INGLEWOOD CO. AWARDED \$42,500 IN CLAIM AGAINST N. B. POWER COMMISSION

COSTS OF CASE TO BE BORNE BY PLAINTIFFS, JUDGE LEBLANC RULES

\$20,000 Allowed for Land; \$2,000 for Forcible Taking; \$3,000 for Road Flooding, and \$17,500 for Severance Damages

EXPENSES WIPE OUT AWARD, CLAIM

Judgment Follows Several Years of Litigation With Eminent Counsel Engaged on Both Sides; Arbitrator Accepts Valuation of \$2.50 Per Acre

DR. F. R. TAYLOR, K. C., one of the counsel for the Inglewood Pulp & Paper Company, asked this afternoon if there would be an appeal from the award of the arbitrator, said he presumed there would, but he could not say definitely at present.

MONCTON, Oct. 30.—An award of \$42,500 was made today by Mr. Justice A. T. LeBlanc, arbitrator in the dispute between the Inglewood Pulp & Paper Company, Ltd., and the New Brunswick Power Commission, regarding the damages to land, property and other rights on account of hydro electric development at Musquash.

The original claim of the Inglewood Company was for about \$840,000, while the amount offered by the Electric Commission in settlement of the company's claim was \$59,003.56.

The Inglewood case, as it has been popularly known, has been followed with great interest by many in the province, not only on account of the large sum claimed, but on account of the principle which was involved in the first large public development of water power.

Dr. William Pugsley, K. C., who had associated with him G. H. Montgomery, K. C., of Montreal, and Dr. F. R. Taylor, K. C., and Hon. A. Porter, of Saint John. The Power Commission case was conducted by Peter J. Hughes, K. C., of Fredericton, and J. D. P. Lewis, of Saint John, solicitor for the Commission.

It is his award Judge LeBlanc allowed \$20,000 on the land being based on \$,000 acres at \$2.50 an acre, \$2,000 for forcible takings, \$3,000 for flooding of roads, and \$17,500 for damage to the rest of the property by severance.

FINDING IN DETAIL The finding in detail is as follows: "I accept Mr. Murdoch's valuation and find \$250 an acre fair value for the land expropriated and taken by the Commission, but that is the maximum. The exact number of acres as shown in the plan is slightly less than 7,500. It seems that a small tract of the company's land taken by the Commission is not included in the quantity of land for which the Commission made a tender. For that reason and in order to avoid any possible injustice to the company I have my finding on 8,000 acres. I find that the 8,000 acres are worth \$20,000. I allow 10 per cent. for forcible taking, \$2,000.

SEVERANCE DAMAGES. "I am unable to follow Mr. Murdoch in the damages he found for severance. He has allowed \$35,000 for severance and other damages which would be the value of the remainder of the land according to the valuation per acre as reached by Mr. Barkhouse. It seems to me

ONTARIO APPLE TREE MAY GIVE OWNER FORTUNE

Seedless Fruit Being Produced in Abbotsford Orchard

OF GREAT VALUE

Mystery Growth Elongated Like Sheep's Nose and Has Famine Flavor

TORONTO, Oct. 30.—The Toronto Globe today publishes the following special despatch from its Ottawa correspondent: "A seedless apple tree, worth thousands of dollars, perhaps millions, to the fruit growers of Canada, is said to be bearing fruit this year at Abbotsford, Quebec, which is not far from Montreal. The mystery apple—no one knows where it originated—is elongated like a sheep's nose, and has the flavor of an Ontario Snow or Fameuse. It is growing on the farm of Arthur Buzzell at Abbotsford. "The apple has neither core nor seeds, and is propagated exactly like the seedless orange, by grafting or budding, like any other pure variety.

CANADA IMPORTS YIELD REVENUE \$151,000,000

Exports for Year Ending Sept. 30 Total \$1,320,000

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 30.—Canadian imports in the year ended last month were valued at \$983,000,000, from which duties of more than \$151,000,000 were collected. Canada's exports dropped from 4,700,000 tons to 3,200,000 tons, but bituminous coal rose from 11,000,000 tons to 13,000,000 tons; supported alcoholic beverages rose from \$21,000,000 worth to \$26,000,000 worth; the value of imported metals rose from \$18,000,000 to \$22,000,000; and the value of passenger automobiles entering the country went from 12,738 to 23,232.

TRENDING INCREASE Trade with the United Kingdom and with the United States has increased. On the imports list butter shows a sharp jump from 40,000 pounds in the 1925 period to 7,705,000 pounds in the past twelve months. that such an amount is excessive. The damages to the remainder of the property on account of severance I fix at the sum of \$17,500. "I find the sum of \$42,500 as the compensation to be paid by the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission to the Inglewood Pulp and Paper Company, Limited, for the lands taken. The Act requires me to ascertain the value or compensation for the land taken. No mention is made of interest. It is not part of the ascertainable value of the land. The authorities laid me to conclude that the interest is payable only under contract or by statute (Canada Drug Company v. Lévesque, 22 D. L. R. 523). I have found no law and none has been pointed out to me authorizing me to allow interest.

As the sum awarded is not greater than that offered, the costs of the arbitration shall be borne by the Inglewood Pulp and Paper Company, Limited."

POWERS OF COMMISSION

In his judgment, before announcing his finding, Judge LeBlanc discussed the powers given to the N. B. Electric Power Commission under the New Brunswick Electric Power Act, 1920, among which was the power to "enter upon, take, use, without the consent of the owner thereof, or any other person interested therein, any land upon which any water power or privilege is situated, or any lake, river, stream or other body of water, to flood lands and do all such acts, matters or things as the Commission deems necessary to develop electric energy."

"Acting under the powers given to them by the Act," the judge continued, "the Commission, in the year 1920, entered upon certain lands of the Inglewood Pulp and Paper Company, Limited, and took some 8,000 acres of lands and waters for the purpose of developing both branches of the Musquash. Not having been able to agree with the company upon the amount to be paid as compensation for the land taken, the Commission, in conformity with the Act, selected Mr. Gilbert G. Murdoch, an engineer, to ascertain the value of the lands taken. He fixed it at \$59,003.56, which was offered by the Commission to the company and refused. Upon application of the Commission I designated myself the sole

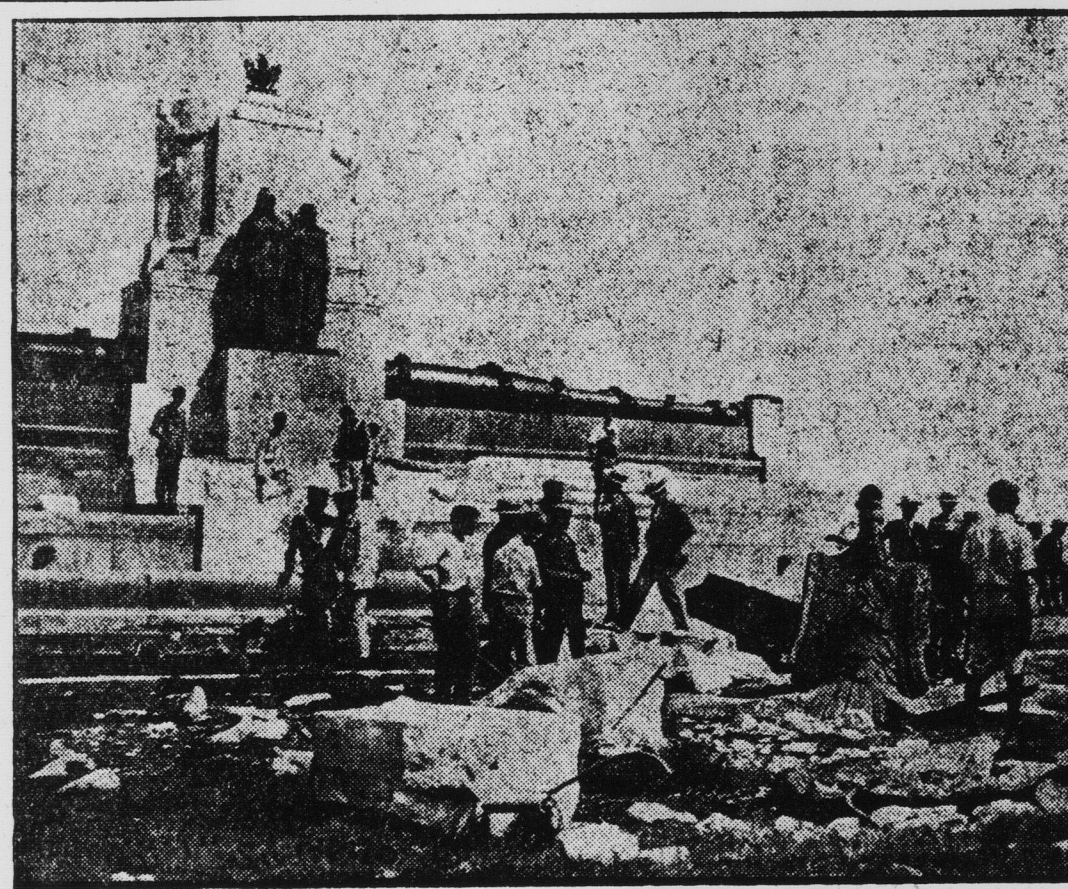

French Aviators Covered 3,750 Miles in Record Hop

Canadian Press PARIS, Oct. 30.—The feasibility of a Paris to New York non-stop airplane flight is considered to have been proven by Lieut. Costes and Captain Rignaut, French military aviators, who have just made an aerial trip from Le Bourget, France, to Jask on the Arabian Sea in South Persia. The distance flown was 3,415 miles. The time was 52 hours. The aviators are claiming a record only for distance in a straight line between the Le Bourget aerodrome and Jask. The actual distance covered by them, counting deviation from this straight line, was about 3,750 miles, which is greater than the distance between Paris and New York.

SISTER ATTEMPTS TO RESCUE BANDIT

Marina Arroya Prepared to Blow up Cuban Jail to Aid Brother

HAVANA, Cuba, Oct. 30.—Marina, sister of Ramon Arroya, notorious Cuban bandit, who is in prison under sentences totalling more than a hundred years, is willing to make a desperate attempt to aid her brother make his escape. The police say she was carrying a valve filled with explosive, with which she hoped to blow up the penitentiary walls and liberate Ramon, when they arrested her Thursday night. Ramon Arroya achieved worldwide notoriety through the pen of Sir Basil Thompson, former chief of Scotland Yard, London, who interviewed the bandit while on a visit to Cuba. For many years Arroya evaded arrest. When he was caught in the spring of 1923, while attempting to leave the country, a long list of offences was charged against him, ranging from robbery to kidnapping wealthy persons and holding them for ransom.

THIEVES AT WORK IN FAIRVILLE STORES

John Carey's Places of Business Broken Into During Last Night

TORONTO, Ont., Oct. 30.—The Telegram yesterday said: "Another Ontario distillery is about to pass into public hands. The Seagram plant at Waterloo has been sold, and the new company, whose capital will consist of 200,000 shares of no par value stock, is likely to be offered on the street early in November. It is understood that the stock will be offered at \$15 a share, which places a \$3,000,000 value on the property. Plant and buildings will be taken over for \$1,200,000 cash. It is understood and the 400,000 gallons of alcohol now on hand at \$2 a gallon against a present market price of around \$6. H. Cleland, Hamilton, formerly in the distilling business there, will be general manager of the new concern.

First Attempt To Destroy Colliery

LONDON, Oct. 30.—The first attempt to destroy a colliery in the six months of the British coal strike was discovered tonight when a night watchman at the middle pit of a mine in Radstock, Somerset, discovered three canisters of high explosives, together with detonators and fuse ready for lighting at the pit-mouth. The watchman's vigilance barely foiled the attempt, and the intruder who, apparently, was about to light the fuse escaped in the darkness.

BRUCE SCORES DUMPING GOODS INTO DOMINIONS

Says Imperial Sentiment Will Not Overcome Deficiencies

MARKET BOARD

Proposal Made to Extend Canada's Wheat Pool, Excluding Russia

By HERBERT BAILEY British United Press. LONDON, Oct. 30.—Premier Bruce is leading a vigorous campaign, which has for its object an attempt to force the British Government to make definite proposals for the development of inter-Imperial trade, and he is passing the most severe structures on those British manufacturers who imagine they can dump anything they please on to the Dominions markets in the hope that Imperial sentiment will overcome any deficits in the quality of their products. He is particularly severe on those who advocate the greatest possible trade development during the next few years, wholly regardless of the ultimate prosperity of the industry.

Meanwhile, the British government is watching closely the process of creating combines to control production and distribution of essential supplies which is gaining world-wide attention. EXTENSION OF WHEAT POOL The proposal to extend the Canadian wheat pool so as to embrace the entire wheat output of the world outside of Russia, has called attention to the fact that such products as rubber, cotton, sugar, cotton wool, etc., are also combine within the purview of a combine. While the shipping interests are also vitally interested in the extension of the trade in these products, the result of all the talk about commerce and distribution of essential supplies which is gaining world-wide attention.

TRADE STIMULATED The government takes the attitude that much can be achieved and will be achieved through the Empire marketing board, but Premier Bruce is not satisfied with these promises, and is asking for declaration from the government of a fuller operation.

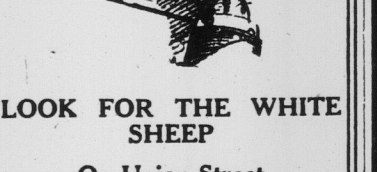

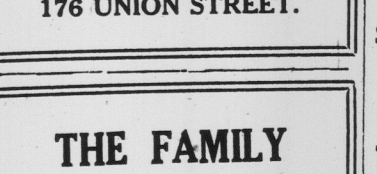

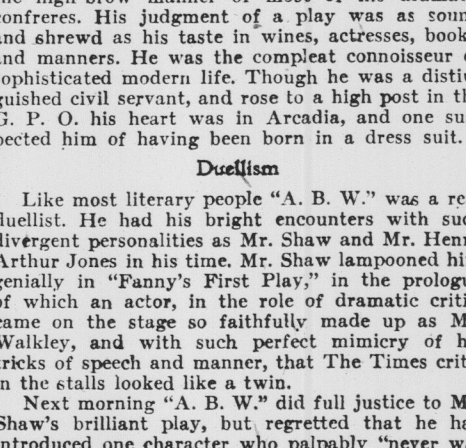

27 SAVED AS TORHAMVAN HITS ON WFLD. SHORE

Steamer, Bound Here, Meets Disaster in a Thick Fog

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Oct. 29.—The Torhamvan's company of 27 persons, including two women, were finally all landed in boats. Reports reaching here tonight indicated that the vessel probably would be broken to pieces on the rocks. Ferryland where she went ashore in a dense fog is 50 miles from this port.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Oct. 29.—The British steamer Torhamvan, which sailed from this port today for Halifax and Saint John, N. B. with freight and passengers, crashed on the rocks north of Ferryland in a heavy sea and thick fog.

Twenty-one persons were taken off with great difficulty soon after the wreck and attempts were being made tonight to rescue those who remained on board, six in all.

Well Known Here THE steamer Torhamvan is a vessel of 1,472 tons register that is well known in the port of Saint John having been on the service between Montreal, St. John's and this port via Halifax for the past few years. She is not a passenger steamer but carries freight and as a business proposition has been most successful, having carried capacity general cargoes to and from this port. When purchased from another company her name was changed to Torhamvan, which name represents the first initials of the names Toronto, Hamilton and Vancouver.

was smashed by kindling wood against the side of the vessel. A second attempt was successful and 21 persons safely landed. Attempts were being made by the boat's crew tonight to get back to the steamer, where the remaining six were in immediate danger from the heavy seas which threatened to overwhelm the stranded vessel.

Local fishing boats were also endeavoring to negotiate the turbulent seas surrounding the wreck and it was anticipated all would be saved.

The steamer sailed this morning with 27 persons aboard all told, including two women. Few details were available tonight owing to the lack of means of communication at the scene of the stranding.

ANXIETY FELT FOR MISSING VESSELS

News is Lacking From Four or Five Schooners Out of Quebec

QUEBEC, Que., Oct. 30.—Anxiety is beginning to be felt here over the lack of news for four or five schooners which left Quebec for North and South Shore points during the last week-end and which, it is feared, were caught in the 60-mile an hour gale which swept over the St. Lawrence on Monday last. Two schooners in particular are mentioned, the "Gagnon," Captain Georges Gagnon, which should have reached Riviere Aux Outardes on Monday evening, and the "Renard." In the ordinary course of events both these schooners should have been heard from several days ago but they have not been reported since their departure from Quebec.

As a matter of fact, it is far easier for a man to climb to a higher social level than it is for a woman, because all doors open to a man easier than they do to a woman. Also far less in the way of graces and charms are demanded of a man than of a woman. A man may be a very rough diamond and be admired and sought after if he has native wit and intelligence and has achieved something worth while, but the female rough diamond is scorned and ostracized.

TODAY'S RECIPES

Veal Chops—Take nice small chops, dust each one with salt, pepper and flour. Dip into one egg, beaten with one tablespoon milk, then in cracker dust. Brown on both sides in frying pan, add boiling water to cover, place in oven and allow to bake one hour.

Lemon Sponge Cake—One cup sugar, one-half cup hot water, three eggs, one and one-quarter cups pastry flour, one-half teaspoon salt, two teaspoons baking powder, grated rind and juice of half lemon, one-eighth cup milk. Boil sugar and water without stirring until syrup spins a thread and pour slowly on beaten egg, white. Add juice and rind of lemon and beat the mixture until cold. Sift flour, salt and baking powder together three times; beat egg yolows until thick, add flour mixture and egg yolows to first mixture. Add milk stir lightly and bake in muffin tins. Do not ice.

Southern Soup—One-quarter cup rice, one-half cup minced onions, four tablespoons butter, two cups raw tomatoes, two teaspoons salt, one teaspoon sugar, one-eighth teaspoon paprika. Wash rice and add to four cups rapidly boiling water. Cook till tender. Cook onions in pan with butter till they are light brown; add tomatoes and boil till done. Rub through strainer into boiled rice and water. Add seasoning and let come to a boil. Serve hot with small squares of toasted bread.

Marquise Salad—Three firm tomatoes, one-half cup chopped onions, one-half cup parsley, one cup finely chopped head lettuce. Peel tomatoes, cut in eighths, mix with rest of ingredients. Mix well. Serve with quarter lemons on salad plates. Olive oil and lemon juice is used for a dressing.

Beans—One-half pound navy beans, one-half cup sugar, four slices bacon, two cups raw tomatoes. Soak beans about an hour. Parboil and add bacon and salt. Boil until beans are tender. Add one-half cup sugar and tomatoes. Place in baking pan, and mix well. Put bacon on top and cover with boiling water. Let bake in slow oven three or four hours, adding water twice. Uncover the last last fifteen minutes to let the top brown nicely.

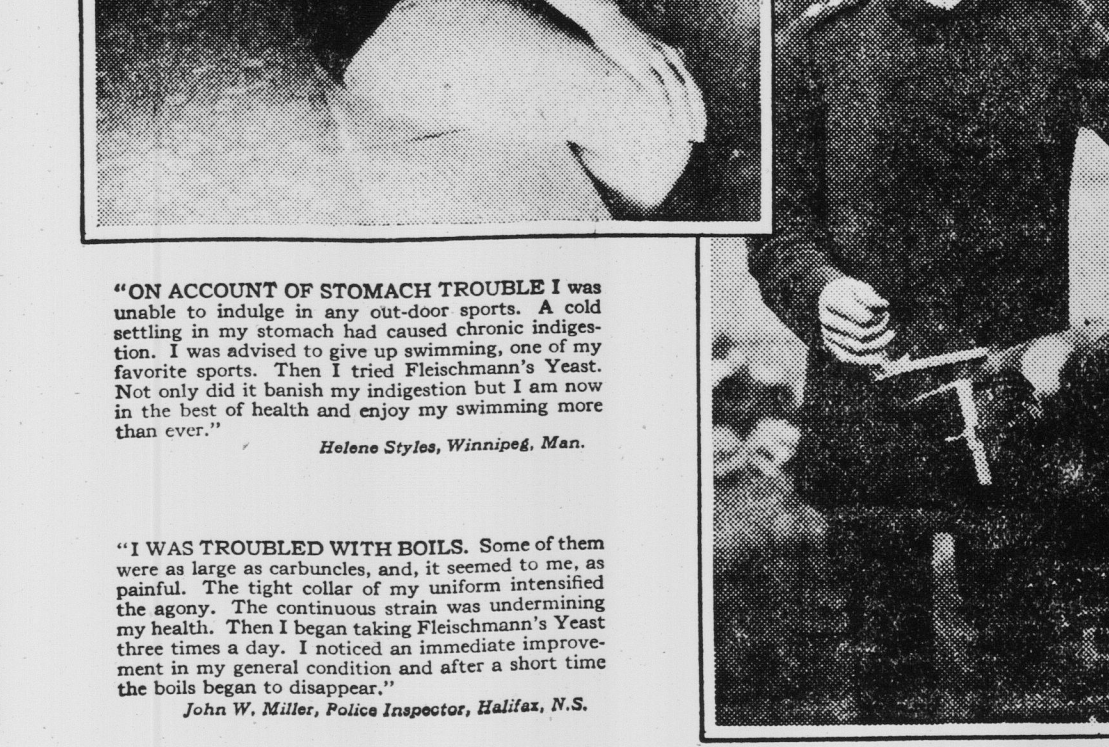

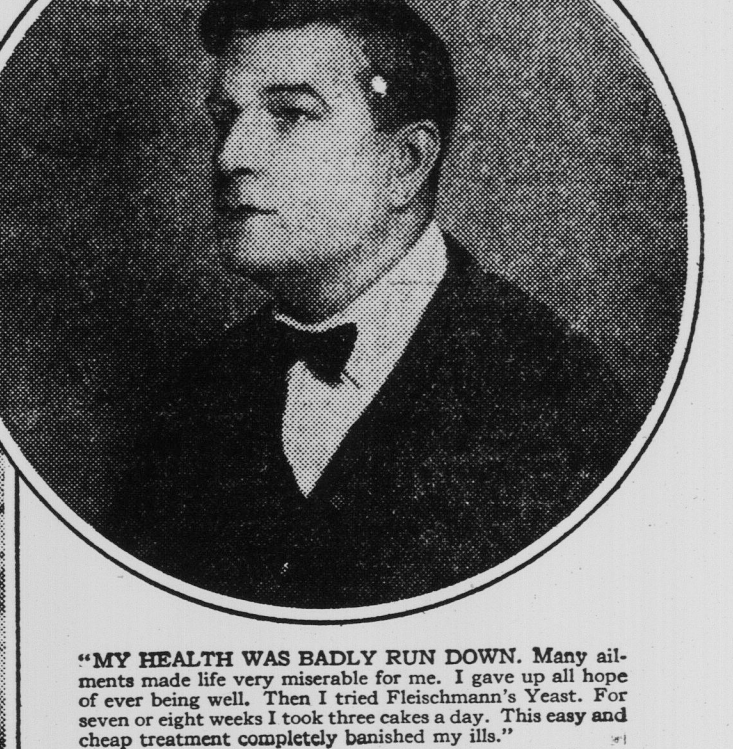

T. Proulx, former Liberal member for Prescott, said: "The situation with me is that I am not in accord with the Liberal leader on the liquor question. If I can agree more with the policy of Mr. Sinclair at a later date than I can with that of Mr. Ferguson, I will support Mr. Sinclair."

## WETS WON'T CANVAAS

TORONTO, Oct. 29.—It is declared there will be no organized canvass on the part of the Moderation League of Ontario, such as there was during the plebiscite campaign in 1924. "This is the government's campaign and not ours," the secretary, B. E. Randle, said today. "We will take no active part. Any efforts put forth will be in the nature of educational propaganda."

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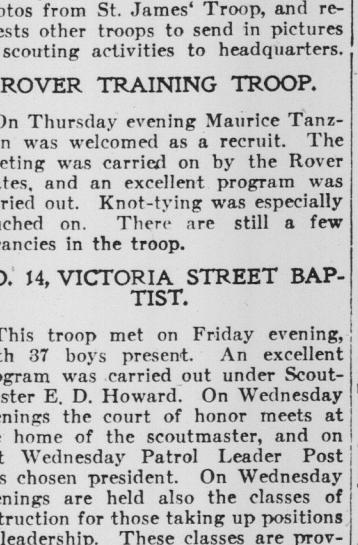

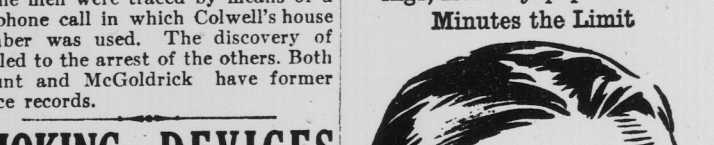

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REWARD FOR INFORMATION IN LEBLANC DEATH

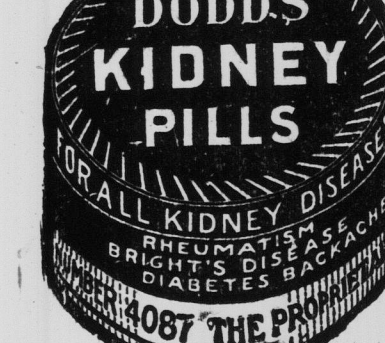
Provincial Gov't Will Give \$500 Leading to Court Action on Matter

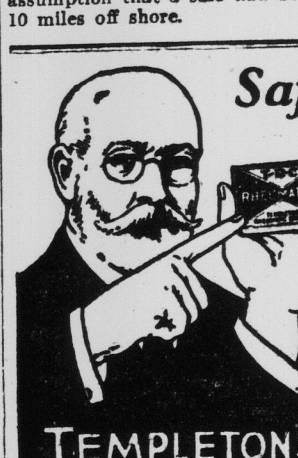
