Booth, the head of the Salvation Army, who is engaged in a motor tour of Great Britain, announced on Sunday at Black-burn, Lancashire, that the same electric flash that carried the news of his death would publish the name of the new general. It is learned that General Booth has left minute directions for the future ad-ministration of the army in a sealed envelope with his solicitors. No one eleknows who his successor will be, but is believed that it will be Bramwell Booth with Commander Howard and Command Bramwell Booth's death, and that the army will continue under the guidance of one man, and not of a committee or a board of directors.
