"The workers received no benefits from the introduction of machinery because they had no share in the ownership. Labor-saving machinery did not even reduce their hours of labor, but it displaced thousands of workmen who were thrown on the labor market to compete with each other for a chance to live, and this has been going on for so long that today the conditions are that in every country that lays claim to civilization there are thousands of permanently unemployed. It is true that the working day is much shorter than it was fifty or even twenty years ago. But it was only by combining m unions that the workers were able to wrest this concession, from the masters. Capitalism never yet voluntarily relinquished any of its privileges and never will. Had it not been for their unions the lot of the workers would be no better than that of the chattel slave.

Of course . capitalist is not going to let work ingmen dictate to him if he can help it. But why should workingmen allow capitalists to dictate to them? Why should they allow capitalists to sob them? Why should the workingman say "If I was a capitalist" which he is not and is likely never to be? Why should not the workingman say, "I am a workingman. My class is robbed by the capitalist It is dictated to by paraclass. sites. I will join the Socialist organization, the party of my class and bring about a state wherein the workingmen will control, own and operate industry for the benefit of the workers ?"

In Berlin, Germany, a society has earned wealth flowing to those who do not earn it. People on a salary are employed to see that this un-earned revenue reaches the persons who claim it legally. These es, whether members of parliament or business agents, see how easily the riches flow to those who do not earn them and try to divert some wealth into their own pockets. Bribery is produced by the present sys-Corruption is natural to it. wherein unearned revenues are abolished and bribery and corruption will ease. For the earners then can get a decent living; the pace set by rich for extravagence will be done away with, and honesty will be respected because it will have a chance to get the rewards that should go to honest endeavor.

"If the Socialists would only stop their agitation, all would be well, say some people. This is not true. Socialists are not the cause of disontent. These causes lie inherent in modern methods of production. The suses of discontent are high rents and low wages, immense profits flowng to the useless capitalists and an insufficient wage to the useful workers, panies and breadlines, unemployment and idle riches, starvation and surfeiting, the inequalities of present system whereby the useful people live poorly while the useless people live in superabundance are the causes of the discontent. Socialists only point out the causes of these inequalities and injustices and show the remedy. Those who benefit by the present system are not afraid of ignorant discontent because they know that such unrest can be controlled by armed force. But the intelligent re volt of Socialist workers makes for the abolition of injustice. Wherefore the unjust capitalists fear Socialism, that it will conquer them in the end.
