



### Daily Hints For the Cook

OYSTER CHOWDER

One quart small oysters, 1 can corn. 1 can tomatoes, 3 pints milk, 14 pound of butter, warm corn and milk together—stew oysters and add. Stew and strain tomatoes, add small teaspoon of soda, add salt and pepper to taste and about 1-2 teaspoon of sugar and a piece of butter. This will serve six or eight people.



The chief valet has been with his Majesty for the last twelve years. His duties are to superintend the care of the royal dressing room and to take all instructions concerning the king's clothes which may be given by one of his private secretaries.

His Majesty's clothes are kept in a large room adjoining the dressing room. The walls of the room are lined with wardrobes, which are divided into two sections—one section contains the king's uniforms, and the other His Majesty's ordinary morning, walking, and evening suits of clothes.

Overnight, the chief valet is instructed regarding the uniforms, if any, and the suits of clothes which the king walking in the royal dressing room. Before a suit or uniform is sent into the royal dressing room it is inspected by the chief valet, to see that it is properly brushed, ironed and ready to wear.

### IOI N BRADFORD HAS DONE MUCH FOR AMHERST

**Keport of Boys' Work Committee** For First Year - An Article Worthy of Careful Reading

(Amherst News.) The first year of the work being done under the boys' work committee closed on September I, and the ground covered will be of interest to those who have supported and co-operated with the movement. All of the work has been based on co-operation with institutions already in the community, the home, the school and the church, and in the results gained the credit lies with the people of Amherst who have given the work their best thought and friendly interest as well as their financial assistance and co-operation with the work in its various phases.

The first two months, August and September, 1911, were given to a study of conditions and the mapping out of the programme for the fall and winter.

In co-operation with the churches a series of lectures to Sunday school teachers and workers was given, the lectures, six in number, were attended by 540 people, an average of 90 per lecture.

This was followed by a teachers' training class for young men attended by ten representatives of the different churches and a number of whom are now teaching boys' classes. der the boys' work committee closed on

representatives of the different churches and a number of whom are now teaching boys classes.

Something over thirty-five addresses to men's classes, young people's societies, brotherhoods, congregations and special groups, were given during the winter.

Gymnasium work was organized for boys and girls, young men and the weekly attendance at these classes was over 500. In consultation with pastors and others, a series of accial service studies were introduced for the winter courses and much interest was aroused in civic matters.

One inter-church older boys meeting was held, and attended by 125 boys, the Baptist church giving the use of their auditorium on the afternoon of Sunday, May 19.

In co-operation with the school authorities much work has been done in the various schools covering a wide range of activities, including organized play, story telling, social work of all kinds, children's games, systematic physical work at the Highlands school and beginnings were made at the Academy.
