




A minimum width of 18 feet for hard-urface roads is recommended by the Bureau of Public Roads of the United itates Department of Agriculture. 





Stores Break Sales-Record at Low Cost.




Berlin, June 20 (By mail)—Holland frontier, made notorious during the war as a favorite exit from Germany for fug-fitive prisoners of war, is again coming into the limelight through the surreptiti-ous crossing of young German girls anx-ious to get Dutch employment. It is es-timated that Germany is already poorer by 20,000 female servants as a result of this practice.

by 20,000 female servants as a result of this practice. With high wages and attractive work-ing conditions, Holland has become something of a "promised land" for Ger-man frauleins qualified as housemaids or cooks. Twenty to twenty-five guilders a month are paid beginners, while the more efficient receive from forty to fifty. Such pay means from 2,000 to 5,000 marks monthly at the present rate of ex-change, about ten times more than help of this kind receives in Germany. Amsterdam firms and dwellings have acquired about 5,000 of the emigrants, and there are about 8,000 at The Hague. Most of them have been drawn from the Rhineland and Westphalia, where labor exchanges have been established at vari-ous places in co-operation with Dutch exchanges. Women's organizations in the Western German provinces are ac-tively opposing the exodus because of the shortage of help in households and on farms.

## CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY.

The monthly meeting of the Children's Aid Society was held last night in the Children's Home, Garden street, with the president, A. M. Belding, in the chair. The report of the agent showed that, since the date of the last meeting, two children had been admitted to the home, while four others were admitted to other institutions. Three were taken out of the society's home. One of these was adopted and the papers have been mailed to the foster parents for signshare while the other two were admitted to another institution. During the menth one child was committed to the society and placed in a faster home, the adoption papers in the case being already an file.
