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# Trinity 'Aniversity.

TRINITY University was constituted by a Royal Charter bearing date 15th July, 1852, and was thereby endowed with all such powers of conferring degrees in the various Faculties as are enjoyed by the Universities of Great Britain.

The fundamental object of the University is to supply to the people of the Province an academic education of the highest kind, in which secular instruction shall not be dissociated from religious teaching. The University is under the control of the Church of England, but open to all who desire to avail themselves of its advantages.

### GOVERNMENT OF THE UNIVERSITY.

By the provisions of the Royal Charter, the government of the University is vested in the Corporation, which body, by an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Canada (15 Vic. ch. 32), is composed of: 1. The Bishops of the five diocesses into which the original Diocese of Toronto has been divided; 2. The Trustees (three in number); 3. The Council.

The Council is made up of the following classes of members :

#### EX OFFICIO MEMBERS.

The Chancellor and Ex-Chancellors of the University, the Provost and Professors in Arts and Divinity in Trinity College.

#### MEMBERS NOMINATED.

By the Bishops of Toronto, Huron, Ontario, and Niagara, four members each, representing their respective dioceses.

By each Medical, Musical, or Theological College affiliated to the University, one member.

#### MEMBERS ELECTED.

By the Graduates in Arts and Divinity who are members of Convocation (see below), eight members, to hold office for four years, two retiring annually.

By the Graduates in Law, two members, to hold office for two years, one retiring annually.

By the Graduates in Medicine who are members of Convocation, two members, to hold office for two years, one retiring annually.

By the Associate Members of Convocation (see below), two members, to hold office for two years, one retiring annually.

By the whole Corporation, seven members, elected for life.

#### CONVOCATION.

By the provisions of the Royal Charter, and in accordance with the practice of the English Universities, the Convocation of the University consists of (in addition to the Chancellor, the Provost, and Professors of Trinity College), all Graduates in Divinity, Law, or Medicine, and all Graduates in Arts of the standing of M.A., who from the time of their admission to these degrees have paid annually the sum of five dollars towards the funds of the University.

All degrees must be passed by Convocation before they can be granted by the University, and the Supplicats for each degree must have been previously approved by a Committee of Convocation called the Caput.

Convocation has also been placed by the Corporation in the position of a Standing Committee of that body, so that its members are in this way enabled, through their representatives, to formally lay their resolutions before the governing body of the University. Convocation is represented by fourteen members on the Corporation. (See above.)

An annual meeting for the transaction of business and granting degrees is held every year in the October Term. Other meetings for granting degrees are held: for Degrees in Medicine and Dentistry, in April; for degrees in all Faculties, in June.

Graduates not qualified as above to become members of Convocation, and other friends of the University, may become Associate Members of Convocation by the same annual payment of five dollars. All candidates for associate membership must be approved by the Executive Committee of Convocation.

Associates have the right of speaking, but not of voting, at meetings of Convocation. They also elect annually a member of the Corporation. (See above.)

Local Associations of Convocation have been formed in the chief centres of Ontario. Members and Associates have equal privileges in the government of the Local Associations. Each Local Association elects one member to represent it upon the Executive Committee of Convocation.

There are at present about 500 members and associates of Convocation.

The Chancellor of the University is elected for a period of five years by the members of Convocation in good standing.

<sup>\*</sup>The Vice-Chancellor of the University is the Provost of Trinity College.

The Caput consists of the Vice-Chancellor and four members of Convocation, to be elected by Convocation at the annual June meeting for conferring degrees.

The Degrees of the University are open to all persons without any religious test, except in case of Degrees in Divinity, candidates for which degrees are required to subscribe to a declaration of membership in the Church of England, and to the three Articles of the XXXVIth Canon.

Subjects of Her Majesty are required to make a declaration of allegiance before proceeding to their degrees.

Boards of Study in the different Faculties, consisting of *ex officio* and elected members, advise the Corporation, through the Executive Committee, as to the nomination of Examiners, changes in the Curriculum, etc., in their respective departments.

### Benefactions.

The original Endowment of this University was collected by the indefatigable exertions of its founder, the Right Rev. John Strachan, D.D., the first Bishop of Toronto, and those whom his Lordship associated with himself in this work.

Amongst these the Venerable A. N. Bethune, D.D., Archdeacon of York, afterwards Bishop of Toronto; the Rev. William McMurray, D.D., D.C.L., Rector of Niagara, and afterwards Archdeacon of Niagara; the Rev. T. B. Fuller, D.D., afterwards Bishop of Niagara; and the Rev. Saltern Givens, are worthy of special and grateful mention.

In addition to the offerings of Condutan Churchmen, amounting to over \$100,000, most liberal assistance, exceeding \$50,000, was obtained from England, including the following douations:

The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts,  $\pounds 2,000$  and seven and a-half acres of land in the City of Toronto.

The Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, £3,000. The University of Oxford, £500.

From members of the Sister Church in the United States, \$10,000, collected by the Ven. Archdeacon McMurray, D.C.L.

The following Benefactions have been subsequently given : 1853.—Dr Burnside, \$24,000.

1864.-Collected in England by Archdeacon McMurray, \$20,000, and by Rev. W. S. Darling, \$2,500.

1865.-Hon. James Gordon, \$2,000.

1866.—Enoch Turner, Esq., Toronto, \$8,000.

1871.-Thomas Clark Street, Esq., \$4,000.

1876.—Family of the late James Henderson, Esq., \$4,000. These last two amounts were appropriated towards th erection of Convocation Hall, opened in 1877.

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1882.—Supplemental Endowment Fund, raised by the Provost and Rev. R. H. Starr, D.D., partly in England, amounting to \$110,000.

In this sum is included a donation of \$10,000 from the Henderson family, specially appropriated to the erection of the College Chapel; a sum of £5,000, promised by an anonymous donor, a member of the University of Oxford, towards the Endowment of a Chair in Divinity and a Chair in Science, and a grant of £3,000 from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, who required a further sum of £6,000 to be raised to meet it as follows :---

£1,500 towards the Endowment of three Fellowships, to meet £3,000 to be otherwise raised for the same purpose.

 $\pounds$ 1,000 for an additional building to accommodate twenty Students, on condition that  $\pounds$ 1,500 more was raised.

£500 to endow a Lectureship in History, on condition that £1,500 more was raised.

These grants have now been paid. The new building was opened in Michaelmas Term, 1890, and Fellowships in Theology, Classics, and Natural Science, as well as the Lectureship in History, have been founded, the last by the aid of Convocation having been raised to a Professorship.

In 1890 the Rev. Algernon Boys, Professor of Classics, left his estate of the value of \$6,400 to the Corporation subject to the payment of four per cent. per annum during the lives of certain relatives.

The following Benefactions have been made specially appropriated to Scholarships or Exhibitions :

1852 .- Two Scholarahips, founded by the first Duke of Wellington.

- 1853.-Two Scholarships, founded in memory of the late Dr. Burnside.

- 1862.—The Pettit Scholarship in Theology, left by W. T. Pettit, Esq.

1866 .- The Cooper Exhibitions, being the interest on \$4,000 left by C. W. Cooper, Esq., of Mount Pleasant.

1889.—The Talbot Exhibitions in Divinity, being the interest on \$4,000 left by J. Talbot, Esq., of Cartwright.

- 1890.—The Palmer Exhibition in Divinity, being the interest on a debenture of \$1,000 issued by the Chapter of S. Alban's Cathedral, given in memory of the late Ven. Archdeacon Palmer, M.A., D.C.L., by his widow.
- 1891.—The Wilson Exhibition, being the interest on \$2,000, left by the late Ven. J. Wilson, M.A., Archdeacon of Peterborough; the holder to be a member of the Divinity Class, preparing for Holy Orders, and accepted for service by the Bishop of Toronto in his diocese.

Subscribers of \$1,000 and upwards to the Supplemental Endowment Fund are entitled to nominate, during their lifetime, one Student, in Arts or Divinity, to an Exhibition of \$50 per annum for three years.

Subscribers of \$750, \$500, \$250, are entitled to nominate three Students, two Students, one Student, respectively, to a three years' Exhibition of \$50 per annum, tenable in Arts or Divinity.

By means of the Annual payments of Members and Associates of Convocation, grants have been made towards augmenting the stipends of the Professor of History, the Lecturer on Modern Languages, and the Fellow in Natural Science.

# Argent Wants.

The sum of \$70,000 is still urgently required to provide for the outstanding expense on the additional building, and for improvements needed in the present building, also to provide Professorial Chairs, instead of Lectureships, in the Departments of Physical Sciences, Natural Science, and Modern Languages.

A Chair in English and English Literature is also much needed.

# fees for Juition and Board.

Although residence within the College buildings for Students in Arts is not in all cases compulsory, it is strongly recommended. The common Collegiate life, after the pattern of the English Universities, is in itself a training of great importance. A new residence containing two lecture rooms, and accommodation for two Professors and twenty Students, was opened in October, 1894, the accommodation previously existing being found altogether inadequate.

Students in Arts are ordinarily required to reside in College, but those whose parents live in Toronto are exempted from such residence, and the same privilege is granted by the Executive Committee in other cases on sufficient cause being shown. See page 81, second paragraph.

The Tuition Fees are \$65 per annum.

The charge for board of Resident Students in Arts is \$130 per annum, and for Students in Divinity \$100 per annum.

These fees are payable for Art Students in three instalments, and for Divinity Students in two instalments, terminally, in advance, and on payment being made during the first fortnight of terms a discount of 10 per cent. is allowed. The rent of College rooms varies from  $50 \times 18$  per term.

The Steward's account for fuel and extras averages \$15 per annum. Students have to provide their own bedding, carpets, etc.; the heavy furniture being supplied by the College. They will also require a cap and gown and a surplice for use in Chapel.

The rooms in Collego will be assigned to Resident Students on the first day of Michaelmas Term, beginning at 9 a.m. Letters received by the Dean after September 20th will be taken into consideration, but it is recommended that Students should be present on October 10th, to look after their own interests.

#### Matriculation.

#### I. ARTS.

The Examination in July will be that conducted by the Education Department for the Universities. The Pass Examination will be held at Trinity College, Toronto, and at the various Collegiate Institutes and High Schools of "the Province, beginning on July 7th. The Honour papers will be set at Trinity College, and at certain of the more important Collegiate Institutes selected by the Education Department, beginning on July 9th. & Candidates for this Examination, if they propose to write at a High School or Collegiate Institute, must notify the Inspector and pay him the fee before May 24th, and should at the same time send notice to the University Registrar, on a form which will be supplied on application. Candidates proposing to write at Trinity College must send the required notice to the Registrar by May 24th, accompanied by a certificate of good character and the fee. A second Examination will begin at Trinity College on September 28th. Notice for this Examination, together with the fee, must be sent to the Registrar by September 10th, on a form which will be supplied on application. A candidate who failed partially in July and desires to complete the Examination in October, and who did not write at Trinity

College, must send a copy of the marks obtained in the July Examination, certified by the Head Master of the school where he wrote, on a form which will be provided by the Registrar. In July the fee is \$5, except when not more than two departments are taken, in which case the fee is \$2. In October the fee is \$5 if one department is taken, and \$10 if more than one department is taken. The Candidate for Matriculation must have entered on his sixteenth year.

#### II.ILAW.

### MATRICULATION EXAMINATION. ARTS

# GENERAL REGULATIONS.

Candidates holding Second Class Teachers' Certificates will be required to take only Latin and Greek or its equivalents.

Candidates in the July Examination who fail in not more than three departments\* may be permitted by the Examiners to present themselves for examination in these departments only at the Supplemental Examination in the October following, or in the next July Examination.

The same privileges shall be allowed in the same circumstances, in the succeeding July Examination to candidates who have presented themselves for the first time in October, or taken the complete Examination in October.

A Candidate for Matriculation who has failed in the July Examination for Second Class Teachers' Certificates, but reckoning the subjects in which he has satisfied the Departmental Examiners, does not require more than three departments to complete the Matriculation Examination, will be allowed to take these subjects at the succeeding October Examination.

Women may present themselves for Examination in one department only, and on passing will be furnished with a certificate to that effect, but if they desire to matriculate they must complete the Examination within she year.

The standard for honours in any department is 66 per cent. for First Class and 50 per cent. for Second Class.

\* A failure in one paper of a department causes the loss of the department, e.g., a failure in Euclid requires the department of Mathem atics to be taken again.

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# REGULATIONS FOR 1896-8.

All Candidates for Matriculation shall take the following subjects :---Latin, English, History, Mathematics, French, or German, and either (1) Greek or (2) the second Modern Language with Physical Science (Physics and Chemistry).

The Examination may be divided into the following two parts, of which (I.) shall be taken before (1I.) and in a different year :--(I.) Arithmetic and Mensuration, English Grammar and Rhetoric, Physics, and the History of Great Britain and Canada ; (II.) Greek, Latin, French, German, English Composition, English Literature, Ancient History, Algebra, Geometry, and Chemistry.

The percentage for Pass shall be thirty-three and onethird per cent. on each paper of the Examination taken by the Candidate.

The marks for sight-work on each of the "Authors" papers shall constitute at least thirty-three and one-third per cent. of the whole of the marks for the paper.

Junior Leaving certificates will be accepted *pro tanto* at both Part I. and Part II. of the Pass Junior Matriculation Examination, but Candidates who desire to compete for scholarships or relative standing will not be granted this exemption in the case of Part II.

### PHYSICS.

# An experimental course defined as follows :----

Metric system of weights and measures. Use of the balance, Phenomena of gravitation. Matter attracts matter. Laws of attraction. Cavendish experiment. Attraction independent of condition. Illustration of weight of gases, liquids, and solids. Specific gravity.

Meaning of the term "a form of matter." All matter may be subjected to transmutation ; "Chemistry ; " application of measurement by weight (mass) to such transmutation leads to the theory of elements. Matter indestructible.

Meaning of "Force." Various manifestations of force, with illustrations from the phenomena of electricity, magnetism, and heat. Force measured in gravitation units; consequent double meaning of the terms expressing units of weight as mass, and units of weight as force.

Meaning of "Work." Measurement of work in gravitation units. Meaning of "Energy."

Effects of force continuously applied to matter. Laws of matterin motion. Velocity. Acceleration. Statement of Newton's Laws of Motion. Definition of "Mass." Meaning, value, and application of "g." Mass a measure of matter.

Conservation of Energy. Energy, like matter, indestructible and transmutable.

Study of the three states of matter. Properties and laws of gases, liquids, and solids. Laws of diffusion.

Elementary laws of heat. Mechanical equivalent. Latent heat. Specific heat. Caloric.

Geometry.-Euclid : Books 1, 2, and 3 ; Easy Deductions.

### FRENCH.

The Candidate's knowledge of Grammar will be tested mainly by questions based upon prose extracts.

### ENGLISH.

Candidate should also give attention to the structure of the whole essay, the effective ordering of the thought, and the accurate employment of a good English vocabulary. About three pages of foolscap is suggested as the proper length for the essay ; but quality, not quantity, will be mainly regarded.

Literature.-Such questions only shall be set as may serve to test the Candidate's familiarity with, and intelligent and appreciative comprehension of, the prescribed texts. The Candidate will be expected to have memorized some of the finest passages, and to have read carefully both prose and poetry outside of the specified work. Electricity. — Voltaic cells, common kinds; chemical action in the cell; magnetic effects of the current; chemical effects of the current; voltameter; astatic and tangent galvanometers; simple notions of potential; Ohm's law, with units; best arrangement of cells; electric light, arc and incandescent; magnetism; inclination and declination of compass; current induction; induction coll; dynamo and motor; electric bell; telegraph; telephone; electroplating.

Sound. —Caused by vibrations; illustrations of vibrations, pendulums, rods, strings, membranes, plates, columns of air; propagated by waves; its velocity; idetermination of velocity; pitch; standard forks, acoustical, C=512, musical, a=870; intervals; harmonic scale; diatonic scale; equally tempered scale; vibration of air in open and closed tubes, with wave-lengths; resonators; nodes and loops; vibration of strings and wires; reflection of sound; manometric flames.

Light. --Rectilinear propagation ; image through a pin-hole ; beam, pencil ; photometry ; shadow and grease-spot photometex; ; reflection and scattering of light; laws of reflection, images is plane mirrors ; multiple images in inclined mirrors ; concave and convex mirrors ; drawing images ; refraction ; laws and index of refraction ; total reflection ; path through a prism ; lenses ; drawing image produced by a lens ; simple microscope ; dispersion and colour ; spectrum ; recomposition of white light.

### CHEMISTRY.

Chemical Theory.—The practical study of the following elements, with their most characteristic compounds, in illustration of Mendelejeff's Classification of the Elements : Hydrogen ; Sodium, Potassium ; Magnesjum, Zinc ; Calcium, Strontium, Barium ; Boron, Aluminium ; Carbon, Silicon, Tin, Lead; Nitrogen, Phosphorus, Arsenic, Antimony, Bismuth ; Oxygen, Sulphur ; Fluorine, Chlorine, Bromine, Iodine ; Manganese, Iron. Elementary Qualitative Analysis.

### BIOLOGY.

1. Elements of Zoology.

Thorough examination of the external form, the gills and the viscera of some common fish. Study of the prepared skeleton of the same. Demonstration of the arrangement of the muscular and nervous systems and the sense-organs, as far as these can be studied without the aid of the microscope.

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Comparison of the structure of the frog with that of the fish. The skeleton of the pectoral and pelvic girdles, and of the appendages of the frog, should be studied and the chief facts in the development of its spawn observed, till the adult form is attained.

Examination of the external form of a turtle and a suake.

Examination of the structure of a pigeon or a fowl.

Study of the skeleton, and also of the teeth and viscera of a cat or dog.

Study of a crayfish as a type of the Arthropods.

Comparison of the crayfish with an insect (grasshopper, cricket or cockroach); also with a millipede and a spider.

Examination of an earthworm and a leech.

Study of a fresh water mussel and a pond-snail.

The principles of zoological nomenclature as illustrated by some of the common fresh-water fishes, such as the sucker and herring, bass and perch.

Study of an ameeba or parameecium as a type of a unicellular animal.

The modifications of the form of the body in vertebrates in connection with different methods of locomotion.

2. Elements of Botany.

The Examination will test whether the Candidate has practically studied representatives of the flowering plants of the locality in which the preparatory school is situated, and representatives of the chief subdivisions of cryptogams, such as a fern, a lycopod, a horsetail, a liver wort, a moss, a lichen, a mushroom, and a chara.

An elementary knowledge of the microscopic structure of the Bean and the Maize. Attention will be given in the Examination to drawing and description of parts of plants supplied, and to the classification of these. Comparison of different organs, morphology of root, stem, leaves, and hair, parts of the flower, reproduction of flowering plants, pollination, fertilization, and the nature of fruits and seeds.

# GENERAL REGULATIONS.

All Candidates for this Degree must be Matriculated Students of Trinity University, and have kept nine terms. They will be required by the University, to pass the Primary, Previous, and Final Examinations.

No change in the Curriculum shall affect any Student who has registered before March 1st, in the year in which such change is announced in the Calendar, but Students who degrade into a lower year shall come under the regulations affecting the year into which they have degraded.

In order that a Student may keep a term he must attend seventy-five per cent. of the Lectures delivered in the term by each Professor or Lecturer whose Lectures he is required to take; and, if resident in College, attend sixty per cent., if living in lodgings, fifty per cent. of the Chapels of the term, and if residing at home, sixty per cent. of the morning Chapels of Sundays and Holy-days.

Students attending lectures in Trinity College will not be allowed to present themselves at the Primary, Previous, or Final Examinations, unless they have passed the Christmas College Examination, held at the end of the Michaelmas Term, on the work read in Lecture during the Term, or the Supplemental Examination, held at the end of the Lent Term, on the work read in Lecture during Michaelmas and Lent Terms, of the First, Second, or Third Year respectively. The marks obtained in this Examination by Candidates in the First and Second Years, are also reckoned in the awarding of Scholarships in June.

In the Primary, Previous, and Final Examinations for the Degree of B.A., the Candidate must obtain thirty-three per cent. of the marks assigned to each paper, and forty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination he is required to take.

### SPECIAL REGULATIONS.

The keeping of terms may be dispensed with in individual cases, in which application to that effect shall have been made to the Executive Committee, and the grounds assigned by the applicant unanimously approved by the Committee. In such cases the applicant must not be less than twentyfive years of age, and will be required to matriculate and to pass the Primary, the Previous and the Final Examinations, at intervals of not less than those which are prescribed in cases of Resident Students. The permission to proceed to a Degree in this manner by Examinations only, must be given by the Executive Committee before the Candidate presents himself for the Matriculation Examination.

Students attending any Divinity School in connection with the Church of England, will be admitted to the Degree of B.A., on condition of passing the usual Examinations, viz., the Matriculation, the Primary, the Previous, and Final Examinations, at the accustomed times, the Candidate producing on each occasion the necessary certificate from the authorities of his Divinity School, viz., at the Matriculation Examination, that he has been admitted as a Student of the School, and at the Primary, Previous, and Final Examinations, that he has kept at least the requisite number of terms, and that he is in good standing. Students who do not reside for so long a period as three years may be admitted to the Degree of B.A., on condition of keeping at Trinity College the rest of the terms required, and of passing the necessary Examinations. Or they may make, severally, applications to the Executive Committee to be allowed to . avail themselves of the Statute under which Candidates are admitted to the Degree of B.A., by Examination only.

Students at law of Osgoode Hall, or Students of any Medical College, may be admitted to the Degree of B.A., if, during their Course of Law or Medicine respectively, they have kept three terms in Trinity College, and have passed the Matriculation, the Primary, Previous, and Final Examinations for the Degree of B.A.

Undergraduates of other Universities may, at the discretion of the Provost, be admitted *ad eundem statum*, up to the end of the Second Year, provided they have kept their terms by attending Lectures and passing Examinations.

### SUPPLEMENTAL EXAMINATIONS

Those Students who shall have been rejected at the Regular Examination of their own year, or who shall have been absent from such Examination, may present themselves, the latter with the consent of the Executive Committee, at a Supplemental Examination which will begin on September 28th, and those who then fail to pass will be required to attend the same Examination in the succeeding year.

Students who have failed at their Annual Regular Examination in not more than three departments, may be permitted, if the Examiners think fit, to present themselves for examination in those departments only, at the following Supplemental Examination.

Students proposing to attend the Supplemental Examination are required to pay a fee of \$5 if one department only is taken, and \$10 if more than one are taken, which fee, together with a notice of his intention to present himself for examination, the Candidate must present to the Registrar, on or before September 10th.

Candidates taking the whole Examination in October cannot be allowed the Examination unless they pass in all the subjects thereof.

# HONOUR EXAMINATION AT B.A.

Oandidates may take the Degree of B.A. with Honours in the following departments: (I.) Classics; (II.) Mathematics; (III.) Theology; (IV.) Mental and Moral Philosophy; (V.) Physical and Natural Science; (VI.) Modern Languages and Literature; and (VII.) Modern History. The result of these Examinations will be published in the College Hall, in three classes; the order of merit in each department being determined by the number of marks obtained in this Examination, together with those obtained in that department in the Pass Examination in the case of Mathematics.

The standard for Honour Classes is for First Class sixtysix per cent., for Second Class fifty per cent., and for Third Class forty per cent.

The Examiners in Mathematics may, at their discretion, add a Fourth Honorary Class to their Honour List, consisting of those who, not being Candidates for Honours, have highly distinguished themselves in the Mathematical part of the Pass Examination.

Candidates for Honours who shall have claimed exemption from any part of the Final Examination though they have failed to obtain a class in Honours, may be granted the Degree of B.A. on the recommendation of the Examiners.

- 1. General Outlines of English History divided into two periods : B.C. 55-A.D. 1485 ; A.D. 1485-1830.
- 2. Outlines of general European History from the Battle of Hadrianople to the Reformation.
- 3. English Constitutional History A.D. 449-1830.
- 3. History of Canada with special reference to its Constitutional History.

#### THIRD YEAR

The Examination will be held in June. Papers will be set on the work of the Second Year, as well as on the following :

- (1) English Economic History.
- (2) Political Economy.
- (3) General European History from the Reformation to Modern Times.
- (4) Political Science requiring a knowledge of the more important examples of different forms of government, Ancient and Modern.
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(5) Three Special 'Periods to be studied in detail, one of English, one of General European, and one of American History. In one at least of these periods a knowledge of selected original authorities will be required.

The periods for examination in 1897 will be as follows :

- (a) English History from A.D. 449-829, to be studied in Bede and the English Chronicle.
- (b) The Struggle in the Netherlands, A.D. 1555-1610.
- (c) The War of American Independence.
- (6) A dissertation on some historical subject of which notice has been given in the June of the year preceding the Examination. This shall state the authorities consulted and must be sent to the Head Examiner by June 1st.

Subject for Dissertation for 1896: "A criticism of Shakespeare's view of the House of Lancaster."

## SPECIALISTS' CERTIFICATES.

The Education Department of Ontario accepts the Honour Degrees of Trinity University, Toronto, in Classics, Mathematics, and Science, obtained on the courses specified in the Calendar of this University, as the non-professional qualification for a Specialist in the departments of Classics, Mathematics, and Science, respectively, provided that the Oandidates in Science have taken Chemical Analysis, Physical Determinations and Biology in the Final Examination.

In the case of other Candidates for the non-professional qualification of a Specialist in these departments, the Education Department will accept, until the regulations in force in 1894 are rescinded, the Examinations of this University, held on the specified courses ; provided the Candidate make one-third of the marks assigned to each paper, and sixtyseven per cent. of the total of marks for all the papers, and provided the papers be taken at one regular Examination (not a Supplemental) or at not more than two such Examinations.

# MASTER OF ARTS.

The Candidate for this Degree must be a Bachelor of Arts of one year's standing. He must send to the Registrar notice of his intention of proceeding to the degree, together with the fee, at least three days before the Convocation.

# SCHOLARSHIPS, EXHIBITIONS AND PRIZES.

The following Scholarships will be awarded at Matriculation :---

The Wellington Scholarship in Classics of \$275 (\$80 and three years' tuition free).

The Wellington Scholarship in Mathematics of \$275 (\$80 and three years' tuition free).

The Bishop Strachan Scholarship in Classics of \$235 (\$40 and three years' tuition free).

The Burnside Scholarship in Mathematics of \$235 (\$40 and three years' tuition free).

The Dickson Scholarship in Modern Languages of \$235 (\$40 and three years' tuition free).

The Dickson Scholarship in Physical and Natural Science of \$235 (\$40 and three years' tuition free).

The Burnside Scholariship in English and History and Geography of \$235 (\$40 and three years' tuition free).

The Pettit Scholarship in Divinity of \$235 (\$40 and three years' tuition free).

In addition to the above, a Scholarship in Mental and Moral Philosophy will be awarded at the end of the Second Year, entitling the holder to one year's free tuition.

# GENERAL REGULATIONS.

Candidates competing for the Scholarships offered at Matriculation are required to write in the July Examination.

The Scholarship in any Department will be awarded to the Candidate who obtains the highest marks in Honours in the Department or Departments for which the Scholarship is offered, provided that he has passed the Matriculation Examination of the year in which he is competing, and has been awarded a First Class in Honours in his Department.

or, if there be more than one Department, a First Class in Honours in one Department and a Second Class in another.

Nore.—The Bishop Strachan Scholarship in Classics and the Burnside Scholarship in Mathematics will be given to the Candidates who obtain the second highest aggregate marks in these Departments and comply with the other conditions.

In order to hold the Scholarships in the Second and Third Years, Candidates must retain the positions in their Departments which they have won at Matriculation.

Norz. —A Candidate obtaining the Wellington Scholarship in Classics, the Dickson Scholarship in Modern Languages, or that in Physical and Natural Science, must obtain the highest place in the First Class in Honours in his Department in order to retain the Scholarship in the Second and Third Years. The same applies to the Bishop Strachan Scholarship in Classics except that the second highest place in the First Class in Honours in that Department is required.

A Candidate obtaining the Burnside Scholarship for English and History and Geography, will be required to obtain the highest place in the First Class in Honours in Modern History in the subsequent years.

A Candidate obtaining the Pettit Scholarship for Divinity will be required to obtain the highest place in the First Glass in Honours in Theology.

Should the holder fail to satisfy the above requirements in any year, his Scholarship will pass to the Student who has so done.

In addition to the above, the following Prizes are annually competed for, being open to all Students attending Lectures.

The Clementi Prize of \$20 for an English Poem.

Prize of \$20 for Greek Iambics.

Prize of \$20 for Latin Verse.

Prize of \$20 for Latin Essay.

Prize of \$20 for English Essay.

The following Exhibitions, tenable for one year, are open to any Matriculated Student of the College, not holding a Scholarship, with a preference to the sons of Clergymen, the exhibitioners being nominated by the Bishop of Toronto:

First Cooper Exhibition of \$100. Second Cooper Exhibition of \$100.

The Corporation has also provided that four Bursaries shall be open every year, tenable from year to year, for a period not exceeding three years, of the value of 62 per annum. Any Student who shall have passed the Matriculation Examination, and shall have satisfied the Corporation that he cannot, without the aid thus afforded, avail himself of the advantage of a University Education, shall be eligible for a Bursary, provided that he is not the holder of a Scholarship or Exhibition. *Cateris paribus* the sons of Clergymen will be preferred.

These Exhibitions and Bursaries will be forfeited if the holder fails to keep a term, or to pass any Examination at the regular time.

Several of the Dioceses in the Province of Ontario have also special funds for the assistance of Candidates preparing for Holy Orders at Trinity College.

# Proceedings in Divinity.

# DIVINITY CLASS.

The course of work in the Divinity Class comprises both theoretical and practical work, such as the composition and preaching of Sermons, reading the Liturgy, Sunday School work, Mission work, etc.

Special importance is attached to the building up of the devotional life. Short services of Instruction, Meditation, or Intercession are held daily in the College chapel.

The following persons may be admitted to the Divinity Class provided they have obtained the approval of the College Committee :---

(1) Graduates in Arts of Trinity University or of other Universities in which Classics form a part of the course required for the B.A. degree, who are admitted into the second year of the Class, but are required to take; in addition to the second year work, the first year work of the Class in English Church History, General Church History, Hooker and Scripture History.

(2) Undergraduates of Trinity University and of such other Universities aforesaid, being of the full age of twentyone years, who have attended the Lectures of the Arts Course for one year, and have passed the Examination at the end of the first year of such course. They are admitted into the first year of the Class.

Graduates of Universities other than Trinity University, must pass an Examination in all Divinity subjects required in the Final Examination for the Degree of B.A. in Trinity University, and Undergraduates of such Universities in those required in the Primary Examination in Trinity University.

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Before his admission each Student must subscribe to the Thirty-nine Articles.

The period of study will be three years; and no certificate in the Theological Department can be granted within this time except as otherwise provided; and unless the Student has attended Chapels and Lectures as required by the Statutes. All members of the Divinity Class are required to reside in College, a portion of which is set aside for their exclusive use.

A Graduate in Theological Honours (who has not previously taken Honours in some other Arts department) will not be granted his Letters Testimonial for Holy Orders, until he shall have passed at an Examination of the Divinity Class in the year's work of the Class in Doctrine, Apologetics, Pastoral Theology, and Homiletics, having attended one complete year's Lectures in those subjects after having completed the Theological Honour Course. A Graduate in Honours in some other Arts department who is a Candidate for Theological Honours, may attend these Lectures and pass this Examination during his Theological Honour Course.

The course of study in the Divinity Class extends over three years, each year terminating about April 15th. Instruction is given by the Professors and Lecturers in the following subjects :--

#### FIRST YEAR.

Scripture History. Selected Old Testament Books. Elementary Hebrew. New Testament Introduction. General Church History. First Period. Elementary Dogmatics. Patristics. Hooker's Laws of Ecclesiastical Polity, Book V. New Testament, Selected Books in Greek. Elecution.

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#### SECOND YEAR.

Selected Old Testament Books in Hebrew. Old Testament Introduction and Selected Books in English. Gospel of St. John in Greek. Selected New Testament Books. English Church History, Second Period. Dogmatics. Patristics. Apologetics. Pastoral Theology. Homiletics. English Composition, History and Literature, Second Period.

#### THIRD YEAR

Selected Books in Hebrew. Old Testament Theology. New Testament Theology. Selected New Testament Books. New Testament Canon. Patristics. Apologetics. English and Church History, Third Period. Liturgies. Homiletics. Pastoral Theology. English Composition, History and Literature, Third Period. Elocution.

Students may substitute for the Hebrew work prescribed in Section I., the Greek Testament work prescribed in Division (2) Sections (c) and (d) of the Theological Honour Course.

The standard in the Divinity Class Examinations is for Honours, seventy-five per cent; for First-Class, sixty-six per cent.; for Second-Class, fifty per cent.; and for Passing, forty per cent. of the whole marks of the Examination, and thirty-three per cent. of the marks of each paper.

Members of the Divinity Class will be required to take such Pastoral work as may from time to time be assigned to them by the Provost.

### LICENTIATE IN SACRED THEOLOGY.

The Candidate for this Degree must have kept nine complete terms. He must (1) have passed the Primary Examination for the Degree of B.A., and three April Examinations of the Divinity Class; or (2) have obtained Honours in Theology, and have passed at an April Examination of the Divinity Class in the year's work of the Class in Doctrine, Apologetics, Pastoral Theology, and Homiletics, having attended at least three terms Lectures in these subjects.

A prize of \$10 given by the Rev. W. E. Cooper, M.A., B.D., for an examination in some selected work on Apologetics.

A prize of \$10 given by His Honour Judge Macdonald for a paper on general Biblical knowledge to be set for the whole Divinity Class as part of the April Examination. The prize is to be open to all the years, but is not to be awarded twice to any Student.

#### HAMILTON MEMORIAL PRIZE.

The family of the late Mrs. John Hamilton, of Hawkesbury, have founded, in her memory, an annual Prize of \$30, under the following regulations :---

I. The Prize to be called the HAMILTON MEMORIAL PRIZE, is to be awarded according to the result of the following papers :--

(a) A paper or papers on a selected book or selected books illustrative of Scripture History, Antiquities, and Interpretation.

(b) A paper on general Scripture History to be set in the April Examination of the Divinity Class.

II. All Students belonging to the Divinity Class, as well as all others who have passed through their Theological Course, and have not attained three years' standing from B.A., shall be eligible as Candidates.

III. The Examination in the selected book or books shall take place towards the end of the Lent Term in each year, and the marks obtained shall be added to the marks of the April Examination.

IV. The Examiners shall be empowered to withhold the Prize if no Candidate is found worthy.

The Examinations for the Hamilton Memorial Prize and the Cooper Prize will be held at the same time as the Divinity Supplemental Examination.

# JUBILEE SCHOLARSHIP.

These two Scholarships were founded by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, from the Jubilee Fund of the year 1851, of the annual value of \$160, tenable for two years. One of these Scholarships is awarded yearly to the most deserving Bachelor of the year, who has obtained at least second class Honours in Classics or Mathematics. On admission to the Scholarship, a declaration must be signed by the holder that it is his purpose to complete the Divinity Course of three years in Trinity College, and to present himself as a Candidate for Holy Orders, and should he fail to do so, he will be held bound to refund to the College such proceeds of the Scholarship as he shall have received.

Candidates for Honours in Theology who have previously graduated with Honours in some other department, will be allowed to compete for the Sermon Prize, the Hamilton Memorial Prize, the Cooper Prize for Apologetics, and the Reading Prizes, in each year of their course in Theological Honours, but those who have not previously graduated with Honours will be allowed to compete only in the year following their graduation.

#### DEGREES IN DIVINITY.

Candidates for these Degrees resident in the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada, other than Candidates for the Degree, *Jure Dignitatis* will, for the future, be required to proceed in accordance with the Canon on Divinity Degrees passed by the Provincial Synod of Canada in 1889. For copies of these regulations application should be made to the Provost.

The following regulations apply to Candidates residing outside the Ecclesiastical Province.

# BACHELOR OF DIVINITY.

The Candidate for this Degree must be a Graduate in Arts of the University of three years' standing, or in the case of a Graduate admitted "*ad eundem statum*" of at least three years' standing from his first Degree. The requirement that the Candidate shall be a Graduate in Arts may, however, be dispensed with by the Corporation, on special application having been made to them, in the case of Clergymen who have been in Priests' orders for at least six years, but such Candidate shall be required to pass the Matriculation **Examination of Trinity University**.

Except in the case hereinafter provided for, the Candidate must pass two Examinations, to be called the First and Second Examination for the Degree of B.D., and at least one year must elapse between these Examinations.

Graduates who have completed the Divinity Course in Trinity College, and have passed the regular Examinations of the Divinity Class, obtaining at least a Second Class in each Examination, shall be exempted from the First Examination for the Degree of B.D.

The Examinations in Divinity will begin on October 1st, and Candidates for any Examination must send notice to the Provost not later than April 1st, specifying, where necessary, the part of the Examination for which they intend to present themselves.

# FIRST EXAMINATION FOR THE DEGREE OF B.D.

The subjects for this Examination shall be as follows :----

(1) Selected portions from the Historical, Poetical and Prophetical parts of the Old Testament. (Questions in Hebrew will be set, but are not obligatory for the Degree.)

(2) A selected Gospel and Epistle or Epistles from the New Testament in Greek.

(3) One selected Greek, and one selected Latin, Ecclesiastical Writing.

(4) The Outlines of the History :

(a) Of the Christian Church to A. D. 451.

(b) Of the English Church.

(5) A selected work on Dogmatic Theology.

(6) A selected work on Apologetic Theology.

(7) A selected work on Christian Ethics.

(8) A selected work on Pastoral Theology.

The selected works for 1896-7 are :--

(1) I. and II. Kings, and the Book of Job.

(2) The Gospel according to St. Mark ; the First Epistle of St. John.

(3) The Epistle of St. Clement of Rome.

Heurtley selection from De Fide et Symbolo, as follows : St. Augustine De Fide et Symbolo ; De Symbolo ad Catechumenos ; St. Leo, Epistola ad Flavianum.

(5) Martensen's Christian Dogmatics.

(6) Christlieb's Modern Doubt and Christian Belief.

(7) Martensen's Christian Ethics (general).

(8) Farrar's Christian Ministry.

SECOND EXAMINATION FOR THE DEGREE OF B.D.

The Candidate may select for Examination one of the five following groups of subjects :---

#### I. OLD TESTAMENT :

The Hebrew Scriptures, with special reference to selected Books ; also selected Books from the Septuagint Version.

The History and Development of the Kingdom of God during the Old Testament period, with special regard to its relation to the Christian Ministry and Sacraments.

- II. NEW TESTAMENT :
  - The New Testament in Greek, with special reference to selected Books.
  - The History and Constitution of the Christian Church during the Apostolic period.
  - The History of the Canon of the New Testament, and of its text; its Inspiration and Contents.
- III. PATRISTICS AND ECCLESIASTICAL HISTORY :
  - The History and Constitution of the Christian Church during the Apostolic period, and to the death of Leo the Great, with selected Christian writings of this period.
  - The History of the English Church, special regard being had to the history and doctrinal position of the various bodies which have separated from her.

### IV. LITURGIES AND DOGMATIC THEOLOGY :

- The Ancient Liturgies and their relation to the various Eucharistic Offices of the Anglican Church.
- The Creeds and Illustrative Documents.
- The History of some selected Doctrine.

#### V. APOLOGETICS :

Positive Grounds of Faith, embracing the several lines of thought by which the mind is led :

- (a) To the conviction of the Existence of God.
- (b) To the conviction of the Truth of Christianity.

Selected Ancient Christian Apologies.

Relation of Christianity to other Philosophical and Ethical Systems.

The selected works of the various groups of the above schedule, and forming part of the work thereby required for the years 1896-8, are the same as those for 1891-2, for which see Calendar for 1889, pp. 57, 58, to be obtained by application to the Registrar.

# DOCTOR OF DIVINITY.

The Candidate for this Degree must be a Bachelor of Divinity of three years' standing.

# EXAMINATION FOR THE DEGREE OF D. D.

The Candidate may select for Examination one of the five following groups of subjects, and will be required to write a Thesis on the corresponding subject specified below :

I. OLD TESTAMENT :

The Old Testament in Hebrew and Chaldee.

For Thesis: Some selected subject connected with the relation of the Old Testament Scriptures to contemporary Ethnic Faiths, or with the authenticity, doctrinal position, or other kindred question of selected portions of the Old Testament.

II. NEW TESTAMENT :

The New Testament in Greek.

Patristic and other Schools of Interpretation, with selected commentaries.

For Thesis : The authenticity, doctrinal position, or other kindred question of selected books or portions of the New Testament.

III. PATRISTIC AND ECCLESIASTICAL HISTORY :

Selected Patristic Writings.

Selected Historical Periods from Ancient, Medizval, and Post-Reformation Ecclesiastical History, with selected writings of the period.

For Thesis : Some selected Historical subject.

# IV. LITURGIES AND DOGMATIC THEOLOGY :

- The Book of Common Prayer in relation to its original sources. The History of Doctrine in the 16th Century, with special reference to the Doctrinal Position of the English Church. For Thesis : Some selected Doctrinal subject.
- V. APOLOGETICS :
  - (a) The Bearing upon the Christian Revelation of recent investigations in the various Physical Sciences and in History.
  - (b) The relation of Christianity to the various non-Christian Faiths.

For Thesis : Some selected subject from (b).

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The selected works for the various groups for the years 1896-8, are the same as those for 1891-2, for which see Calendar for 1889, pp. 60-62.

In order that a Candidate may pass in any Examination for B.D. or D.D., he must obtain thirty-three per cent. of the marks assigned to each paper, and fifty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination.

Candidates for the Degrees of B.D. or D.D. are required to preach a Sermon before the University.

Any Graduate of the University holding the office of Bishop or Dean of the Church of England, is eligible for the Degree of Doctor of Divinity, *jure dignitutis*, upon payment of the accustomed fees for that Degree.

# Froceedings in Law.

# BACHELOR OF CIVIL LAW.

The Candidate for this Degree must be a matriculated Student of Trinity University, but if he be a Student at-Law who has been matriculated by the Law Society of Upper Canada he shall be admitted to Matriculation in the University without further examination.

The Candidate must be of the standing of three years from the date of Matriculation, and of the full age of twenty three years, but the latter condition may be dispensed with in the case of Students-at-Law of Osgoode Hall who have kept three complete Termis in Arts, and passed the Primary Examination.

The Candidate will be required to pass three Examinations, separated by intervals of not less than a year, to be called the First; Second, and Final Examinations in Law. If, however, the Candidate produces a certificate of his having been called to the Degree of Barrister-at-Law by any Law Society in Her Majesty's Dominions, and be a Graduate in Arts of Trinity University, or of any recognized University, the first two Examinations may be dispensed with, and the Degree of B.C.L. may be conferred after the Candidate has passed the Final Examination only.

The Examinations in Law will begin in 1896 as follows: The First and Final on June 11 and the Second on June 16. Candidates for any Examination are required to give notice to the Registrar by June 1st, on a form which will be furnished on application.

In order that a Candidate may pass in any of the three Examinations he must obtain thirty-three per cent. of the marks assigned to each paper, and fifty per cent of the total marks of the Examination. Candidates who satisfy the Examiners will be arranged in three classes in order of merit, the standard for the 1st and 2nd class respectively being seventy and sixty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination.

Candidates who fail in the First or Second Examination, (may, at the discretion of the Examiners, be allowed to take a supplemental Examination in the following June, together with the subsequent Examination, those who fail in obtaining fifty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination being required to take the whole Examination, those who obtain fifty per cent. of the total, but fail in particular papers, being required to take only those papers in which they have failed.

# MEDALS IN LAW.

A Gold and a Silver Medal are annually awarded upon the special recommendation of the Examiners, to the Candidates who obtain the first and second places respectively in the first class at the Final Examination for the Degree of B.C.L.

# DOCTOR OF CIVIL LAW.

The Candidate for this Degree must be a Bachelor of Civil Law of seven years' standing complete.

He must compose a Thesis on some legal subject to be appointed from time to time, and send it in to the Registrar on or before May 15th, together with the fee of \$5 for its examination.

In 1896 the Candidate may select one of the following subjects for his Thesis:

The Validity of Combinations to stifle or diminish competition from the standpoint of Public Policy.

Privity of Estate.

Actio personalis cum Persona moritur.

And in 1897 one of the following subjects :

Privity of Estate.

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# Proceedings in Medicine.

## DOCTOR OF MEDICINE, AND MASTER OF SURGERY.

The Candidate for a Degree in Medicine must have matriculated in that Faculty or in Arts (see p. 36).

The \*Medical Matriculation Examination will be held twice in the year in Trinity College, beginning on the second Friday in March and October respectively.

Notice must be sent to the Registrar of Trinity University, together with the Examination fee of \$5, at least one week before the Examination, on a form which will be supplied on application.

The subjects for this Examination until further notice will be :--

(1) English Language, including Grammar and Composition.

(2) Arithmetic.

Algebra, including Simple Equations.

Euclid, Books I., II., III., with easy deductions.

(3) Latin.

Grammar.

Cæsar, Bellum Gallicum, Bks. I., II., or Bks. IH. and IV., or Bks. V., VI.; or Cicero de Lege Manilia; or Virgil, Æneid, Bk. II. in 1896, Bk. III. in 1897.

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Translation of easy passages from unspecified Latin authors.

(4) One of the following divisions, to be selected by the Candidate :

- (a) Scripture History; and St. Matthew's Gospel, ch. i.-x. incl., in Greek.
- (b) Greek : Grammar ; Xenophon's Anabasis, Bk I.
- (c) French : Grammar ; Voltaire's Charles XII., VI.-VIII.
- (d) German : Grammar ; Schiller's Thirty Years' War, Bk. I.
- (e) Natural Philosophy, including Mechanics, Hydrostatics, and Pneumatics. (Balfour Stewart's Lessons in Elementary Physics is recommended.)
- (f) Logic.

\*This Examination will not qualify Candidates to practise Medicine in Ontario, as the Ontario Medical Council only can confer a License to do so.

The standard for passing is 25 per cent. on each paper and 33 per cent. on each department.

Candidates who pass in two departments may, at the discretion of the Examiners, be allowed to take the remaining subjects at a subsequent Examination, a fee of \$5 being required for each Examination.

No change in the Ourriculum shall affect any Student who has registered in the University before March 1st in the year in which such change is announced in the University Calendar, except that any change in the requirements for the Final M.D., C.M. Examination shall apply to all Students who have not passed their Primary Examination at the time of the issue of the Calendar containing notice of such change, provided also, that Students degrading into a lower year shall be bound by the regulations affecting the year into which they have degraded.

The Candidate for Degrees in Medicine or Surgery must be of the full age of twenty-one years.

He must furnish certificates of having attended four Winter Sessions at some Medical College recognized by the University, except he be a Graduate in Arts or Science, when attendance at three Winter Sessions will be accepted.

Before admission to the Primary Examination in Medicine, he must have attended in some recognized Medical College the following courses of Lectures :---

Two courses of six months each on

Descriptive Anatomy. Practical Anatomy. General Chemistry. Materia Medica and Pharmacy. Physiology.

And one course of three months on

Botany.

Practical Chemistry, including Toxicology.

Before admission to the Final Examination, he must further have attended two courses of Lectures of six months each in some recognized Medical College on

Theory and Practice of Medicine. Principles and Practice of Surgery. Midwifery and Diseases of Women and Children. Clinical Medicine. Clinical Surgery.

And two courses of three months each on

Medical Jurisprudence. Therapeutics.

General and Special Pathology (taken in the Third Year).

And one course of three months each on

Applied Anatomy. Sanitary Science. Practical Pathology.

He must have attended for at least *eighteen* months the practice of some general Hospital and, during two sessions, Clinical Lectures on Medicine and Surgery.

He must have attended for at least six months the practice of a Lying in-Hospital, or must give satisfactory evidence of having otherwise enjoyed equivalent advantages of gaining obstetrical knowledge, with a certificate of attendance upon at least six cases of labour.

He must have passed two University Examinations, called the Primary and the Final Examinations in Medicine.

Before admission to the Primary Examination, he must produce a certificate that he has passed the First Year's Examination in some recognized Medical College.

# PRIMARY EXAMINATION IN MEDICINE.

This Examination may be passed at the end of the Second Year. The subjects are: Descriptive Anatomy, Practical Anatomy, Physiology, including Histology, General Chemistry including Chemical Physics, Practical Chemistry, Materia Medica and Pharmacy, Toxicology and Botany, unless this last subject has been passed at the First Year's College Examination.

The Primary Examination of other recognized Universities, or that of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, Quebec, or Manitoba, will be accepted in lieu of the University Primary Examination, provided that the Caudidate shall in all cases pay the full fee for the Degree, but if any of the subjects of the Primary Examination do not form part of the Examination allowed, the Caudidate shall be required to take such subjects together with his Final Examination.

Graduates of any recognized University will not be required to take such subjects of the Primary Examination as they have already passed in their University Examinations.

# FINAL EXAMINATION IN MEDICINE.

In and after 1897, Candidates for this Examination will be required to furnish proof that they have passed an Examination at the end of their Third Year in such subjects as the Faculty of the Medical College or School they may have attended may require.

In cases where this has been unavoidably, as from illness, omitted, an equivalent Examination must be passed prior to going up for the Final Examination.

The Final Examination shall take place at the end of the Fourth Year. The subjects are: Theory and Practice of Medicine; Principles and Practice of Surgery; Olinical Medicine, Clinical Surgery, Midwifery and Diseases of Women and Children, Medical Jurisprudence, Sanitary Science, Therapentics, Applied Anatomy, Practical Pathology; General and Special Pathology, unless this last subject has been passed at the Third Year College Examination.

In 1896 and afterwards, instead of one paper on Midwifery and Diseases of Women and Children, there will be two papers, one on Midwifery, the other on Gynæcology and Diseases of Children.

Pathology will be examined upon in 1898 and afterwards. In order that a Candidate may pass in either of these Examinations, he must obtain thirty-three per cent. of the marks assigned to each paper, and fifty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination. Candidates who satisfy the

Examiners will be arranged in three classes in order of merit; the standard for the first and second class respectively being seventy and sixty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination.

Candidates who do not pass in at least three of the subjects of Examination in the Examinations of the Faculty of Medicine, obtaining thirty-three per cent. of the marks of each paper, and fifty per cent. of the total marks of these subjects, shall be deemed to have failed altogether in the Examination. Candidates who pass in three subjects at least, obtaining the requisite single and total marks as above, may be allowed to take the remaining subjects at the Supplemental Examination, or at the next Annual Examination, provided that a Candidate shall not be given credit for any portion of the Examination unless he shall have obtained at least thirty-three per cent. of each paper and fifty per cent. of the total marks of such part of the Examination. A Candidate who does not complete the Examination again.

Candidates in the First Class of the Final or the Primary Examination in Medicine, shall be awarded Certificates of Honour, provided they obtain at least seventy-five per cent. of the marks of the Examination.

The Primary and Final Examinations may be taken together at the end of the Fourth Year.

Supplemental Examinations will be held beginning for Final Candidates on June 16th, and for Primary Candidates on October 1st.

#### MEDALS IN MEDICINE.

A Gold and a Silver Medal are annually awarded to the Candidates who are first and second respectively in the Final Examination, and two Silver Medals to the Candidates who are first and second in the Primary Examination for the Degree of M.D., C.M., provided that a Medal shall not be awarded to any Candidate who obtains less than seventy-five per cent. of the total marks of his Examination.

All Candidates for the Final Medals must have taken the Primary Examination in this University; and if they have not already done so, they may take it at the same time as the Final Examination.

In case of equality for the Final Medals, the Gold Medal shall be awarded to the Candidate who obtained the greatest percentage of marks at the Primary Examination. It shall be open to any Candidate who desires to do so to take the Primary Examination a second time with the Final, and in this case the Primary marks so obtained shall be those counted for the Medal.

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# Proceedings in Music.

#### BACHELOR OF MUSIC.

The Candidate for this Degree must transmit to the Registrar, before Matriculation, the Matriculation Fee and the following papers : —

(i.) A certificate of character in the following or some equivalent form :—

"I, ——, hereby certify that I have known A. B. for the last —– years, and I believe him to'be of good moral character."

(ii.) Satisfactory evidence of attainments in the form either (1) of a certificate of some public Examining Body, or (2) of a testimonial from the Headmaster of his School, or from a Master of Arts of some recognized University, to the effect that he has received a good general education.

(iii.) A certificate that he has employed five years in the study and practice of Music.

N.B.—In the case of Graduates of some recognized University, Clergymen in Priest's Orders, or Barristers (ii.) and (iii.), will not be required.

The Candidate will be required to pass three Examinations separated by intervals of not less than one year, to be called the First, Second, and Final Examinations in Music, and before admission to the Final Examination he must send to the Registrar an original Composition for voices on a sacred or secular subject, consisting of four movements: (1) a chorus or solo and chorus in five part harmony, (2) a solo in cavatina or aria form, (3) a trio or quartette, unaccompanied, and (4), a fugue in four parts, the accompaniment to be written for a string band. The movements may be in any order preferred, and the whole must occupy from fifteen to twenty minutes in performance.

Candidates who present satisfactory evidence of having passed an examination in Harmony equivalent to the First Examination in Music may be allowed to take the First and Second Examination on consecutive days.

Students of the Toronto Conservatory of Music, who have passed the First and Second Examinations for the Diploma of the Conservatory, will be exempted from the First Examination in Music, and Students holding the Diploma of the Conservatory will be exempted from the First and Second Examinations in Music, the Fee of the Second Examination when exemption from the First is granted being \$10, and for the Final Examination when exemption from the First and Second is granted being \$15.

The Examinations will begin in each year as follows :--The First and Final on the Wednesday after Easter-day and the Second Examination on the Thursday after Easterday; and the exercises for Degrees and notice for Examination must be sent to the Registrar by February 1st, on a form which will be supplied on application.

#### MEDALS IN MUSIC.

A Gold and a Silver Medal are awarded annually on the special recommendation of the Examiners to the Candidates who are first and second respectively in the Final Examination for the Degree of Mus. Bac., regard being had also to the Exercise. A Candidate will not be eligible for the Medals if five or more years have elapsed since he passed the First Examination for Mus. Bac.

# DOCTOR OF MUSIC.

The Candidate for this degree must produce a testimonial of his having studied in this faculty for the space of three years subsequent to admission to the Degree of Mus. Bac.

He must send to the Registrar an original composition for voices on a sacred or secular subject containing harmony and fugal counterpoint both in eight parts with orchestral accompaniments, sufficiently long to occupy forty minutes in performance, and this Exercise must be approved by the Examiners. He will also be required to pass an Examination in the higher branches of the Science of Music, and also work a paper on the form and scoring of a given work, and containing one or more questions respecting his own work, unless the Examiners see fit to exempt him from this Examination on account of the excellence of his exercise.
Caudidates must transmit with their Exercise for the Final Examination for the Degree of Mus. Bac., or for the Degree of Mus. Doc., the following statutory declaration :

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# Proceedings in Deutistry.

#### DOCTOR OF DENTAL SURGERY.

A Candidate for this degree must have passed the Matriculation Examination in Arts, Medicine or Dentistry of this or some other recognized University, or the Non-professional Examination for a first, second, or third class teacher's certificate, or an examination accepted by the University as equivalent to the above.

The Matriculation Examination in Dentistry which is the same as for Matriculation in Medicine will be held twice in the year in Trinity College, beginning on the second Friday in March and October respectively.

For the subjects of this Examination see page 98.

Notice must be sent to the Registrar of Trinity University together with the Examination fee of \$5 at least one week before the Examination, on a form which will be supplied on application.

The Candidate must be of the full age of twenty-one years, and must furnish a satisfactory certificate of good conduct.

He must produce certificates of having attended lectures in some Dental College recognized by the University for not less than two winter sessions, and of having spont twentyfour months in addition in the office of a legally qualified Dental Surgeon. He must pass two University Examinations called the Primary and Final Examination in Dentistry.

Before admission to the Primary Examination he must have attended in some recognized Dental College the following lectures :

One course of five months on each of the following subjects :

Special Dental and Practical Anatomy.

Chemistry.

Materia Medica.

Physiology, including Histology.

Dental Laboratory Practice.

Operative Dentistry.

Medicine and Surgery, as applied to Dentistry.

Before admission to the Final Examination he must have attended the following additional lectures :

One course of five months on each of the following subjects :

Clinical Dentistry.

Prosthetic Dentistry.

And one course of three months in Laboratory Practice in Crown and Bridge work, and in the construction of regulating devices, instruments, and appliances for Clinical Dentistry.

## PRIMARY EXAMINATION IN DENTISTRY.

This Examination will be held at the end of the First Year. The subjects are: Anatomy, Special, Dental, and Practical; Primary work in Physiology, Histology, Chemistry, and Materia Medica.

The Primary Examination of other recognized Universities, or that of the Royal College of Dental Surgeons, will be accepted in lieu of the University Primary Examination, provided that the Candidate shall in all cases pay the full fee for the Degree, but if any of the subjects of the Primary Examination do not form part of the Examination allowed, the Candidate shall be required to take such subjects together with his Final Examination.

Graduates in Arts of any recognized University, shall not be required to take such subjects of the Primary Examination as they have already passed in their University Examinations.

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# FINAL EXAMINATION IN DENTISTRY.

This Examination will be held at the end of the Final Year. The subjects are :

Operative Dentistry, Oral and Dental Pathology, Dental Anatomy, Dental Therapeutics, Prosthetic Dentistry, Physiology, Histology, Chemistry, and Materia Medica.

Students will be required to produce satisfactory evidence of proficiency in Practical Dentistry. The certificate of the Royal College of Dental Surgeons will be accepted.

The Primary and Final Examinations may be taken together at the end of the Final Year.

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# Proceedings in Pharmacy.

## BACHELOR OF PHARMACY.

The Candidate for the degree of Phar. B. must have (a) passed the Matriculation Examination in Arts, Medicine or Dental Surgery of this or some other recognized University, or (b) the Departmental Non-professional Examination (with Latin) for a first, second or third class Teacher's Certificate.

The Candidate must be twenty-one years of age, and before examination must furnish to the Registrar of Trinity University satisfactory evidence of his having attended courses of lectures on Pharmacy, Chemistry, Materia Medica, and Botany, including their collateral branches, together with laboratory work, for at least six months in some recognized College of Pharmacy or Medicine; and, also, of his having passed a practical course of instruction for at least four years under the direction of a qualified Pharmacist.

The Examination will be held in May of each year, and will embrace the following subjects :---

Pharmacy, Theoretical and Practical.

Chemistry, "

Materia Medica; "

Botany, including Microscopy.

#### DOCTOR OF PHARMACY.

The Candidate for the degree of Phar. D. must be a Bachelor of Pharmacy of at least three years' standing, and must have passed the Examination hereinafter specified, which will be held in May of each year.

The Candidate shall be at liberty to select for special study two of the following Departments, of which Pharmacy shall always be one.

PHARMACY.—Advanced work in one or more of the following :---

- (a) Assay of the organic drugs official in the British Pharmacopæia.
- (b) Methods of preparation of the official galenical compounds, and detection of impurities and adulterations.

(c) Dispensing methods, including the subject of incompatibility.

CHEMISTRY.---Advanced work in one or more of the following :---

(a) Volumetric Analysis as applied to official chemicals.

(b) Analysis of Potable and Mineral waters and Urinary Analysis.(c) Plant Analysis.

MATERIA MEDICA.-Advanced work in one or more of the following :--

(a) Principles of Pharmacognosy. (Fluckiger's Manual must be carefully studied.)

(b) Therapeutics of official drug.

BOTANY.---Advanced work in one or more of the following :---

(a) Classification.

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(b) Bacteriology.

# Admission to Ad Gundem Degrees.

Ad eundem degrees in Divinity, Arts, Law, or Music, are granted to Graduates who are resident in the Dominion of Canada, of Oxford; Cambridge; Trinity College, Dublin; King's College, Windsor, Nova Scotia; the late King's College, Fredericton, New Brunswick; Bishop's College, Lennoxville, Quebec; or the late King's College, Toronto, on their paying the fee of the degree, and making the declarations required.

Clergymen of the Church of Edgland, resident within the Dominion of Canada, being graduates in Arts of three years' standing of any chartered University in Her Majesty's Dominions shall be admissible to *ad eundem* degrees as soon as they shall have complied with the conditions requisite for the Degree of Bachelor of Divinity, or of Bachelor of -Music.

The Professors of Trinity Medical College and of the Woman's Medical College, Toronto, are in all cases admissible to *ad eundem* degrees.

Application for *ad eundem* degrees not provided for in the foregoing regulations are considered by the Executive Committee, but no such degree can be granted unless the Candidate has taken the degree at his own University in course.

Candidates taking a College Supplemental Examination in Arts or in the Divinity Class will be required to pay a fee of \$5.

If a Candidate for any Examination fails to send the notice and pay the fee by the date prescribed in the Calendar, the Registrar may at his discretion accept the notice, but he shall in all cases require the payment\*of an additional fee of two dollars.

Candidates for the First Degree in any Faculty may be admitted to such Degree *in absentia* by permission of the Executive Committee on payment of an additional fee of \$10. Candidates for Higher Degrees may always be admitted to the Degree *in absentia*.

Candidates taking the First Degree in any Faculty at a Special Convocation must pay a fee of \$5 in addition to the ordinary fee.

The annual payments made by Bachelors of Arts to Convocation will be credited in payment of the fee for M.A.

The fee for the Degree of M.D., C.M., shall be paid by the Candidate as follows: \$10 before presenting himself for the Primary Examination, and \$14 before presenting himself for the Final Examination. Candidates rejected at either Examination shall be entitled to have the fee returned to them, less \$5. Candidates conditioned, must pay a fee of \$5 for the Supplemental Examination whether taken in June, October or March.

The fee for any degree other than M.D., C.M., shall be paid when notice is given for the Final Examination together with the Examination fee.

For admission *ad eundem gradum* the Candidate shall pay the fee for the degree to which he is admitted as specified in the foregoing table of fees.

Candidates in the July Matriculation Examination taking one or two departments only will be required to pay \$2. Candidates taking the Supplemental Arts Examination, or the Matriculation Examination in October will be required to pay \$5 if they take one department only, and \$10 if they take more departments than one.

Candidates conditioned in the B.C.L. Examination will be required to pay a fee of \$2 if they take the one paper only, \$3 if they take two or three papers and \$5 if they take more papers than three.

The University Library contains 10,000 volumes, 600 of which were a gift from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge. Valuable additions have, from time to time, been made to the Library by the following donors: The Government of the State of New York, the University of Oxford, the University of Cambridge, Trinity College, Dublin, the Smithsonian Institution, Columbia College, the First Bishop of Toronto, General Sir Henry Lefroy, the widow of the late Rev. W. Ripley, the late Rev. E. B. Pusey, D.D., the Rev. J. E. Mayor (late Librarian of the University of Cambridge), the late Rev. John Smithurst, the Rev. C. J. S. Bethune (from the library of the Second Bishop of Toronto), the late Rev. Prof. Boys, the Royal Irish Academy, the Associates of the late Rev. Dr. Bray, and others.

The Library is open during Term fixed hours, when the Librarian will issue books to Graduates and Undergraduates.

All books must be returned to the Library on or before each of the four days: March 24th, June 24th, September 30th, and December 24th.

A fine of twenty-five cents for every folio or quarto volume, and of fifteen cents for every volume of a smaller size, not so returned, must be paid; the fine to be repeated fortnightly until the volume is returned.

Books marked as first-class books must be returned within a fortnight from the time they are taken out of the Library. A fine of twenty-five cents must be paid for every first-class book not so returned, the fine to be repeated weekly. Books on the curriculum of any Faculty are included in the first-class books, but the Librarian may extend the time for such books to four weeks.

Graduates of the University who do not reside in Toronto can have books sent to them on application to the Librarian. They will be required to pay the carriage both ways, and will be subject to the ordinary rules with regard to the dates for returning books and the payments of fines.
