MUCH DISORDER IN RUSSIA YET

Social Revolutionists Still Making Much Trouble IN THE CAUCASUS

Trans-Caucasian Railroad Now in Operation for First Time in Months—Fears of Renewal of Armenian-Tartar Butchery Did Not Materialize.

TIFLIS, Caucasus, Jan. 31.—The assassination of General Grigoroff on Monday last has brought to a head the discontent among the officers of the military which regards with disfavor the policy of the victors of the Caucasus, Count Von Vorontoff-Dashkof, in the war between the Tartars and the Armenians.

It is established that the murder of General Grigoroff, a member of the fighting organization of the social revolutionists. He was selected for his removal and they are secretly supported by high officials of the vicerealty.

The whole revolutionary movement in the Caucasus was an echo of the movement in Russia proper. It was conducted by workmen of various nationalities under the leadership of Russian social democratic agitators, and is being gradually stamped out in Kutais, Mingrelia and the Black Sea littoral.

The forces of the renewal of the Armenian-Tartar butchery following the assassination of General Grigoroff happily did not materialize. Both sides were ready, but the troops were everywhere in force and no collisions occurred.

Annual Meeting of Canadian Society For Prevention of Tuberculosis to be held in Ottawa.

The sixth annual meeting of the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Consumption and other forms of Tuberculosis will be held in the railway committee room of the house of commons on the 28th of March next. Hon. Senator Edwards will preside in the afternoon. In the evening a public lecture will be delivered in the lecture hall of the Normal School by Dr. Arthur J. Richer of Montreal which will be illustrated with stereoscopic plates showing the stages of consumption and some of the appliances now in use to check and cure the disease. The lecture will be given in the evening by His Excellency, Earl Grey.

EUROPE IS BEARISH ON FINANCIAL SITUATION

A Wave of Caution—Is the Wall Street Market Top-Heavy? —Why the Bank of England Is so Extensively "Loaned Up"—The Problem of Russia.

(Special to N. Y. Evening Post.) LONDON, January 29.—A wave of caution seems for the moment to be passing over all of the world's financial markets. On this side of the Atlantic, it seems to be chiefly due to dislike of the Radical supremacy at the polls in our general election, to the Morocco dispute, to the continued doubts over Russian finance, and to uncertainty as to your own market's real position.

BUSINESS AND SHARE VALUES

An Unvarying Front of Strength and Apparent Permanency is Presented. J. H. Davis & Co., New York.—It is only once in many years that the financial and business conditions of this or any other country present an unvarying front of strength and apparent permanency. Such is the situation in this country today, and it is difficult to speak even in terms of moderation of the extraordinary facts of course, there will be a reaction and a less period, but so far as one can judge, the early future, there is no serious check in sight. It is not strange, therefore, that speculative interest in securities is being carried to a degree which has not been known since the days of the gold and silver boom.

IT LOOKS LIKE EASIER MONEY

A Chicago View of the Present Market and the Outlook. CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—A decided easing up in the money market is noticeable, as rather more than most bankers expected three weeks ago, after the stringency. Money has loaned this week at low as 5 per cent, in large amounts in a few instances, but most of the money put out was at 5 1/2 per cent, and some of the national banks secured 6. Commercial paper is increasing in supply, and broken and local and interior bankers are buying it more readily at 5 to 5 1/2 per cent. Funds are returning from the interior in larger volume, and shipments of currency are decreasing. The movement from the interior should be larger from this time forward. Many country bankers are increasing their balances here, which is taken as an indication that there is less call for their funds at home. Deposits of local banks are keeping up well, and with some institutions they have increased since the first of the year. This was due in a measure to the distribution of the Walsh accounts.

HOPEFUL OF RUSSIA
A French economist, M. Paul Leroy-Beaulieu, in a survey of Russia's financial position, declares that if social, political, and economic order has been fairly re-established by next spring or early summer, which he regards as probable, he thinks Russia's credit can be restored to the former position without great difficulties.

THE FERRY COMMITTEE

Whatever the ferry committee has done or may do, it is to be credited with making the responsibility of heads of departments a live issue. It recommended that the ferry superintendents be given power to suspend or dismiss employees.

A PURCHASING AGENT

There is some talk of appointing a purchasing agent for the city, to do all the buying for all the departments, instead of having it done for each department by the director or superintendent.

The present conditions prove nothing as to Russia's financial future. However, order must be restored in the first half of 1906. Then new taxes must be levied, and parasitical growths in the budget must be amputated.

THE SPRUCE MARKET
The British spruce market is not at present in a firm condition. There is some disposition to clear stocks at a reduction and there seems to be a wide range in quotations. It is an interesting fact that though Galatz spruce, from Black Sea ports, is not giving the best of satisfaction, it is nevertheless quite a keen competitor of Canadian spruce.

IT WAS A SURPRISE
At the City Hall yesterday, Ald. Macrae sprang a little surprise on two members and an ex-member of the Canadian parliament. They were the Hon. A. G. Blair, Senator Thompson and Dr. A. A. Stockton, M. P., who appeared before the board of works in connection with the affairs of the New Brunswick Telephone Company.

MILLIONS IN RAILWAYS
Increased railway construction in the Dominion is one of the best indications of the confidence which prevails in the development of the country. It is estimated that extensions have been undertaken which during the next three or five years will add 7,444 miles to the railway now in operation.

DRINK MORE WATER
Free water drinking is another essential to vitality and to the development of staying power. 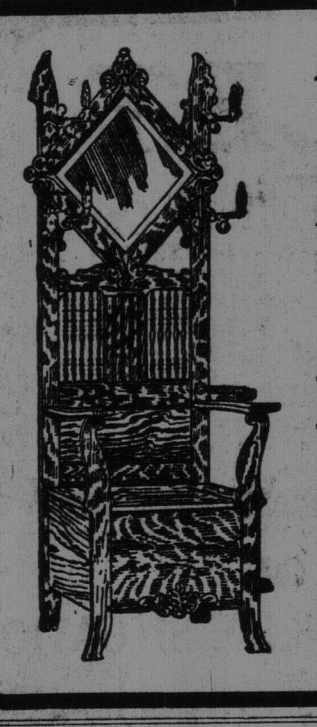

President of Santo Domingo and His Possible Successor

Sancti Spiritus, Santo Domingo, Jan. 28.—General Caceres' friends are surprised to learn that he objects to serving out President Morales' unexpired term and proposes to call an election so that a new president may be inaugurated on Feb. 27, the Independence Day of the republic, when the chamber of deputies will meet.

One reason of General Caceres' popularity is that he has the reputation of being the only politician who is not anxious to "chase the turtles," as Dominicans refer to the presidential bee in the bonnet.

General Caceres is now in Moca, the scene of his killing President Herrera. He is said to be anxious to resign the presidency in favor of General Horacio Vasquez, who is with him and who may run for the presidency, although he has announced that he does not wish office again.

His brother, General Leonie Vasquez, business, and requires that all consular fees shall be accounted for.

The shipping bill was under consideration for a time. It was amended so as to relieve it from constitutional objections, and Mr. Lodge delivered a speech in support of the bill, in which he gave the details of a combination of the owners of foreign sailing vessels for the purpose of controlling the freight rate on grain shipments from the United States.

There also was a discussion of the bill making common carriers liable for injuries to employees, which arose over the question of their reference to committees. Some of the senators intimated that the committee were anxious to avoid the responsibility of passing on these measures.

A YOUNG GIRL ENDS HER LIFE

Mabel Bell, an English Immigrant in W. G. Salmon's Home, Killed Herself With Revolver.

Pretty fifteen-year-old Mabel Bell took her own life yesterday afternoon a little after 3 o'clock at the home of W. G. Salmon, 34 Golding street. She shot herself with a thirty-two calibre revolver.

It was at once seen that the girl was not dead, though she did not appear to recognize either of the women. Dr. Murray MacLaren was immediately summoned, but long ere he had arrived the young life was gone.

Coroner Berryman has just said that he proposed today making further inquiries into the affair, and would then determine as to whether or not he would hold an inquest. In the meantime he has notified Mr. Salmon that arrangements for the burial be made before Thursday at the earliest.

Frank A. Gator, of Halifax, who is the Chamberlain of the Middlemore Home, was located at Sussex, and he looked after the funeral arrangements. Little Miss Bell looks quite peaceful as she lies in a casket in a room in the home. It is hard to think as one looks on the little form, that she had been the principal in a tragedy of this nature.

It was suggested that the shooting might have been accidental but the coroner is believed, however, to have used the property of Mr. Salmon's son Charles and he kept it in a box in one of the bureau drawers in his room.

FREE TRADE IN EMPIRE. British Elections Changed Political Views of W. I. Gear—Was a Chamberlainite.

Montreal, Jan. 30.—(Special)—The result of the elections in Great Britain seems to be turning the tide in Montreal against Mr. Chamberlain for, this afternoon W. I. Gear, retiring president of the board of trade, advocated free trade with the empire, but he did not think that the policy of the late colonial secretary would work out to that end.

This especially looks like a turning when it is remembered that just before the elections in England Mr. Gear presided at a meeting in the board of trade rooms which was addressed by Alfred Moseley, Chamberlain's ambassador to Canada, and at which a resolution was passed expressive of confidence in the policy that had just been outlined.

The occasion of Mr. Gear's address to-day was the annual meeting. In following up this subject the retiring president declared that the British electors would never consent to the imposition of taxes until it could be assured that those taxes would not have to be paid by themselves. But he thought that if the colonies were to approach the British also, and say:

CITY SPRINGS SURPRISE ON TELEPHONE COMPANY

Application Heard For Permission to Lay Conduits Under the Streets—Ald. Macrae says Section of 'Phone Company's Act Was Ordered Repealed and Franchise Accordingly Limited—Other Business Done by Board of Works.

At a meeting of the board of works yesterday, Hon. A. G. Blair, Senator Thompson and Dr. A. A. Stockton, M. P., were heard on behalf of the N. B. Telephone Company, with reference to putting conduits under the streets.

A statement by Ald. Macrae that the act incorporating the company had been dissolved by the minister of justice as a surprise to the deputation who said they had never heard of it.

Mr. Blair repeated he had never heard of it. Mr. Thompson added that it was the first time he had knowledge of the question laid before him.

Mr. Thompson said he was willing to give all we can. After thanking the board the deputation withdrew.

Mr. Blair read a copy of the resolution of the council dated July 3 in which, in return for the permission, the company was asked to give twenty-five free city telephones.

Mr. Blair—'I am not prepared to agree.' Mr. Blair—'I am sure you are not prepared to deny it.'

Mr. Blair—'I am prepared to say I did not do it in the street.' Mr. Blair—'I am prepared to say you had a good deal to do with it.'

Mr. Blair—'I don't say your interest is very large. Although the baby is small case it serves the purpose, but you thought your company should have the same rights as we now have.'

Mr. Blair—'I am not prepared to say I will take all cables down where conduits are placed. I must admit I was ignorant of the fact that cables are running along streets with conduits.'

Mr. Blair—'Was not the ninth section of your company's act dissolved by the minister of justice?'

Mr. Thompson—'The view taken was that the Bell Telephone Company had certain rights.'

RICHARDS CO. MUST PAY \$25,000 INTO THE COURT

Pending Result of W. C. Winslow's Suit Against Big Lumber Company—Judge Orders Them to Put Up Security for Mr. Winslow's Claim.

Fredericton, Jan. 30.—(Special)—In the equity court here this evening Judge Barker made an order in the case of Warren C. Winslow vs. Wm. Richards Co., Ltd., calling upon the defendants to pay into court \$25,000 as security for Mr. Winslow's claim.

The hearing in the case was set down for the third Tuesday in February at St. John, N. B., before Judge Barker.

When court opened Mr. Curry moved to have the injunction dissolved so that the Richards Company could pay the balance of the \$80,000 held up on the strength of an injunction granted by Judge Barker on the application of Mr. Winslow.

Mr. Curry said that the amount of plaintiff's claim was only \$17,000, and that the balance of the \$63,000 which they were justly entitled to receive had been secured over by the amount of Mr. Winslow's claim providing the injunction was dissolved.

A. GORDON LEAVITT CORRECTS A STATEMENT OF MR. WISELY

Says The Natural History Society Has Not Sub-Let Its Rooms In Market Building, or Derived Any Revenue From Them

To the Editor of the Times: Sir—Will you kindly allow me space to refer to the article in this evening's issue re the societies and the market building or rather the portion of same which was referred to in the article.

This was given as Director Wisely's report, and if the director made any such remark he will no doubt be given an opportunity of explaining himself to the Historical Society.

I am not connected with that society but with the Natural History Society of N. B., which latter is the one occupying the top floor and the one below it, and it is for fear that the citizens who happen to know this might imagine that the Natural History Society was deriving a revenue from their quarters, that I wish to explain our position.

In order that the citizens may thoroughly understand our position let me state that the provincial government kindly assists us with a grant that just about pays for the publication of our bulletins and thereby allows us to lay before the scientific world the results of the labors of our members.

We further, without even dreaming of making one dollar, arrange and carry out a series of lectures to which all are invited.

It would be possible for any organization to do more. Will the day ever come when our citizens will realize the great benefits to be derived from a collection such as our society possesses, if the same was suitably housed?

Surely no one will doubt the value of collections of food fishes, metals, buildings, fossils, beneficial birds, beneficial and injurious insects, native grasses and woods, and the forms to protect our great and fossil departments which, and which only, enable man to read of prehistoric times.

Where, may I ask, is there a city the size of St. John that has not been provided with a suitable building for the display of collections of this kind as I have mentioned; where also could a city the size of St. John be found that would not at once provide suitable quarters for such a valuable collection as our society possesses?

I sincerely hope that our society will move and move into quarters suited for the proper protection and display of our valuable collection in order that the people of this city and province may be able to profit by the inspection of thousands of specimens of plants and animals that are so common to the homes of the Natural History Society of New Brunswick.

OLD CANNON FOR SQUARE

Relic of French Occupation to Be Mounted in the Queen Square by Historical Society.

An old French cannon was discovered recently in making an excavation in the vicinity of Barrack square twenty feet below the surface. The Historical Society are now the custodians of the relic and it is a suitable carriage can be found it will be mounted in Queen square.

The property on which the cannon was found was at one time part of or adjoining the John Fisher shipyard. On this account it was claimed by Mr. Fisher's descendants. This was arranged and the old gun was the undoubted property of the government, possession being taken by Col. A. J. Armstrong, military engineer.

The Historical Society, hearing of the matter, a letter was sent to Ottawa asking that they be appointed custodians and D. R. Jack, secretary, was able to report a favorable answer. A meeting of the Historical Society last night.

It is supposed that the cannon is as old as the first imperial cartridge on the site and was likely used to mark the boundary of the military property.

These arms for compensation or losses sustained during the war. They were collected by a royal commission and filed in Washington.
