

JEWS IN TORONTO CIVIC POLITICS

nitial Mass Meeting is Held---

May Run a Candidate for Council. (Toronto World, Monday.)

A campaign is on foot in the "ward" for the formation of a Jawish party to take a hand in municipal politics.

With this end in view a mass meeting of the Polish-Jewish congregations of the city was held in the Elm street Synagogue yesterday. The place was crowded, and attended by all the prominent and representative Hebrews in the city. Mr. Garfunkel occupied the chair, and in calling upon Harold P. Donn to address the meeting, remarked in a manner which might suggest a coming candidate, should the party get the required recognition that that gentleman was a very active and energetic apostle of "Jewish rights."

Mr. Donn advocated the need of a Jewish representative in the municipal council, advancing the argument that in consideration of the great percentage of taxes they were paying into the treasury, and because of having a vote of over 3,000 in the city, they were entitled to a seat in the council chamber, providing the right sort of man was found to represent them.

A collection toward the campaign fund was taken up, amounting to \$75.

It was decided to hold various meetings throughout the ward during the next two months.






