Industry has not spoiled it. Wages are high, and artisans live in what we call 'garden suburbs.' The business thoroughfares are stately; the residential sections, through which we motored for hours, are altogether lovely. Idealism has triumphed in Detroit, and idealism voted out the saloon.
