"An Act Respecting the Refining of Cod Liver Oils"

(Passed May 4th, 1916.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows:-

1.-From and after the first day of Ju. P, one thousand nine hundred and sixteen, no person in New R. D. McRae & Sons foundland shall engage in the business of refining Cod Liver Oil without having first obtained a m12,2m License from the Department of Marine and Fisheries, under a penalty not exceeding one hundred lollars, to be recovered in a sumdollars, to be recovered in a summary manner before a Stipendiary Magistrate or a Justice by any person who shall sue for same.


