



Seventy-six million four hundred and seventy-four thousand feet of lumber were used, worth \$2,513,265, or an average cost of \$32.86 per thousand. Of the native woods, cherry was the most expensive, at \$104 per thousand, and iron wood the cheapest at \$15 per thousand. Mahogany at \$120 per thousand was the most expensive of imported woods.

The species of woods having the technical qualities required by these industries at present grow only in small quantities in the agricultural and farming districts of Canada. For this reason, it is stated, the supply is rapidly becoming diminished.
