





FIFTEEN MINUTES OF RADIO EACH DAY



COMBINED RADIO-FREQUENCY AMPLIFICATION AND REGENERATION.

When a receiving station is located within a comparatively short distance of a transmitting station, the radiated signals are usually of sufficient strength to properly actuate the vacuum tube detector. If increased strength of signal at an audible frequency is desired, the incoming wave after being detected may have its energy built upby the addition of one or two stages of audio-frequency amplification, to the detector.

If, on the other hand, the receiving station is so remote from the source of radiated signals that the feeble impulses do not possess sufficient energy to cause the detector tube to function, it is necessary to build up the weak signals through several stages of rado-frequency amplification, or in other words, to increase the intensity of the signal at its original frequency. In this manner the signals are given an increased strength sufficient to produce rectification in the detector tube.

Radio-frequency amplification has other advantages; it permits the use of small liop antennae and also reduces interference by amplifying only such signals as are of radio-frequency, that is, of a frequency above audibility. It is also particularly adapted to the reception of broadcasted music or speech, as it has a tendency toward eliminating the distortion which occurs when several stages of audio-frequency amplification are employed.



A very satisfactory arrangement for the reception of short wave lengths is obtained, as shown in the accompanying diagram, by combining two stages of radio-frequency with a standard form of regenerative circuit employing the "tickler coil" as a means of feeding back a portion of the plate circuit energy to the grid circuit. In the simple form of regenerative circuit, proper adjustment of the coupling between the "tickler coil" and the secondary coil causes the oscillation to be built up to a strength greatly in "xcess of that which would be obtained without regeneration. If, however, the coupling is increased, until the electrical resistance is "balanced out," by the plate circuit energy, until this resistance approaches zero, the tube will burst into oscillation, in which case it acts simultaneously as a local oscillator and as a regeneratively amplifying dectector. Under these conditions the antenna radiates energy which is undesirable in a radio receiver.

By combining the regenerative circuit, as shown, with two stages of radio-frequency amplification, local oscillations are prevented from passinft through the radio-frequency amplifier, and consequently are not radiated from the antenna circuit.

In the accompanying diagram the variable antenna series condenser (C) has a maximum capacity of .0006 micofarads and the tuning coil (L) may be of the single coil type, either tapped and provided with "tens" and "units" switches or with a sliding contact. The filament of "A" battery is of the six-volt storage type, having a capacity of eighty ampere-hours or greater. The plate or "B" battery consists of standard 22.5-volt units and has an eighteen-volt tap for the plate circuit of the detector tube and additional units which supply for forty to sixty volts, so that a maximum potential of approximately eighty volts may be impressed upon the plate circuit of the amplifier tubes. The potentiometers (R-1) and (R-2) have a resistance of 200 to 800 ohms and are provided with adjustable contacts. (R-1) is utilized as a "s





NO CONSECRATION OF BISHOP THERE

Official Says a Public Cere-

mony Prohibited by Law in Mexico.

Mexico City, Feb. 8.—(Associated Press).—The consecration of Mgr. Jose Manriques Zarati as Bishop of Huejctla which was to have taken place at Cerro del Cubilete, where ceremonies recently held culminated in the expulsion from the country of Mgr. Filippi, the Papal delegate, was forbidden on Saturday by Cilharte Valensuela subsion from the country of Mgr. Senor Valensuela cited lengthy sections of the constitution prohibiting such public ceremonies and the construction of religious edifices. He reiterated that the Government did not wish to appear prejudiced against Catholics, but that it must act in accordance with the Federal laws.

El Heraldo, which is recognized as the Government organ, announces that legal proceedings against members of the Catholic clergy for participating in the ceremonies which led to the expulsion of Mgr. Filippi have been dropped, "the investigation proving that certain civilians, and not prelates, provoked the conflict between the prelates and the Federal authorities."

The newspaper adds that it now appears "that high Catholic prelates in Mexico are almost unanimously in accord on the expulsion of Mgr. Filippi, since the subilete ceremonies were conceived, presided over and made possible by the apostolic delegate personally."


