CALM MILITIA IF STRIKE IS PROLONGED

IMPORTANT OF OUTSIDE LABOR IS PREGATED

Chief McCormick Says Trouble Would Result From Policy

SITUATION QUIET

Both Sides Show No Inclination To Bring About Early Settlement

HALIFAX, N. S., March 10.—(Canadian Press) That the active militia may be called out to protect the property of the public in the event of a prolonged strike between the British Empire Steel Corporation and its coal miners, was intimated by Chief of Police J. B. McCormick of Sydney this morning.

McCormick had a conference with Hon. E. H. Armstrong, who stated that McCormick had told him there was no immediate need for additional police protection in Cape Breton, as the U. M. W. had the situation well in hand.

Would Need Militia. Following his conference with the Premier, the chief stated that in the event of an attempt being made to bring in outside maintenance labor, trouble might conceivably develop. In this eventuality he personally believed it would be necessary to call out the active militia in order to cope with the situation.

Under the present law the militia can only be called out on the direct representation of the Attorney-General.

Not Interested, Says McLurg. GLACE BAY, N. S., March 10.—"I am not interested in the proposition made to the Premier last evening regarding the re-opening of negotiations under the United Mine Workers of America's original proposition that we establish credit at the mines, give a guarantee of a minimum of work, and pay the 1924 scale during the sitting of a board of investigation," said J. W. McLurg, vice-president of Besco, this morning.

No Word From Lewis.

GLACE BAY, N. S., March 10.—"The executive of the mine workers of District 26, U. M. W. of A., has as yet received no definite statement from J. H. Lewis, general president, regarding the existing conditions which prevail now in the Nova Scotia mines," said J. W. McLurg, U. M. W. president this morning.

"We have heard nothing definite definite from our international president Mr. Lewis does not approve of the manner in which things have been carried on up to the present, he can give us his views and submit some proposal. Any proposition from international headquarters will receive the earnest consideration of the executive board of District No. 26."

Port Morien Protest. SYDNEY, N. S., March 10.—The following telegram protesting the corporation's action were sent to Premier Armstrong at the conclusion of mass meetings of the citizens of Birch Grove and Port Morien, held at both places, last night.

The first is from Port Morien and states:

Having been appointed by a committee to investigate and report on the removal of the pumps from the Birch Grove colliery, we ascertain that the pumps are being removed from the area of the collieries in that district and the said collieries are being allowed to fill with water. Your committee here with begs you to prohibit this action on the part of the Dominion Coal Company and to use your best offices in protecting the said coal mines from destruction in the Birch Grove district in which the people here are directly concerned.

FAVOR CONFERENCE ON SENATE REFORM

Liberals and Majority of Progressives Want B. N. A. Act Amendment Considered.

OTTAWA, March 10.—The division in the House of Commons, last night, following the approval of a conference between the provinces and the Dominion to consider amending the B. N. A. Act respecting the powers of the Senate, found the Government members in favor of the conference and incidentally the principle that "the Senate as it is at present constituted, is not of the greatest advantage to Canada."

With Government members voted the Progressives but eleven, and one Conservative, W. F. Maclean of South York. The Progressives voting against the resolution as amended included some who were in favor of direct appeal to the Crown for an amendment to the B. N. A.

The result was 120 for and 82 against.

"Poverty Stricken" Germany Buys \$50,000,000 U. S. Gold

NEW YORK, March 10.—The Germany considered poverty stricken a year ago is now planning to purchase \$50,000,000 of American gold.

Arrangements for the transaction have been virtually completed. These purchases will be made without recourse whatever to the recent gold credit established for the German government through flotation of \$110,000,000 German government reparation bonds.

HAIL DISCOVERY AS GREATER THAN KING TUT'S FAMOUS TOMB

Egyptologists Say Objects of Priceless Value and Wealth of Unknown History May Follow Latest Excavation at Great Pyramid

LONDON, March 10.—Egyptologists here agree that if the tomb found by the Boston-Harvard expedition, deep down in the rocks near the great pyramid at Giza, proves to be that of the Pharaoh who immediately preceded the renowned pyramid builder, Cheops, its importance is greater than that of Tutankhamen, because it is some thousands of years older, and the contents may throw light upon the remote period, about which very little is known.

The Pharaoh Senefersu was the first king of the fourth dynasty (about 4000 B. C.) while Tutankhamen reigned as late as the eighteenth dynasty, the history of which is fairly familiar.

Yield Priceless Objects. Sir Wallis Budge, who lately retired from the post of keeper of Egyptian antiquities in the British Museum, told the Daily Express that if the tomb proved to be that of Senefersu and had not been plundered, it was almost certain to yield objects of priceless value.

Senefersu was the first sovereign who, so far as known, attempted to make a colonial empire for Egypt, as his expeditions to Sinai and the Sudan show. He gained control of the Red Sea and built the monument commonly known as the pyramid of Medum.

Built Two Pyramids. Dr. Alan Gardiner, another noted Egyptologist, although greatly interested in the discovery, which he believes will prove vastly important, doubts whether the tomb penetrated is actually that of Senefersu.

That pharaoh, he says, built two pyramids, neither of which is at Giza, and his body was most likely laid in one of these, probably the pyramid of Medum.

Crew of Dutch Tugboat Went to Aid of Disabled Steamer.

AMSTERDAM, March 10.—Eight members of the crew of a tug boat, sent to the aid of the Dutch steamer Soerakarta, which went ashore yesterday near the North pier, were drowned when the tug also stranded in a heavy sea.

Lifeboats have landed 48 of the Soerakarta's crew, but the captain and other officers were still aboard early this morning. The Soerakarta is a cargo steamer 4,284 tons.

TO DISSOLVE HOUSE

Elections for New Ulster Parliament Will Be Held on April 3.

BELFAST, March 10.—The Governor General, the Duke of Abercorn, announced in the Northern Parliament today, that he had acceded to the request of the Ulster ministers for the dissolution of Parliament which would occur this coming Saturday.

Notations for the new parliament, he announced, would be made on March 24, and the polling would take place April 3.

FLAYS TARIFFS

Noted Economist Says Nations Cannot Go On Selling If They Do Not Buy

HAMILTON, Ont., March 10.—Members of the Canadian Club heard an interesting address on the world's economic and financial situation given by Sir George Paish, editor of the London Statist, at a dinner here last night.

Sir George declared that the League of Nations would not be effective until every nation in the world was a member. "If we force Russia and Germany into poverty, they will come back upon us in a few years, supported by a third great nation, Japan," he continued. "What could continental Europe do against such a combination?"

Condemns High Tariffs. Sir George condemned high tariffs, declaring that they were a mistake. "If America continues its high tariff policy, it will drive us to the verge of bankruptcy," he said.

"America continues its high tariff policy, it will drive us to the verge of bankruptcy," he said. "Every country in Europe would find it for the common good to reverse its tariff downward. Nations cannot go on selling if they do not buy. We are all exporters and few importers."

BLIZZARD IN WEST

Manitoba and Saskatchewan Experience Worst Storm of Winter Season

WINNIPEG, Man., March 10.—Manitoba yesterday experienced its worst blizzard of the winter, and reports reaching here told of delayed trains, country roads almost impassable, with a stiff northwest wind piling the falling snow into huge drifts in all districts.

Winnipeg and district got the brunt of the storm. A heavy snow storm over Saskatchewan reported heavy snow, and sleet storms during the day.

3,254 People Killed On Canadian Railways

OTTAWA, March 10.—More people were killed on Canadian railways in 1924 than in 1923. Compared with 295 deaths from all causes in 1923, there were 318 in 1924, of which 17 were among passengers, 107 among employees, and 194 others. In 1924 there were 3,254 people injured in railway accidents, railway commissioners' annual report shows.

Levee at St. James Most Gorgeous Function in Europe

CUSTOM REVIVED

Exclusive Affairs Means Much To Men With Social Ambition

LONDON, March 10.—The Prince of Wales, acting in the place of King George, today is presiding for the first time at a "levee" one of the pageants of swords and silk, gold braid and gleaming epaulettes, staged by British Royalty in accordance with long standing custom.

Ambassadors in all the finery of their dress costumes join richly uniformed military men of high rank in making oblation to the Prince, their gorgeous attire bespangled with medals and decorations brightening the courtyard and reception rooms of St. James Palace, with an ensemble of color hardly to be equalled elsewhere these days.

Exclusive Male Affairs. Levees are exclusively masculine affairs, and to the men of social ambition, they mean quite as much as court presentations do to matrons and their daughters.

Full dress is usually worn, but since the war it has been permissible to appear in service dress. For those not of military status, the cost of attending a levee is considerable. Sometimes the gold braided coat of a diplomatic uniform costs £100—and all the rest of the costume must harmonize with this splendid garment.

In holding the levee the Prince is renewing a custom which his grandfather, as the Prince of Wales, established after the death of Albert, the Prince Consort.

Summer Time Is Adopted in England

Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, March 10.—The Government has adopted summer time as a permanent institution. Sir William Joynson-Hicks, Secretary of State for Home Affairs, announced today the Government would allow free vote on a bill to that end and adopt and carry it through as a Government measure. This means that the bill is certain to become a law.

Limit Interest Rate On All Private Loans

LONDON, March 10.—(Canadian Press)—A bill amending the law relating to money lending, was tabled in the House of Commons, last night, by a group of private members representing all parties. It proposes to limit the rate of interest to 20 per cent., and its restrictions include the prohibition of money lending advertisements and the distribution of circulars dealing with loans.

PEOPLE DEMAND DRASTIC ACTION TO AID INDUSTRY

Plight of Large Business Concerns Is Worrying British Nation

LOSE CONTRACTS

Newfoundland Government Latest to Turn Down Prices of English Shipbuilders

LONDON, March 10.—Britain's industrial plight with foreign firms undercutting the prices of British firms on all sides is having a stiffening effect on the action which Winston Churchill plans in dealing with repayment of the French debt.

It is gradually being realized that Germany, without any internal debt, and France, unwilling to pay her external debt, are both in a most favorable position to compete against British industry, and there is an insistent demand today from many quarters that Churchill should make a heroic attempt to secure reduction of taxation by collecting at least a part of what is owing to Britain by other nations, notably by France.

It is said in Paris that France is slowly coming to a realization that the will have to pay this debt, but whether this string will be translated into positive payments is a matter of considerable doubt which a strong group of parliamentary members believe should be dispelled.

Another Hard Crack. LONDON, March 10.—British shipbuilders, while still smarting under the loss of large contracts to German shippers, have had salt rubbed into their wounds by the Newfoundland government. Newfoundland has ordered a passenger steamer from a Dutch firm, which in turn placed an order for sailing with the Skoda works of Czechoslovakia. So this passenger ship will be thoroughly continental in construction.

EARL HAIG COMING TO CANADA IN JULY

Will Attend G. W. V. A. Dominion Convention and Visit Large Cities While Here.

OTTAWA, March 10.—Preliminary plans for the visit to Ottawa, this summer, of Field Marshal Earl Haig and the delegates to the convention of the British Empire Service League, were announced at a general meeting of the local command, Great War Veterans Association, last night. Earl Haig is expected here July 17, and is the Dominion convention, G. W. V. A. will be held here at the same time as that of the British Empire Service League.

Earl Haig will spend two weeks in Canada, and has already expressed a desire to visit Toronto, Montreal and Winnipeg, and other large centres.

In high terms, and President A. J.
Boreham declared that the suggestion
of a round table conference of patriotic
business men representing the four
great divisions of the Dominion was
most opportune and in his view the
best method of meeting the situation.

To show how keen is the interest
in my mission President Philpot, of the
Association of Canadian Clubs, has re-
ceived a letter from the Simcoe Club
asking that, if possible, I visit their
city.

Among those at today's luncheon
were Stanley Smith, of St. John; L. J.
Webster, formerly of Shediac, and C.
W. Jarvis, formerly of P. E. Island.
There were also present Percy Hut-
chinson and Lord Lyveten, of a British
dramatic company, soon to appear
in St. John. The former said a report
of my address, which he had read in a
Whitby paper, would be sent to the
British Prime Minister, who was keenly
interested in all that related to the
welfare of Canada.

Both here and throughout the west I
find a feeling of resentment toward
any suggestion that fear of United
States retaliation should have any ef-
fect on our national policies.

Export Routes.

I am now in a position to answer
the question whether any grain goes
from Port William and Port Arthur
by rail in winter. The all-rail move-
ment from these cities to the Atlantic
seaboard during the winter up to the
end of February was as follows:
Wheat, 2,211,100 bushels.
Oats, 195,790 bushels.
Barley, 896,059 bushels.
All of this grain, though the total
amount is not large, went through
United States ports.

The official report to the Grain Com-
mission says: "It is worthy of note
that all of the rail shipments for each
port were destined via U. S. A. At-
lantic seaboard ports. The movement
of grain via the Canadian seaboard has
been very small, indeed, during the last
two months, but it is reported tonnage
engagements for March shipments are
substantial."

The report further says that the
movement via Vancouver has been ex-
ceptionally light, principally owing to
the fact that high prices and high rates
for ocean tonnage render competition
with wheat from the southern hemi-
sphere impossible.

Total Shipments.

The total shipments of wheat from
Port Arthur and Port William for the
seven months ending February are
118,400,000 bushels compared with
190,000,000 bushels in the like period
of the previous year. This is due to
the smaller crop and a lessened export
demand.

From Dec. 8 to Feb. 27 nearly 5,000,
000 bushels were shipped from St. John
and this nearly 2,000,000 was Ameri-
can grain. Stocks of all kinds of
grain in store in St. John on Feb. 27
were 1,486,122 bushels, of which 479,
188 bushels was American.

Winter Storage Cargoes.

Out of 10,000,000 bushels of Cana-
dian grain afloat in winter storage
cargoes at Canadian and American
ports on March 6, more than 4,000,000
bushels were at Buffalo.

Of the remainder a little more than
4,700,000 were at Georgian Bay ports
to be shipped through Canadian At-
lantic ports.

The receipts of wheat at Port Wil-
liam and Port Arthur elevators for
seven months ended February were
122,999,429 bushels and the shipments
118,398,454 bushels.

THE LOCAL POWER SITUATION

Speaking of Premier Baldwin's declaration of the "hopelessness of attempting a common task in an atmosphere of diabolical suspicion between man and man," the Globe refers to the local power situation, saying: "Right here in Saint John there are problems—the most important perhaps the restoration of good relations between private and public interests engaged in the operation of our public utilities. There can be success in this greatly to be desired end only if the common task is freed of the 'atmosphere of diabolical suspicion between man and man.' Premier Baldwin has given a lead to the capitalist and to the worker in the ranks which both must ponder seriously if both would reap the benefits which come from industrial co-operation. And Premier Baldwin truthfully said unless there is close partnership between these, efforts by the politicians and the intellectuals can be of little help."
The Globe is right in its advocacy of action to restore good relations between public and private interests engaged in the operation of public utilities here. The way to get rid of the retarding atmosphere of suspicion is for all concerned to show a reasonable attitude, place the cards upon the table, and frankly seek a solution of the difficulty which will work out best in the future and which will avoid mere expense in warfare that can only prolong the trouble and result in waste of effort and money.

POETRY AND LIFE

Those New Brunswickers who went to school thirty or forty years ago did not all like poetry, but a great number of them found in after years great pleasure and much advantage through their early acquaintance with many of the poems contained in the old school books. Not a small proportion of the boys and girls who went to school in those days acquired a love for poetry which afterwards caused them to widen their initial knowledge of it, and some who from one cause or another neglected poetry after they left school still find their lives considerably enriched by the verses they learned when they were young. Many of those poems were classics. Many of them contained high sentiments and deep patriotism, and inculcated admirable principles which the years did not dim.
Recently Viscount Grey of Falloden, in the course of an article on the love of poetry, told his public how highly he values it, and how great a part it plays in the life of any country. Among the things he said were these: "Poetry is the greatest literature, and pleasure in poetry is the greatest of literary pleasures. It is also the least easy to attain, and there are some people who never do attain it. I met one man for poetry at all; it gave her no pleasure, no satisfaction, and only caused her to reflect how much better the thought, so it seemed to her, could be expressed in prose."
"In the same way there are people who care nothing for music. I knew one Englishman of whom it was said that he knew only two tunes: One was the National Anthem, 'God Save the King,' and the other wasn't. We cannot help these people if they do not care for poetry or music, but I may offer you one or two suggestions founded on my own experience with regard to poetry.
"There is much poetry for which most of us do not care, but with a little trouble when we are young we may find one or two poems whose poetry, if we get to know it well, will mean very much to us and become part of ourselves. Poetry does not become intimate to us through the intellect alone; it comes to us through temperament, one might almost say enters through the pores of the skin, and it is as if when we get older our skin becomes dry and our temperament hard and we can read only with the head. It is when we are young, before we reach the age of thirty-five, that we must find out the great poets who have written specially for us; and if we are happy enough to find one poet who seems to express things which we have consciously felt in our personal experience, or to have revealed to us things within ourselves of which we were unconscious until we found them expressed in poetry, we have indeed got a great possession.
"The love of such poetry, which comes to us when we are young will not disappear as we get older; it will remain in us, becoming an intimate part of our being, and will be an assured source of strength, consolation and delight."
Poetry helps to balance life. It stimulates the imagination, and when the days and the years become too crowded with routine or too greatly dominated by the more material aspects of life, poetry affords a welcome relief

and helps to restore the right sense of proportion. It is of immense service to the children to give them some knowledge of poetry, to leave in their minds some of the thoughts of the great masters that are bound to bear good fruit.

NOT JUST YET.

The immediate business of Canadian statesmanship, many people in the Maritimes and elsewhere will think to-day, is not to acquire more territory, but to solve some of the problems confronting those peopling the vast reaches lying inside Canada's existing boundaries.
"Shall we buy Labrador?" a Toronto newspaper asks.
Not just at present. We can all live without it for quite a while.
The country is not asking for Labrador. It is asking that Parliament, men of all groups or parties, shall turn their attention searchingly upon the development of courageous and productive national policies, upon national transportation, upon the business of employing the national railways and the national ports that we shall guard against the growing loss the country suffers through having traffic of Canadian origin diverted to foreign channels. We don't need Labrador—or Portland, or New London, we want to build up St. John, Halifax, Quebec, Montreal, Vancouver.
Canadians have no time to think of Labrador, which of course is not a burning issue, and will never be. Mention of it in this way merely suffices to turn public thought more closely to the fact that the domestic issues wrapped up in transportation are urgent, and that their solution by policies of national application challenges Parliament to-day.

Sentiment is a mighty tie in this country, but to that sentiment should be added the consciousness that property due to the labor and enterprise of the people in every province is being promoted by federal policies boldly designed to meet the requirements of each part of Canada, which requires, by vision or originality, which refuses to rely upon mere drift, and which refuses to take it for granted that the more serious problems of the various provinces cannot be met by constructive leadership.
The world's business shows signs of betterment. Within the next few years the business of Canada, stimulated by immigration and by increased purchasing power in other countries and a larger demand for our products, will bring increased traffic, and an obvious duty is to see to it that our own transportation agencies, our railways and national ports, secure all possible benefit from that growth.
The time to begin to apply the all-Canadian building-up policy is now. Labrador can wait. At present the country sharply needs concentration upon policies and enterprises designed to build up Canada for Canadians.

Mr. George Bucklin, American Consul at Victoria, B. C., paid a graceful tribute to Great Britain in the course of an address delivered on Washington's birthday. "In the United States," he said, "we call George Washington the father of his country. Of this we are proud, but we are no less proud of the ancestry which is the New World; an ancestry which is common to Canadians and Americans and all English-speaking people. England gave us our common ideals of courage, purpose, tenacity and humanity, which have made our civilization endure where other civilizations have failed."
By a vote of 120 to thirty-two the House of Commons last evening carried a resolution calling for a conference between the provinces and the Dominion to consider amending the British North America Act respecting the powers of the Senate. The resolution sets out that "the Senate, as it is at present constituted, is not of the greatest advantage to Canada." The Government forces all voted for the resolution, together with all but eleven of the Progressives. Only one Conservative supported it, Mr. W. F. McLean, of South York. To what measure of Senate reform the provinces will commit themselves remains to be seen.

Hon. Jacques Bureau, Minister of Customs, according to Ottawa reports, is likely soon to retire from the Government. He has been in rather poor health for some months, and although improved it is said that he does not desire to continue in a post involving a great deal of work. It is expected that his successor will come from the

Montreal district, which is not represented in the Cabinet except by Senator Danneberg, who has no portfolio. Among those mentioned as likely to succeed Hon. Mr. Bureau in the event of his retirement are Joseph Archambault, M. P. for Chambly-Verchères, and Ferdinand Rivest, M. P. for St. James division, Montreal. Should Mr. Bureau desire to go to the Senate, there are now two Quebec vacancies in that body.

Independent Strength Shown on Several Important Issues

TRADING EXTREMELY DULL IN MONTREAL

Abitibi Is Most Active Stock on Board, Taking Slight Advance.

NEW YORK, March 10.—Uncertainty over the trend of money rates caused fresh selling of stocks at the opening of today's market, but independent strength was shown by a number of issues, including various oils, and specialties.

General Electric moved up 2 1/2 points to the highest level since segregation of its public utility holdings. Butte and Superior continued to gain in response to resumption of dividends.

Montreal Market.

MONTREAL, March 10.—With the exception of a few fractional price changes, early trading today on the local stock market was extremely dull, with Abitibi the most active issue. This stock gained 1/4 to 66. Other variations were a decline of 1/4 to 88% in Brazilian, a decline of 1/2 to 16 in Detroit United Railway, and a similar loss to 66% in Atlantic Sugar Preferred, which appeared in a small lot only. The balance of the list received practically no attention.

FR. McDONNELL IS FEDERAL OFFICIAL

Paid \$150 a Month to Aid Emigration From Scotland to Canada.

OTTAWA, March 9.—Rev. Father McDonnell, of the Scottish Immigration Aid Society, is an official of the Canadian Government in connection with emigration from Scotland. It was stated in the House of Commons this afternoon.

He is paid \$150 per month and actual living and traveling expenses. In this fiscal year 1922-23 and fiscal year 1923-24 and in nine months of the present fiscal year, Father McDonnell received from the Dominion a total of \$7,158. In the same period the Scottish Immigration Aid Society, received \$13,300 to assist immigration.

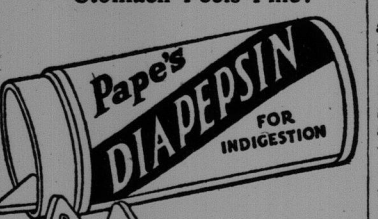

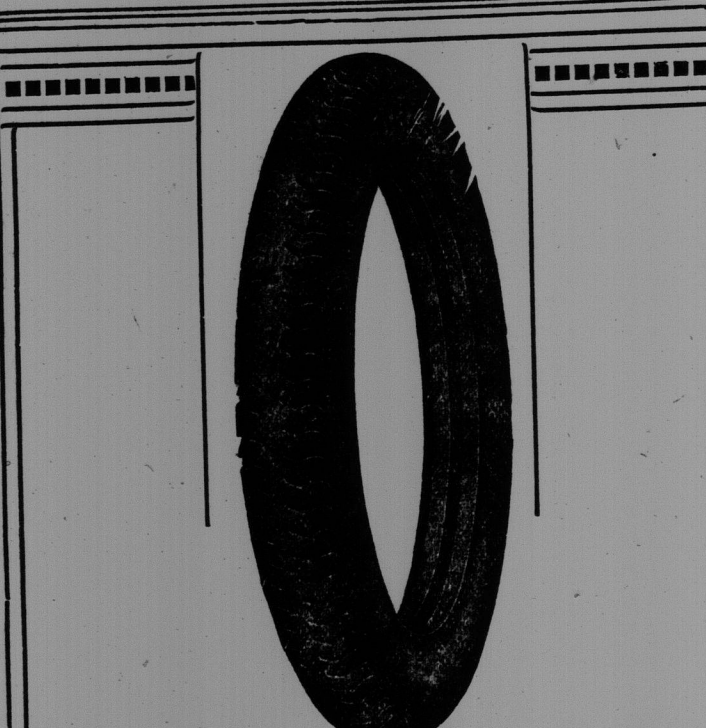

Commissioner Bullock Reports to Montreal Officials Report in 1908

SAW ONLY 2 WAYS TO HANDLE GRAIN TRADE

Predicted Canada's Crop in 20th Century Would Be 800,000,000 Bushels.

The necessity for the development of Canadian ports to carry Canadian traffic was foreseen years ago and at that time it was realized that it was the duty of the nation to equip the ocean ports for that purpose, it was pointed out this morning by Commissioner Bullock in support of his statement referred to the report of George W. Stephens, at one time president of the Montreal Board of Harbor Commissioners, who in 1908 made a trip to Europe to study harbor conditions on that side of the water.

Says Develop Ports. In the introduction to the report, Mr. Stephens predicted that in the 20th century Canada would produce 800,000,000 bushels of grain and there was only two ways to take care of this new business, to increase the terminal facilities on Canadian soil or to allow the business to be taken care of through American ports. In view of this he says "It would therefore seem to be a national duty to equip Canadian sea terminals."

Three Moons and Two Rainbows Delight Eyes of Night Workers In Early Hours of Morning

Two genuine rainbows and what appeared to be three moons were seen in the sky at 4.45 o'clock this morning. And the newspaper men who saw them were perfectly sober. Any who refuse to accept this as a statement of plain, unvarnished truth, may appeal to four printers who also witnessed the phenomenon for corroborative evidence. The fact that this marvelous lunar display was not the result of moonshine made in the Maritimes but of moonshine made in the heavens is beyond dispute. One of the moons was an authentic moon, the one with which all citizens of St. John are familiar. Regrettably it must be admitted, however, that that satellite had been backsliding again and was about one-third of the way down to the western horizon. From the moon, to north and south, there stretched two sun bands of luminosity which were focused on two points apparently 300 or 400 yards from it. It was these bright focal points that resembled the auxiliary moons.

Not only were these extra moons bright enough to be mistaken for the regular variety at a hasty glance but they emitted two broad bands of white light almost exactly parallel to the rays from a searchlight on a battleship except that they were not so bright. The auxiliary moons themselves bore the coloration of rainbows but the hues were not so pronounced.

end would not come immediately, the observers ventured to scan the heavens further and behold there broke upon their startled gaze two beautiful "rainbows," one at the zenith and one about a third of the distance between it and the moon. They were well separated and in a sense even grander than ordinary daylight rainbows because their coloration was softened in the relative darkness. They seemed like great veiled arcs in the sky. But when the supernumerary lunar lights and the nocturnal rainbows did not complete the varieties of the moon, so gloriously full, rounding out the display was another band of luminosity similar to the two shafts emanating from the auxiliary moons which began about the zenith, passed over the moon and continued on down to the horizon. Whether this light came from the rays of h's celestial flashlight held by some friendly planet to guide his errand, another home, someone better versed in astronomical courtesies than humble newspaper men will have to decide.

Maybe 'Twas Mist.

These are the facts. Someone suggested getting D. L. Hutchinson, director of the local meteorological observatory, out of bed to explain the lunar dereliction, but it seemed too cruel at that hour. So the newspaper men assuaged the burning "Why?" in their bosoms by deciding that the spectacle was the result of the light from the moon striking the mist from the harbor and that the two extra moons were in reality patches of cloud or thicker mist on which the rays struck and from which they were reflected. The rainbows were due to the light striking the drops of mist and being broken into its primary colors.

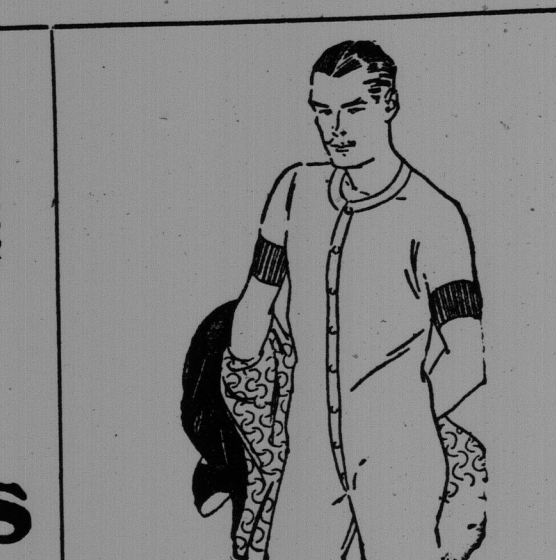
