to accomplish this satisfactory result, by increasing their contributions to the required extent. We must make another demand on the liberality of the congregation. The past year, for the first time since 1885, in obedience to repeated requests from members of the congregation, the long vacant post of Assistant Minister was filled, in addition to that of Curate. This addition to the staff involves an addition to our expenditure of \$1,500. If the service of the Church is to be maintained in its present efficiency, the congregation will require to provide this sum by an addition to their present contributions. Altogether \$2,000 more income requires to be raised. Part of this is of the nature of payments in discharge of an encumbrance upon the Church--the land, building, income and pews. We therefore propose at an early moment to call the attention of the owners of freehold pews to the Many of these are now absentee landlords. We do not think they will expect their tenants to discharge the debt upon their property.

Now that we must contemplate increased charges, partly occasioned by the repayment of the funded debt, if it were proposed to provide this by an increase of pew rents, it would seem to be the natural and equitable course to charge the freehold pews with their share of the increase. They constitute fully one-half of the occupied pews of the Church. We propose to ask their owners to contribute

in some manner in a fair proportion. If they consent, it will leave about \$1,000 to be provided by members of the congregation. It will amount to about twenty per cent. addition to the amount now received from pew rents, envelope subscriptions and miscellaneous collections; and we think it will be preferable to ask it in the form of a systematic increase of voluntary contributions under the envelope system, rather than by raising the rents of the pews.

With these additions to our income we may look forward to maintaining the establishment of the Church in its present efficiency, and the services in their present beauty; while looking forward to the assured future which awaits the Church at the end of twelve years, when, freed from debt, it will possess a landed income ample for its support. If to this be added the income from an accumulating fund produced by sales of Cemetery lots and lands, the two funds will be ample to provide for the future care of the Cemetery, and also to place the future work of the Church beyond all doubt and danger.

With these cheering prospects, we hope that the income required in the meantime will be readily provided by the congregation; that they will also liberally support the effort, which the ladies have kindly undertaken, to provide for the suitable completion of the organ. The addition of a more convenient choir-vestry will be another matter for your consideration.

In submitting the report of the Morning Sunday School, it is hoped and believed that the work has been faithfully performed. Much praise is due to the Teachers who, in almost every case, have a great distance to come, but who, nevertheless, are, on the whole, always found regularly and punctually at their posts. It may be said here that, although the present staff is an efficient one, there is always room for more Teachers, as some of the Classes are too large to allow of the individual attention being given to the Scholars which they should receive.

By the adoption of the same Hymn Book as that used in the Church Services, the School has undoubtedly been benefited.

Upon two occasions the Morning and Afternoon Schools have joined together in an afternoon Service, held in the Church, and addressed by one of the Clergy. For good reasons the usual Summer Picnic was not given last year; but the Christmas Festival was held on Tuesday, 30th December, 1890, and the prize distribution at the same time.

The decrease in attendance, appearing this year may be accounted for as follows:—The Rector's Bible Class, formerly included in the statistics of the School, and composed of the young ladies attending one of the large city Boarding Schools, is now held by him upon a week-day at the Boarding School residence. Another cause may be found in the growing competition which exists in the neighbourhood of our Sunday School, and from which we have no doubt suffered. Also, each year the homes of the scholars are being removed to such great distances from the School that we can hardly expect to retain our strength of numbers.

The establishment of the Afternoon School at which there is now an attendance of 200, has naturally deducted from the attendance of the Morning School. In fact both Schools now make up the former attendance at the Morning School.

There is now a large class composed of some of the junior Church Choristers, and instructed by Rev. J. G. Lewis.

We have also had the pleasure of hearing interesting accounts of personal experience in mission work among the Indians from the Bishop of Saskatchewan; Archdeacon Phair of Winnipeg, and the Rev. Mr. Tims of the Blackfoot Reserve, Gleichen, N.-W.T.; also from Mr. Lewis of Petewawa, in the Upper Ottawa District, an account of mission work amongst the settlers and lumbermen.

The correspondence has also added to the interest in the work of the Dorcas department. Letters have been received from the Rev. W. T. Bourne and Mrs. Bourne; the Rev. Henry Rollings of Manitowaning, Manitoulin Island; the Rev. James Boydell of Bracebridge, Ont.; the Rev. George Scott of Windsor, Ont.; the Rev. Chas. Piercy, Sudbury, Algoma; the Rev. E. Soward and Mrs. Soward, Kinmount, Ont.; all acknowledging with much gratitude the assistance given them by the Dorcas department of this Society.

This Society continues to pay annually:—

\$400 towards the stipend of the Rev. W. T. Bourne of the Piegan Mission, near Fort Macleod.

\$30 towards the salary of Miss Perkes, lady missionary on the Blackfoot Reserve, and Miss Brown's successor.

\$10 towards the support of the Blackfoot Home for girls, in charge of Miss Perkes.

\$25 towards the salary of \$200 for a lay reader in the township of Temiscaminque.

\$100 to the Nipigeon Mission, Algoma, in charge of the Rev. R. Renison.

\$12 towards the rent of the Central rooms on Yonge street for the use of the Dorcas Department of the Woman's Auxiliary.

At the Quarterly Meeting of the Mission Board it was thought advisable to appoint a travelling missionary in each Rural Deanery, and an appeal was made to the Woman's Auxiliary to raise \$500 annually towards the support of a travelling missionary in the Rural Deanery of Haliburton.

In response to the appeal made by the President of the Woman's Auxiliary for assistance from the Branches St. James' Cathedral Branch undertook to raise \$100 towards the amount.

A letter was received by the Treasurer from Canon O'Meara, St. John's College, Winnipeg, "enclosing a full statement of all subscriptions which were promised from members of the St. James' Cathedral Congregation and a cash voucher for money received," hoping that this Society would undertake to collect the second and third instalments of the yearly subscriptions and forward the same in bulk to him.

There has been an increase in the membership by card; 93 being the present number, and 76 subscribers to the Monthly Letter Leaflet.

Mrs. Strachan and Mrs. Wyld were re-elected delegates to the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary which was held in St. James' School-house last May.

We have a total membership of 184, not including the young ladies of Miss Veal's school, and the Upper Canada College Boys who have assisted us so generously.

In concluding we thank all those who have so kindly assisted us by

their subscriptions, and donations of clothing and toys for the Mission boxes; but more particularly we thank those who have encouraged us by their presence and kind assistance in the work committed to our charge, and try to induce others to become earnest workers in the St. James' Cathedral Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, whose mottos are "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might" for "The love of Christ constraineth us."

BROTHERHOOD OF ST. ANDREW.

ST. JAMES' CATHEDRAL CHAPTER.

In the report of last year mention was made of the field that our parish presented for work for our Chapter, and the hope was expressed that the organization would duplicate the good work being done by it in several parishes in the States. And in reviewing the year's work there is certainly no cause for discouragement for, although in a work which consists in great part of personal efforts it is difficult to make a definite report, yet there can be no question but that there has been a large increase in the attendance of men at the Sunday evening services, which is cause for thankfulness and encouragement.

A course of four special sermons to young men was preached on Sunday evenings, once a month, in the Cathedral, during the winter. The preachers were: Very Rev. Dean Carmichael, of Montreal; Very Rev. Dean Robbins, of Albany; Rev. Prof. Clark, and Rev. Allan M. Pitman. The members of the Chapter advertised extensively these services, and were rewarded by finding the Church crowded at each service, three quarters of the congregation being men. We cannot help feeling that these services must have been the means of doing good among the class for whom they were intended; and it is our intention to petition the Rector to make the course an annual one.

But what we have done in the past ought to stimulate us to redouble our efforts in the future, and to effect this a new plan of action is now being discussed,—it is the formation of a "Men's Reading Room." Beginning in the fall, we intend to try and establish this important medium in one of the districts of the parish, and, we venture to hope, make it a great means of communication between the Clergy and the men of the parish. We will not dwell on this plan at present, as we will probably have occasion to bring it to the

some of the older members interested in our work.

We would not do justice to our report if we did not notice briefly the Convention of the Canadian Chapters of the Brotherhood, held in Toronto last February. Anyone who was present at the meetings and services of this convention must have been impressed with the intense earnestness and loyalty to the cause displayed by the young men attending. The service on the Sunday evening, when our immense Cathedral was crowded with a congregation, the great majority of whom were men, and the singing and responses, led by our efficient choir, were joined in with a heartiness seldom heard, was, as a Toronto paper put it, "an inspiration." The Council of the Brotherhood deserves to be congratulated on the success of the convention.

Before concluding this report we would beg to mention a few practical details. Our members are twelve in number, all young, but in order to manage the reading-room properly it will be necessary to increase our membership to twenty, and to have as members some of the more experienced laymen of the congregation, but we do not anticipate any trouble in this. We have held meetings fortnightly, at which the work has been discussed, and numbers of young men have been visited. Our work in the Summer will necessarily lag owing to some of the members being out of town, but it will be resumed in September with, we hope, redoubled vigour.

We conclude our report with a sense of thankfulness for the past,

and encouragement for the future.

We would emphasize this point for the better fulfilment of the society's original aims and objects.

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It is further to be hoped that ere long something may be done by the Cathedral authorities in the direction of providing a reading room, gymnasium, etc., for young men in this quarter of the city, as there is reason for believing that such a privilege would receive the hearty co-operation and support of the Y. M. A., our parochial branch of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, and many others.
