VOLCANIC ERUPTIONS IN WEST INDIES

NO OFFICIAL MESSAGE FROM ST. VINCENT

Panic-Stricken People Are Flocking to Kingstown-The Scenes in the Island of Martinique.

London, Sept. 6.-The colonial office has received no direct news of the reported further eruption of the Soufriere volcano in the Island of St. Vincent. Yesterday evening a cable message was received from the Island of St. Lucia to the effect that no details of the outbreak were known. These noises were accompanied by electrical discharges from La-Soufriere, which continued until 1 o'clock in the morning, when a curious roar began, lasting until 4 o'clock. This was followed by a murmuring sound, which was heard until 6 in the morning. In a short time the heavens were obscured by dust or smoke and the scene was fearful. Nobody slept at all during the night. No dust, the advices say, has yet fallen at Kingstown or Georgetown, but the atmosphere has a hazy look. Dust and pebbles fell at Barronollie at d'o'clock on the afternoon of September

Reports from Chateau Belaire are to the effect that there has been a heavy fall of sand there, and that the arrowroot cultivation on the Sharpe, Petitbordel and Richmond valley has been destroyed by the sand. No deaths have been reported.




