HEROIC CREW OF SCHOONER SIROCCO FROM ST. JOHN, N. B.

Perched On the Roof of the After House, the Vessel Waterlogged and Stores Ruined, They Refuse Help and Drift On For Cuba.

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—Somewhere far out in the Atlantic, off the Florida coast, half a dozen men perched on the roof of the after-house of the waterlogged British schooner Sirocco, are struggling against wind and sea, to reach a Cuban port with their almost hopeless charge.

CHICAGO, Oct. 24.—W. J. Stewart, 30 years of age, 23 Wilcox Avenue, Toronto, Ont., was found dead in a bathroom at the Saratoga Hotel last night. It is believed Stewart committed suicide by shooting himself through the brain.

GREAT INCREASE IN IMMIGRATION

OTTAWA, Oct. 24.—(Special.)—The total immigration to Canada for July and August was 35,300. There were received at the three ocean ports, 26,007, and from the United States, 9,287. The arrivals for the same period last year were 22,468 showing an increase of 12,831 for the same two months of the current year. This shows 57 per cent of an increase, or 59 per cent on the ocean arrivals and 63 per cent on those from the United States.

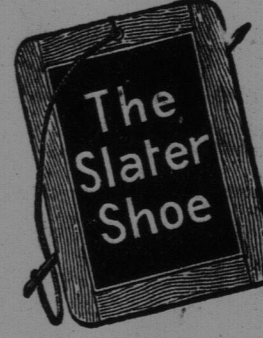

Advance of Discount Rate by Bank of England a Move in the Great Game of Checkers--Effect of Mr. Shaw's Order.

(New York Herald Monday) By unanimous consent, the great event of the financial week was the action of the governors of the Bank of England in unexpectedly advancing its minimum discount rate to six per cent, a rate which has ruled only four times in more than twenty-five years.

BUTTERMILK AS CURE FOR DRUNKENNESS

Dr. Latham, Known as the "Buttermilk Doctor" in New York to Advance His Theory

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—Dr. Edward C. Latham, popularly known among his patients as "the buttermilk doctor," is in New York to advance the theory which he has maintained for more than a quarter of a century, that the craving for strong drink can be overcome without the use of drugs or the so-called "gold cures," by the use of a cheap nutritive natural liquid, which in his own experience has cured more than 1,000 cases and has brought happiness to that many homes.

"My friends regard me as a crank on this subject," said Dr. Latham to a reporter in the Fifth Avenue Hotel, "and I am quite willing that I should be so regarded. I am, and have been all my life, opposed to the use of alcohol except where it is administered in medicinal doses for the purpose of heart stimulation. Drunkenness is a disease. I do not mean that I think that a patient demands a drink before breakfast to induce an appetite, and many drinks during the day to stir up a tired mentality."

THE DREDGING

The vindication of Director Cushing goes on apace. After all the wild assertions in certain quarters about the condition of the berths at Sand Point, the board of works has adopted a report which endorses Director Cushing's views with respect to the dredging.

The above is a fair statement of the case as it appears after last night's meeting of the board of works. It follows that the delegations to Ottawa and Boston were unnecessary, and the panic that suddenly overtook some members of the council, some members of the board of trade and some newspapers was without just cause.

Toronto papers are taking note of the fact that the mortality from consumption can be reduced by proper measures. The News quotes this statement from the last annual address of Dr. E. E. Kitchen, ex-president of the provincial board of health.

THE SOCIAL PROBLEM

To better equip the weaker members of society to earn their own living rather than to give them charity was the keynote of last night's meeting of the Associated Charities. The speakers were on the ground. The work ought to begin in the homes, but because in so many cases it does not, the responsibility falls upon society at large, and it is not doing its full duty either in the schools or in the helpful agencies that should guard the children and encourage and stimulate the older ones who perhaps feel that they are down and out in the struggle of life.

While Mrs. Hall's statement that St. John is generous to its suffering ones is true of cases brought to the attention of the charitable, it is nevertheless a fact that society as a whole is far too indifferent and does not manifest sufficient zeal in getting at the causes of poverty and suffering and removing them.

The London correspondent of the New York Evening Post has a very high opinion of the ability and statesmanship of M. Clemenceau, the new premier of France. He says: "The new prime minister is recognized as the strongest statesman in France, and his best powers will be needed to cope with the coming crisis over the law of public worship. It is not so well known that he may work a revolution in French official life. In a recent speech he declared his hostility to the army of place-hunters who hang on the skirts of departmental administration. Young Frenchmen prefer a small official position to the exertions of trade or industry. M. Clemenceau would discourage perverted ambition."

The city council will probably not adopt the recommendation to remove these west side leases for seven years. As the Times pointed out last evening, the dry dock and other things incidental to west side trade development are concerned in this affair. The future of the port of St. John has a larger outlook than would be implied by the tying up of that property in the manner suggested.

The action of female suffragists in attempting to force their way into the British parliament will have the effect not only of directing public attention to their demands, but also of discrediting their cause. Nothing is gained by such an unseemly course of action.

Have the members of the council forgotten that Hon. Mr. Hyman was willing to have the cost of a certain amount of extra dredging charged up to his department if it were necessary?

REGINA, Sask., Oct. 23--The full court met this afternoon at three o'clock and handed down judgment in the controversial elections ordinance. Albert Alexander, petitioner and appellant, and Hon. John H. Lamont, respondent. Each of the five judges handed down a separate opinion, three in favor of dismissal of the appeal and two dissenting from the majority decision.

While the doctors were examining him he fell asleep and has been in that condition ever since.

He lies in bed, frowning heavily all the time. His limbs are flexible, but his skin has lost its color. He shows sensibility when food is placed to his lips and chews it mechanically.

Owing to the great necessity for increased accommodation in all departments of work the committee of management of the Montreal Sailors' Institute has been carrying on negotiations with the agents of the William Dow estate for the purchase of the property adjoining the present institution, and a meeting today was held to discuss the matter.

The new purchase of the property, however, is the most insignificant portion of the plan proposed, for an expenditure of between fifty and six hundred dollars, the aim being to make the institute the peer of any similar institution in the world.

In addition to the new buildings, the present building will undergo a thorough remodeling and renovation, and the roof will be raised considerably higher than it is at present.

A striking feature of the new plans is a roof garden, the first of the kind in the city, which will extend over the entire roof of the new building, and afford great advantages for the holding of summer concert.

The chief feature of the remodeling of the building and its large addition will be the increased accommodation in all departments. A billiard hall with a billiard table, a billiard room, and a billiard room, and a game room, 55 by 65 feet, making an area of 3,575 square feet, will be provided for the sale of indoor games.

There are many detailed improvements planned which cannot fail to add greatly to the appearance and attractiveness of the institute.

He said he believed that when all the projected plans were carried into effect the Montreal Sailors' Institute would be one of the best in the world.

Mr. Bell said that the institute was a very young one, and that it was his duty to see that it was kept up to date and that it was one of the best in the world.

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VERIGHEN TO CONFER WITH COUNT TOLSTOY

He Expects More Doukhobors to Come to Canada, But Has Not Learned to Speak English Himself—The Progress of the Colony.

Peter Verighen, the chief of the Canadian Doukhobors, arrived in Montreal Saturday, says the Witness, on his way to Moscow, via London.

He is accompanied by several of his companions, among them his daughter, Miss Anastasia Verighen, his secretary, Simon Bankin, and Basil Masourenko, who had the task of surveying the route of the Grand Trunk Pacific across the territory of the Doukhobor colony.

Though he has been seven years in Canada, Mr. Verighen does not speak English, but he speaks several other languages, the secretary acting as interpreter. He is a big man, over six feet in height, well set up, with the air of a prosperous business man. He is believed to be very rich, and is said to have made his fortune in the timber trade.

At the commencement of this autumn, the preliminary work was begun in each village for the construction of schools. The Doukhobors in the Canadian West. Our colony is composed of 48 villages, between Yorkton and the River Swan. The distribution of the Doukhobor earth is made with the greatest impartiality. Everyone is proprietor of the ground he lives on, but the products of the soil are held in common in each village, and are distributed among all according to the measure of their need. In each village are big granaries for storing the produce, and the produce is kept in these until the time comes to sell them.

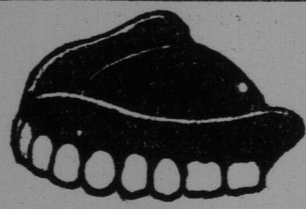

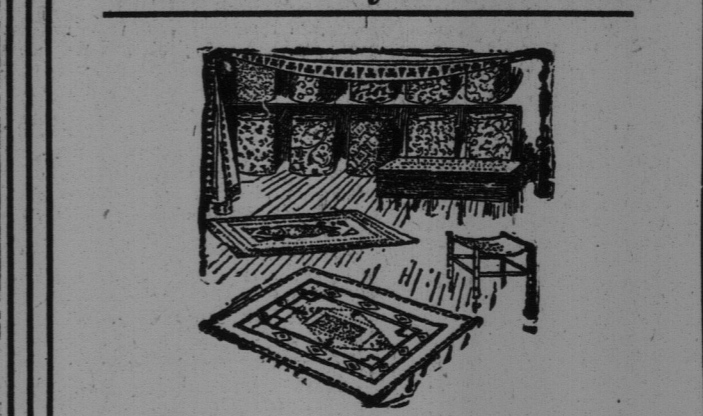
