Why Should the Baptists of the Maritime Provinces Have Another Convention?

To the Editor of The Sun:
Sir—As your paper has given the fullest report of the doings of the new self styled N. B. Baptist convention, formed in St. John on the 20th and 21st June, I will venture to express what I think the largest number of regular Baptists in New Brunswick believe about the newly organized body.

By the statistics within my reach, I find that the delegates who met in the school room of the Baptist church represented thirty-two out of the one hundred and sixty-five Baptist churches in New Brunswick, or 1,776 of the 16,196 regular Baptists of the province. That being the case, it is rather misleading to say that the delegates met "by a convention" as was known as the "New Brunswick Baptist Convention."

The new convention owes its existence to an act of incorporation. I regret this. Baptists require nothing more than Christian fellowship to hold them together, and the ordinary laws of the land are sufficient to protect them in the possession of property and their rights as citizens, and every special law they have been made does more harm than good.

A Missionary and His Wife Tell of the Condition of Affairs in the Sultan's Land.

Rev. X. H. Basmajian gave an illustrated lecture in the basement of Central Street Baptist church last evening. He was assisted by his wife and little son. There was a good audience. Rev. Geo. O. Gates, pastor of the church, was chairman. After a few general remarks the lecturer spoke of the Sultan of Turkey. His residence was, he said, one of the grandest structures, from an architectural point of view, in the empire.

Mrs. Basmajian spoke briefly of the condition of the women of Turkey. They were, she said, allowed little or no freedom. They were kept in the house nearly all the time. In this country men and women walked together, but in Turkey the men and women were never seen walking arm in arm.

BRITISH TRADE.

An Increase in Imports From Canada.

LONDON, July 11.—The British imports from Canada have increased £394,665, or 40 per cent, in the past six months, as compared with the same period of 1893. The increases are: Sheep, £18,000; bacon, £57,000; hams, £5,000; butter, £3,000; cheese, £38,000; eggs, £1,500; fish, £278,000; wool, £280,000. Exports from Great Britain to Canada during the same period decreased 28 per cent. For June alone the imports increased 25 per cent.

SPRINGHILL, N. S., July 12.—A great town meeting was held in Fraser's hall last evening, which drew out the principal taxpayers in town and was intensely exciting. The object of the meeting was to ascertain the decision of the ratepayers concerning a proposed new town hall and civic building, also the borrowing of \$5,000, wherewith to perfect over the roads of the town with burnt stone, the refuse of the mines, and also to purchase horses for the new chemical engine.

The meeting was presided over by the Hon. Mr. Fraser. He presented a plan drawn by Dunmore of a town hall, which embodied a large town hall, municipal offices, station house, library, museum, school, court room and jail. The ratepayers rejected the proposition to build at the present time, after an exciting debate.

Rev. Father Egan begins work on the upper portion of the new stone church this week. A large force of masons has come from New Brunswick to work on the building. When finished, the Roman Catholic and the Episcopalian will have by far the finest and largest church properties in Springhill.

The Methodist church is having a thorough and tasteful renovation in its interior. During the repairs the congregation have been worshipping in Pioneer hall, but next Sunday they will have services in Fraser's hall.

HALIFAX, July 10.—The Block House mine at Cow Bay was sold by the sheriff today. Robert Ballant of New York was one of the principal owners. He and Adam Burns were the only bidders, the latter on behalf of the mortgagee. The property was known as Pioneer ball, and for \$86,000. The mortgage amounted to \$100,000.

CARLETON CO. METHODISTS.

Early History of the Church on the Upper St. John.

HARTLAND, Carleton Co., July 12.—The Methodists of the county of Carleton is no recent importation. Nearly three-quarters of a century ago it began the work of "spreading scriptural holiness throughout the land," and from that time to the present the church has been steadily pursuing the even tenor of her way.

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In 1828 the Rev. John B. Strong made an extended visit to Carleton county, and during the next four years he was followed by Revs. Arthur Wood, Sampson Busby and Arthur McNeil, the last named receiving all of Halifax, and others of this city.

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BUFFALO MAN SUICIDES.

The Ex-Postmaster and a Large Manufacturer Takes His Own Life.

BUFFALO, N. Y., July 15.—Bernard Genath, who finished his term as postmaster of Buffalo on July 1st last, when he gave way to a delirium, and who was an ex-member of the assembly, a large manufacturer, one of the best known Germans in Buffalo, and a prominent republican, shot and killed himself in a field back of his home on Seneca street this morning.

The case for the suicide is supposed to be due to the fact that Mr. Genath, who was vice-president of the Hydraulic bank, had been advised on what was considered a bad loan, on which the bank stood to lose \$12,000, which worried him so much that he was driven to suicide. Mr. Genath was worth \$180,000.

This cup was competed for by teams of ten men who fired five volleys at 500 yards. The score was as follows: England, 133 points; Scotland, 128 points; Canada, 114 points; Wales, 89 points.

BROOKLYN, July 8.—Rev. Dr. Talmage, who is now near the Antipodes, on his round-the-world journey, has selected as the subject for his sermon through the press to-day, "The Rupture in the Palace," the text being taken from Gen. 45:28, "I will go and see him before I die."

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A GLASGOW MIRACLE.

A Scotch Lassie Rescued by a Canadian.

Her Life Was Despaired of—Subject to Fainting Spells and Heart Trouble—Doctors Said Recovery Was Impossible—A Wonderful Story.

The case of "Little Nell," whose miraculous cure was reported in the newspapers, with a subsequent letter from the Rev. Samuel Harding, is but one of the series of similar cases in Glasgow. The latest is that of Miss Lizzie Duncan, a young woman who has been snatched back to life.

She was in what is termed a "doctored" state when she was taken to the hospital. Her parents, and her condition seems to have been known to a number of people. Consequently the death, and she, apparently, as well as anyone else, escaped the threatened danger.

Arriving at 208 Strirling Road, the reporter was introduced to the presence of Mrs. Duncan by a young woman, whom we proved to be Miss Duncan, who looked in no way like an invalid.

"This is the lassie," said the mother. "Heaven knows she is a good girl. She was brought upon her. Eighteen months ago Lizzie began to pine away. The color left her entirely, and she appeared to be as weak as water. She would faint at the sight of 'oh, mother, I canna rest today, and before she had got out the words her weakness became like that of a corpse, and she fell away like a dead weight."

"I was in the hospital for some time," she said, "and the doctors were all against me. I was told that I was to die. But I was brought here by a Canadian who had been to the States."
