WITH A BOAR LIKE ANTELOPE. A Big Water Main Burst in the Streets of New York. New York, March 12.—The six inch Croton water main in Green-street, close to Clinton place, burst at 11:45 o'clock Saturday night, ripping up the street from curb to curb on Green-street, at the point where the University place car track curves into Clinton place, and tearing away the pavement of Clinton place under the eastbound track of the Christopher and Tenth street road for a distance of nearly 30 feet. An Eighth street car bound east was not 100 feet away when the water spout arose. The rush of water from the broken main was tremendous. Residents of the neighborhood say that a column of water shot up to the height of the houses with a roar like artillery. Cobblestones and sand were flung everywhere. When Water Surveyor Keegan arrived he computed that the water was escaping at the rate of 2000 gallons a second. He got a gang of men at work as soon as possible to endeavor to stop the flow. Fortunately for the surrounding streets, Christopher and Tenth street railroad tracks, which were at first in danger of being broken up, were not touched. The street sewer exposed by the escape of water was broken by the falling debris, and the water found an escape through the sewer.
