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LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,

As adopted at a General Meeting of the Society, held in the City of Toronto, on the 3rd Day of August, 1855, and amended at General Meetings held on the 13th day of April, 1880, 18th day of November, 1887, and 30th day of May, 1895.

[UNDER THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.]

ARTICLE I. This Society shall be denominated the "UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY," having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society—that is, the circulation of the Bible without note or comment.

II. This Society shall endeavor to unite all Bible Societies in the Province, and to concentrate their operation, in order to give more efficiency to the whole.

III. This Society shall maintain, in the City of Toronto, a general depot of Bibles and Testaments, from which all Societies in connection with it shall be supplied with the Scriptures at the lowest price at which they can be afforded.

IV. The business of the Society shall be carried on by a Board of Directors, to consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer and Secretaries, and a Representative from each Branch, as provided in Article V., together with twenty clerical and twenty lay members, so selected as to give the Board always, as before, a representative character as regards the principal religious bodies interested in the work of the Society, five of whom shall form a quorum. The three clerical and three lay members who shall have attended the least number of meetings of the Board shall not be eligible for re-election, except in cases where the non-attendance has arisen from illness or absence from the city, in which cases the Board may nominate such member or members for re-election.

V. Each Branch Society shall be entitled to a representative on the General Board. The President of the Branch shall be ex officio such representative, or any other resident member v hom the Committee may appoint as a substitute, who shall be a member of such Branch.

VI. At any meeting of the Directors the President, or in his absence the Vice-President first upon the list then present, and in absence of such Vice-President, the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be chosen for that purpose, shall preside.

VII. Each person paying annually one dollar shall be a member of this Society; and persons paying fifty dollars at any one time, either to this Society of to any of the Societies in connection therewith, or through them to the British and Foreign Bible Society, or who may have rendered important services, shall, at the discretion of the Directors, be declared Life Members.

VIII. Each Life Member of this Society shall be furnished with a certificate of membership, under the corporate seal of the Society, duly signed by the President and Secretaries.

IX. The Board of Directors for the time being shall have the appointment of the Permanent Secretary, Agents, Depositary, Colporteurs, Book-keeper and

Assistants of the Society, and the fixing of all salaries and allowances; and shall vi. have the superintendence and management of all the property, real and personal, of the corporation, as well as the management and control of its general affairs and the appropriation of its funds, with full power to enact such rules as may be requisite to effect the objects contemplated by the Act of Incorporation.

X. The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of business on the third luesday of each month, at the hour of 7.30 p.m. Special meetings may be called by the Secretaries at any time, at the request of the President or of any three

XI. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be held on the second Wednesday in the month of May in each and every year, or at such other time as the Directors, for the time being, may deem best for the interests of the Society, when the Officers and Directors for the ensuing year shall be chosen; a report of the operations of the Society during the foregoing year shall be presented, together with the Treasurer's and Depositary's accounts duly audited. Special general meetings may be called at any time by the Board.

XII. In case of the death or removal of any Director or Officer during the year, the Board shall at the next ensuing meeting thereof fill such vacancy.

XIII. No alteration of these By-laws shall be made except at a General Meeting of the Society, and after one month's notice of the proposed alterations has been given to the Board.

RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS RELATIVE TO GRANTS TO SUNDAY-SCHOOLS, SEPTEMBER, 1878.

That in all applications for grants of Bibles to Sunday-Schools the applicant be requested to furnish the Secretaries with an account of the state of the school; the number of scholars and teachers; the amount of funds at the disposal of the managers; who are its officers; and why it is necessary to make such application; all of which should in every case be certified by a minister of the Gospel, or some person of known respectability. And further, this Board recommends that the Secretaries make grants in future only to destitute settlements, reporting the same to the next General Meeting of the Board of Directors.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RELATIVE TO "GRANTS TO SUNDAY-SCHOOLS," ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS, 18TH JUNE, 1888.

That the forms of application or grants, already in use, as authorized by the Board in October, 1867, and September, 1878, regarding Sunday-Schools, be continued, although it is right to state that the superintendents of schools have not availed themselves of the privileges offered in the form of September, 1878, to any

In the opinion of your Committee, mission churches and schools under denominational auspices are not in general to be considered fit objects for the gratuities of this Society; but missions among Indians, Jews, French Canadians, Chinese, Italians, etc., though under denominational auspices, are not to be taken as coming under this general rule.

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RULES

RECOMMENDED TO BRANCH SOCIETIES.

(Revised May 17th, 1887.)

- I. That a Society be formed in connection with the Upper Canada Bible Society, and through it with the British and Foreign Bible Society, for the purpose of contributing to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment.
- III. That all persons subscribing one dollar annually shall be members of the Branch Society; and those subscribing twenty dollars at one time shall be life members of the same.
- IV. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee consisting of not less than ______other members; five to constitute a quorum.
- V. That all Ministers of the Gospel who are subscribers to the Society shall be members of the Committee.
- VI. That the Committee shall meet quarterly or oftener; time and place of meeting to be fixed by themselves.
- VII. That the Committee divide their sphere of operation into districts, and appoint visitors for each district to solicit subscriptions and donations, and also to ascertain the wants of the people regarding the Word of God.
- VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Branch Society shall, after deducting incidental expenses, be remitted yearly to the Upper Canada Bible Society, or through it to the British and Foreign Bible Society, for the purpose of translating the Word of God into the various languages, and for supplying the whole world, through the Parent Institution, with the pur-Word of God.

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- IX. That a depository for the sale of the Holy Scriptures be opened in a suitable central locality, and that the books be placed in a conspicuous position, the necessary supply being obtained from the Upper Canada Bible Society on sale. Remittances on purchase account to be made from proceeds of sales only.
- X. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on the———day of——, in each year, at ———, when the accounts shall be presented; the proceedings of the past year stated; moneys voted, a new Committee appointed, and a Report agreed upon; the Report to be published under the direction of the Committee if required, and a copy forwarded to the Secretary at Toronto.
- XI That on the formation of a new Committee, the President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and such three-fourths of the other members of the Committee as have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

FORM OF BEQUEST TO THE UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

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FIFTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY, 1897-98

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST MARCH, 1898.

The questions are sometimes asked, "Why so many Bibles?" and "Why such eagerness to circulate them?" To reply to such queries satisfactorily one must first know what the Bible is, and what it contains. Speaking concisely, it is God's message to the world; it is a loving Father's instructions to His disobedient children who have lost their way; it is the announcement to man of the remedy provided by God for all the ills of mankind; it is the gospel of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. These statements have been verified by the experience and testimony of Christians in all ages, and by the utterances of our Lord Himself.

David writes, "The law of thy mouth is better unto me than thousands of gold and silver; I will never forget thy precepts, for with them thou hast quickened me." The Bible, therefore, being all, and infinitely more than thus described, and the only rule of faith and practice, it is needed for ourselves in Christian lands, it is needed for the heathen in pagan lands, it is needed for the weary and heavy laden in all lands; therefore it should, it must, be a world-wide book, and it is the duty of Christians of every land to make it known and revered by our fellowmen to earth's remotest bounds.

The chief agency for the translation of the Bible into all languages and dialects, and its circulation throughout the world is the British and Foreign Bible Society with its numerous Auxiliaries and Branches in Europe, Asia and Africa.

It is worthy of remark that in this comparatively new country of British North America there are fourteen Auxiliaries, with some twelve hundred Branch Bible Societies in active co-operation. The principal Auxiliaries are Halifax and Pictou, in the province of Nova Scotia; St. John and Fredericton, in the province of New Brunswick; St. John's, in Newfoundland; Quebec and

Montreal, in province of Quebec; Ottawa and Western Ontario (London), and last, though not least, our own, the Upper Canada (Toronto), with its Branches and Depositories extending from the city of Kingston through Northern, Central and Western Ontario, Manitoba and the North-West Territories, beyond the Rocky Mountains to the Pacific coast, and to Victoria on the Island of Vancouver,

Although we have not received the report of our parent, the British and British Columbia. Foreign Bible Society, which held its anniversary meeting in London, England, yesterday (4th May, 1898), and cannot give full details of its work for the past year, yet we are enabled to place before our readers a very interesting forecast of the report through the great courtesy of the Rev. J. Gordon Watt, one of the secretaries, who writes as follows :-

LONDON, March 29th, 1898.

My Dear Sir. —I have to acknowledge your remittance of £752.158 2d., for which the Committee offer their warm thanks to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

It is too early yet to report the state of the Society's finances, or the total of its circulation for the year now closing, but I am able to mention some of the special

"In commemoration of the Diamond Jubilee of Her Majesty's reign, special features of the year's work. editions of the English Bible and New Testament were issued in large numbers.

"The Foreign work of the Society has been carried on with activity in every field. From the Society's Kiosk at the Brussels Exhibition a large distribution was effected, which must have made the Scriptures more familiar than ever before throughout the whole of Belgium. During the war in Thessaly the Society's agents visited the Greek army and gave away many portions, an attention which called forth many comments of praise from the Greek press. In China there has been great progress and consolidation, the issues of the Society having reached a figure far exceeding the total of any previous year. In this country and its neighbors, Korea and Japan, a new scheme for Bible-women has been set afoot, with immediate results which promise to repeat the success of the older scheme prepared especially for India. No part of the large China Agency has been more fruitful of good than Manchuria, where it is hoped that the Society's work may continue to flourish

"In translation we have to record the completion of the Bible for Uvea in the amid any political changes South Seas, and of the New Testament for the Yao people around Blantyre in Central Africa. A revision of the Sesuto Bible has been carried through the press for the Paris Evangelical Mission and the South African Auxiliary. A gospel has been published for the first time in the Bierian language for an island of the New Hebrides, and another for the Tavara tribe in New Guinea. The number of distinct languages and dialects in which versions of part or the whole of the Bible have been published by our own and other Societies has been estimated at 390. A less rigorous estimate would make the total somewhat larger, but the number quoted seems the nearest approach that is possible to scientific accuracy. For the Continent of Africa some part of the Word of God is provided in at least ninety-eight languages that may be called native to its soil, which, with the addition of English, Dutch and Arabic, largely used within it, swells the total of its versions to over one hundred. Of the above ninety-eight, thirteen are complete versions of the Bible

and twenty-one of the New Testament." With best wishes for your approaching Annual Meeting,

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In accordance with the practice of past years, the Directors of the Upper Canada Bible Society present a brief record of its labours and operations during the past year, which, through the Divine blessing, has been brought to a satisfactory termination. We say satisfactory, not with the feeling that, as Directors, we have attained the highest point of our aims, but because the continued deep interest of the friends of the Bible is evidenced by increasing liberality to the funds of this Society. Although the total revenue for the year 1897-8, which closed on the 31st March, is not so large as that of the previous year, we are pleased to be able to state that the ordinary revenue, on which the Society mainly depends, and which is derived from the sales of Scriptures in our Depositories and from the contributions of our Branch Societies, is noticeably in advance.

On the other hand, the extraordinary revenue, which is ever fluctuating, being made up of legacies and special donations, is considerably less than the previous year.

Since our last Anniversary Meeting, death has claimed one of our Vice-Presidents, the Rev. John Burton, who formerly took an active part in the work of the Society until his removal from Toronto. A resolution of condolence was passed by the Board and a copy sent to the family of the deceased.

Your Directors have pleasure in reporting that the past year has been one of progress and expansion. Many new Branches have been formed, while others have been resuscitated and reorganized, and more extended Colportage work has been undertaken. While your Directors are sincerely grateful for the measure of success which has crowned the efforts put forth, and for the sympathy and encouragement of Christians of all denominations throughout our extensive field, we realize our own weakness and insufficiency, and attribute to God all the praise and glory, and give thanks to Him for allowing us the privilege of co-operating with other Bible Societies throughout the world in endeavouring to promote the happy time when every man, woman and child on the face of the earth will have a copy of the Scriptures in his or her own language, and read, love and obey the precepts therein contained; and when all will know the Lord, from the least to the greatest.

The object aimed at by the Bible Society is one and the same in all lands, namely, the circulation of the Holy Scriptures in all languages, at cost price, or gratuitously when necessary; and, according to our Constitution, without note or comment.

A certain degree of similarity will therefore mark the efforts and operations of the Society from year to year. The work naturally divides itself, and may be more conveniently considered under the following heads:

BRANCH SOCIETIES.

Arrangements are made each fall so that all those Branches desiring assistance at their Anniversary Meetings may be visited and addressed by an agent of this Society. A number of the Branches hold their meetings without the assistance of an agent, and much expense could be saved if the officers of many more of the Branch Societies and the resident ministers would unite, once a year, with their

choirs and congregations, and hold mass meetings in the different churches alternately, in advocacy of the circulation of the Scriptures in all languages, in every land, and the claims of the Bible Society for help in its prosecution of this great work. This plan has been adopted in several places with most satisfactory results, and is earnestly recommended by the Directors of this Society. A note to the Permanent Secretary at Toronto, stating such a desire on the part of the officers of any Branch, will be promptly attended to.

This Society is deeply indebted to the many officers who so faithfully conduct the affairs of the Branch Societies, and to the zealous collectors who canvass for contributions in aid of this Society and otherwise assist in this noble work to the glory of God and the advancement of His cause and kingdom. The progress of our work in Manitoba and the North-West Territories continues, and the liberality of our friends of the western prairies is highly commendable.

Twenty new Branches and Depositories have been opened during the past

In British Columbia: Donald and Golden.

COLPORTAGE.

Twelve Colporteurs have been engaged in Colportage work during the past year for longer and shorter periods, as shown in following schedule. The object of this Society is to circulate the Scriptures in the more remote sections of Ontario-Muskoka, Algoma and Parry Sound districts-and Manitoba and the North-West Territories. A special Colporteur has been engaged for the ensuing summer, to canvass along the line of the Crow's Nest Railway, now in course of construction, and among the miners, etc., in the Kootenay district in British Columbia.

It being considered inexpedient to send Colporteurs to the Yukon and Klondike districts, a consignment of small pocket Testaments was sent, specially for circulation among those young men not already supplied, while passing through the city of Vancouver, B.C., on their way to the gold mines; and grants of Testaments have been ordered by the Board of Directors for circulation by missionaries of the different denominations engaged in the mining districts. (See Schedule Report, page 7.)

FINANCES.

Although the recent protracted depression of trade is still felt in many portions of our field, yet it is worthy of note that in many places the returns are considerably increased, and the general liberality of the people has enabled your Directors to make the usual annual donation of \$2,500 to assist our sister Bible Society in Quebec in its colportage work in that Province; also a special donation of £700 stg. to the British and Foreign Bible Society, in addition to the sums allocated by the Branch Societies.

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BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

ABSTRACT OF THE REPORT, 1897-8.

"I have given unto them the words which Thou gavest Me."

"I have given them Thy Word."-St. John, xvii. 8, 14.

The hour of hours was come. There was but a step betwixt the guest-chamber and Gethsemane and Calvary and the Tomb. At such a moment, in solemn prayer to His Holy Father, the Son of God reviews His earthly life. He gives account of what he had done here. As the ambassador of the Most High, the one missionary from Heaven, He that "came forth from God," He had been charged with divine sayings to tell men, and a divine Word to be. And at the close of His ministry, with agony and death before Him, the Lord Jesus felt that His fidelity to this part of His mission deserved scrutiny. He claims to have carried out the revelation entrusted to Him in both its parts. He had passed on the sayings. He had lived

It was the purpose of the Master that His disciples should give permanency the Word. and currency to this two fold revelation by word and act from generation to genera-tion. He had set them an example, and He had delivered to them messages for all mankind. How else but by written records, reproduced and translated and carried far and wide by others, could they to whom the command "Go ye into al the world and preach the Gospel to every creature" was addressed obey that command? How else could there have been exactly fulfilled the loving promise to Mary, "Wheresoever this Gospel shall be preached in the whole world, there shall also this that this woman hath done, be told for a memorial of her"? Can the individual or the Church that does not promote the translating and the transmitting

of the Bible, be fully Christ-like in aim and act?

The first Christians felt a necessity laid upon them, for one thing, to write down, and to transcribe, and to translate, and to spread abroad the divine words. In their view the Holy Scriptures were the test of truth, the sword of the Spirit, the testimony of Jesus, the good seed for the world-wide field. In the New Testament the expressions "to preach the Gospel," "to preach the Word," and "to preach Christ" are used inter-changeably, Thus, spoken and written words were identified with the living Person who breathes power and life into them. Wherever the missionary went, there, as a matter of course, the Scriptures were reproduced and translated and spread.

Some of the Christian ages since the first have been more alive than others to this duty. But no age has been wholly devoid of the oral, or written, or printed diffusion of words believed by the Christian to express the mind of God. Sometimes strongly, sometimes faintly, the call to hand on in fresh copies and tongues the records that "came not by the will of man" has been continuously recognized. And now, as the nineteenth century after Christ is drawing to its close, this grand and sacred work is assuming proportions of area and volume never reached before.

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II.—ISSUES.

Counting a year's figures onward in every case from those incorporated in the totals of a year ago, the issues of Bibles, Testaments and Portions by this Society now to be reported, come to 4,387,152 copies, or 181,120 beyond the largest ever announced at any previous anniversary, and more by 611,019 copies than the total of last year. The issues from the Bible House in London for the year ending March 31st 1898, were 2,073,467, an advance of 292,474 copies on those of 1896-7. Of this increase, 255 576 copies were in English. In the case of Foreign Agencies and Auxiliaries the official year varies in the date of its termination, and complete figures in many cases do not arrive in time to be incorporated in the London report for the year to which they properly belong. The issues abroad which are included in the present totals were 318,545 in advance of those announced last year.

The total issues of the Society for the 94 years since 1804 come to 155,529,954

III.—FINANCE.

The enlarged work of the year represents correspondingly increased expenditure. Payments from the General Fund came to £221,857 13s. 6d., as against £203,-681 13s. 1d. in 1896-7, an advance of £18,176 os. 5d. Of this advance, the sum of £14,768 8s. 6d. stands for enhanced outlay upon translations, revisions and new editions of the Holy Scriptures. The remainder is mainly for extended colportage, and new agencies and sub-agencies.

The new income of the year was £138,356 17s. 1d., showing an advance of £9,852 7s. 2d. on that of 1896-7. The chief item of increase is under legacies, and is due to one legacy of an exceptional amount. Apart from it, other legacies do not reach half the figures of the year before. The Free Contributions as a whole, from Auxiliaries at home and abroad, continue to show a want of elasticity which is to be regretted.

The receipts from sales were £91,392 17s. 2d. If this sum be added to the

new income, a gross total of £229,749 14s. 3d. is attained. The receipts for Special Funds amount to £2,188 7s. 7d. The expenditure from them has for the moment been only £473 2s. 4d.

IV .- Translation and Revision.

Three names of special significance have been removed from the list of those honored brethren who for Christ's sake were devoting their talents to translating the Holy Scriptures for the everlasting welfare of their fellow men. They are those of the Rev. E. Lewis, a reviser of three versions, the Kanarese, the Dakhani and the Telugu; the Rev. Dr. Bryce Ross, one of the translators of the Kafir Bible; and George Lawrence Pilkington, the chief translator of the Bible for Uganda.

Since the last anniversary the Queen's "Diamond Jubilee" has been celebrated. Bound samples of almost all the 196 new languages in which translations of more or less of the Bible appeared for the first time on the Society's lists during the Queen's reign, were presented to Her Majesty, and have found a home in the Library of Windsor Castle, accompanied by the most interesting little book by Canon Edmonds, of Exeter, on the expansion of the Society's work in the sixty years from 1837 to 1897.

The issue of the Tavara St. Mark-which is now being printed on behalf of the British and Foreign Bible Society, in Auckland New Zealand, will introduce a new language into the Society's record of translations. The Rev. C. W. Abel (L.M.S), of Kwato, New Guinea, is the translator, and the Gospel of St. Mark is

the first portion of Scripture to be translated into the Tavara language. Among the new translations of the last year is also the Gospel of St. Mark in Quiché for Indians in Guatemala. The translation has been made with the help of natives by a Spaniard, Mr. F. de P. Castells, the Society's sub-agent in Central

The Society was awarded a gold medal for its display of translations of the Scriptures in the Exhibition: -a noticeable occurrence in a Roman Catholic country, and as

A new translation of the Gospel of St. John into Gondi has been made by the award of a Board of Roman Catholics. Babu Phailbus, under the supervision of the C.M.S. Mission to the Gond aborigines in India. Details as to several other new languages, or added translations, will be found in the Annual Report, Appendix B. Suffice it to add here that the Rev. J. T. Lee Mayer, who has already done such excellent work on the Pashtu Bible for Afghanistan, has been commissioned to go to Baluchistan to translate more of the Scriptures for a people whose evangelization he has earnestly at heart.

The versions of Holy Scripture in eleven of the great languages of India and Ceylon are at present undergoing elaborate and costly revision. Through the kind co-operation of the chief Missionary Societies, the best European and native Christian talent is being devoted, mainly at the charges of the Bible Society, to improving the accuracy and the clearness of translations, which are in each case the Christian lamps for millions. In China the united boards of revisers are steadily pushing on their work. In Burma there is hope that something of the same kind will now soon be begun. The Bible Societies are an essential feature in the evangelisation of the world; every missionary looks to them for his store of the Word of God. From them every mission school draws its supplies. From them come the Bibles which native Christians need at home and in the house of God.

V .- OBITUARY AND HONORARY APPOINTMENTS.

Within a few days of this Anniversary, the Society lost its kindly and venerable Treasurer. Mr. Joseph Gurney Barclay was widely known, and wherever he was known he was loved. From its foundation to the present day, the British and Foreign Bible Society has owed much to devout, active and generous supporters belonging to the Society of Friends. They love the Bible, and trust it; and the Society which multiplies copies of the Book, and tries to "live peaceably with all men," provides a congenial instrumentality for benevolent services. Mr. Gurney Barclay was a munificent contributor to the Society's funds, and retained to the last the truest interest in its cause. His last letter to the Bible House, closed with the "earnest hope" that Almighty God would continue to bless the Society's

Since the last anniversary the hand of death has removed the names of seven efforts. other distinguished men from the Society's list of Vice-Presidents: Bishop Walsham How of Wakefield; Dean Vaughan of Llandaff; Dr. Stoughton; Dr. Newth; Dr. Moulton; Harry Coghill, Esq., and H. M. Matheson, Esq. Six Honorary Life Governors have died: the Rev'ds. W. W. Woodhouse, F. Fitch, A. H. Rumbell and B. Harden and B boll and R. Henderson; the Rev. Dr. Charles Hole, and John Fish Pownall, Esq., who was a member of the Committee from 1884 to 1894. One Lady Honorary Life Governor, Mrs. Wightman of Shrewsbury, and one Honorary Foreign Mem-

ber, the Rev. Jens Killengreen of Tromso, have also passed away.

VI. STAFF.

The last report had to record the sudden death of the Society's Literary Superintendent, the Rev. George Wilson, M.A. The Rev. T. H. Darlow, M.A., has been appointed his successor, and has recently entered upon his office. Mr. Darlow was a scholar of Clare College, Cambridge, where he graduated, and afterwards studied at Leipsic University.

The retirement of the Rev. T. Aston-Binns, Honorary Home Secretary, fore-shadowed a year ago, took effect in June. The Committee hope very soon to be able to announce that an able and earnest clergyman has been appointed to the vacant post. The Rev. Harry Scott has been in charge of the office, as Assistant

Home Secretary.

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An unlooked-for and severe loss befell the Society in October through the death of Mr. Charles Finch, the Assistant Foreign and Financial Secretary. By diligent service for a quarter of a century and varied experience, gained at times on responsible journeys abroad on the Society's behalf, Mr. Finch had become a most valuable officer in the Bible House. His bright genial manner and everwilling help made him highly appreciated far and wide; and his removal has created a gap which many will feel for long. Mr. T. Ernest Price has been

appointed Mr. Finch's successor as Assistant Foreign Secretary.

Abroad, the Rev. Dr. Nicolson has retired from the Russian Agency after twenty eight years' service. His successor is the Rev. W. Kean, M.A., B D. After three years of active and successful work in the Panjab, as Secretary to the Auxiliary Bible Society, the Rev. F. H. Baring has resigned office, and been succeeded by Mr. Chas. J. Rodgers. He brings linguistic proficiency and long experience in the Panjab to the Society's service. The Rev. T. F. Shaw, already known as the translator of three Gospels into Nyamwezi, is about to follow Mr. Joseph Mackertich as Sub agent at Mombasa for Zanzibar and Cent al East Africa. Mr. J. S. Mellowes has been working as Sub-agent in the West Indies. The Rev. H. F. Milller of Melbourne has gone to Singapore as Acting Agent to allow Mr. Haffenden to recruit his health by a furlough home. The Agency in Persia is still vacant. Meanwhile Bishop Stuart kindly exercises an oversight of the work, while Mr. George Mackertich attends to its details. For Burma the Committee are seeking a suitable Agent to follow up and develop the arrangements ably initiated by the Rev. S. W. Organe of Madras. Australia and New Zealand are cared for by the local Auxiliaries.

The Society's work in country after country will now be passed rapidly in review. It is like the procession of vessels of all nations moving day and night through the Suez Canal. And their treatment of the Bible may be illustrated by the conduct of the fifty nine warships and troopers that passed Port Said in 1897. All the twenty six British ships were accessible, many giving a warm welcome to the colporteurs. Twelve of the twenty three Russian vessels received our men freely, buying 600 volumes. An Italian warship and two out of three Spanish men-

of-war were accessible, but nearly all merchantmen of these nations were closed against the Book. All vessels flying the Dutch and the Austria-Hungarian flags were freely open. The colporteurs sold Scriptures on a Mexican ship of war, and on two out of three Turkish transports, and had a pleasant welcome on the one American warship that visited Port Said.

VII .- REVIEW OF THE YEAR.

The story of each year's work of the Bible Society has many familiar features, many constant lights and shades that fall across its pages. It may sometimes seem that nothing new can be told about it, that history is so full of the fortunes of this book that it can now only repeat itself. Its friends may consider the Society's object so excellent as to be above praise or discussion; its enemies believe its condemnation to be equally clear. The former think it calls for as little advocacy or explanation as goodness itself; the latter thwart and denounce it without apparent misgiving. It may be well for both to ask themselves how it is that they stand in this enduring opposition to one another, how so often in the name of truth they come into conflict, and how over this Society and its agents there are re-enacted some of the brightest and some of the saddest scenes in

If the aim of the Society be simple, the conditions under which it is carried out are very varied. They are as diverse as the peoples, the languages, the religions, and the types of character which are to be met with in the field of labor. Each of these factors calls for special study and treatment. The colporteur deals with men not in the mass but as individuals. He has to approach each along the line of least resistance. He must be so skilled in the Word as to know the riches of its power to win and to hold even those who find in it usually an offence and a stumbling-block. He has to reconcile its foes, to warn the indifferent, to show its comfort to the sorrowing and its light to the doubtful. He must understand how to deal with the manifold prejudices and evasions which he daily encounters. Thus although the instrument of evangelisation be in this case the printed rather than the spoken Word, it has to be wielded by men to whom its tongue is familiar, who have heard from it the words which have reached their own hearts, and who know how to speed its message to others. Native agency under suitable guidance has to be employed in every country. The Society is thus not only strongly missionary in its character, but of all missionary societies

There is one large part of the Society's field of which little mention has been the most international. made in the reports, a part in which its operations are nevertheless extensive. Lands in which the Bible is loved and where its spread does not arouse a keen antagonism may bring forth many fruits, but these are gathered by the churches and are never distinct from their activity. In the case of our own country and its colonies there is little to call for special notice, save to remind ourselves that in the remoter corners of Great Britain, the miner, the squatter, and the backwoodsman are not to be reached without effort or sacrifices. Protestant Europe has been gradually left to provide for itself. The German Agency of the Society remains, but it concentrates its strength on the Roman Catholic population, comprising onethird of the whole German Empire, and views with joy the progress of native Societies by its side. Mr. Morrison reports a circulation* by all Societies at work in Germany of over three-quarters of a million, an increase of over 40,000 copies on the total of last year, the highest then on record, and a sure sign that the Bible is more prized and more sought after by the people than ever before. But outside of Protestantism the encouragement received is not so substantial.

In the Roman Catholic countries of Europe, with which for practical purposes the Society's German Agency must be associated, the picture is very different. Yet when one remembers the facts, one can hardly wonder that the progress is slight. In these lands the Bible is not wanted; it is proscribed by the priest, and disliked on mere hearsay by the people. To possess it or to read it is the distinctive mark of disloyalty to the prevalent faith. When the demand is made for 'bad books" to be given up, it is this which is aimed at. And the term "bad books" is understood in Spain, in Quebec, in Belgium and elsewhere as a sufficient description of the Holy Scriptures. And their fate when given up is to be torn or burnt. Mr. Morrison, speaking of the hard life his colporteurs have to endure says of one of them: 'Colporteur N. was one of those men who with the best intentions, and animated by sincere Christian impulses, was yet unable to withstand the fierce opposition of the Catholic clergy. The priests in West Prussia were also Bible burners. What do they hope to accomplish? They and their predecessors have been burning Bibles for centuries. Last year I was shown the spot outside the Cathedral of Constance where a pile of Wycliff's Bibles was burnt. The pile was burning as John Huss was led from the Cathedral towards the beautiful meadow outside the town, where he also was given to the flames. He cast a look of amused contempt at the cardinals and bishops around the burning books. These burning books and burning men reproduce themselves in the strangest manner possible, and it is high time that the Romish Church gave earnest consideration to this aspect of the question. In Russia, if you burn the Bible you are sent to gaol as a person guilty of sacrilege; but in Germany, these priests burn it with impunity. If they think that their intolerant conduct is likely to get rid of the Scriptures among their people, they are vastly mistaken. If any of them will read this Report, they will learn that their ill-directed hostility will never deter us from our Christian duty. Our conviction cannot be shaken that the entrance of God's Word giveth light.'

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The incident here referred to is by no means an isolated episode and the testimony of all the Agents is in remarkable accord as to the fierceness of the opposition to be endured. M. Monod says that the French Protestant is attacked for lack of patriotism and the colporteur is denounced as the agent of a foreign society. Mr. Walker sees a reign of fanaticism in Spain,* under which a modern Inquisition dooms the man who would be free to ostracism and indescribable annoyance. Italy † M. Meille recognizes that liberty of conscience is in danger, threatened on the one hand by the clerical party, which is growing in power, and on the other by the extreme radicals and socialists, who are as determined enemies of the Bible as the priests themselves. It was with no little difficulty that leave was obtained to sell Scriptures at the kiosk in the Turin Exhibition. Mr. Millard has been unable, in spite of renewed efforts to obtain the necessary licenses for colporteurs in one important province of Austria; while M. May reports that the sale by colportage of religious publications has been forbidden in Tunis, where missionaries have been fined for distributing Scriptures and tracts. Under such prevalent conditions, colportage, where possible, must be wearisome and often heart-breaking. Success is arduous. "To sell a Bible," says Colporteur Peruggia, "is almost a battle." But when it has been effected it is a victory over ignorance, prejudice and unbelief. Yet on all sides the Agents complain that they cannot keep their staff up to its proper level. "The difficulty," says Mr. Morrison, "of obtaining suitable workers appears insuperable. One after another the men we engage leave us disheartened

by the trials confronting them, and unable to face their work with the necessary courage and patience." If this is the case in Germany, with its numbers from which to recruit, how much more must it be so in Italy, Spain or Central America.

But let us look at the brighter side of things and ask what our victories are. Many will remember from last year's Report, the story of the English gentleman who went about in Belgium as a volunteer colporteur. He offered to take charge of the kiosk at the Exhibition held in Brussels last year, and pursued his labours among the crowds who passed by with an assiduity that has seriously impaired his health. But he had done a unique work. The influence of the Bible had been made to permeate all classes and parts of Belgium* to an extent never before reached, and copies which he gave away must now be in many homes where the Scriptures had been unknown, From France M. Monod reports a growing demand, which has resulted in an increase of circulation to the number of nearly 30,000 copies. He quotes l'abbé Gayraud, speaking at the ecclesiastical congress held at Rheims, to the following effect: "There is a general cry for the Sacred Writ, a growing desire that our sermons should be the paraphrase of the Gospel. What the world is most in need of is the Word of God, and I hold for certain that it craves for it. It is the Word of God that people expect to hear when we address their thick crowds from our pulpits." M. Monod also notes a movement among the clergy towards the Reformed Faith, which has led many out of the Church of Rome. The work of the last eighty years is beginning to produce its effects, not only on a few individuals but on the national life as a whole. There is no better foundation for the quickening of a people's faith than a deepened knowledge of the Holy Word in the tongue of their daily life.

To pass to the wide field of the Russian Empire, the environment is clearly more genial, if the labour is not less strenuous, than in Western Europe. One cannot but be struck by the almost silent forces which make for the expansion of that empire. Its growth seems inevitable. It moves at many points towards the open sea like a huge glacier, which is checked in one quarter only to press forward in another. Everywhere it maintains and fosters the same characteristics among its subjects. They are passive, loval and reverent, and they hail the Bible-man as the bearer of holy things. He and his books, mostly the output of the press of the Holy Synod, are often conveyed by rail and steamboat free of charge, and everywhere find a friendly reception. In the first of these, the headquarters of which are at St. Petersburg, there has 550,000 copies. been an important change in administration by the retirement of the Rev. Dr. Nicolson from the position of Agent, which he has held since 1869, and the succession to the sole responsibility of the Rev. W. Kean, his assistant and colleague since 1895. The transfer could not take place, as it were, by a mere stroke of the pen, but made necessary the presence of a deputation from the Committee. Accordingly, the Rev. J. Sharp, Secretary, and Mr. I. P. Werner attended on their behalf, and made a tour last September—fully described in the pages of the Monthly Reporter—over several of the chief centres of the work in Northern Russia. Mr. Kean himself, immediately after the transfer, had a long programme of journeying to fulfil, spending more than two months, and travelling over 10,000 miles in order to visit all the Depots. 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shores of the broad Pacific, a distance of nearly 5,000 miles, further prolonged by the journey over America and Europe which brought him back to his starting-

point, we have a significant record of energy and movement,

A large increase in the sales by Mr. Kean's colporteurs, which in the aggregate for the year exceed 200,000 copies, shows that he was well supported by his staff. "This labour," he says, "meets with an increasing reward, and there is always need for it." On the other hand there is a large decrease in the sales from the Depots of Northern Russia. But when he explains that this is in all probability due to the fact that booksellers and other purchasers of Russian and Slavonic Scriptures are beginning now to take their supplies direct from the Holy Synod, there is every reason to rejoice in so manifest a sign that Bible work is becoming naturalized in Russia. Mr. Davidson from Siberia reports an increase of over 12,000 copies, more than one-third of the total in the previous year,—a progress that is prophetic of the future of the work in a country marked by such rapid deve-

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From Russia the mind turns to Turkey and those neighboring fields, once the home of early Christianity, now mainly of Islam. The report for Turkey and Greece may be given in the vivid summary of Mr. Hodgson: "The year under review has been full of vicissitudes, and the record of our Bible work presents a somewhat broken character. The war between Turkey and Greece interfered with our plans and operations in both these countries. In Greece the opportunity was taken of reaching large masses of the population of the country by a free distribution in the army. In Turkey the unsettled state of affairs and the political feeling caused by the war made it difficult for our colporteurs (mostly Greeks) to carry on their work. Parts of the field had to remain unvisited and tours had to be curtailed. In Janina our Depositary was put into prison on an unfounded political charge, and we owe his release to the good offices of a friend in power. Both in Epirus and Thessaly the work has practically been at a standstill. The unhappy state of affairs in Crete has made it impossible for our work in that distracted island to be resumed. In Macedonia and Albania, if the work has not suffered to any great extent, it is entirely due to the order maintained by the able and upright Turkish official who fills the post of Governor at Monastir, The echoes of war hardly penetrated to our field north of the Balkans, and the colporteurs have made their usual journeys in Bulgaria without let or hindrance. Here, as has been the case in Ionia and the Islands, the obstacle most noted seems to be the accentuated poverty of the people. This is true to a great extent of Constantinople itself, where so large a part of the steady wage-earning classes has either been extirpated or exiled, and where security and trade and credit have alike been shaken. In the capital our men have pursued their duties without interference, and the work has gone steadily on." For the entire Agency there is an increase in circulation of over 8,000 copies, a remarkable result under the circumstances.

In Egypt and the associated countries of Palestine and Arabia there has been a slight falling off,† owing to sickness among the staff, and other adverse causes. The polyglot character of the circulation of this Agency is remarkable, being made up of versions in no less than fifty-four languages. The predominant language of the field is Arabic, and its influence is apparent on others spoken within the boundaries of the Agency, such as Turkish, Maltese, and Swahili. But two facts explain this large total. One is the inclusion within the field of the Sub agency of Mombasa, from which the neighboring missions stations of the C.M.S. and other Societies have been supplied and colportage has been carried on among the natives of India at work on the railway to Uganda. The other is the active visiting from

the Depot at Port Said of the ships passing through the Suez Canal. These ships are of many nations; but the crews are still more varied, Malay, Chinese and Japanese seamen being greatly on the increase. Although this work has been hindered by quarantine and other restrictive regulations, the large total of languages is evidence that it must have far reaching effects.

An account of the Egyptian Agency naturally leads to a review of the continent The Mediterranean coast which lies west of Egypt is occupied by the two Agencies* of Algeria with Tunis and Tripoli and of Morocco. Here also, as in Egypt, the true counteractive to the fanaticism of Islam is the noble Arabic version of Scripture. It is due to the wide knowledge of this language that the Gospel is beginning to penetrate the Soudan. From Biskra on the north, from the Gambia on the west, from Lokoja on the south, and the Upper Nile on the east this region with its vast deserts here and its dense populations there, with its little known hinterlands whose value is now so greatly magnified in the eyes of traders and politicians, is being gradually opened up. To the south of the centre of Mombasa lies the island of Madagascar, whose annexation by France has led to a large demand for the French instead of the Malagasi version. In West Africa the new Agent, the Rev. C.R. Johnson, has made journeys which have been fruitful of the best results. He has established Depots for Scriptures in the chief centres, and become a longdesired medium of communication between the Society in London and its Auxiliaries and the Missionary body in Africa. Through him translation has been encouraged and grants of Scriptures made. In Sierra Leone colportage has been promoted, and at all the chief centres the Society's action in sending him out has met a quick and generous response in the form of help from the native Churches. In many places where cruelty used to prevail, and most recently in Ashanti and Dahomey, the Bible is now taught. Finally, in South Africa the Auxiliary knows no abatement in its energy, reporting the largest circulation | ever attained within its borders, and forwarding to London a free contribution of £1,200. The great continent is thus encompassed on all sides, and rapid progress is being made towards the interior. No better proof could be found of this than the fact that there are versions of some part of the Scriptures published by this and other societies in at least ninety-eight native languages of Africa, and that of one of these alone, the Luganda, there are now 80,000 readers. This once dark land is surely waking to its heritage in

The year 1897 will long be remembered in India for a succession of calamities Christ. almost unexampled in number and severity. Famine, pestilence, earthquake, civil violence and war have all been suffered to afflict the land." With these words begins the Report for 1897 of the North India Bible Society, and the picture they present, one only too familiar to us all, is reproduced from the other five centres of the Society's work in India. The angel of death has been hovering over the land, visiting thousands and spreading desolation and terror far and wide and trembling have seized hold of many; and the sense of an impending storm that threatened from the Himalayan mountain tops has disturbed rulers and people

Mr. Wynkoop goes on to describe the effect of the famine thus: "At the beginning of the year prices of food had risen to a rate at which the great mass of the peasant population and a large proportion of the artisan class could not purchase enough to support life. the country, which from December to March is covered with growing crops, lay bare and parched. There was no food for man or beast. The masses of the people, always miserably poor, were only able to prolong life by the most desperate expedients. Taking India as a whole over four millions of people were in receipt of public relief, besides uncounted others who were cared for by private charity.

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"Under these conditions there seemed to be little hope of an extensive circulation of the Word of God. The supreme duty of the hour, alike to Government officials, missionaries and all who have a heart for doing good, appeared to be to save life, to feed the hungry, to shelter the orphans, and when the summer rains rendered agriculture again possible, to give the people seed to sow and clothing for the approaching winter.

"But as has so often happened in the providence of God, our time of trouble has been also a time of blessing. Our missionary friends have not neglected the circulation of the Scriptures. Our colporteurs and Bible women have worked earnestly and well. Perhaps the hearts of the people were prepared for the Word of God. When the reports for the year were gathered in, it was with joyful surprise we found our circulation had reached an aggregate of 101,786, including Bibles, Testaments and Portions, an advance of 24,080 over the circulation of 1896, and a greater number than in any previous year of our Society."

So much for North India: but what of the other* Auxiliaries? They all tell the same tale of blessing through affliction. From the plague-stricken Bombay Presidency the report comes of a circulation considerably in excess of that of any previous year. In Madras, the total for the year is, with a single exception, the highest reached. Calcutta does slightly better than last year; so also Bangalore. A spirit of inquiry and a willingness to seek comfort in dire distress prevail. Speaking of the Scriptures given to University students, the Rev. W. C. Penn of the Noble College, Masulipatam, says: "I have every reason to believe these gifts were appreciated and read by the recipients. The ordinary educated Hindu reads more about Christianity than he is willing to admit." Another well-informed witness says: "There is no doubt that a sort of incipient faith is growing up in the minds of many in the principles and doctrines of Christianity. Some may be found who may go no further than say: 'Well, if there be a divine creed in the world and a religion fitted to the conditions and wants of man, that religion is Christianity.' Others again read the Bible with reverence, though they hardly like to confess it; others again have embraced intellectually the greater part of the doctrines of Christianity, but stop short of one or two serious difficulties. Not a few have got over these difficulties, and after fighting their way it may be for years, through doubts and fears, have come to embrace in their hearts unreservedly the whole Gospel of Christ, but are kept back by the social martyrdom which the open avowal of Christ in India involves." Thus both figures and testimonies from India show that Christ is never more a Saviour to men than in their worst hour of need.

Around India there are several fields which must be noticed in passing. In Persia harassing restrictions have operated and one of the best colporteurs has in consequence been idle. Burma has been visited by Mr. Organe from Madras, and under him the beginnings of an Agency for which an Agent is now sought have been made. The Auxiliaries in Ceylon and Mauritius continue to make good provision for their fields. In Malaysia,† under Mr. Haffenden, there has been an increase in sales of more than 15,000 copies, an increase which consists almost entirely of Chinese Portions, and is due to the wonderful activity of Mr. Walter James, the Society's sub-agent in Cochin-China. Mr. James sold 25,690 copies by colportage in

The causes of this progress are various. In the first place it is contemporaneous with the direction of the Agency by Mr. Bondfield, whose energy and enthusiasm rise to seize every opening. staff of Sub-agents has been doubled, the local committees have been met, consulted, and encouraged, and great attention has been paid to the production of books. The staff of native colporteurs has been increased, and a new scheme for Bible. women has been formulated and has found a welcome among missionaries. what has made this advance, and the means taken to secure it possible, can only be a great awakening in the land, and a breaking down of the stubborn resistance so

A noteworthy feature in the increase is that it applies to the sale of Bibles and long offered to Christian truth. Testaments as well as of Portions. This is a sign of increase in the native Church, or in the number of those who have placed themselves under Christian instruction. The colporteurs are not encouraged to sell Bibles and Testaments promiscuously in their itinerations, but to supply them only to interested and instructed readers.

"Another feature in the colportage returns," writes Mr. Bondfield, "is the wide extent of the ground covered by our workers. Thanks to the energy of our sub-agents and to the hearty co-operation of an increasing number of missionaries, we have been able during the past year to circulate the Holy Scriptures in whole or in part, in seventeen out of the eighteen provinces, as well as in Manchuria, Mongolia, Tibet, Hainan and Hong Kong. And side by side with their ordinary duties, it is gratifying to report that our colporteurs in many districts are doing a work of special importance by seeking out in their own villages and hamlets those who are known to be interested in the Truth, or to have come under the influence of the Gospel in hospital or preaching hall or by casual attendance at some service. In places far removed from any mission centre the catechumen or inquirer is often to be found, and the colporteur is perhaps the only helper or instructor such scattered disciples are able to meet with from one year's end to the other. Could the story of some of our native workers be fully told, it would be seen that these men with the Book, are indeed bearers of the Word of Life to many a heart. In their visits to the houses of inquirers, in their evening gatherings for prayer and Bible reading, and in their frequent talks by the wayside, they are rendering service, the fruitfulness of which it is dificult to estimate. reports which have reached us as to the good work done by our colporteurs are most encouraging, and the help which so many missionaries have rendered, both in instructing them and in superintending their work, is gratefully acknowledged."

Dr. Ross, the well-known missionary in Manchuria, confirms this statement. He says that he has been much impressed with the evangelistic value of the work of the colporteurs. Among its results are little bands of believers, gathering here, there and everywhere, often in remote mountain villages. The fruits of the reading of the Scriptures in conversions are perhaps nowhere more numerous than in

This review of the field has taken little account of America* and the colonies of Great Britain. In many parts of these colportage is industriously pursued and pushed forward into new fields. It is hoped that by this time an entrance has been found into Bolivia by a missionary who has received the aid of the Society, accompanied by one of its colporteurs. Cuba has been a field of the American Bible Society, but the men of Spanish speech who may be found far away from home in the stress of these troublous times will not be forgotten. In Canada there are many warm friends and devoted helpers of the Society. For Klondyke English Scriptures have been supplied through the Bishop of Selkirk, and Archdeacon Macdonald's version in Tukudh is published for the Indians of that locality under instruction at the C.M S. mission stations. Although there has been a considerable falling off in the contributions from Australia, it has sent a recruit to Singapore as assistant and locum tenens to Mr. Haffenden. Local interest in Biblework would receive a sure impetus were there many more additions to the staff from the colonies.

It is well to bear in mind and to set forth in a Report which traverses so wide a field, that this Society is not the only, although it is the chief, instrument in God's hands for this work. Nor does the work start with this century; it has a long and suggestive history. It owes much to the revival of learning, much to the reform of religion, but still more to both when they have been combined. The prototype of all Christian labourers in this field is perhaps to be found in a scholar and a saint of the Early Church, the martyr Pamphilus, the admirer of the Christian thinker, Origen, and the friend of the ecclesiastical historian, Eusebius. philus wrote many books, now lost to us almost without exception, and founded the theological school and the celebrated library of Cæsarea. It is by the establishment of the latter he is best remembered, as there is little doubt that our knowledge of the first three centuries of Christianity is in a large measure due to the use Eusebius made of the books his friend gathered for this library. But history also records that he prepared and gave away copies of the Scriptures to those desirous of possessing them, no light task when books were copied by hand, and parchment was scarce and costly Pamphilus is therefore the forerunner of the Bible Societies of modern times, the father of organizations which, though so much better equipped for their purpose than he, can only emulate his diligence and generosity.

Two hundred years ago the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge was founded. Having for one of its objects the diffusion of Christian literature, it has published and circulated the Scriptures in a number of languages. While its devotion to other high aims has necessarily limited its activity in this special direction, and left the field to be occupied mainly by the Bible Society, its issue of Scriptures to many churches and missions of the Church of England commands the praise of all. Next year the Religious Tract Society, the parent of our own Society and sometimes its associate, will complete its centenary, and already it is beginning to recount its many gracious achievements. So also the Church Missionary Society, over whose imperial field there has been the most brotherly reciprocity with the Bible Society. In Scotland, America, Holland, and elsewhere there are many sister Societies, all of whom help to swell the total result But when all have done their utmost, how much yet remains undone. How many there are still opposed or indifferent to the Word of God, how many to him it is yet inaccessible. The burden becomes heavier with years, but the strength to bear it is never withheld. In faith and hope and love may the Society labor on, knowing that its work is not in vain in the Lord.

REV. THOMAS NATTRESS, B.A.

The district assigned me comprised the following branches: St. Williams, Oct. 1st; Vittoria, Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 2nd and 3rd; Delhi, Oct. 4th; Lynedoch, Oct. 5th; Waterford, Oct. 6th; Bookton, Oct. 7th; Otterville, Oct. 8th; Port Dover and Woodhouse Oct. 9th and 10th; Fort Rowan, Oct. 11th; and Norwich, Oct. 12th.

Each of these, except Waterford and Norwich, passed a resolution at the annual meeting, at your agent's suggestion, and, after explanations given, to the effect that they would conduct their own annual meeting a year hence. In the case of the two exceptions named, the question was reserved for decision at an early meeting of the executive. At Norwich it was so reserved because of the absence of several of the resident ministers from home, and, consequently, from the meeting of the Bible Society; at Waterford because of the small attendance of the people and the smaller representation of the executive although the old and tried supporters of the Society present were in favor of the proposed step. In each and every case it is definitely understood that a visit from an agent of the Society may readily be arranged for in any year. Without exception, the resident ministers, who were not from home unavoidably, were present at the meetings and took an active part, the churches represented being the Baptist, Episcopal, Methodist and Presbyterian.

In every place I was heartily received, even to the extent of a standing vote of thanks at the close of a fifty minute address; and had the gratification of seeing not a little enthusiasm called forth by the resolution to be self-sustaining. The attendance seemed small everywhere, though in several places it was stated to be larger than usual. The sales for the year, with the exception of Otterville, Bookton and Lynedoch, were reported small—not a discouraging feature by any means. In two or three instances the stock was in large part old and shelf-worn. As your representative I advised the quickest possible distribution of the books, in a charitable way, if not by sale.

The very small meeting at Bookton did a commendable thing in passing a resolution requesting the ministers to preach a sermon annually on the work of the British and Foreign and Upper Canada Bible Societies. The Sunday spent at Vittoria, as advised by the Rev. Mr. Moorhouse in his annual report a year ago, was spent to good advantage. So, also, was the Sunday at Woodhouse, a part of the Port Dover branch, the people here having asked for the visit of an agent and for organization. By preaching in the Methodist Church on Sunday afternoon the visit was paid and the information given without the disadvantage (as it doubtless would be) of organizing a separate branch so near to both Port Dover and Vittoria Should an agent of the Society visit Waterford next year, perhaps a Sunday in the churches there would be spent to better advantage yet.

Simpson presided most efficiently. Business was promptly and satisfactorily completed. No contributions were received from this branch last year owing to some misunderstanding. Your agent made the matters so clear that the Bible Society was deserving of the first place in the people's sympathetic interest, and worthy of liberal contributions, that it was resolved that the

grand old Bible Society should have its claims duly attended to.

Holland Centre Dec. 10th. This branch was not visited last year and no contributions were raised. The evening was an unfavorable one, owing to the sudden breaking up of the sleighing of the last eight days, and the downpour of rain all day. The attendance was small. The Rev. R. B. Beynon, B.A., Methodist minister, in whose church it was held, presided. The business was fully transacted. Collectors were appointed, who are to get to work speedily, and then your agent addressed the meeting for about forty minutes, and received interested attention.

Deshoro, Dec. 14th.—Notwithstanding the unfavorable night and condition of the roads, there was a fairly good attendance at the meeting. All business was satisfactorily completed. The collectors voluntered their services, and expect to begin shortly. Your agent occupied the rest of the time in setting forth the importance of the work and the excellent methods of the Bible Society, showing that with such a worthy object, and by such means, with the blessing of God, and the hearty support of all Christians, ultimate success in fully accomplishing its work was assured.

Walter's Falls, Dec. 15th.—After a day's travel through the mud and slush occasioned by the melting snow and the rain of a few days ago, your agent was agreeably surprised to find a fairly good audience at the meeting. The address

was appreciatively received and the business transacted with despatch. Mr. J. R. Wickham, the efficient president, was re-elected, and the collectors appointed.

REV. P. STRAITH.

Hepworth, Oct. 11th.—Your agent visited this place on the above date and found this branch had done almost nothing during the past year. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, but the night was unfavorable and the attendance small. It was decided to postpone the business until another time, and arrangements were made for preaching on Bible Society work in the churches on Sabbath. The office-bearers were all in hearty sympathy with the work.

The attendance was small, but the spirit of the meeting was good. Rev. F. W. Holden, pastor of the church, occupied the chair, and set forth in a few remarks the claims of the work. Mr. W. F. Sithes, secretary-treasurer, a good friend of the Society, urged the appointment of collectors who would attend to the work, and I have no doubt you will have a good deal better return from this field this year than we had last.

The depository is well kept by our efficient depositary, Mrs. Day, and the amount of sales is comparatively large.

Cataraqui, Dec. 1st.—A very stormy day, followed by a pleasant evening. Meeting held in Methodist Church. A good attendance and good attention. Rev. J. E. Star, of Kingston, gave an excellent address. The prospects for the year's work are good.

Wolfe Island, Dec. 2nd.—Service in Methodist Church The pastor, Rev. Mr. Cornell, who was also president of this branch, was absent from home attending a sick bed. Rev. G. R. Lang, the Presbyterian minister, rendered good service, and was elected president. He will make a faithful officer, and the outlook is hopeful for this branch.

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South Saltfleet, Oct. 25th.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, Tapleytown. Though not large, the attention was good. This branch is capable of much better results. This year effort is being made to reach all the sections by collectors, so a much better statement financially is expected.

Winona. Oct. 26th.—This branch is doing good work with an efficient executive. The meeting was very interesting. The territory is wide scattered, and thus much work is necessary on the part of the collectors.

Campden, Oct. 27th.—This is where the people attend Bible Society meetings and all are interested. The officers work with a will and appoint collectors in good time. Liberal response always expected here.

Beamsville, Oct. 28th.—Meeting here well attended. Local clergymen all present and assisted in the meeting. The committee are setting to the work with a mind to do much for the Society.

REV. W. G. WILSON (MAN. AND N.W.T.).

The committee had partly done its work, and once again we believe this branch has come to life again. Here we saw what energy on the part of the management can do. The stock is well kept, but ought to be more prominent and replenished.

Baldur.—Next we visited Baldur and found a small audience, yet anxious seemingly to hear of the good work of the Bible Society. Baldur does not do all that it ought to do for the funds of the Society, and we hope that the present executive will push a little more than its predecessors. The stock is well cared for. They need a supply of Icelandic Bibles.

Belmont.—Belmont is a new point for this work. It is some ten miles west of Baldur on the N.P.R.R., a nice little thriving village. Here I met a few of the people to whom we explained the object and working of the Society. They thought they would like to help the good work along, and hence we elected a staff of officers, etc. They have made a beginning and would like to have a stock of Bibles for sale.

Roland.—Here we found the branch in good working order and quite enthusiastic. A plan was arranged to visit outstanding points with local talent, which if carried out I am sure would bring forth good fruit. Officers all at the meeting. The stock is in good order.

Miami.—At Miami we found the usual audience to greet your agent, and well up in interest in the work. The president was in the chair. Here the executive looks after the agent and he does not have to look around town to find out where the meeting is going to be held if held at all.

Stoney Mountain.—Stoney Mountain is only one year old, still it shows marks of vitality. Our meeting was not large, but of the right sort. Officers looking well after the interest of the work. They are doing well. The stock is in good shape. Sales will not be large, but being near the penitentiary will be found useful.

Stonewall.—Stonewall is safe. We met in the Baptist Church; the pastor in the chair. Though at a late hour still we got to work and had a very profitable time, and appearances were that they would make a good mark for themselves this

year. The stock is in good condition.

Balmoral.—Balmoral is an inland village some eight miles from Stonewall, and that far from railway. It has a large tract of settlement still back of it, and is thus a natural place for a depository of the Society. We held a meeting in the Methodist Church, at which they decided to organize a branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society. They have taken hold of the work and already made a fair beginning in giving to the funds, and I think they will do better as they become accustomed to the work.

McGregor.—We next visited McGregor and found matters not in the most satisfactory condition, but little interest has been taken in the matter for some time apparently. Obstacles were in the way of having a large meeting. I suppose you have heard from the depositary long before this. Our meeting was one of the small ones but promises better things for the future. The stock

is well kept and in a good place.

Carberry.—Carberry is one of the difficult points to handle. We had hoped that the executive would have done well last year, but for some reason they failed. They promised to do better in the future. Here we spent the Sabbath and addressed a fair audience, considering the day was a stormy one, in the afternoon in the Presbyterian Church, the president in the chair.

Douglas.—Douglas is a good branch, considering its chance for work. They take a good interest in the work of the Society. They have finally got out of their stock tangle and everything is in good order. Their stock at present is very small.

They need a general assortment before many sales can be made.

Portage la Prairie.—Portage la Prairie is officered and carried on by some of the foremost men of the town, and the way they do their work deserves special mention. I believe that they might be safely trusted to do their own work.

Chater.—Chater is a new point for the Society's operations. It is situated a few miles east of Brandon on the main line of the C.P.R. A nice little village with a large and good country around it. We went there by invitation, and while the weather was rough, we had a small audience of earnest people, who thought favorably of the work, and desired the benefits of a depository, and to do what they could for the good work of the Upper Canada Bible Society. They accordingly appointed officers and collectors. They have made a start.

Austin.—This branch is laboring under difficulties. It is situated in a district where they feel the need of a branch Society. They urged the sending of their stock of Bibles, which I believe has been sent on. From what they say they ought to do fairly well in collections. By some mistake we had to hold our meeting at the close of an entertainment. I am sure their stock will be well kept, and that the

sales will be fair at least.

REV. P. WRIGHT, D.D. (MAN. AND N.W.T.).

Alexander.—Your agent visited this branch on January 10th An excellent meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, when reports from the secretary-treasurer and depositary were read and addresses given. Rev. J. A. G. Calder occupied the chair, and opened the meeting with prayer. Good music had also been provided, and the meeting was cordial and hearty. Officers were appointed, and also collectors who were urged to attend to their duties immediately. A collection was taken up which amounted to fully eleven dollars. The depository

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Griswold.—This branch was visited on January 11th, and your agent found things in fairly good shape, except that the subscription list might have been greatly increased by an increase of interest and zeal. The meeting was a very good one, and it is hoped and believed that increased interest and enhanced collections will result. Rev. Mr. Lawson, Methodist minister, and Rev. A. Moore, of the Presbyterian Church assisted at the meeting, which was addressed at length by your agent. The officers were all re-elected and collectors were appointed for the ensuing year. The sum of \$25.90 was handed to me at close of meeting.

Virden.—A pleasant visit to this branch was made on January 12th, when a very well attended meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The president, Mr. Healy, conducted the meeting, and gave a short address. Rev. Mr. Strang also took part. Secretary Best read the annual report. After the address of your agent, the officers were appointed, Rev. E. L. King, Church of England minister, being made president for the current year. The collection was liberal, and there seemed to be a general feeling that collectors will do much better next year.

Elkhorn.—This branch was visited by your agent on January 13th, when a very encouraging meeting was held in the Methodist Church, the minister of which gave good assistance, as did also Rev. Mr. Hood, Presbyterian minister. After the agent's address, officers were elected, when three ministers, Episcopalian, Presbyterian and Methodist, were appointed to the offices of president, treasurer and secretary respectively. Collectors were also appointed who were earnestly urged to set out at once on their labors, and report to committee within a month or less. The collection taken at meeting was \$4 25, and a further sum of \$7.30 on purchase account was handed to your agent. I feel satisfied the collectors will have a good report to give in when their work is completed.

Moosomin—On account of a children's festival here on the Friday evening—date at first fixed—I agreed to change the meeting to Thursday evening. I had hoped to get Elkhorn to exchange evenings with Moosomin, but before it could be effected pulpit announcements had been made. I engaged Rev. J. P. Strang, of Virden, to visit this branch, which he did most efficiently. An interesting meeting was held, which Mr. Strang addressed at length. The usual business was transacted, including the appointment of officers and collectors. The sum of \$84.73 was received from the treasurer, of which \$39.48 was on purchase account.

St. David's.—This is a very noble and spirited branch in a purely rural district. Your agent held the meeting here in mid-afternoon on January 17th. The schoolhouse was well filled and much interest evinced. The president conducted the meeting, and Rev Mr. McLean, of Oak Lake, took part. The officers were re-elected, and at the close of an enjoyable meeting a loose collection of \$12 was taken up. A good report from the collectors may be confidently expected.

Oak Lake.—On the evening of January 17th I visited this branch. The meeting was well attended, about seventy or eighty people being present. Your agent addressed it at length, and is satisfied that good work will be done by the collectors then appointed. A collection of \$8.25 was taken up. All the business of the branch was attended to in an orderly manner.

Qu'Appelle.—This branch was visited on February 14th. The public meeting in the evening was held in the Presbyterian Church, and was well attended, considering the severity of the weather. Rev. Mr. Thomson, pastor of the church, assisted. The depositary, Dr. Carthew, was absent from town, and on that account I could not obtain an accurate statement of sales for the year. Your agent addressed the meeting. A good spirit prevailed, and officers and collectors were duly appointed.

Indian Head.—The meeting was held here on the evening of February 15th, in the Presbyterian Church. The attendance was small, but larger than I expected in view of the storm then raging. Rev. Mr. Robson, president, conducted the meeting. At the close of the agent's address, a collection of \$5.50 was taken up,

which the treasurer will forward along with proceeds of canvass by collectors when returns are made. All the routine business was done in a proper manner. The depository stock is nearly exhausted. The committee promised to have it sup-

plemented immediately.

Wolseley.—I visited this branch on February 16th The weather was still severe, but the meeting was well attended. The Methodist Church was quite full, and much interest manifested. Rev. Mr. Holling, pastor of the Church, presided, and Rev. Mr. McKechnie, Presbyterian minister, took part. After the agent's address, the reports were read, officers appointed and a collection of \$8.00 taken up This branch is in a very hopeful state, though the depository should do a much larger business. Only \$5.55 worth were sold during the year, though the stock on hand is quite large.

Grenfell.—We had a good meeting here on Thursday evening, February 17th. Many had come a long distance, despite the heavy roads and cold weather. The usual business was done, and the work of the Society fully expounded and its claims enforced. A good report is expected from the collectors when they finish

their work for the year.

Broadview.—Visited the branch on February 18. The weather was again very stormy. This greatly interfered with the success of the public meeting which was held in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. Mr Campbell, pastor of the church, presided. The business was regularly transacted and the few who attended—little over a dozen—seemed deeply interested in your agent's address. In opening the meeting, The President said :- My Christian friends, I desire to bid you all a very hearty welcome to this 58th Anniversary of the Upper Canada Bible Society. I regret that there are not more friends of the Bible Society present this evening, but I am quite persuaded of this, that when we shall have heard the eloquent words which I know will be addressed to us by those friends who have come from a distance here to-night to speak to us, that we shall all feel that it is good for Perhaps as most of you know this month of May in the old motherland is especially marked by a very large number of religious gatherings which are held during this month, and one of the most important, and to us one of the most interesting, is that of the annual meeting of our great parent Society, the British and Foreign Bible Society. It would seem, I have always thought, a particularly fitting period of the year, when nature has just awoke from her long winter sleep, and forest and field, flowers and shrubs are all putting on new life and bursting out into fresh vigor, that it should also be a period when in the spiritual world there should be a fresh awakening, a renewed activity and zeal in every good and Christian work; and surely we may say that foremost among all these is the glorious work in which this Society is engaged, that of sending forth the Lamp of God's Word where its rays have hitherto not penetrated and where there are still so many sitting in darkness and in the shadow of death. I have alluded to the annual meeting of the parent Society. Usually our own anniversary meeting is held much later in this month, and we have thus the advantage -and it is a great advantage, I think—of receiving the report of the parent Society, and being able to incorporate some of the most interesting and latest particulars of its world-wide work into our own annual report. We have, however, a brief summary of some special features of their year's work given in a letter from the Secretary, and with your permission I shall just read a short extract from it.

(See letter as printed in full, second page of the Report).

Now to aid this great work of the parent Society we have been enabled this year to send a special donation of f_{700} sterling in addition to the sums allocated for same purposes by our branch Societies. But when we remember the condition of those heathen races whose countries are being brought, year by year, more into contact with civilized and Christian races, and remember that in China and India alone there are many, many millions still in the darkness of heathendom; or if we turn to that continent of Africa, with its heathen and Mohammedan population, surely our hearts should be stirred with fresh zeal for the blessed work of the Bible Society, and to still more liberal and generous contributions in furtherance and support of its work. Turning now to the home work of our Society, the Directors, I see, report that the past year has been one of progress and expansion; many new branches formed and more extended colportage work undertaken. Of the many new branches I am glad to say seven have been formed in Manitoba and the North-West and two in British Columbia. I am glad to observe, too, that a consignment of pocket Testaments has been sent specially for circulation among those young men, not already supplied, who are passing through the City of Vancouver on their way to the gold mines of the Yukon and the Klondike. While they are laboring for earthly riches, I am sure we may pray that those precious little volumes may bring home to their hearts the necessity for laying up that treasure in heaven where "no moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through and steal." I desire also to allude to our usual annual donation of \$2,500 to our sister Society in Quebec to aid them in their colportage work in that Province, and I know of no work in our own territories that should more engage the active sympathy of our members than Bible reading and Bible work in that Province. Of the extent and necessity of that work we shall have, I have no doubt, a most interesting account from the lips of our friend from Quebec who will address you this evening. And now, looking to what we expect to hear from both our friends on my right and on my left, I think I shall do better not to trespass further on your time, but will simply close with the words of a speaker at a Bible Society meeting the other day-" Remember that in supporting the work of the Bible Society, we are furthering the purpose of our dear Lord and Master, when he caused that Holy Word to be written which it is the purpose of the Bible Society to spread throughout the whole world." With these remarks I shall now call upon Dr. Geikie to move the first resolution.

DR. GEIKIE said:—I am very glad that so easy a task has been given me, simply to move "That the report, as printed and now distributed, be adopted, and that the following gentlemen be Officers and Directors for the ensuing year (1898-99)." (For list of Officers and Directors see page iii.) I will not read all the names that follow, because they are printed and in the hands of everyone present. I have great pleasure in being here and great pleasure in

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hearing your opening speech, and I hope that this meeting, although not as large as it might have been, but still a large one, will be an interesting one, and I hope that from this meeting will go forth such a strong demonstration in favor of the Bible Society as will give it an impetus through the whole country much to be desired; that in this city and in the country wherever the Bible Society's name is read that the utmost enthusiasm should exist amongst its friends; that they should never forget it, and however much they remember any other Society—and it is their duty to do so—let them never, never mix our Society with any other, or forget our Society while they remember the others, as the great Bible distributing Society of the world.

J. G. Scott, Esq., Q.C., said:—I have much pleasure in seconding the resolution. The list of names is too lorg to require a speech.

Motion carried.

THE PRESIDENT:—I have now very great pleasure in calling upon Dr. Stobo to address the meeting. It will not be the first time he has addressed this Bible Society. We always welcome most heartily a visit of our friend from Quebec. I am sure it will give us very great pleasure indeed to listen to what he says of the work in Quebec.

REV. EDWARD J. STOBO, of Quebec, said: Mr. President and Christian friends,-The Committee of the Society which I represent regard it as an honor done themselves, that you have invited me here to address: he fiftyeighth Annual Meeting of the Upper Canada Bible Society. They are also deeply grateful to the Directors of the Upper Canada Bible Society, and to the different branches of the same Society for the financial aid which has been rendered all through these years, especially of late years, because the giving has been more liberal within the last ten years than it had been previously. In coming here I promised to say something about Quebec and Bible work in the province of Quebec. I find on the part of our Upper Canada friends, especially the younger portion, that there is considerable ignorance about the sister province, as to its extent, its population, the characteristics of its people, and the necessity for Bible work in that province. Perhaps it will be new to some of you to learn that in the province of Quebec we have 228,900 square miles of land. It is an extensive country; it is a most picturesque country; it is an historic country. There is everything to interest you on your arrival in the province of Quebec, especially if you visit the ancient capital. The 228,900 square miles of land is divided into 62 counties. Some of those counties are very extensive, though the population is not vast. In the province of Quebec there is a population of 1,488,825. Of the 1,488,825, 196.525 are Protestant or nominally Protestant. You can put that 196,000 against the 1,488,825, and you will see where Protestantism stands in the province of Quebec. Of the 62 counties in the province of Quebec, 22 are operated by the Quebec Auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society. This Society works the larger portion of the province. The Montreal Society has the bulk of the Protestant population, because out of the 196,000 the Quebec Society has only 27,000. Of the 62 counties, the Montreal Society operates 40, the Quebec 22, and yet the 22 counties constitute the larger portion of the province of Quebec.

In the province of Quebec we have an Assembly and we have a Legislative Council. The members of the Assembly number 77; the members of the Legislative Council number 26. The Protestant representatives in the Assembly number 7; in the Legislative Council they number 3. So that they are not sufficiently numerous to influence legislation. They cannot even produce a dead-lock. They are there to be seen; they are not very often heard, and of course the less you are heard in that province, if you have any opinions, if you adhere to any principles, it is the better for you. Now, taking the religious side of the thing, we have had one Cardinal archbishop, and I suppose we shall have another Cardinal. We have 3 archbishops; we have 13 bishops; we have 1,799 parish priests; we have 26 religious orders of men, and we have 42 religious orders of women. The youth of the country are committed into the hands of these religious orders. The parish priests look after the fathers and the mothers. Up till of late the great obstacle in the way of our Bible work was the ignorance of the people. We had few elementary schools, and very few people could read. You might go into a home and find the father, the grandfather and the grandchildren, and not one of them able to read, and so all that could be done by a Bible-worker was to converse with the household, and read the Scriptures to them. It was no use to leave a book. There was no opportunity for selling a book, because the book was of no use in the place. Then again, the prejudice against the Holy Scriptures or Word of God. The Holy Scriptures, as we have them, are but little known in the Province of Quebec. If the people know anything of the book at all, they only know it as a bad book, as a dangerous book, as a book that is sure to make Protestants, and of course if they become Protestants, they endanger their eternal salvation. So you see that on the one hand we have had to contend with ignorance; on the other hand we have had to contend with prejudice. And then again we have had to contend with the hierarchy, and also with all these different religious orders ever on the watch to prevent our placing the Scriptures in the hands of the people. The Quebec Bible Society employs colporteurs, and colportage in the province of Quebec means one thing, whilst colportage in the province of Ontario means quite another thing. In the province of Ontario the colporteur is a travelling bookseller. He is mixing amongst Protestant people, and if Protestants need a book, they will express themselves in that way, and he will have the opportunity of placing the book. In the province of Quebec the demand has to be created. The book has to be read, and its most interesting portions read to the people. The book has to be explained, lengthy conversations have to be entered into, and in the end the book may be loaned or the book may be sold, but it takes a long time to find a place for the book or to make a sale, because of the ignorance and the prejudice on the part of the people. Then again, when our men go into a district it is generally noised abroad The curé from the pulpit informs his parishioners that there is a man going through the parish selling bad books, and that they are not to receive him; they are not to give him shelter, not to give him refreshment; they are to hunt him out of the parish. For example, we have a young man, the nephew of the Bishop of Three Rivers, who has gained for himself very great notoriety in connection with the Manitoba School question, and who is likely to gain for himself some notoriety, if we are to credit the newspapers to-day, in connection with this American-Spanish

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question. Mr. Lafleche went to St. Malachi, in the county of Dorchester. He had his gripsack, and his Bibles and New Testaments. The postmaster of the village, who has a general store, gave him shelter. He went out, and he did his work amongst the people. At night he returned; he had refreshment; he read with the family; he sang Gospel hymns with them, and they retired at a late hour. After he had retired, Father Frechétte, the curé of the parish, came down to Mr. Paradis, the postmaster, and he says, "I understand you are lodging under your roof that man who is going around selling the bad books." He said, "I don't know that I have anybody under my roof that is busy selling bad books. I know I have a man (I have given him shelter, and I have given him food) who is selling the Holy Scriptures." The curé ordered Mr. Paradis to turn him out! That evening the thermometer stood 26 below zero, and Mr. Paradis said to his curé, "Aside from religion, it would be inhuman to turn that man out on such a night as this, because there is not another house in the village that would give him shelter; the man would perish;" and he says, "I will not turn him out; he shall remain under my roof." He remained over night in that house. Next morning he had worship with the family, and then he went down to the store, and in the store there gathered quite a number of farmers; they had come to receive their mail. While they were waiting for their mail, the curé, Mr. Fréchette, came in, and he saw Mr. Lafleche, the colporteur, and he at once attacked him, calling him bad names, uttering fearful threats, and also threatening Mr. Paradis for giving him shelter. After he had spent all his energy, Mr. Lafleche turned to him, and he said, "Now, your reverence, I have come here on what I believe to be a good mission. It has pleased God to open my eyes, to enlighten my mind and to change my heart, and I am here to give to these friends what God has blessed to my own soul, and I want to know from you whether you think your conduct is according to the teaching of the Lord Jesus Christ, or whether this holy book which I am placing in the hands of the people will sustain you in your conduct towards me. Towards yourself I cherish no hard feeling. I respect you as a man who has the care of souls, but I appeal to your own good sense whether your spirit accords with the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. You have called down Heaven's vengeance upon me for giving up the religion of my fathers. You have ordered Mr. Paradis to throw me out into the street, and for what? Simply because I am seeking to place in the hands of my compatriots the Word of God." The curé then and there begged his pardon, said that he had been hasty, that he had used strong language, that he was altogether at fault; but he said, "You know that the authorities of our Church forbid the people to have the book, and you are here in direct opposition to Church authority to give the people the book, and on that ground I forbid you to go through my parish." Now, there were fourteen men in that postoffice waiting for their mail. They saw the spirit of the one man who had his gripsack full of new Testaments, and they saw the spirit of the other man who had the care of their souls, and upon whom they rested their eternal salvation, and those men set about doing their own thinking, and they are doing their own thinking to-day. (Applause). Mr. Lafleche, a few weeks ago, called upon his grand uncle, Bishop Lafleche, of Three Rivers. He thought he would like to see the old gentleman, and have a little talk with him. An aunt introduced him, and, after they had conversed for a little while, the young man let

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the Bishop know what his business was-that he was a colporteur for the British and Foreign Bible Society, that he was selling the New Testament, and he begged of the Bishop to take the book in his own hands and examine it, and see whether it was a good book. The Bishop would not touch the book; told him that he was sorry he was any relative of his; that he could not give him his blessing; that he was doing the devil's work, and that the sooner he got out of the county of Maurice the better; and young Mr. Lafleche had to leave without the Bishop's blessing, as one of the devil's agents circulating a bad book. Now our friends in Ontario have to get a grip of this question, because in meeting our Roman Catholic friends we must meet them in a Christian spirit, in a loving spirit, and we have got to know their position. The Douay Bible which is in the hands of our Irish Roman Catholic friends has the Pope's approbation. So far as Canada and the United States are concerned, it has the approbation of Cardinal Gibbons It is supplied with notes on the points which separate all Protestants from Roman Catholics. That is, the reader is assisted in getting a grip of what we call the doctrine of Justification by Faith only, and then as to the nature of the sacraments. In the book that we circulate there are no notes, because it is one of the rules of the British and Foreign Bible Society that there is neither note nor comment supplied. There is just the naked text. Now the danger, in the eyes of the Roman Catholic, just lies there. Giving them the naked text, they say, is calculated to lead them astray, but if you give them the Holy Scriptures, and with the Holy Scriptures the Church's teaching, the people are safe, because the people will go by the teaching of the Church, and not by their own understanding of the book. Now, when we say that the Roman Catholic Church forbids her adherents to read the Scriptures, we do not state exactly what is the whole truth, but when we say that the Roman Catholic Church forbids its adherents to read the Scriptures without note or comment, and does not allow them to do their own thinking, then we state the whole truth. Now, our French people in the province of Quebec and in the province of Ontario are not on the same footing as the Irish or English-speaking Roman Catholic population. Protestant opinion, public opinion amongst Protestants or on the part of Protestants, influences the English-speaking Roman Catholic hierarchy, and in self-defence the hierarchy is compelled to give the Scriptures to the people, but not to all the people, because as a rule the Scriptures come through the hands of the priest, and the people receive the book with the priest's blessing. The French people are not in the same position. They have not the Scriptures. You cannot get a copy of the Scriptures. I have a book with me that is being circulated just now. A little while ago I said that in the province of Quebec we had twenty six religious orders of men. We have forty-two religious orders of women. Of one of these religious orders (the Franciscans) there are three branches; there is the Franciscans, the Reformed Franciscans and the Capuchins. The Capuchins circulate this book that I hold in my hand, which professes to be a harmony of the four gospels. In connection with each statement made as to the life and acts of the Saviour, we have reflections; and the reflections on the Gospel, or the comments, are more considerable than the Gospel itself. Now this book is sold by those gentlemen as they go over the country. You will notice this statue is St. Francis, of Assisi. He has the stigmata; he reflected so

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much on the life and sufferings of Christ, it is said, that in some mysterious way he bore the print of the nails in his hands and in his feet. In his day (the twelfth century) the Church was very corrupt, the priesthood very dissolute, and he set out as a reformer. He would go out as Christ went out; he would go out without a home, without friends, without money, and he would go out simply clad. He would wear no covering over his head; he would have no shoes for his feet. He would clothe himself in a coarse woollen gown; he would have a rope around his waist, and he would have three knots on the rope to remind him of the triple vow he had taken, and he would use that rope as a means of keeping his body under. He was the evangelist of his day, and he tried to effect a reformation, but then he was recognized by the Pope, and was made the head of an order, and the reforming work just stopped there. Now this order-the Franciscan Order-is broken up into the Franciscans, the Reformed Franciscans and the Capuchins. The Capuchins issue this book, and this book is sold for eighty cents. The Bible Society sells the complete New Testament for ten cents. And yet this book goes to the people as authorized by the Church to displace the book that we circulate, and which we give to the people at the low price of ten cents, and if they are not able to pay that, we lend them the book, and allow them to keep it as long as they find a use for it. Now, you have no idea of the influence that these orders are exercising in the province of Quebec. You who have been reading the public press will have seen that of late, in the Philippine Islands, the Pope sent the Capuchins there to preach peace and submission, but the insurgents in the Philippine Islands turned on these friars and shot twelve of them. The Pope desired to send the Capuchins to the island of Cuba to preach peace and submission, just on the eve of the declaration of war by the United States. These orders are the latest additions to the religious orders that we have in the Dominion of Canada. They have come to Canada within the last four or five years. This (shewing a small statue) is the saint held in the greatest reverence by the French Canadian people. This is St. Anthony, and they have, especially in the province of Quebec, the worship of St. Anthony, the devotion of St. Anthony, and you have it in St. Michael's, Toronto. In all the great churches they have the statue of St. Anthony, and of course he is accredited with most wonderful power. He has power to cure the blind and the deaf and the dumb, and even to raise the dead. He has power over the wind and over the sea. He can influence the minds of men. If you have property to sell, or if you have property to rent, he will find a customer or he will find a tenant. If you have lost anything, anything of value, he will discover it, and he will cause those who have it in their possession to return it to you. If a mother has a daughter that she wants to get well married, he will obtain for that daughter a good husband; or if a young fellow who is very blate or bashful desires to get hold of a nice girl who will make a good wife, St. Anthony will put him in the way of getting that girl. Now this statue is set up in all the great churches. You will find it in St. James Cathedral in Montreal; you will find it in nearly every church in the city of Quebec; you will find it at Three Rivers; you will find it at Chicoutimi; you will find it Rimouski; you will find it down at St. Anne de Restigouche, and the people are going in crowds to worship. In front of this statue there is a tin box, and this tin box is for the reception of requests. You put down your request in writing, and

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s . . sign your initials or your full name; you tell St. Anthony what you want him to do for you. Then behind the statue there is another box, and in this box you put your offering. You tell St. Anthony what you are prepared to give him, or what you have given him, if he will grant you this request. Then on nine consecutive Tuesdays you go and you bow before the statue, and you offer five prayers on each occasion to St. Anthony, and then you bind yourself, that when St. Anthony grants your request, when he has heard it and given you what you desire, that you will publish the answer in the press; you will let the public know that St. Anthony has granted you this great favor. Now it is astonishing! You and I cannot realize the thing at all! These people live in another world altogether from the world in which we live. They see things, hear things and feel them; the whole mind is occupied with the great unseen world, with mysterious influences which you and I know nothing about, and we cannot understand it. When you see judges, eminent men, educated men, see them coming there in their carriages, and going in and kneeling before the image of St. Anthony, and putting in their request and making their offering, and going there repeatedly, you cannot understand it. When you see medical men doing the same thing; when you see lawyers doing the same thing, you get to understand that this system has a tremendous grip of the human mind, and that there is something in it adapted to human nature. There is a fascination about the whole thing. Now, beloved friends, we have to contend against this. We have ignorance, we have superstition, and we have what is worse; but the Bible Society is quietly and lovingly doing its work. We have seven men and one woman engaged in this work. Six of the men are French, one is English. The Bible woman is French. Now, during the year, those agents called upon 16,330 families. They sold 118 Bibles, 901 Testaments, 246 Gospels. Amongst Protestants and Roman Catholics the Secretary's sales were 204 Bibles, 263 Testaments and 103 Gospels, or over 2,000 copies of the Holy Scriptures have been judiciously placed in the hands of the people. Now, the work done by the colporteurs is done amongst Roman Catholics entirely. They have to make their own way. They have to find an entrance into the homes of the people. They have to win the confidence of the people. They have to engage the people in conversation. They have by degrees to introduce the Gospel. They have to take out the book and ask them if they ever saw a book like that, if they would like to hear a bit of that book read to them, and then they will turn to some of the most interesting portions, some stories of the New Testament, and read them, get them interested, and then they wish to have the book Now, there is scarcely a parish in the Province of Quebec to-day, and I am thankful to say there is scarcely a parish from the Ottawa River down to Labrador, and from the borders of New York State down to the Magdalen Islands, where we have not Roman Catholics in possession of the Scriptures, and who are reading the Scriptures, searching the Scriptures, trying to become acquainted with the Scriptures, whose minds are becoming liberalized by the reading of the Scriptures, and whose lives are better by what they know of the Holy Scriptures. Now, in the Town of ----, in the County of Bonaventure, a lawyer, one of the must noted men of the place, met me on the street, and he said: "Mr. Stobo, would you care to come over to my office?" 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"I have had a New Testament, you know I have had a New Testament for about a year, I would like to get a whole Bible." He said, "Would you sell me a Bible?" and I said, "Oh, yes, I would be delighted to supply you with a Bible." "Well," he said, "bring over what you have, and let me have a look at them." After I went to his office we talked matters over, and I gave him the Bible he wanted. I desired him to take the Ostervald and the De Saci, but he said " It would be safer for me to have the De Saci." Here is a man doing his own thinking. Two years ago I had sold a Bible to another man, a young man of good parts, and he was reading the New Testament, and he would gather his friends into his room for the evening, and read the New Testament and discuss its teaching. The curé got to know about it, called him a Freethinker, called him a Freemason, called him everything that was bad, and blamed him for not attending church. This young man, taking out the book, said to his curé, "this is the book I am reading, this is the book you are making a noise about. Now, if you preach from this book, and preach according to this book, I will come and hear you, but I am not going to attend and listen to the nonsense I have had to listen to of late." And that young man takes a stand. Now, we have cases like that all over the Province. Of course the work will take time. There is a story told about the entrance to New York Harbor. There was a rocky reef there that endangered life and property. It was a great hindrance to the shipping, and the harbor commissioners decided that they would drill into that rock, they would blast it, they would get rid of it, and for a long period of time there were men at work, there were divers down. They were boring away, and people coming into the harbor and people going out could see those tugs and other craft (scows), and see men working away pumping air down to those under the surface, and they said, "It is a great waste of time and a great waste of money, it will never amount to anything." But there came a time when all the drills had been made. The dynamite had been placed into each drill hole. There came a time when the wires were attached. There came a time when the day was fixed, and the hour and the minute fixed, and all that had to be done was to touch a button, and the whole thing that had been a hindrance to navigation went up into the air and fell down. The broken mass has been taken away and so the obstruction is removed. Now, our Bible work is slow work, it is difficult work, it is trying to flesh and blood, it is trying to one's faith, and those who engage in it have to make sacrifices; but there is a time coming, just as those men under the surface made those borings and placed that dynamite, just as those wires were attached and the time for the use of the electric battery came, so there will come a time in the history of our country and of our race when that which is so destructive, so detrimental, so hurtful to the human family will be removed. God is God, and the Bible is the Bible, and truth in the end must triumph. (Applause). Now, beloved friends, I have been greatly influenced all the way through by the Gospel. People say to me, "Mr. Stobo, why did you settle in such a hole of a place as Quebec? Why don't you let them alone, and get out altogether?" Well do you know that Quebec is the key to North America? Quebec is the great recruiting ground of the Roman Hierarchy; and it is Quebec that supplies the whole continent with its missionary force; and the aim of those who are opposed to the Protestant principle is to win

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the whole continent of America for the Holy Father. Now, if we value the Protestant principle, if we value an open Bible, if we value civil and religious liberty, we must give the Bible to those people who differ from us in language, in faith, in laws and traditions; they are our brother men, they belong to the great human brotherhood, and if the Gospel is of value to you and to me, if the Bible way is the way of salvation, then their salvation depends on knowing and trusting and loving the Christ of the Scriptures; and we are bound to do something for them; and I am thankful that Upper Canada is doing something for the Province of Quebec. (Applause). Now, this expresses my sentiment in regard to this work, and I trust it will express yours.

Dear friends, I thank you for listening to what I have had to say on this occasion. I might say more, but there is a brother to follow me, and I do not desire to trespass on his time. I have a great deal to say; much that I would like to say, but I trust that I have let in a little light, created some little interest—and that you are the better for hearing about Quebec. There is hope for

Quebec; there is future for it.

Wood to address you.

During collection the hymn, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," was sung. The President: I have now very great pleasure in calling upon Rev. Morgan

REV. MORGAN WOOD said: The lateness of the hour and the good supply we already have had of instruction, and the facts that we have listened to, must have filled us, I think, to more than overflowing But seeing I am on the programme I will only take up a very few moments as far as I can to say that which I have in my mind along the general line of the Bible as a factor in the effort as far as the conversion of the world is concerned. I presume we can include in our interest and in our sympathy all those who have not yet received the light of the truth and have not been brought into contact with it as the bread of life; all that element of society, whether Protestant or Catholic, whether at home or abroad, that needs the Word of God as a rule of life. I believe in the book from that standpoint, as a book of life, perhaps more than in any other sense. It means more to me as the Book of Life; it means more to me as the rule of life. I am not interested in the Word of God from the controversial standpoint; nor from the standpoint of technicality; nor in the mechanical element; but I am interested in it as the "Yea" and the "Nay," I am interested in it as the "Thou shalt" and "Thou shalt not." I am interested in it as the Golden Rule, which, if laid down and used in our every day life and relationship, becomes a rule of life, and a higher, and truer, and nobler definition of our own nobler attributes. I am interested in the life that now is as well as the life that has been in the past, and that is to be in the future. When Philip was on his way into that south country, in obedience to the voice of God, he encountered the eunuch reading upon the chariot seat, and the first word he asked was, "understandest thou what thou readest?" "And Philip went and joined himself unto the eunuch and preached unto him Jesus." That is my idea of the Word of God to-day: and I believe, friends, when you begin to include in your thoughts this evening this, that you must understand the Word of God as

the Word of Life, you will find out that there is need for a good many Bible

Societies. Some of them will have a good deal of home missionary work to do as

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ible as well as foreign missionary work, when we come to include it in that one question, "Do you understand what you read?" We may read it believingly, and yet not understandingly; we may read it with a blind faith and a sort of reverential spirit, and still it cannot mean to us the moral character, the tone and ethics, in our relation of man to man, and man to God. To my mind the Bible is a record of God's dealings with man in the past-the evolution man has passed through from heathendom; it is the record, the registration of God's manifested power and providence and dealings with His people in all conditions of human nature, and human weakness, and human liberty. We have there the vibration from the one extreme to the other, of obedience and disobedience; and we have there the registration of the natural and logical results that follow ever in the case of obedience and disobedience. It is the record of the past; and all of the past, in every sense of the word, is of value to us only as it becomes an interpreter of the present and a prophetic revealer of that which is to be in the future. I fear that many of us are weakening that progressive element that would be incarnate in the Word of God as righteousness because we worship it as something that has come down. We love to be reminded of the hair-breadth escapes the Word of God has had from demolition. We love to record what the Word of God has stood of persecution. We love to sing how these pages have been pierced through with heathen bayonet, and sealed time and again with human blood. We love it and reverence it because of what it has come through; and that is well as far as it goes. There is enough that the Book has gathered upon its pages in the past to make it worthy of reverence as such; but there is infinitely more to make it worthy of reverence. The value of the Word of God does not lie in the past. It lies still more in the present, and more and more as the present shall germinate in the future; and only as you and I keep bringing the past into the present and use it to unlock the hidden mysteries of the present, does it continue to be the Book of Life, the Bread of Life on which men may nourish themselves morally, and spiritually, and intellectually in the times and conditions that now are. It is the Book that in its application is the same yesterday, to-day, and forever. It is a panoramic vision that is constantly unfolding and revealing the conditions through which men now are passing, the same as it reveals through Old Testament law the conditions through which the men before our time passed. There is a sense in which it is opportune and wise for us to get to some altitudinous point where we can get a panoramic vision of the whole landscape first, and then we may go down from that lofty summit and meander along the streams and by-ways and hedges, clamber down the rocky slopes, and enjoy the scene in detail. If you want to get a vision of something of the grandeur of the White Mountains in New Hampshire, the first point is to make straight for the summit of Mount Washington, and stay there until you can catch a glimpse of the vision that unfolds itself to you on the clear, blue, crisp mountain, to stand upon that coronated summit, lit up with God's sunlight, and then look out for miles and miles over the range of vision that lies before you. Then, and not till then, are you prepared to go below and explore the foot hills that lie below you. You want to get a comprehensive view first, because then you have a relative idea. That is the view we ought to get of the Word of God. If you begin to study it in detail, analytically

and critically, we lose its power as a revelation of all life. So with the whole world of thought and literature; there is the largest insight into relations and daily actions that can best be gathered by rising into the higher realm of ideas, great truths and principles; and until society comes to understand that the Word of God is the key to all these relationships, that it includes every sphere and function of life, we will not yet have drank in the fulness of its inspiring spirit and grasped the fulness of its projecting forces. Take our present day national struggle for territorial aggression, and political economy is a fault very largely because of man's ideas of what should be the standard that should regulate patriotism in the world to-day. We have political economy that is bound in its extention to local and individual welfare; it is not the political economy of Jesus Christ; it is not the political economy of universal brotherhood; it is not the political economy of "Glory to God in the highest, peace on earth and good will to men," but it it is the political economy that "might makes right," and "to the victor belong the spoils"; and you will find men working out their code of manliness, their code of international comity, their code of geographical patriotism and territorial aggression and acquisition along that line of individual self-interest. You have to lift them out of that little narrow idea of individualism, and raise them to the larger principle of possession and property-not simply of rights, what I can have and therefore I will have, but great truths and principles. So in our social problems to-day; the relation of man to man, the question of civilization, is not Ontario, or Quebec, or the North-West Territory; it is a question of manhood; it is a question of life; it is a question of those who have been created by the same creative power and genius working together and receiving the same blessed fulfilment of God's power, as the result of the increase of God's spirit in our hearts and lives. Come down to the Word of God and to my mind it is simply a reproduction of the panoramic vision of how God has been leading His people in all ages past; and until you and I begin to grasp the naturalness of the Word of God we never will be in a position to grasp the supernaturalness of the Word of God. I say that advisedly. I believe a man has got to appreciate the naturalness of it before he can ever appreciate the supernaturalness of it; and I feel that we as ministers sometimes make a very serious mistake in constantly pointing the feeble, struggling mind and soul first of all to the supernatural, whereas the supernatural will operate upon the soul when that souls grasps the beauty, the simplicity and the reality of the kinship of our Elder Brother, and the reality of the eternal and the supernatural life as compared with the life that now is. When you get them knit together, and he sees the naturalness, then it is only a step into the supernatural and the eternal and the immortal. The Bible then becomes a panoramic vision of God's dealings in the past, because it deals with the principles that produce the conditions-the Divine reward and condemnation, in the providence of God. We may say that it is a book to-day in the hands of men for the purpose of civilization, in those haunts of darkness and vice and crime where civilization is not known. It is not only the revelation of God to man, but it is the revelation of man to himself. If any of you people were down to hear Sam Jones the other night, one particular thing especially he said, and that is how years and years ago he fell upon the book as the key to his own peculiar mechanism; just as if some piece of machinery that he got

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the got was all to pieces, and that he found a book of directions that told him how to put the machinery together. Years ago, in a parallel sense, he was all to pieces and he happened to run across a Book; he began to read the Book and to make up his mind that the author of the Book was the author of himself; the one that wrote the Book knew him, and the Book told him how to put himself together. That is No man knows himself a literal interpretation of the value of the Word of God. except as he sees himself mirrored in the life of Jesus Christ. The poor ignorant Frenchman of the St. Lawrence doesn't know what kind of a life he ought to live. I can't tell him; you can't tell him; we can't show him because we don't live the life we ought to live ourselves. Very few men here can say, "Follow me as I follow Jesus Christ." I can't; none of you can, because of the weakness of human nature to-day we can't do that, and so we have to point them to the one invincible, spotless, Christ-man; and if you want to know how to walk and what to do, there is the type of character. Then they begin to think over it and say, "The Book is good for something; it is real, isn't it?" Certainly it is real; that is what it is for-to teach them the kind of men and women, the kind of home, the kind of government, the kind of education, the kind of immortal life that they are here and hereafter to have. Men are going to start it; they are going to advance it; they are going to wing it with their prayers and also their contributions as one of the civilizing and advancing agencies of the present to-day. It is a revelation of man If we could forget just for the time that it to himself in all its purity and unity. is a religious book, and read it as a collection of pictures and biographies from the past, there will be an infinitely new fascination lent unto us for it. If we could get rid of the false reverence of our hearts for it, it would become a book of reality, of naturalness. Half of your boys and girls in the Sunday School right here in your home that read these Bible stories will come up to you and me and scratch their heads and wonder, "Was their ever such a man as that?" "Was there ever such a thing as that?" "Do you suppose that ever did happen?" "Or is that just simply spiritual?" The Bible has got to be interpreted and translated into the light and love of the present if it is to have a present value for them. The beauty of the Bible is that when you look into it and read the history in the book itself, it is something like looking into one of those glass-faced clocks on the mantel -not intended to keep accurate time, but just kept there so that it will tick and make believe it is keeping time. You will see the machinery, not only the hands on the face, but you can see the wheels working, cog within cog on the inside, the motion of the internal mechanism producing the movement on the outside. So when you come to read the history in the Word of God, you can see the wheels working behind that produce the manifestation in front. You can find set forth the causes why certain empires were overthrown, why certain people fall, why certain conditions don't remain permanent as a social factor. Then, again, there is an individual life in all this mechanism of human nature that becomes very apparent to us. The follies of life are set forth; the tree of life is shown; the sins of Samuel and Elijah and David are exposed, and the prophets quarrel among themselves. The Bible shows that unfortunate weak side of human nature; it becomes a revealer and interpreter of human nature to men; and the only perfect man you will find set forth in the Word of God is the only perfect man

that ever has lived or ever will live within time. He is the same yesterday, to-day and forever. The Bible shows the progress of religion from the lowest to the highest times, from fetishism, polytheism and monotheism up to the highest forms where Christ said to the woman, "God is a Spirit." You have progress in worship, from that blind, ignorant devotion and false reverence and fetish worship, up to that high degree where the true worship is the internal sacrifices of our purposes in life, the giving of ourselves up to some high and noble aim in the world. As the race progresses from some form of barbarism up to a higher form of humanitarianism we pass through those same stages of existence to-day. Thus the record God has made in the past becomes the reproduction to-day. While you and I distinguish between barbarity and humanity, between darkness and light, between heathenism and civilization, that is always a relative comparison-it is never absolute. We compare our civilization to-day with the heathen races, tribes, pagans and nomads of the past. We will be looked upon a hundred years from now as the barbarism, as the heathenism, as the uncivilized in comparison with the everadvancing type, the spiritual type that reaches the highest type of society, as God's Kingdom keeps coming in fuller and fuller until at last the world shall be full of His love, and the kings of this earth shall be kings of the everlasting God. It is a good thing to put that book in the hands of men who are living to-day in darkness and sin and ignorance, and let them read it, because they see that there have been others long ago before just like them; there has been the same experience passed through by others: it becomes in deed and in truth the book not only of the life that is to come, but of the life that now is. But I am wondering as our good brother is working down there in Quebec. He brings us that dark, morose, harrowing picture of superstition and of ignorance, where the mind as well as the body is bound, fettered and shackled as in the dark ages. When I saw him bringing these images out and setting them down, I thought, "Is he from India or China or Africa? These things from the American continent-from within a night's ride of Toronto! Is it possible that there is that spirit? Yea, it is here. Talk about foreign mission work! It is in Toronto; it is right here!" Now, as I look around this annual meeting of the Upper Canada Bible Society I was wondering just how much interest this meeting represented to-night. I suppose I can say something because I don't belong to it; it is nothing to me only that I am interested—everybody here is interested-in the spread of the Word of Lite. Now, if there was to-day an intelligent interest and practical sympathy with the Word of God as a law of society, as a book of life, as a rule for conducting the daily affairs of the individual and of society, it strikes me as rather peculiar that more people are not interested in spreading it in that spirit and in that truth. I wonder how many of you have got that little book by Charles M. Sheldon, "In His Steps," that is on sale down town. I advertised that last Sunday morning at my communion service. "What would Jesus do?" That is the Bible, and all that is in the Bible; that is, finding out what would Jesus do now; and you and I can only find out what would Jesus do now by knowing what Jesus did then. It becomes the key and the interpreter and the guide of the living present. If you can get men interested in this Upper Canada Bible Society to give this book to men in order that they may come to know what Jesus would do, and by the spirit of Jesus be able to do it, it will become the be an increasing to-day the outward a that it ma (Applause

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J. C. After become the Book of Life unto them, one and all. I hope and pray that there will be an increasing interest. With increasing problems and increasing demands, and increasing vice and crime apparently, it would seem as though there ought to be to-day the very highest tidal wave of interest bearing this Society onward and outward and upward in its glorious mission. May God bless it to that end; but that it may attain that end we must be pledged to its furtherance and support. (Applause).

J. C. COPP, Esq., seconded the resolution, which was carried.

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
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After the doxology had been sung, Rev. Dr. Potts pronounced the benediction and the meeting closed.
