



WARTIME SHOES IN GREAT BRITAIN

Expected Demand Has Not Materialized So Far-Materials Scarce

time shoes, made according to specifications supplied by the government, have been placed on exhibition in Birmingham, Eng. They were designed for the dual purpose of saving leather and of stabilizing prices.

Some months ago the director of raw materials ordered that one-third the outing two-thirds may be used to satisfy other tastes in footwear. 




