

In submitting its report to the Conference, your Committee would call the attention of Chairmen of Districts to the necessity of such care being taken in the District Meetings regarding the statistical returns as will secure the presenting of correct schedules to the Conference. This might be attained by the Conference regulation regarding auditors being strictly observed.

We present the following summary of statistics:-

MEMBERSHIP.

Received on trial during the year, 2,690. Present membership: On trial, 1,264; full membership, 26,726; total, 27,990; increase, 674. Baptisms, 1,567; marriages, 811; burials, 1,218.

OFFICIARY.

Ministers: Effective, 107; superannuated, 32; supernumerary, 3; probationers, 15; total, 157. Local preachers, 184; exhorters, 75; class-leaders, 960; stewards, 772; representatives, 894; Sunday School superintendents, 263; Epworth League presidents, 67; net total, 2,806.

SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT.

Your Committee is pleased to note the continued prosperity of our Sabbath Schools within the Conference.

There are 269 schools, being one of a decrease, but we are pleased that there is a Methodist Sabbath School at all the appointments within the Conference except twenty places, and in most of these there is a union school, so that the Conference may be said to be fully organized. We have an attendance of 25,889 scholars, an increase of fifty-seven. The number of

conversions—for which the School really exists—is very encouraging, being 1,306, an increase of eighty-eight over last year. 6,985 are members of the Church, an increase of 591.

We fear the number reported as having taken the "total abstinence pledge" is misleading, from the fact that many limit the question to those who have taken the pledge during the year, whereas the object of the question is to ascertain how many of our Sabbath School children are now pledged abstainers, no matter how long since the pledge was signed. We certainly think that more than twenty-six per cent. are total abstainers.

We would recommend that the children in our Sabbath Schools be taught the evils arising from the use of liquor and tobacco, and we rejoice to know that the Legislature of our province has recognized this evil in making it a crime to sell tobacco to minors.

To have our children well grounded in the truth requires more than eight per cent. as now shown to be studying the catechism, and we recommend that the catechism be introduced into all schools, and about ten or fifteen minutes be devoted to its study each Sabbath.

We are pleased to see the large number of our own Sabbath School periodicals taken. Though there is a large falling off in the circulation of *Pleasant Hours* and *Happy Days*, it is compensated by the increased circulation of *Onward*.

We are surprised to find some of our best circuits, notably in Brantford District, neglecting to take our own Sabbath School periodicals. We believe it would be wise to publish the Sunday School Banner at fifty cents per annum, to be on a par with similar publications issued by other Churches, and to keep out American publications which in some places supplant our own. We do not think that a better quality or quantity for the money can be secured anywhere else, and we sincerely hope our Sabbath Schools will avail themselves of the advantages to be found in our own Book Room.

A Scholars' Quarterly, for adult classes, would be of great advantage to the senior scholars, and we recommend this to the favorable consideration of the Sunday School Board.

We also recommend that T. W. Jackson be Secretary-Treasurer for the present year.

That the object of the fund be clearly stated before taking the collection, especially the following points: (a) That necessary Conference expenses and special claims of affliction alone can be considered legitimate; (b) That the salary of a minister regulates his claim on this fund, no minister having any claim whose salary amounts to \$800 or over, and others only in cases of very special affliction; (c) That cases of ordinary expenses for physician's bills cannot be entertained; (d) That when a circuit requiring ministerial supply during the year is considered by the committee abundantly able to pay for the same, the committee may reduce the claim, or rule it out altogether; (e) That the maximum amount allowed for funeral expenses shall be, for the minister or his wife, \$40; for children from twelve to eighteen years of age, \$30; and for children under twelve years of age, \$20.

3. That the Secretary of the Conference for the current year order the necessary supplies for his successor in office.

4. That the Rev. J. H. Collins be re-elected the Treasurer.

The President of the Conference opened the meeting with devotional exercises. Eleven presented themselves for examination in the preliminary course, eleven in the first year, five in the second year, and three in the third year's course.

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certificates issued by this Board, it was resolved to report to the Conference as follows:—

(1) That the new form of certificate provides a column whereby marks given by our own College authorities may now be recorded in the certificate.

(2) In the case of provincial teachers', matriculation, and undergraduate certificates, it is the opinion of this Board that the subjects which these certificates cover be marked simply as passed, unless the candidate furnishes official proof of the marks he has obtained.

On the evening of Wednesday the 20th, a public meeting was held in the church, the President of the Conference in the chair. Addresses were delivered by Revs. R. W. Woodsworth and D. L. Brethour, Ph.D., after which the Secretary presented to the successful candidates their certificates and records of standing.

On motion of Bro. S. W. Fallis, seconded by J. M. Wright, the candidates and probationers unanimously passed a resolution of sympathy with Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Stoney, of Hamilton, in the loss of their son, Rev. H. E. C. Stoney, and the Secretary was requested to forward a letter of condolence, which was done.

REPORT OF TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee on Temperance begs leave to report as follows:

1. We declare that we abate no jot of our demand for immediate Prohibition as the right of the people of this country from its Government.

2. That although we did not regard the Prohibition Commission as required, yet we note with gladness that the petitions for Prohibition have resulted in positive action and policy on the part of the Government and Parliament, so that thereby the question of Prohibition has become actually introduced into politics. With a view to securing as favorable a report as possible, we strongly recommend all persons who have information favorable to Prohibition to make all that information available to the Commission—voluntarily if necessary.

3. Having declared frequently, and believing still, that "the liquor traffic cannot be legalized without sin." we are driven to the inference that every act of voluntary complicity with the issue of any license is morally indefensible, so that we cannot endorse any Christian man or member of our Church incurring any avoidable responsibility for the authorization or issue of a license. With the anomaly that this will likely place the enforcement of the law in the hands of those favorable to the traffic, we have nothing to do, but cast the responsibility, therefore, entirely upon the authors and abettors of the license system.

4. We believe that in no respect is it the duty of the Temperance people to enforce any Temperance legislation whatever—beyond that ordinary support which we give to any law—even if that legislation were entirely in accord with their own request. Such enforcement belongs exclusively to the Government, which in no case ought to evade its responsibility, but especially ought not to do so when the legislation does not profess to be in harmony with the demands of Temperance people.

5. We recommend (a) that a Quarterly Temperance Meeting be held wherever possible at each appointment; (b) That a Band of Hope be organized in each Sunday School; (c) That the Temperance Fund for this Conference be sustained by one collection during the year from each Sunday School to be taken on some Sabbath when a Temperance lesson is taught; (d) We urge more zeal in the circulation of the pledge in the Sabbath School, as a comparatively small proportion of signatures are reported.

6. We recognize with gratitude the generosity of Mr. Thomas C. Watkins, in offering to gratuitously supply tracts on various phases of Temperance instruction suitable for use in the home, church and school. We recommend our people to avail themselves of this kind offer by writing (enclosing necessary stamps for postage) to W. W. Buchanan, Royal

Templar Publishing House, James Street North, Hamilton.

7. We are glad to know that the validity of the provisions for local

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option by municipalities has been vindicated by the decision of the full Court of Appeal. We recommend, wherever practicable, that by the adoption of this measure our people should endeavor to wash their hands of responsibility for the continuance of the traffic in their midst.

8. The Simcoe District Meeting requests that inasmuch as a license has been granted to Orchard Beech Park at Port Dover, a resort frequently visited by our Sunday Schools and Church organizations, the Conference advise such organizations of this fact, and to withhold their patronage from said park and all other summer resorts where intoxicating liquors We recommend Conference to accede to the request.

9. In accordance with the request of the council of the Dominion Alliance, we recommend the following as delegates to the annual meeting of the Alliance to be held in Montreal in September, 1892: Rev. Dr.

Brethour and Jos. Gibson, Esq.

10. In view of the fact that the teaching of Temperance in our public schools has been made compulsory, we urge our people to see that their children are not through any neglect or indifference of teachers deprived of this great privilege.

11. We hail with great satisfaction the adoption of legislation prohibit-

ing the sale of tobacco to persons under eighteen years of age.

12. We beg to report that during the year a Temperance Convention was held as appointed by Conference on each of the following districts, viz.: Brantford, Woodstock, Simcoe, Milton and Welland. Hamilton, St. Catharines and Norwich did not hold such conventions. The collections as reported to the Treasurer of the Annual Conference Fund amount to \$14.61, which, with the collection at the Conference Temperance Meeting, \$10.21, makes a total of \$24.82.

13. That Rev. J. W. Cooley be appointed treasurer of the Niagara

Conference Temperance Fund.

2. Rev. A. A. Bowers, B.A., recommended by the Brantford District Meeting to be restored to active work; your Committee concur in the recommendation.

3. Rev. Eph. L. Clement. The Norwich District Meeting recommends that he be restored to the active work. Your Committee have carefully considered the case, and recommend it to the consideration of the Stationing Committee, with a view to his restoration to active work if a suitable appointment can be found; but if such cannot be found, your Committee recommend that his superannuated relation be continued.

4. Rev. Ezra Adams. The Norwich District Meeting recommend that he be granted a superannuation relation for one year. Your Committee

concur in the recommendation.

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COMMITTEE ON STATE OF WORK.

Your Committee begs leave to report as follows:-

With deep gratitude to God we rejoice that through earnest labors on the various fields throughout this Conference there have been gathered into the Church 3,826, making a net increase of 674. This is very gratifying, especially when we recall the circumstances under which the work has been prosecuted, owing to unfavorable weather and the prevalence of the la grippe.

Especial evangelistic agencies have proved eminently successful on a number of charges in our Conference during the year, but while reference is made to these special means, we would not pass unnoticed, much less undervalue, the faithful and persistent labors of the regular ministry, aided by our loval people.

We would call attention to the ordinary means of grace, and the regularly established agencies of the Church; the Sabbath School which is the seed-bed of the Church; the Epworth Leagues, and Christian Endeavors, which are not only the connecting links between the Sabbath Schools and Church-membership, but are training-schools for service in every department of the Church. The class-meeting, which is the time-honored and distinctive feature of our beloved Methodism, and which we regard as the thermometer of the Church's piety, should be more loyally supported by faithful attendance, and we think that every method, such as lively singing, short prayers, and brief pointed testimonies, tending to render these meetings seasons of grace and blessing as well as attractive to our young people, should be observed, and we further recommend that our ministers lovingly and earnestly urge upon our people the importance of this means of grace.

Nor would we forget the mid-week prayer service of the Church which has ever been a strength and help to those who attend. The cares and burdens of everyday life, together with the constant demands of social life and the pursuit of pleasure, too often lead our people to absent themselves from this profitable means of grace.

In harmony with the wish of many brethren, we would advise the holding of conventions for the promotion of the work of God, especially in the larger centres of population.

We have reason to believe that on many of our charges the financial interests of our Churches suffer through allowing the first-half of the year to pass without raising the proportionate amount of money for that period; this brings a very heavy financial pressure upon the closing months of the Conference year.

The attention of your Committee has also been called to the fact that many of our members are lost to the Church through removing without letters of removal. We also find that many letters of removal are directed to no particular Church. We also find that in many cases members moving to cities or towns are directed to the larger Churches, though they may reside in the vicinity of the smaller Churches. Your Committee would recommend that efforts be made to induce our people to attend the Churches to which they geographically belong.

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REPORT OF CHURCH AND PARSONAGE PROPERTY. COMMITTEE.

Your Committee after carefully considering all the cases brought before them, begs leave to report as follows:—

Hamilton District.—The Centenary Church, Hamilton, Trustee Board asks permission to sell the West End Mission lots, to apply the proceeds on present debts, and if there be any surplus, said surplus to be applied on new Sabbath School room. Recommended.

Binbrook.—The Trustee Board of Trinity parsonage asks permission to sell said property and apply the proceeds of sale in the purchase or erection of another parsonage on Binbrook Circuit, and in the event of any appointment on this Circuit becoming a part of any other Circuit, that the said appointment shall have the net amount contributed by it to said parsonage refunded, less the depreciation of said property in value; and until such time as the parsonage is secured, the money from the sale of the Trinity parsonage shall be held by the Trustee Board subject to the direction of the Quarterly Board of Binbrook Circuit. Recommended.

Brantford District.—The Trustee Board of the Bethel Church, Lynden Circuit, asks permission to sell one-half acre of their church lot, and apply the proceeds of sale to the liquidation of debt on the parsonage of Lynden Circuit. Recommended.

Woodstock District.—The Trustee Board of Bright Church, Bright Circuit, asks permission to sell the old church property and apply the proceeds of sale to the erection of a new church. Recommended.

Simcoe District.—The Trustee Board of the Waterford Church asks permission to sell a portion of the parsonage property, and to apply the proceeds in purchasing land for shed purposes. Recommended.

Welland District.—The Trustee Board of the Trinity Church, Canboro' Circuit, asks permission to sell the church property, and apply proceeds towards the erection of a new parsonage for that Circuit. Recommended.

Norwich District.—The Trustee Board of the Centre Church, Dereham Circuit, asks permission to sell the old church and apply the proceeds of sale on the new church now being erected. Recommended.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

We are thankful to God that we live in a land where the Sabbath day is so generally observed. We call upon our people to uphold this sacred institution, as one of the pillars of our holy Christianity, and deprecate anything that would invade the sanctity of the Lord's day. The enjoyment of religious liberty is dear to us, and we realize that those things that encroach upon this liberty and tend to destroy it must have our open opposition. The eyes of wicked men are looking for the day, and their hearts are longing for the time, when the restraints surrounding this hallowed institution shall be removed, and the day become one of amusement instead of worship, of pleasure-seeking instead of church-going, of holiday-

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making instead of glorifying God. We believe this to be one of our strongholds, against which the enemy is particularly directing his assaults and continually aiming at its overthrow. We are confident that in upholding the sanctity of this day we are standing by the highest interests of the individual, the community, the nation, and, above all, the kingdom of Christ.

When we consider what momentous issues are at stake, moral, social, national and religious, and dependent upon the right observance of the Sabbath, we feel that as a Church it is ours to stand unitedly and loyally

for the upholding of this day as "Holy unto the Lord."

For the furtherance of this end your Committee would respectfully recommend:

1. That in pursuance of the requirement of the General Conference of 1890 (Journal, page 299), a time be fixed by this Conference when each minister within our boundary shall be required to preach a sermon on the subject to his congregation or congregations in which the divine origin and perpetual obligation of the Christian Sabbath as a day of rest and worship be explained and enforced, and your Committee would respect-

fully suggest the month of October as a suitable time.

2. In regard to the memorial from the Woodstock District re Sabbath Observance, your Committee are in hearty sympathy with the resolution, and recommend that this Conference expresses its deep regret that the present session of the House of Commons has taken no satisfactory action in the matter of Sabbath observance, and has failed to express the strong feeling of the Christian people of the Dominion as expressed by petition that her connection with the Columbian Exhibition, to be held at Chicago, should be marked by a strict observance of the Lord's day, by declining to request that its gates be closed upon the Sabbath day. That we express our strong and unqualified disapproval of the action of Parliament upon so vital a question, and though our legislators may not compel the reverent observance of the day of rest, they can protect it from open, shameless and avowed desecration; that though they cannot force the stream of population into the churches, they may help to keep from places avowedly unfriendly to religion. We agree that the State is bound to remove every temptation from the masses to dishonor the day dedicated to public We therefore urge and pray that the strength of legislation be arrayed against Sabbath desecration.

3. We suggest to the editors of our periodicals, including the Sabbath School papers, the desirability of frequently referring to the great importance and solemn obligation of Sabbath observance, so that our people may have the matter before them, and to wage continual warfare against the running of railway trains, street cars, steamboats and all public convey-

ances on the Lord's day.

4. We would earnestly request our people to discountenance Sabbath social visiting, Sabbath parades, Sabbath funerals, except in cases of extreme necessity, the hiring of conveyances for use on that day, travelling either for business or pleasure, neglect of God's house, and all other practices calculated to dissipate spiritual thoughts and feelings, and prevent the cultivation of religion.

5. Whereas strenuous efforts have been made for the better observance of the Sabbath within the bounds of the Niagara Conference, your com-

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observance your committee would recommend that the Conference put itself on record expressing its strong disapproval of the opening to the public of the gates of public parks and summer resorts where religious services are held, as the same is a prolific source of Sabbath desecration, and believing that the sanctity of the Lord's day will be the better preserved if within the bounds of this Conference all such places be kept strictly closed on that day, so that it may be a season of rest and worship, rather than of dissipation within the gates, and would urge upon the managers of such institutions a cordial compliance with the recommendation.

6. We recommend that this report be read in all our congregations at an early date.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Report of the Treasurers for the Year ending July 31st, 1891, as adopted by the Board.

We beg herewith to submit the Annual Statement of the Superannuation Fund:—

The affairs of the Fund occupied the earnest consideration of the General Conference, which body appointed a commission, consisting of ministers and laymen, representing different shades of opinion, to take the whole question into consideration, and report to the next General Conference.

The commission has met, and appointed sub-committees to collect information from a great variety of sources, and present it in tabulated form. Important beneficial results may be expected from the thorough and impartial examination of the whole question.

The amount raised from Circuits has exceeded that of the previous year by \$1,862.04. It is, however, just to state that a small portion of this increase arises from back payments on account of former years. The Interest Account is also in advance of the former year, \$1,249.37, and the Book Room has added \$200 to the grant of the preceding year, making the yearly grant now \$6,500.

We have received in legacies this year \$6,437.25, which sum embraces the half of the legacy of the late William Gooderham. There appears to be a praiseworthy disposition on the part of our people to remember this Fund in the final distribution of their property.

We are, however, still under the necessity of expressing our regret that there are a few Circuits that have failed to pay their apportionments in full, to the great embarrassment of the ministers laboring on them, and to the great injury of the Church. The aggregate amount is not comparatively very large, but the example is bad and it is not just to those Conferences and Circuits that are loyal to the laws of the Church.

The new claims this year are exceptionally large and amount to \$9,630, while expired claims are only \$5,848, leaving a balance of \$3,782, less \$382, being the difference between the debt of the last year and the pre-

sent one, or \$3,400 to be provided for, the entire claims for the year being \$87,084. The estimated income of the Fund will be about \$85,334, so far as we can at present ascertain. The Treasurers did not, however, feel at liberty to increase the percentage on the assessable income.

CONSTITUTION OF SUSTENTATION FUND.

1. The object of this Fund shall be to secure salaries of not less than \$750 for ordained married ministers, \$400 for ordained unmarried ministers, and \$350 for probationers; provided, nevertheless, that no appropriation from this Fund shall be made to married ministers who have received more than \$550 for salary, board and fuel; or to ordained single ministers who have received \$250 for salary in addition to board; or to probationers who have received \$200 in addition to board, until these sums respectively have been provided in full.

2. The income of this Fund shall be derived from a collection taken

up in all our congregations, in the month of March in each year.

3. The Committee for the distribution of the Fund shall consist of a minister and layman from each District, and shall be appointed by the Conference.

4. There shall be a Conference Treasurer appointed on the nomina-

tion of the said Sustentation Fund Committee.

5. This constitution shall be printed in the Minutes of Conference from year to year.

REPORT OF THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

The Committee met and organized by appointing Revs. Jas. H. McCartney, Chairman, and Thos. Boyd, Secretary.

The memorials referred were duly considered, and your Committee

reports as follows:-

- 1. In reference to the memorial from the Woodstock District concerning horse keep, it was recommended that the maximum amount be fixed at \$75.00.
- 2. Re the memorial from the Provincial Prison Reform Conference in reference to Prison Reform, we recommend the approval of the ten resolutions adopted by the Prison Reform Conference, held in Toronto, November, 27th, 1891; that the same is commended to the favorable consideration of our legislators—both Dominion and Provincial—and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Hon. Sir J. S. D. Thompson, Minister of Justice, to the Hon. Sir Oliver Mowat, Attorney-General, Province of Ontario, and to the Press for publication; and we recommend the appointment of Rev. Alexander Burns, D.D., and Wm. McCleary, M.P.P., as a committee to co-operate in securing such legislation as will bring the contemplated reforms into effect.

3. Re the memorial from the Sabbath School Association of Ontario, concerning the duties of citizenship, the Committee having duly considered the questions involved, wish to say that while we are prepared to cordially co-operate in any effort to improve the moral tone of society, yet, at present, we are not aware of anything further to recommend, believing as we do, that the influence now exercised by the use of the Bible in the Public

Schools is accomplishing an effective and leavening work.

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REPORT OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE COMMITTEE.

Your Epworth League Committee is gratified to be enabled to report a splendid growth during the past year in this important department of Church enterprise. Whereas, last year, Niagara Conference reported only forty-five Leagues, with a membership of 1,780, to-day we find there are sixty-seven Leagues, having a membership of 2,818, thus showing that our people appreciate the helpfulness of the method and results of league work in the growth of our Church. The League enlists in the service of God multitudes of earnest young people who accomplish an incalculable amount of good in bringing their young companions into sympathy and co-operation with Church life and work. This organization presents the promise and the potency of inestimable benefit, and we express the hope that all our people will soon awaken to its usefulness and helpfulness, and that during this year, in every Circuit, if not at every appointment, there shall be organized a League of young people who shall be imbued with the sentiment of Bishop Simpson's memorable sentence, "We live to make our own Church a power in the land, while we live to love every other Church that exalts our Christ."

The young people have always had a large place in the work of the Methodist Church. Her great successes have largely resulted from the constant infusion of youthful energy into the great body of her The organization of the Epworth League is a reproduction, in the nineteenth century, of the spirit and purpose of the "Holy Club" of the eighteenth century. Its four departments of Christian endeavor, religious work, literary work, and social work, are identical with the four purposes aimed at by the Oxford brotherhood of a century and a half ago, but adapted to the methods of this practical age. Our league is truly denominational—"A thoroughly Methodistic movement, designed to build up Methodism, that Methodism may do more effective work in building up the cause of Christ everywhere." At the same time it provides for affiliation and co-operation with all young people's societies of every denomination that are organized to work "for Christ and the Church," and thus "form a league, offensive and defensive, with every soldier of Jesus Christ." What shall result from the labor of this great army of young workers organized for the promotion of personal piety, personal culture, and personal service in the aggressive work of the Church?

We rejoice with you all that this organization has been eminently useful in developing personal service in God's cause among our young people; while their attention has been directed to several courses of study, such as Bible clubs for systematic study of God's Word, which have suggested to them many opportunities for the cultivation of mind and morals, and thus with improved opportunities to do work for God; and with our young people subscribing to and living out our pledge in the constitution, "Taking Christ as my example, and trusting in the help of the Holy Spirit, I promise that I will endeavor to learn and do my heavenly Father's will," the Methodist Church of the future will far surpass the record of the past in work done, and character produced. Valuable as is the service of young people to the Church, it is of more moment to themselves that they be cultured in methods of active Christian work. We give our hearts most to that for which we most toil and sacrifice. "Where your treasure is "—

your investment of prayer, and struggle, and self-forgetting service—"there will your heart be also." If young people, in their youth-time of enthusiasm and energetic action, can be led to do the work in all our Churches, which youth, and only youth can do, their love for Christ's kingdom shall steadily strengthen, they will grow in grace, and thus come to "the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ."

With these considerations your Committee would earnestly recommend:—

1. That all our ministers seek to organize on each of our 113 Circuits, and, if possible, at each of our 289 preaching appointments, a branch of

the Epworth League.

· 2. That every league be urged to affiliate with the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor, and in every case where an Endeavor Society exists in Methodist Churches, it be urged to affiliate with the Epworth League, according to arrangements made by the authorities of both movements, under the general name of Epworth League of Christian Endeavor.

3. That in every district Epworth League Conventions be held at some suitable time during the year, and that in the plan of public anniversaries for next Conference arrangements be made to have the Epworth League

represented at the Conference S. S. Anniversary.

4. That all our young people's societies be urged to send delegates, and in every possible way contribute to the success of the Second Annual Convention of the Methodist Young People's Association, to be held in Hamilton, in February, 1893.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SYSTEMATIC BENEFICENCE.

In presenting our Report on Systematic Beneficence we are glad to know that recent discussions on this subject have been followed by beneficial results. Proportionate and systematic giving, so strongly commended to our people by the highest court of our Church, and also by the repeated deliverances of our own Annual Conference, is being more widely adopted in our Churches as the advantages of this scriptural method are more clearly seen and understood.

Churches that have given this matter a fair trial have found it eminently successful, and have no disposition to return to former plans for

raising money.

But while we hail with delight the tendency in our Church to rise to a higher plane of religious consecration and giving, we must express our deep regret that so much laxity still prevails, and that so much practical unbelief in the promises of God still exists, as amply shown by the great difficulty experienced in many instances in raising sufficient money from year to year to meet the absolute requirements of the work. We further regret that while some of our congregations have adopted the method recommended by our Conference, many Churches are still resorting to unbecoming devices to raise money for the Lord's cause, your Committee being of

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so rise to a ss our deep cal unbelief at difficulty om year to her regret and recomo unbecombe being of the opinion that any method of Church finance other than that of direct giving is unworthy of the Christian Church.

It is evident, therefore that much yet remains to be done. The work of educating the people should be prosecuted with increased vigor, literature on this subject should be more widely circulated, and organized effort put forth to give permanency and success to this forward movement in sustaining the numerous financial interests of our Church. As there is now a good supply of literature on this subject, our people need not be ignorant concerning the question in hand. Your Committee would commend the following productions for careful perusal, viz., "Gold and the Gospel," "Mammon," "The Path of Wealth," "Prize Essays on Proportionate Giving," "Twenty-five Points on Giving," "Pay, Pray and Prosper," "Layman's Tracts" (published in Chicago), "Proportionate Giving," by Wm. Arthur, and The Worker, a monthly non-denominational paper devoted to systematic giving and Christian missions, published in Laconing, Maryland. Most of the above books and tracts can be obtained by application to our own Book Room. In addition to the circulation of literature, we would recommend our pastors and people to organize Systematic Beneficence Societies on their circuits.

We would urge the Official Boards, the Ladies' Aid Societies and the Young People's Societies on all our Circuits throughout the Conference to co-operate in giving practical effect to the recommendations of our General Conference on the subject of systematic beneficence. Those recommendations are as follows:

1. "That all our people be urged to give to the cause of God as He has prospered them, at the rate of at least one-tenth of their income, and that the use of all unscriptural methods of raising money for Church purposes be discountenanced as unworthy a Christian people.

2. "That in addition to the teaching of the pulpit on the duty of systematic giving, our ministers be earnestly requested to arrange for the circulation, throughout their congregations, of suitable literature on this important subject."

We repeat the direction of the Conference last year, that each pastor read this report to his congregation, and that at some time during the year a sermon or sermons be preached on the subject of Systematic Christian Beneficence.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DUNDAS STREET CHURCH, WOODSTOCK.

Your Committee appointed in the matter of the Dundas Street Church, Woodstock, begs to report as follows:—

1. We find that the Board decided to build a new church at a cost not to exceed from \$10,000 to \$12,000, but owing to change of purpose as to site, difference in price of lots, and some change in plans, the cost of church would reach at least \$17,000.

2. We find that the Board of Trustees, with the consent of the pastor, undertook this huge undertaking with a subscription list of \$4,840 and a verbal promise of \$500, and with a possible income from sale of old church of \$1,000, in all \$6,340, or about one-third of the estimated cost, which was quite contrary to Discipline.

3. We further find that the church and parsonage were not only completed, but furnished, and that the actual cost of all reached \$26,271; and that at the opening a further subscription was taken up amounting to \$8,027. Of the combined amounts mentioned there has been realized \$4,928, and after writing off \$4,811 as being worthless, the representative of that Church thinks that the sum of \$3,000 may be realized towards the liquidation of the debt.

4. Your Committee also find that there is a mortgage on the church of \$12,166, and a mortgage on the parsonage of \$2,000, and a floating liability of \$8,159, making in all a debt of \$22,325, with an asset of the church and parsonage property and a probable amount from subscriptions of \$3,000.

5. We also find that there is a membership of 273, and an average congregation, taking morning and evening toge her, of 400. The ordinary income last year, taking envelopes and collections together, was \$31 per week, which amounted to \$1,612; in addition to this there will be \$300 or \$400 from pew rents.

6. Your Committee in dealing with this question cannot but regret that the Trustees entered upon such an undertaking with so little ability to carry the scheme to successful completion, and would strongly intimate that, if Trustee Boards will unwisely enter upon and bind themselves to impossible undertakings, they cannot expect either sympathy or substantial aid from the Connexion. Your Committee can only account for the blunder in this case on the ground that those concerned were animated with the hope that the boom which then existed would continue and grow. Instead of that being realized, the boom collapsed and values have shrunk, and several of the promoters. Trustees and others, have left Woodstock; and now only three or four Trustees remain, none of whom are wealthy. Your Committee are not insensible to the fact that it is very much easier to find fault after the deed is done than during its progress.

7. Your Committee would recommend, after a careful weighing of all the facts, that the sympathy of this Converence and its hearty co-operation be enlisted on behalf of this Church on the following grounds:—

(a) That the property is needed and that it is well worth the amount against it.

(b) That the few remaining Trustees would be completely ruined financially.

(c) Inasmuch as the said Church offered to raise \$3,000 to help to pay the floating indebtedness, together with the interest on the mortgages of \$14,166 and the running expenses of the Church, we recommend that the Rev. G. W. Kerby, B.A., be set apart to raise the balance of the floating indebtedness now resting on the church and parsonage property, he still retaining the superintendency of the Hannah Street Church, and the Hannah Street Church continuing to pay his salary as at present. We further recommend that the Stationing Committee be requested to appoint a young man as an assistant to Mr. Kerby in the Hannah Street

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Church, and that the disciplinary salary be paid to said assistant out of the funds collected by Mr. Kerby. The Committee is unanimously of the opinion that this is the most equitable arrangement that can be made under the circumstances, and that the Hannah Street Church will not suffer thereby.

ALBERT COLLEGE.

To the Niagara Annual Conference of the Methodist Church:

Dear Fathers and Brethren,—The present College year, 1891-92, has been, under the blessing of God, one of prosperity and advancement in connection with Albert College. Two hundred and twenty students have enrolled during the year. We are again able to report an increase in attendance upon that of any preceding year. There has been a steady growth from 125 students in 1885-86 to 220 in 1891-92, so that in seven years the attendance has been nearly doubled. In that time the College building has been considerably enlarged, and yet there is an almost imperative need for largely increased accommodation.

The College still maintains the highest efficiency in its class work. The large number of successful candidates in departmental and University examinations is a source of great satisfaction to the Principal and faculty.

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There are forty-three matriculants in preparation—twenty-five seniors and eighteen juniors. A large number of young men who passed junior matriculation at a high school or collegiate institute have come to Albert College for their first year's work in Arts in preference to going to a university; surely no higher compliment could be paid to the thoroughness and efficiency of the work done.

It is becoming more widely known that Albert College offers unequalled advantages for Conference preliminary students, and every year finds a large class in attendance for this work. Over twenty persons wrote at the College on this examination in April last. Special classes are formed in theology, and every attention is given to Conference students. The College also offers very superior advantages in elocution at a very moderate cost, so that students contemplating the ministry are afforded every possible help.

It is the desire of the Principal that attention should be called to the fact that Albert College can and does compete successfully with the best equipped collegiate institute in the preparation of candidates for the primary and junior leaving examinations, or for what was known as second and third-class teacher's certificates. The College sends up annually a number of candidates for these examinations, and has been successful in passing an exceptionally large percentage of them. When parents must send their children from home for this work, by all means send them to Albert College.

Many of our Methodist people pass by their own institution and send their sons for a business education to ordinary commercial colleges. The consequence is they pay more to get a vastly inferior business education than though they sent them to their own denominational schools. Albert College affords every facility for a thorough, practical business education that the best equipped commercial college does, and besides offers the very best opportunity to secure a solid English education. Many of the graduates of Albert College are filling lucrative positions as accountants.

The Departments of Music and Fine Arts are doing excellent work, and no effort will be spared to make them thoroughly efficient.

The College has always been foremost in the missionary zeal of its students.

Mr. J. F. Livingston, whom the students purpose sending as a missionary to Africa, has recently graduated as B.A. at Victoria University. He purposes spending a couple of years in the study of medicine, when the students hope to have one of their own number in the foreign field. The students have already raised over seven hundred dollars (\$700), and are busily engaged in raising funds for that purpose.

We gladly recognize the practical aid given to Albert College by both the ministry and laity of the Church, and to this a large measure of the success of the College may be attributed. We render thanksgiving to God for the great prosperity He has vouchsafed to us in our work, and we earnestly labor and pray that Albert College may not only be a high-class academy, but may be the spiritual birthplace of many souls. We earnestly covet the students for Christ. We still ask for your hearty co-operation.

Notice of Motion re Sustentation Fund.

With a view to strengthen the bonds of Connexional Methodism, to facilitate the work of the Stationing Committee, and to promote the work of God throughout the Conference, I give notice, that at some convenient time to-morrow (June 4th), I will move that the following addition be made to section 2 of the constitution of the Sustentation Fund, as found on page 62 of the Minutes of the Conference, 1891: "and from a graduated assessment on the salaries of all ministers receiving \$700 and upwards, on the following scale:

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and so on, increasing ½ per cent. for each \$100 of salary."

Rev. W. H. Garnham, B.A., having moved the above, the President of the Conference ruled as follows:—

The President being appealed to as to the constitutionality of Rev. W. H. Garnham's resolution, ruled:

1. That the Annual Conference has no power to tax the salary of any minister, unless expressly authorized to do so by action of the General Conference.

2. That in the present case no such express authority has been given. On Tuesday, June 7th, Rev. W. H. Garnham, B.A., gave notice that he would appeal to the Court of Appeal against the ruling of the President re his motion on the Sustentation Fund.

Responsible Government, Centennial.

Moved by Rev. J. S. Ross, M.A., seconded by Rev. George A. Mitchell, B.A., and

Resolved,—That the communication from the Committee on the Centennial of the founding of Upper Canada be received, and that on Sabbath, July 17th, in accordance with the request of the Committee, special references be made to the completion of one hundred years of representative government in Upper Canada.

The Opium Traffic.

Moved by Rev. Richard Hobbs, seconded by Rev. J. S. Williamson, and Resolved,—Whereas ever-increasing light is being thrown on the stupendous evils of the opium traffic in India and China, entailing demoralization, and antagonizing all missionary endeavor beyond all power of expression; whereas it is now made manifest that England, through her Indian Government, originated and is perpetuating this dire evil by the manufacture of opium to the ruination of millions in India and China; and whereas the Christian and philanthropic conscience of England is aroused even to the extent of legislative condemnation of the evil by accepting the resolution of Sir Joseph Pease, who, in his conflict against this wrong, has expressed a desire for the moral support and prayerful sympathy of Christendom, to aid British Christians who seek the abolition of this curse; therefore be it

Resolved,—That we, the ministers and laymen of the Niagara Conference, tender to Sir Joseph Pease, and British Christians generally, our moral support and sympathy with the movement, and our prayers for the immediate abolition of the evil by legislative enactment.

Dundas Street Church, Woodstock.

Resolved,—That this Conference authorizes the Rev. G. W. Kerby, B.A., to solicit subscriptions, re Dundas Street Methodist Church, Woodstock, upon the following conditions:—

1. That a sum of not less than \$6,000 be secured.

2. That subscriptions be payable in two equal instalments, the first when the full amount of \$6,000 has been secured, and the second three months thereafter.

3. That cash subscriptions be also solicited, and all sums thus obtained shall be deposited in some chartered bank, subject to the order of the President and Secretary of this Conference.

4. That the Treasurers of this Fund be instructed to disburse the money in harmony with this resolution at such times as they deem prudent.

5. That the members of this Conference pledge themselves personally to give the Rev. Mr. Kerby their most hearty sympathy and cordial support on their various stations and circuits by practically assisting him in soliciting subscriptions among the members of their congregations.

6. That the Chairman of the Woodstock District be associated with the President and Secretary of Conference in the management of this Fund.

Billeting Fund.

5. That any member of Conference arranging for his own billet shall not be exempt from paying the amount, but shall send notice to the Treasurer, informing him of the home where he has made his arrangements to stay.

6. That the limit of any one claim be \$5; and, further, that any balance on hand, after paying expenses, be given over to the Contingent Fund—the balance from last year to be paid to the Contingent Fund of this year; and the balance of this year to be paid to the Contingent Fund of next year.

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OBITUARIES.

REV. EZRA ADAMS STAFFORD, D.D., LL.D.

Dr. Stafford was born in the County of Elgin, Province of Ontario, in the He was educated in that county, and after teaching school for a time, was received on probation for the ministry of the Methodist Church, in the year 1860. His first appointments were the Warwick, Arkona and Ingersoll Circuits. In 1863 he entered Victoria College as a student; was ordained in 1864, and was stationed at Mooretown. His subsequent appointments in that region were at Newbury, Kingsville and Petrolia. In 1874 he was transferred to the Montreal Conference, where he remained nine years, for the first three years as pastor of the Dominion Square Church, Montreal, the next three at the Dominion Methodist Church, Ottawa, and then for a second term at his former church in Montreal. During this period he was for several years elected chairman of these two districts respectively, and in 1882 was appointed President of the Montreal Conference. In 1883 he went to Winnipeg as pastor of Grace Church, and in 1884, when the Manitoba and North-West Conference was organized, was made its first president. After a stay of two years in Winnipeg, he came to Toronto, and was stationed for three years at the Metropolitan Church, and three years at Sherbourne Street Church. While at the latter, he was in 1888, elected President of the Toronto Conference. In June, 1891, having been transferred to the Niagara Conference, he was placed in charge of Centenary Church, Hamilton, where after a short period of service in which he drew many to his ministry, he passed to his reward above. His eminent ability was fully recognized by his brethren. He was a member of the General Conference of the Methodist Church in Canada in 1878, 1882, 1883, 1886 and 1890. In 1880, he took the degree of B.A., at Victoria University; in 1883, the degree of LL.B. was conferred upon him, and in 1886, after examination, he became an LL.D. In 1888, he represented the Canadian Church at the General Conference of the Methodist Espiscopal Church in the United States, and gave a noble, memorable address before that august body at the Metropolitan Opera House, New York.

Dr. Stafford was a close and diligent student all through the years of his active ministry. His mind was of a keen inquiring character, eagerly entering into all fields of knowledge open to him. Early learning to think for himself, he was kept from blindly bowing to any idol the world of philosophy or theology might set up. He would not accept any creed or dogma, simply because his text-books taught it. Having a hatred of shams and an inveterate dislike to ruts, he aimed at originality; and to this perhaps were largely owing the interest and suggestiveness of his public discourses and private conversations. His teaching was the delight of students, and yet many who were not students heard him gladly because of the freshness of his thoughts and the quaintness of his illustrations. His largeness and kindness of heart were known to many, and his views of Christian liberty were broad and generous. His sympathy overleaped denominational barriers, and he longed for the union of Christian bodies under the standard of Christian charity and liberty. has always been my ambition," he said, a few hours before his death, "to have the same love in my heart as brought the Saviour from such a distance to die for me. I have had a measure of that love, and consequently I feel enmity to

That love has made everything pure to me."

His last illness was comparatively short, and his end came unexpectedly. Though feeling somewhat feeble when he arrived in Hamilton last July, he faithfully attended to his pulpit work until within five weeks of his death.

His will-power often sustained him and compelled him to face heavy tasks when his physical system was crying out for rest. His gentleness under severe suffering was at times very touching. An examination after death showed that the trouble that laid him low, a tumor in the brain, had begun months, if not years, before it did its work.

He was fully prepared for his approaching change and in no respect did he seem to shrink from it. When the 23rd Psalm was read to him, looking up with a pleasant smile he said, "That is good, I am going to dwell in my Father's house." His mind was kept in perfect peace. He had great trust in God's fatherly love, and placed all his dependence for acceptance upon the merits of Christ. Once, when "Jesus, Lover of my soul" was sung, he said, "That is all I have to depend upon," and enlarged upon the beauty and richness of the hymn, and of the tender love of Jesus. And in dwelling upon the work of Christ he remarked again and again, "I am a very imperfect man," but one of many tokens of his deep and genuine humility. When they sang "Rock of Ages, cleft for me," he joined in the words and at the close said, "What a reality that is to me."

A few weeks before his death he remarked in conversation, "I often think that when we come to die, God will give us wondrous revelations." That experience was to be his. When on the last morning they sang, "There is a fountain filled with blood," he roused up and said, "I am not one of those who leap upon the mountain-top in religious ecstasy; but I see the mountain; I am on it; my assurance is in Christ."

At another time he asked for the Coronation Hymn, and when they came to the passage, "O that with yonder sacred throng, we at his feet may fall," he placed his hands together as in worship and cried, "O the rapture, the rapture, I wish they could see the rapture I see."

Thus quietly and peacefully in the very prime of life, God's faithful servant passed to his reward on December 21, 1891, beloved and mourned by many to whom his ministry had been a blessing. His funeral service in the Centenary Church at Hamilton was a olemn and memorable one, and a similar one w s h ld at the Dominion Square Church, Montreal, whither his remains were taken for interment.

DANIEL EDWARD BROWNELL.

Rev. Daniel Edward Brownell was born in the township of Cornwall, on November 25th, 1837, and died at his brother's residence, in the city of Detroit, on October 1st, 1891, in the 54th year of his age, and the 32nd of his ministry. At the age of sixteen, under the ministry of Rev. John Howe, he was led to seek reconciliation with God, and obtained a clear and blessed realization of converting grace. In 1858 he received from Rev. Peter German, exhorter's license, and two years later, in June, 1860, he was received on probation for the ministry. At the end of four years of successful labor on the Clinton, Stratford and St. Mary's Circuits, and Clinton a second term, he was ordained to the full work of the ministry, in the Elm Street Church, Toronto, by the sainted Rev. W. L. Thornton. After ordination he was stationed on the following circuits: Osprey, Paisley, Meaford, Vienna, Tilsonborg, St. George, Burlington, Ingersoll, Norwich, Oakville, Grimsby, Welland, and back to St. George for a second t.m. He was chairman of the Welland District for three years. He was married to Mary M., eldest daughter of Rev. Thomas

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Cosford, on Sept. 14th, 1864, who for 27 years was to him a loving and devoted wife, and an efficient and faithful helpmate in the great work of his calling. Mrs. Brownell, with two sons and three daughters, now mourn the loss of an affectionate husband and father, and two sons preceded him to the mansions in our heavenly Father's house. During the third year of his pastorate on the Welland Circuit, his health, which for some time had not been robust, began to seriously fail, and at the Conference of 1891 he was much enfeebled. He, however, entered upon his work. in his new charge, in good spirits, hoping that the pure, bracing air of St. George would build up his health, and that God would give him a rich harvest of souls. For a time his health seemed better, and in August he went to visit friends in Detroit and Cincinnati. In the latter city he spent a Sabbath and preached in one of the large churches. Feeling unwell he returned to Detroit, and while in his brother's office he was smitten down with hemorrhage of the lungs. Several attacks followed in quick succession, which soon destroyed all hope of recovery, though he had as good medical treatment as could be obtained in the city. During five weeks in which he endured much physical suffering, he was patient and resigned. All that the tender sympathy and gentle hands of his loving wife, and several other dear relatives could do, was done for his relief and comfort. His spiritual interests were kindly and sympathetically looked after by faithful pastors of When the struggle was over, surrounded by his wife, his aged mother, his sister, three of his brothers, and his revered and aged father-inlaw, he peacefully and sweetly fell asleep in Jesus. Our dear brother "fought a good fight," he "kept the faith," and he has gone to his reward. His remains were taken to St. George, and interred on Saturday, Oct. 3rd, in the presence of a large concourse of ministers, friends and sorrowing parishioners. Rev. A. E. Russ, M.A., chairman of the district, had charge of the funeral services, and short addresses were given by Revs. Dr. D. G. Sutherland and the late Dr. E. A. Stafford. Five of his ministerial brethren and one old and intimate friend bore the body of their friend and dearly beloved brother to the tomb, and gently and lovingly laid it away until the resurrection trumpet shall call it forth a spiritual and glorified body. We "sorrow not, even as others which have no hope."

> "Death cannot claim the immortal mind, Let earth close o'er the sacred trust, Yet goodness dies not in the dust."

Brother Brownell was a man of a gentle and amiable spirit, tender-hearted and full of sympathy for all suffering and sorrowing ones. He was a true man, a man of the highest honor, of deep and earnest piety, and of full and constant consecration to God and the work of his calling. He was a man who held sweet and intimate communion with God, and manifested his love to God in all his intercourse with men. He was a man of genuine humility, and with a single purpose in life.

"The lust of power, the love of gain,
The thousand lures of sin
Around him, had no power to stain
The purity within."

Our brother was a man of good ability, and of great energy; and he was inspired with a burning desire for the salvation of souls. His ministry was fruitful in conversions, and in the building up of the Church. He was a favorite among his brethren in the ministry; and on his circuits he was highly esteemed as a preacher, and much loved as a pastor. The glorious gospel, which he so much delighted to preach to others, was to himself the power of God unto salvation as he went down into "The valley of the shadow of death." His dying testimony was, that if he had to go back and live life over again,

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knowing all about the hardships, privations and trials of the ministry, as he had experienced them, yet for the joy of saving souls, and for the sake of the consolations of his last hours, he would choose the work of the ministry and cheerfully endure them all. Among his last words were, "The best of all is Jesus is with me."

"How beautiful it is for man to die
Upon the walls of Zion! to be called
Like a watch-worn and weary sentinel,
To put his armor off and rest in heaven."

ERASTUS HURLBURT.

Died suddenly at Burford, after a few hours' illness, on Tuesday evening, August 25th, 1891, the Rev. Erastus Hurlburt, in the 73rd year of his age.

Heman Hurlburt, the father of the subject of this memoir, came into this country from Vermont in the year 1785. He was one of the sturdy United Empire Loyalists, the worthy sire of eleven sons, five of whom were ordained to the Methodist ministry, and two were local preachers. Erastus, the youngest of the sons, was savingly converted to God in early life. So decisive was the change that he was never known to falter in allegiance to Christ, or in loyalty and devotion to the Church of his choice and all its institutions. He was emphatically and worthily one of the old school. He regarded his beloved Methodism as approaching perfection, hence, the strictly conservative views he entertained as to its principles and polity.

Brother Hurlburt was ordained to the full work of the ministry at Belleville Conference on June 11th, 1848, and spent 47 years as one of God's ambassadors, of which 41 were in the active work. During his long ministerial life, he was stationed at Gananoque, Onslow, Gatineau, Bath, Elizabethtown, Perth, St. Andrews, Merrickville, Rawdon, Winchester, Innisfil and Meaford. At the latter place his health failed from overwork, and he was compelled temporarily to retire. After four years' rest, his health was so far restored he entered upon the Indian work, in which for 25 years he labored acceptably and successfully on the reserves at St. Clair, Christian Island, Grand River and Oneida.

Brother Hurlburt was an affectionate husband and father, and leaves a widow and two children to mourn their loss. He was a man of ripe experience, sound judgment, clear perception and extensive range of reading. Modest and unobtrusive, he was easy of access to those who sought his sympathy and advice, and many a young minister received wise and fatherly counsel from his lips. As a writer he was a frequent contributor to the *Guardian*, and had just prepared, a week or two before his own decease, an article for the *Magazine*, on "The pioneer mission work" of his late brother Thomas.

He loved the Lord's House, and was never absent from the public means of grace, when his health permitted. During the last year of his life, it was evident to his friends that he had passed the summit of the hill of life and was going down apace. Memory was becoming considerably impaired, but his quotations of Scripture were always apt and correct, and the mention of Christ's name filled his heart with holy joy. At the last quarterly meeting he attended, held at Fairfield three weeks before his death, he begged the opportunity at the close of the service, as an old man, to exhort the membership to a higher and holier life, stating his intention to present a copy of "Wesl-y's Christian Perfection" to each one of the leaders. On the Sabbath, two days before his death, he spoke with such singular fervor that a deep impression was made upon the members of the class in which he met. At the close of the service he spoke again on the subject so near his heart, viz., consecration to a holy life. Little did he or his hearers think that he was standing so near the borders of the better land.

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HENRY E. C. STONEY.

Henry E. C. Stoney was born in Stratford, Ont., March 19th, 1869, and departed this life in the fourth year of his ministry, and on the 23rd anniversary of his birth. He was the only son of John L. and Emma C. Stoney, of Hamilton, grandson of the late Rev. Edmund Stoney, and nephew of the late Revs. Hall Christopherson, of the Methodist Church in Canada, and Henry Christopherson, of England.

Christopherson, of England. Dedicated to God by his devoted mother, and influenced by Christian teaching and example, he was from his earliest years of consciousness acquainted with the Lord Jesus as his Saviour and King. As he himself said shortly before his departure, the influence of home with God's blessing had made him a Christian from childhood. When 11 years of age he made a public profession of faith in Christ, and was enrolled as a member of the Centenary Methodist Cnurch, Hamilton, by the late Rev. W. W. Ross. In his 16th year he began the study of law, and, in the fall of 1887, passed a successful examination in Osgoode Hail and became a member of the law society. But, being deeply impressed with the thought that God called him to another line of work, he consulted his pastor, the late Dr. Samuel J. Hunter, and laid before him the convictions of his heart. Being encouraged by his pastor, he began at once as physical strength permitted, to prepare himself for the great work of preaching the gospel. He was licensed to preach and duly recommended by the Centenary Quarterly Official Board, and in June, 1888, was received by the Conference as a candidate for the Christian ministry. After spending two years in active work, with much acceptance, on Springford and Townsend Circuits, he was allowed, to his great delight, to attend college. With increased bodily vigor, and thorough mental culture, he hoped to accomplish a grand work for God and humanity; but on the morning of the 19th of March, he ventured out on Lake Ontario for a sail, a gale drove him far out from the harbor, his boat upset and he found a

Brother Stoney was a young man of good mind, pleasing address, firm principle and generous disposition. His very countenance indicated purity of intention and strength of soul. His life's work was done far sooner than he or any of us had thought. but.

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THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE NIAGARA CONFERENCE, TO THE CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

(To be read in all the Congregations.)

Dearly Beloved Brethren,—In the providence of God we have been kept through another year, and assembled in our annual Conference send you cordial and affectionate greetings. "Grace be unto you, and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. We give thanks to God always for you all, making mention of you in our prayers; remembering without ceasing, your work of faith, and labor of love, and patience of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ, in the sight of God and our Father; knowing brethren beloved of God, your election." We assure you that this address is not written to you as a mere custom, but because we would convey to you our Christian greetings, and suggest such counsel as the experiences of the past and the circumstances of the present may call for. You are in our thoughts, and all the work of the Conference has your well-being in view. We remind you that this is a mixed Conference; composed of an equal number of ministers and laymen, and what we do is not the work of one order, both of both; using their maturest judgment and best thought for the good of the whole Church. Our deliberations have been of the most harmonious character, and daily, prayer has gone up to the Great Head of the Church, that He might guide us in all our conclusions.

Receive your pastors as "the sent of God," and in a loyal, faithful manner rally around them, supporting them well, and holding up their hands in the all-important and responsible duties entrusted to them as the "overseers of the Lord's flock." Let your lives be fully consecrated; live in the higher, purer atmosphere of separation from the world, and of devotedness to God, through the Holy Spirit. Permit us to remind you that we are "every one members one of another," and are mutually dependent; while each one is needful in his place as an individual, he is also necessary to the whole. We differ in gifts, graces and ability, but each in his own place may do the work of God, "bearing the burdens of the weak," "coming up to the help of the Lord against the mighty" or "going forth from standing before the Lord of all the earth." Out of devotion to the Master, and earnest effort in behalf of those who are "redeemed by His blood," there will assuredly come to you great personal blessing, and that joy which follows the conversion of souls, As ministers, our chief satisfaction is found in the upbuilding of believers, and in the saving of men. We exhort that you pray that this year we may reap a great harvest of souls, and have a revival in every Church throughout our work.

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Once again we remind you of the value and importance of the social means of grace, "They that feared the Lord spake often one to another," and we urge the duty of abiding loyal to the class meeting: of having a largely attended and interesting prayer-meeting in connection with every Keep up with regularity and faithfulness your family congregation. devotions, so that the incense of praise and prayer may unceasingly arise from the altars of our homes to the God of Israel.

We cannot speak too strongly concerning the observance of the Lord's Day. There is on all sides an effort to secularize the Sabbath, and rob it of its sanctity and influence. We cannot depart from the command to "remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy" and be guiltless. This tree of evil may be stunted and destroyed best by a faithful recognition of the claims of the Sabbath on us as individuals, and by carefully governing our families on the old lines, keeping up the landmarks that make undoubted and clear distinction between the Sabbath and the week-day. Our land and nation will be honored of God and made happy and prosperous if we "call the Sabbath a delight, the holy of the Lord, honorable, and honor Him, not doing our own ways, nor finding our own pleasure, nor speaking our own words."

It is very gratifying to us, and we are sure is also to you, to learn that the recent census reveals the fact, that in the last decade Methodism has made great progress in our Dominion. There is increase in all the Provinces, while in this Province of Ontario our growth has been greater than that of any other denomination; we now number 653,942 of Ontario's population, an increase of 62,439. In the whole Dominion we number 847,469, making ours the largest Protestant Church by nearly 100,000. These figures call for devout thanksgiving to Almighty God, and cause us

to exclaim, "Behold, what hath God wrought!"

A review of the year's work reveals the gratifying fact that prosperity has attended our labors in every department. The increase in membership is 674, after making up for 3,112 removals and 420 deaths. The various funds have been well sustained; the Missionary showing an increase of \$470, and the Educational of \$208, while all the funds are increased by \$1,289. We commend to your liberal support all these funds; especially making mention of the Sustentation, Missionary and Educational.

Our missionaries to China have, in the providence of God, enjoyed a safe and prosperous journey, and are now at their destination, where they will under the direction of Rev. Dr. V. C Hart, address themselves to the great undertaking before them. We bespeak for them the warm sympathy and earnest prayers of the Church; and have no doubt but that this our newest mission will with God's blessing be a very prosperous one; and not only prove a blessing to the darkened Chinese among whom they have gone to labor, but also to the Church at home; which will be led to give both her substance and her sons and daughters for the hastening on of the time when "all shall know the Lord."

The plans at work in behalf of our educational institutions are looking in the direction of a vigorous prosecution of this department of the Churches' interests. The buildings for Victoria College, which were commenced last year, will be completed and ready for occupation this fall; when the Faculty will remove to Toronto, which will henceforth be the

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are looking ent of the were comn this fall; orth be the headquarters of our educational work. The training of the ministry is of great importance to the Church, and while the income of the society yearly indicates a growing interest in this work—over which we greatly rejoice—we continue to solicit your liberal support both to the Educational Society, and to the Endowment and Building Funds.

The good work being done in our Sabbath Schools from year to year is very pleasing. We have 25,889 scholars in the schools of this Conference, and last year 1,306 are reported as having been converted, while 816 are in catechumen classes. The handsome amount of \$14,896 was expended for the maintenance of these schools, which is a most satisfactory showing. The Sabbath School is the recruiting ground of the Church, and in this portion of our country we cannot longer look to emigration as the field from which to gather, but must rear our youth within the pale of our own Church for God, and the work committed to us. We deplore the absence of the catechism in so many Sabbath Schools and homes, and most respectfully urge that it be more universally taught. We would also impress upon all parents the duty of dedicating their infants to God in the sacrament of baptism, and then of uninterruptedly training them "in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." The large army of teachers and workers in our schools, who unselfishly spend time and money, for the spiritual nourishment of the youth, have our best thanks, and our continued prayers and support.

The Epworth League has grown wonderfully; we have now reported sixty-seven Leagues with a membership of 2,818. This is an important feature of our work, and an agency of much promise and power. Let all our young people be taught to "Look up, and Lift up." We strongly recommend that the Sabbath School and Epworth League be utilized as a medium for imparting instruction in temperance, and the prohibition of the liquor traffic; and also abstinence from the use of tobacco in every form.

We do not by any means despair of the ultimate success of the temperance movement in our land. We stand in the same attitude, and are emphatically in favor of the total prohibition of the sale and manufacture of intoxicants. We reiterate the statement made last year, that "one of the greatest needs of the temperance cause to-day, is a compact and thorough organization of the friends of prohibition." We also need to prove ourselves really true to the principles we advocate, and throwing off all allegiance to political party, unfailingly stand up and out for the cause. Be consistent. Never sign a petition to license any person to sell; never vote for a known friend of the liquor party, nor in any way bring reproach on our religion by truckling to rum or the rum party. "Be firm, be vigilant." "Have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather reprove them."

We trust you will continue your hearty support to our excellent church publications, by taking into your homes the Christian Guardian, and Methodist Magazine; and into your Sunday Schools, Epworth Leagues and Mission Circles, Onward, The Outlook, Pleasant Hours and Sunbeam, together with literature for the school and home, published and sold at our Book Room in Toronto.

The roll call of our Conference has saddened us, for some of our honored and beloved brethren in the ministry did not answer to their names. We

paused from business, to bow in worship before the Lord of all, and also to think and converse about the servants of God who during the year were called up higher. Rev. H. E. C. Stoney, a probationer for the ministry, attending College at Cobourg, met a tragic death by drowning. He was a young man of a fine spirit, and promised well for the future. Erastus Hurlburt, one of the oldest and most honored of our number, after long and faithful service, has entered into rest. He belonged to a generation of grand and noble Methodist preachers, who have almost all passed on to their reward, but the Church and the nation affectionately reveres the memory of these pioneers. Rev. Daniel E. Brownell, who for more than thirty years went in and out among us, and who did good service for the Master, has been summoned to his reward. He was a man of deep and fervent piety, and al ays a soul winner. Rev. Ezra A. Stafford, D.D., LL.D., in the prime of life, and the brilliancy of his career, was taken from his congregation and this ministry, "clothed in royal ascension robes." His demise is deeply regretted by us; but the Lord knoweth what is best. The life of each brother is his testimony, and we are consoled in the assurance that they died well. We deeply sympathize with the bereaved ones, and commend them affectionately to the God of all comfort and grace.

With the close of this Conference another year begins, and we together go forth into the vineyard. Look for great things; for revivals; for increased spiritual life in the Church. Seek personally, sanctification of heart and life, through the power of the Holy Spirit. Keep vigorous, by diligently applying yourselves to all the Christian duties that come to you. "Grieve not the Holy Spirit of God, whereby ye are sealed unto the day of redemption." Guard well every interest of our beloved Zion; practise more than you profess; and keep separated from the forms and follies of the world. May He who walks among the golden candlesticks, and is the source of all blessing, cause you to "abound in all goodness," and "make your light to shine more and more unto the perfect day."
