

AGAIN DEFEATED

Flee In Terror at Onslaught Of Villa's Troops

He is Stockholder-Man Who Hundreds Leap Into River to Swim To American Side of Border But United States Troops Force Them Back

Presidio, Texas, Dec. 30—The federal army of 4,000 men at Ojinaga, opposite here, was put to flight last night by 4,200 constitutionalists sent by General Villa, from Chihuahua. In the darkness many of the federals crossed the river to the American side, but all except the wounded were forced back by the United States troops.

The final rout was preceded by a constitution of the federals, who had fallen from exhaustion in their efforts to get into the fort.

The rebels, believing the darkness afforded them an opportunity for safely getting within firing distance of the village, waited until dusk before their onstaught. They then began to swarm toward the Federals with cries of "Mexico libre." The continued firing of the rebels was terrifying to the Federals, who scattered at once. The firing had ceased by ten o'clock. The night's activities were by no means decisive.

ANOTHER BIG FIRE

BROKE OUT TODAY IN DRY MONTREAL

Montreal, Dec. 30—For the second time in twenty four hours the firemen were called upon today to face an outbreak that threatened to sweep everything before it and to fight a fire with no water pressure.

Fire broke out on the fourth floor of 867 St. Lawrence and spread to 865 and the entire central division of the brigade was turned out but the men were powerless for half an hour after their arrival on the scene of the fire.

At the end of that time by stringing hose along to Mount Royal Ave. a distance of a mile, and starting the engines pumping a stream was obtained which would reach the flames.

Some little time ago a bald eagle, of the called bald-headed eagle (hallactus) leucocephalus), the national emblem of the United States, was captured in Chanjotte county, near the State of Maine. It is probably a native of the neighboring republic, and hearing of the movement northward, joined the exodus. It is now in Rockwood Park. This species is called "bald" not from the absence of feathers on its pate, but from the conspicuous whiteness of its head. The tall also is white, the former giving it a venerable or aged appearance. Though not common, it breeds in suitable situations in New Brunswick, and is found at times westward to the Pacific coast. A second eagle has lately been procured for the park. It was caught at Buctouche River, Kent county. Though similar in most respects to the other specimen, the last acquired differs in the absence of the gray or white head and tail, and some doubts were expressed as to its species. These have been set at rest by A. Gordon Leavitt, who pronounces it a young specimen of the bald cagle, the feathers on the head and tail not turning gray until the age of the precinen, its wings when outstretched measuring seven feet from tip to tip. The two birds can, on fine days, be seen getting on amicebly together in a cage next the barn.


