\$20,000 Allowed for Land; \$2,000 for Forcible Taking; \$3,000 for Road Flooding, and \$17,500 for Severance Damages

EXPENSES WIPE OUT AWARD, CLAIM

Judgment Follows Several Years of Litigation With Eminent Counsel Engaged on Both Sides; Arbitrator Accepts Valuation 'of \$2.50 Per Acre

DR. F. R. TAYLOR, K. C., one of the counsel for the Inglewood Pulp & Paper Company, asked this afternoon if there would be an appeal from the award of the arbitrator, said he presumed there would, but he could not say definitely at present. At the office of Porter & Ritchie it was said they could not discuss the case until after a consultation with their principals, but it was very likely an appeal would be taken.

The Inglewood case, as it has been popularly known, has been followed with great interest by many in the province, not only on account of the large sum claimed, but on account of the principle which was involved in the first large public development of water power. In its early stages, the claimants were represented by the late Hon. Dr. William Pugsley, K. C., who had associated with him G. H. Montgomery, K. C., of Montreal, and Dr. F. R. Taylor, K. C., and Horace A. Porter, of Saint John. The Power Commission case was conducted by Peter J. Hughes, K. C., of Fredericton, and J. D. P. FINDING IN DETAIL The finding in detail is as fol-

"I accept Mr. Murdoch's valuation and find \$2.50 an acre fair value for the land expropriated and taken by the Commission, but that is the maximum. The exact number of acres as shown in the plan is slightly less than 7,500. It seems that a small tract of the company's land taken by the Commission is not included in the quantity of land for which the Commission made a tender. For that reason and in order to avoid any possible injustice to the company I base my finding on 8,000 acres. I find that the 8,000 acres are worth \$20,000. I allow 10 per cent. for forcible taking, \$2,000.

"Some evidence has been given that roads had been flooded and that damages thereby had been occasioned to the property. The evidence as to the damages on account of such flooding of roads is perhaps meagre, but there is some evidence of damages. In addition to the evidence heard I have traveled along one of those roads, partly submerged by the rising of the waters, and I have decided to make a special allowance for damages to the property on that score. For the flooding of roads I allow \$3,000.

SEVERANCE DAMAGES. "I am unable to follow Mr. Mur-

doch in the damages he found for severance. He has allowed \$35,000 severance and other damages which would be the value of the remainder of the land according to the valuation per acre as reached by Mr. Barkhouse. It seems to me

that such an amount is excessive. The damages to the remainder of the property on account of severance I fix at the sum of \$17,500. "I find the sum of \$42,500 as the compensation to be paid by the New Brunswick Electric Power ission to the Inglewood Pulp and Paper Company, Limited, for the lands taken. The Act requires me to ascertain the value or compensation for the land taken. No mention is made of interest. It is not part of the ascertainable value of the land. The authorities lead me to conclude that interest is payable only under contract or by statute (Canada Drug Company vs. Liquor Board, 1925 D. L. R., P. 528). I have found no law and none has been pointed out to me authorizing me

to allow interest. "As the sum awarded is not greater than that offered, the costs of the arbitration shall be borne by the Inglewood Pulp and Paper Company, Limited."







THE COAL STRIKE

THE British coal strike has now continued for six months. All attempts on the part of the Government to settle the dispute between the miners and the mine owners have proved futile. The attempt of the former to tie up all industry of every kind until their dispute with the owners had been settled to their satisfaction met with complete failure. On the other hand, attempts to persuade them to accept a compromise were equally futile. One of this week's cables said that prominent industrial and financial interests may now endeavor to bring about peace, and provide a large private loan if that should be necessary to tide the industry over the crisis.

There is every reason for a resumption of work; but, since the strike has lasted so long, the settlement made should be such as to prevent a recurrence of the trouble for many years to come. The effects of a long tie-up of the mines are felt not only in the United Kingdom but in Europe and South America, and in ocean traffic generally. Even Canada has faced a scarcity of tonnage as a result of the effects upon shipping.

JEW AND JEWISH

MR. A. M. COHEN, President of the Anti-Defamation League of the Independent Order of B'nai B'rith, has issued a statement with guiding rules governing the use of the word "Jew" or "Jewish" in print or in conversation. The Order B'nai B'rith was founded in 1918 with the object of defending the good name of Jews in the public prints, and on the stage and screen, but has extended its activities along cultural lines.

The Montreal Gazette prints Mr. Cohen's statement in full. This points out that the word "Jew" Implies primarily a person professing the Jewish religion, but, since the adherents of that creed are almost exclusively of one race, a secondary meaning of the word implies membership of that race. The statement sketches briefly the opprobrious application of the term, its origin and its persistence. and the prejudice thereby perpetuated in certain minds, a state of affairs the order desires to correct. It is pointed out that sensitive Jews at times have attempted to avoid what had become an undeserved stigma by substituting the words "Hebrew" and "Israelite," but this has failed of its object and of recent years the best Jews have boldly adopted the term "Jew." Then follow the guiding

"(1) The words 'Jew' and 'Jewish' can never be objectionable when applied to the whole body of Israel or to whole classes within the body, as for instance, 'Jewish wives,' 'Jewish children,' 'Jewish young men' and

"(2) There can be no objection to the use of the words 'Jew' or 'Jewish' when contrast is being made with other religions. 'Jews ob-serve Passover and Christians Easter'; 'Jews are less susceptible to tuberculosis than other These two are perfectly fair and proper subjects of public comment.

"However, (3) the application of the word 'Jew' or 'Jewish' to any individual is to be avoided unless from the context it is neceseary to call attention to his religion; in other words, unless the facts have some relation to his being a Jew or to his Jewishness. This rule should apply equally whether the word is used in a scandalous or discreditable con-

nection with some praiseworthy or honorable act or achievement. Thus, if a Jew is convicted of a crime, he should not be called a Jew makes a great medical or other scientific discovery, he should not be called a great 'Jewish physician' or an eminent 'Jewish scientist.' In neither case had the man's Jewishness any connection with his conduct or with the disgrace or honor which that conduct entailed. The same rule applies in the case of other religions; if a Roman Catholic or a Protestant is convicted of a crime, he is not alluded to as a 'Catholic criminal' or a 'Protestant criminal.' "(5) The word 'Hebrew' should not be used instead of 'Jew.' As a noun, it connotes rather the Jewish people of the distant past, as 'the ancient Hebrews.' It is used also as an adjective, 'the Hebrew language,' 'Hebrew literature,' etc.—but as such it has a historical rather than a religious connotation. One cannot say 'the Hebrew religion,' but 'the Jewish religion.'"

Echoes From Old London

ONDON, Oct. 14, 1926-Mr. A. B. Walkley made a gallant recovery from a recent serious illness. and the inimitable pen that seemed lost to us for ever resumed its accustomed gaiety. But a relapse has too quickly followed, and, at the age of 71, which few could have guessed from his dapper firstnight appearance, London loses its only dramatic critic who combined scholarship with genius and a level-headed sense of fun with both.

"A. B. W." who was born in Bristol, was a brilliant Oxford man, a litterateur to his finger tips, but his infinite savoir faire never postured in the high-brow manner of most of his dramatic conferers. His judgment of a play was as sound and shrewd as his taste in wines, actresses, books, and manners. He was the compleat connoisseur of sophisticated modern life. Though he was a distinguished civil servant, and rose to a high post in the G. P. O. his heart was in Arcadia, and one suspected him of having been born in a dress suit.

Duellism Like most literary people "A. B. W." was a real duellist. He had his bright encounters with such divergent personalities as Mr. Shaw and Mr. Henry Arthur Jones in his time. Mr. Shaw lampooned him genially in "Fanny's First Play," in the prologue genially in "Fanny's First Play," in the prologue of which an actor, in the role of dramatic critic, came on the stage so faithfully made up as Mr. Walkley, and with such perfect mimicry of his tricks of speech and manner, that The Times critic in the stalls looked like a twin.

Next morning "A. B. W." did full justice to Mr. Shaw's brilliant play, but regretted that he had introduced one character who palpoly "never was



TODAY'S RECIPES

Veal Chops—Take nice small chops, dust each one with salt, pepper and flour. Dip into one egg, beaten with one tablespoon milk, then in cracker dust. Brown on both sides in frying pan, add boiling water to cover, place in oven and allow to bake one hour.

Lemon Sponge Cake-One cup sugar, one-half cup hot water, three eggs, one and one-quarter cups pastry flour, one-half teaspoon salt, two teaspoons baking powder, grated rind and juice of half lemon, one-eighth cup milk.

Boil sugar and water without stirring until syrup spins a thread and pour slowly on beaten egg white. Add juice and rind of lemon and beat the mixture until cold. Sift flour, salt and baking powder together three times; beat egg yellows until thick, add flour mixtures and egg yellows to first mixture. Add milk, stir lightly and bake in muffin tins. Do not ice.

Southern Soup-One-quarter cup rice, one-half cup minced onions, four tablespoons butter, two cups raw tomatoes, two teaspoons salt, one teaspoon sugar, one-eighth taespoon pap-

Wash rice and add to four cups rapidly boiling water. Cook till tender. Cook onions in pan with but-ter till they are light brown; add tomatoes and boil till done. Rub through strainer into boiled rice and water. Add seasoning and let come to a boil. Serve hot with small squares of toasted bread. Marquise Salad-Three firm tomatoes, one-half cup chopped onions, one-half cup parsley, one cup finely chopped head lettuce.

Peel tomatoes, cut in eighths, mix

with rest of ingredients. Mix well. Serve with quartered lemons on salad plates. Olive oil and lemon juice is used for a dressing.

Original Baked Beans—One-half pound navy beans, one-half cup sugar, four slices bacon, two cups raw to-

Soak beans about an hour. Parboil and add bacon and salt. Boil until beans are tender. Add one-half cup sugar and tomatoes. Place in baking pan, and mix well. Put bacon on top and cover with boiling water. Let bake in slow oven three or four hours, adding water twice. Uncover the last last fifteen minutes to let the top brown nicely.



DIVERS SEARCHING TREASURE

New German Invention Used to Locate Sunken P. and O.

LONDON, Oct. 29-Weird creatures resembling H. G. Wells' metallic Martians are groping on the bed of the mouth of the English Channel. They are searching for treasure of the P. and O. Liner Egypt, which sank off Ushant in May, 1922, carrying \$5,500,000 in gold and silver, after collision with a French cargo boat. The Egypt went down in 860 feet of water, too deep for the ordinary diver with his rubber suit. About 200 is his

The present attempt is being made with the aid of a recent German invention, first heard of in this country in the endeavor to locate the British submarine M1, rammed and sunk off Start Point some months ago. This new diving dress is made of jointed steel, and weighs half a ton.

t has been tested at a depth of 500 The diver's hands do not project from the apparatus, but tongs at the ends of the "arms" are operated mechanically from inside the "deep sea armour." An experienced man can pick up and operate tools with the tongs while walking about the sea

CARRIES AIR SUPPLY The diver carries his own air sup-ply, and it is sufficient for four or five

urs. He is lowered to the bottom of the sea by a steel cable on a crane from the salvage ship. This cable contains electric wires, and constant communication is maintained between diver and ship by telephone. Specially contructed electric lights are also lowered to illuminate the errie darkness of he ocean bed.

The location of the Egypt was a ro-

mance in itself. A steel cable nearly a mile long was dragged along the sea floor by two tugs. This cable was equipped with heavy weights which caught against the liner. The first attempt was unsuccessful, because one tug was stronger than the other and drew the weaker tug backwards. Equal powered tugs were then employed. When the cable caught the wreck the tugs crossed courses, drawing the cable in a tight loop round the sunken liner. Buoys, connected to the weight, marked on the surface the exact location, shape, and size of the wreck. The dimensions corresponded those of the Egypt.

LENINAKAN, Armenia, Oct. 29-Indescribable desolation, made more acute by the spread of malaria, influenza and other diseases, prevails in the earthquake zone of Armenia where recurring earth shocks and loud subterranean rumblings have kept the population in a state of panic and despair for the past seven days and nights. Government and Near East Relief reports, which have been trickling in for the past few days, reveal that the casualties of last week's great earth shock will be higher than at first thought. The villages of Alexand-rovka, Daharlu and Karaklisea alone had 125 persons buried in the ruins and 210 badly injured. If the same proportion of deaths prevails in other 34 devastated villages, the total loss of life will exceed 1,500 as against the

No estimate has been made of the fatalities in towns beyond the Armenian-Turkish border, although the loss of life and property is known to be very great.
"Horrible," is the way the situation in Turkish-Armenia was described by a telegraph operator at Kara.




Circular Letter Being Sent to Each Affiliated Club






